SAT QUICK REFERENCE SHEET

- This document is compiled as a quick reference for LHS students and parents. Access the SAT website at https://collegereadiness.collegeboard.org/sat for the most updated information.
- The SAT is a college entrance exam that measures two areas: evidence-based reading/writing and mathematics. Scores on these two areas range from 200-800 and students receive an SAT total score that is the sum of the two areas (ranging from 400-1600).
- Students should check the admissions requirements for schools they are interested in and talk to their guidance counselor to determine whether
 to take the SAT, ACT, or ACT Writing, or both ACT and SAT.
- The SAT is accepted by virtually every college in the U.S. It seems to be favored by schools on the East & West coasts.
- College Board suggests that students register for the SAT during the junior year, although some students opt to register earlier.
- It is very important that students not wait until their senior year to take the SAT. Many college applications have deadlines beginning in the fall of the senior year. If you are a senior student and you have not registered for the SAT or ACT, see your counselor immediately.
- Students can take the SAT more than once to try to improve their score.
- Students with **disabilities** and **English Language Learners** may qualify for testing with accommodations. A student with an IEP, 504 Plan, or ILP should discuss this testing option with their counselor. If appropriate, an online request for accommodations can be made.
- Students who plan to play a college sport at an NCAA or NAIA school must register with the respective eligibility center for the type of school they plan to attend. In January 2023, the NCAA (https://web3.ncaa.org/ecwr3/) removed test scores from initial eligibility requirements, but your college/university may still require the ACT/SAT for admission. NAIA (https://play.mynaia.org/) may require an ACT/SAT score depending on your GPA/rank. See your coach or school counselor for clarification.
- Test fees for 2025-26 (as of June 1, 2025):
 - o SAT \$68.00
 - If a student receives free or reduced lunch, he/she is eligible for a fee waiver for up to two SATs which can be used junior and senior year. Students who qualify can obtain a form from their guidance counselor.
- Students should prepare for the SAT by:
 - Taking a rigorous, college-preparatory curriculum.
 - Taking the PSAT sophomore &/or junior year.
 - Visiting the SAT Preparation Center at <u>sat.org/practice</u>, which has many free practice opportunities, including personalized practice through Khan Academy.
 - Seeking opportunities listed below:
 - Use Method Test Prep through your Xello account, which can be accessed by logging into your PowerSchool account.
 - The Emporia State TRIO Program is a local option requiring an application. Discuss this option with your counselor.
 - Peterson's DoD MWR Library & www.eknowledge.com/mil offer preparation materials to military families.
- College Board encourages online registration at www.sat.org/register. Use a personal email, not your lypioneer account, and be sure to keep your username and password in a safe place so you can access your scores when they become available. The process to set up the account and register for the exam takes about an hour the first time. You will need to know the classes you have taken while in high school and the grades received. If you do not know this information, you can access it in PowerSchool or get a copy of your transcript from your counselor.
