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CCPS Offers the National School Breakfast Program SY 2025-2026

JONESBORO - Clayton County Public Schools (CCPS) announces that it will continue to make breakfast available at all schools during the 2025-2026 school year. Through the Community Eligibility Program (CEP), breakfast is available to all children in every grade level at no cost. According to Audrey Hamilton, Executive Director of Nutrition Services for CCPS, breakfast is the most important meal of the day because it sets the stage for learning, growth, and development. "A hungry child cannot focus or succeed in the classroom," Hamilton said. "That's why our department is committed to making sure every student has access to a healthy breakfast to support their education and well-being."

To that end, the National School Breakfast Program was created to make breakfast available and to give every child access to it. The breakfast meal service times vary by school and grade level and it is available everyday when schools are open to educate children.

Breakfast is also available to children on days when CCPS offers Extended Learning Beyond the Classroom (ELBC).

The school breakfast program provides parents/guardians an opportunity to save time, money, and resources. It also gives their children a boost to be academically successful during the instructional day!
