Creative Project

Creative projects may be assigned as open-themed (student choice) or as a closed, unit project (based upon subject matter discussed in class) meant to demonstrate the student's understanding of material(s) covered in our Social Studies Class. Each person works with the knowledge and information they receive and molds it into something they can better understand or relate with. *This is the second of our Social Studies Class goals*

Project Requirements:

An awesome project will:

- Show evidence of effort
 - Demonstration of artistic craftsmanship;
 - Application of Art Principles and Elements
 - At least four values
 - Some attention to Space and/or Balance
 - Some attention to at least two other principles and elements of Art.
 - Apparent or explained symbolism.
 - Evidence of rehearsal (dramatizations, presentations, etc.)
- Demonstrate an understanding of subject matter...WHY or HOW it is important and/or interesting to self and/or others.
 - Explains the importance of the subject matter to self and/or others.
 - Provides a connection to the individual's understanding of the subject matter
 - A purpose or message communicated in the project (overt or covert).
- Make an impact upon the audience
 - Some connection to the audience is made; creates discourse; etc.

Creative License: Think outside the box... use your talents to wow the classroom (to include):

- Musical Performance
- Dramatic Performance
- Recital of Poetry
- Dance Performance
- Artistic Creation
- Technological Presentation
- News Broadcast
- Written Project; Slideshow; Poster Presentation
- Five Geographic Themes Report
- Intelligence Briefing

Projects are individual performances. If two or more students wish to integrate their projects together, they may, as long as each performance could stand alone, and you have received prior teacher approval (not at the moment of presentation). You may also enlist the services of other people, IE: actors in your personally written script, but their performance doesn't count for their own individual project, it only enhances your project.

Writing Projects

Requirements:

- Introduction: A broad or general idea that narrows down to a specific idea, and Introduces all items to be expressed in the body of text
- Body of Text: Includes an explanation as to the importance to self and/or others of the information, and Includes at least three facts presented in class or from out-of-class sources.
- Proper citation (MLA) for all information reported
- Conclusion: A summary of all information outlined in the introduction and expressed in the body of the text, which expands from specific to general ideas.

Project Requirements:

An awesome project will:

- Demonstration of artistic craftsmanship;
 - Application of Art Elements & Principles
 - Value: At least four values
 - Color: Use of color or the intended absence of color;
 - Hot-Warm-Cool-Cold Color Scheme
 - 4 color palette (minimum or foundation of colors)
 - Balance: Consideration of balance in the final product.
 - Some attention to at least two other Elements and Principles of Art
 - Elements: Line; Shape; Form; Space; Texture; Value; Color
 - Principles: Repetition; Emphasis; Variety; Economy; Rhythm; Balance
 - Apparent or explained symbolism.
 - Well crafted final product: clean, neat craftsmanship
- Demonstrate an understanding of subject matter...WHY or HOW it is important to self and/or others.
 - Explains the importance of the subject matter to self and/or others
 - Provides a connection to the individual's understanding of the subject matter
 - A purpose or message is communicated through the art (overt or covert).
- Make an impact upon the audience with the overall product
 - Some connection to the audience is made; creates discourse; etc.

Cereal Box Project

Students will create a Cereal Box showcasing a country selected by them. Each box will include:

Box Cover ("title") This will be located on the front and on one of the sides of the cereal box like a book spine.

- Country Name
- Logo
 - Country's Flag
 - Some Identifying Feature(s)
- Fictional Cereal Company Name
- Capital City

Ingredients (Demographics) Probably best located on the second small side of the box.

At least seven of the following:

- Population
- Ethnicity Percentages
- Languages
- Gender Breakdown
- Age Group Percentages (children; young adults; middle age; old, etc)
- Educational Level Breakdown
- Sports
- Recreation
- Unemployment Rate
- Gross National Product (GNP)
- Gross Domestic Project (GDP)
- Individual Wages (breakdown of averages)
- Import/Export Status
- Major products and goods produced in the country (at least 5)
- Urban and Rural Populations
- Life Expectancy (male and female)
- Literacy Rate

Nutrition Facts: Best located on the back of the box.

- Land and Water Features (at least three each)
- Climate Zones within the country
- Place: At least three things unique to the country alone, such as Mount Rushmore in the USA.

FIVE GEOGRAPHIC THEMES REPORT (5GTR)

Slideshow or Poster Presentation

Your finished product::

- Introduction: An introduction which goes from broad to specific and lists the five themes you're going to explain..
- Location:
 - Physical Location: Specify continent, longitude/latitude, hemisphere, etc.
 - Climate or temperate zone(s)
 - Land Features and/or Water Features
- Place: Three unique things found in your geographic area..
- Region: Three things/characteristics that other similar areas share with your area..
- Movement: Three people/animals/plants that have migrated to or away from your area.
- HEI: Human Environment Interaction: Three ways in which people adapted to the environment found in your area...adaptations made to the environment in order to survive.
- Conclusion- A conclusion which goes from the specific focus (area) of your report back to the broad beginning of your introduction, including a brief summary of the information you shared in your report and listed in your introduction. The importance of your information should be stressed here if not already included in your report.
- Turned in on Time
- Craftsmanship/Art Work
 - At least three graphics for each of the five themes.
 - Powerful graphics that add to the presentation
 - Clean, organized, demonstrating effort.
- Mechanics (Script)
 - Strong control of mechanics (spelling, capitalization, grammar, etc.
 - Six Traits of Writing

Enhancements or Detractors

Your starting grade will either go up or down depending upon how well you addressed and/or completed each of the following categories:

Category	Description
Art Work	Your artwork should add to or enhance your final product. Did you: incorporate the Elements and Principles of Art; and use basic 2D design concepts? Did your artistic craftsmanship enhance your project? Did your images and graphics upgrade your project?
Symbolism	Symbolism should be included in every project. This may be overt or covert. This should add to or enhance your final project. Universal symbolism may be used to draw attention to; illustrate; or identify the importance of the subject matter to self and others. Symbolism clarifies or amplifies your purpose/message. Explains why you choose to do this project in this manner.
Content	This is the subject matter you are presenting to your audience. Basically, what is the information, and why is it important or interesting enough to share. The information must be accurate and relevant to the subject.
Mechanics	Your writing. Focus on the Six Traits of Writing. Your writing should only enhance your presentation. Bad writing takes away from your overall product. All projects require writing, either embedded in the project, or on a script. Please...no cut and paste.
Effort	There should be a demonstration of effort in your final project: attention to detail; careful craftsmanship; apparent rehearsal; a prepared script, etc. Your audience should be able to recognize the effort you put into this project. This is sort of the "wow" part, or reaction to your presentation.
