Dear Parents / Guardians,

The Palmerton Area Senior and Junior High Schools, just like schools in other districts, have had issues with vaping. However, I can say that the number of students caught vaping in school has dropped considerably with the installation of our vape detectors and cameras. Now I am not naive to think our students have quit vaping altogether. However, we can say that things have improved. Our data shows this. Please consider having a conversation today with your child / children about the dangers of vaping. Together, we can work towards a healthy future for our youth. Helpful information to assist you with this conversation is noted below.

The purpose of this letter is to inform you of the issue, give you resources if you feel your child is involved in this kind of behavior, notify you that the vape detectors are still in place, and alert you to the possible repercussions if your child engages in vaping on school property. We take this matter very seriously due to the negative health effects vaping can have on our students. We also find that some parents are often not aware of the risks associated with vaping or that their child vapes. For the 2023-2024 school year, we installed Vape Sensors in the Junior High School and Senior High School bathrooms. For the 2024-2025 school year, we also installed a sensor in our Nurse's office. The sensors alert school staff immediately when there is a detectable anomaly in the air. This will allow us to respond and hopefully address the core of the vaping problem. Again, after analyzing the data from last year, we showed a substantial decrease in vaping discipline incidents. The sensors clearly have served as a deterrent.

Student vaping may be due to an addiction to nicotine that students have developed. It could also simply be the result of peer pressure or just curiosity. Besides the serious health risks that are associated with vaping, students are spending an excessive amount of time out of class when they are doing this. Student vaping generally correlates to lower grades and a lower understanding of class material. Students who are vaping are obviously not in class so they are missing class time. Additionally, vaping on school grounds negatively impacts other students and staff members. People are exposed to harmful vapors and are also put in a very uncomfortable situation by having to witness things. This has an overall negative impact on our school community.

Vaping is the act of inhaling a vapor produced from an electronic vaporizer or e-cigarette. The vape can contain nicotine and other substances which is also concerning. The liquids that are vaporized come in many different flavors and might even smell fruity. For example, many of the flavors of these liquid concentrates are sweet and have a variety of names such as grape, strawberry, bubblegum, and lemonade. The vaporizers come in all different shapes. Some common styles are a thick pen, a stylus for an iPad, a flash drive, and a small flask with a round chimney coming off the top. Like cigarettes, stores are not supposed to sell it to people under the age of 21. However, students have reported that they have purchased them in stores, online, from older siblings or friends, and unfortunately, even parents. While we are certain that there are many stores that are vigilant about selling to people under the age of 21, there are obviously some that are not.

The Surgeon General reports that nicotine is addictive and can harm brain development. We know that using nicotine may make it harder for school-related tasks such as learning, concentration, peer pressure, and the implications on various societal norms such as being on time to class and school.

Vaping is prohibited by the Junior and Senior High School Student Handbooks / Code of Conduct. Parents must sign that they are in receipt of the Student Handbook and have reviewed the document carefully with their child. When a vape detector is triggered and a student is seen going into the bathroom by reviewing the vape camera located outside the bathroom doors, the student will be “searched” following School District policy 226.

While we certainly try to be as proactive as possible by educating students on the risks of vaping, there will be consequences for students possessing or using a vape on school district property. These consequences can include citations, police involvement, security guard involvement, suspensions, and parent contact. Our goal is to partner with parents to help support our students to make good decisions for themselves and their school community.

Another issue that bears mentioning is that the vape sensor is going off many times outside of school hours and during evening and weekend events. Please know that while we cannot tell adults what to do, please keep in mind that any type of nicotine product, including vaping, is not permitted on school property at all. More than half of the incidents occurred on weekends and or at outside events. It is not only illegal to have such products on school policy, but it is a direct violation of School Board Policy 904.
