## Mid-Summer Building Project Updates

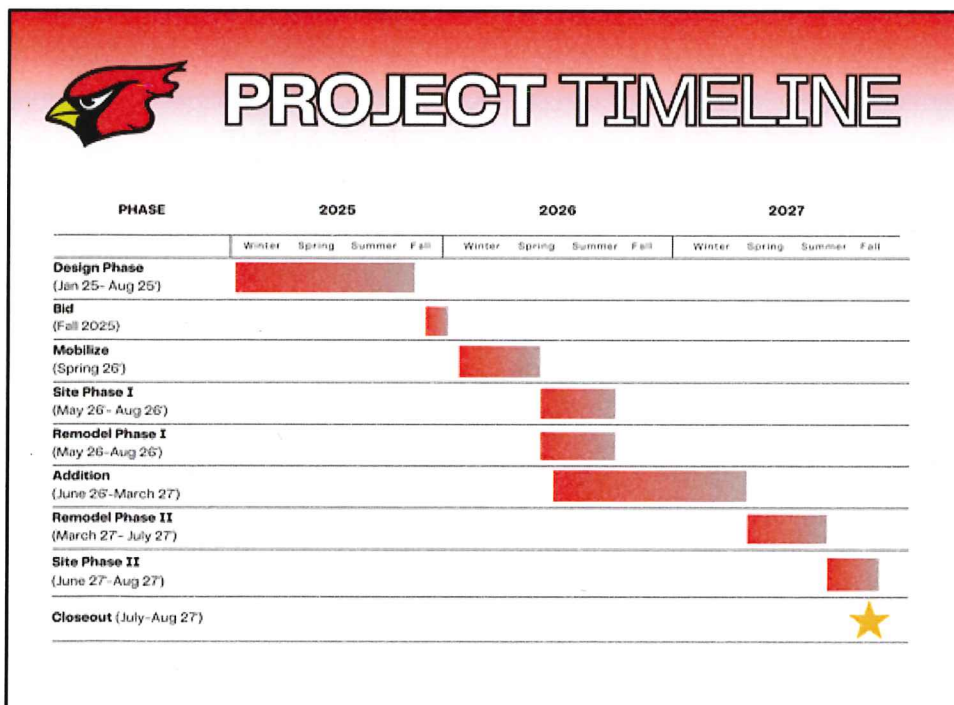
The latest developments with our building project include detailed planning related to technology, safety and security, parking lot and traffic flow as well as many finish details within design. The core team has continued to analyze details and options, making constant adjustments to ensure the project remains on time and within budget. Each month, the full Board is updated on progress and key milestones. The three most significant costs within our project are electrical, HVAC and the excavation and site work. These budgets together make up a significant portion of the project.



### What recent changes and adjustments have been made to the plans?

The core planning team comes together at least bi-weekly, often more frequently, to make continuous design decisions and adjustments. As budgets get more dialed in, the team considers the cost impact of various options in order to ensure value engineering and efficiency. Some

shifts within the project in the last several weeks include the addition of sprinklers per code requirement, decreased number of windows in the new addition, shifts in acoustic treatments



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in the ceiling, and bathroom modifications to decrease projected costs. The team made the decision to eliminate a paved parking area in the back of the school and eliminate and downsize sidewalks and concrete. The design process is a constant back-and-forth of planning, checking projected budgets, and making adjustments. The team has also been thoughtful about safety and security planning, technology, and site planning to maximize the safety and accessibility of our building. Within the planning process, the team continues to consider specifications and code requirements, as well as how to make the project conducive to the most competitive bidding.

### Timeline Updates

The project planning remains on schedule with continued design throughout the summer. The Board of Education will be presented the most recent updates and budget at their July meeting. The plan remains for the project to be ready for competitive bids this Fall. This will allow the phased projects to begin in May of 2026, with the project wrapping up by the Fall of the 2027 school year.

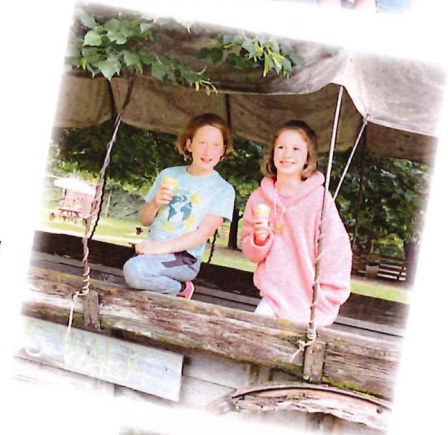
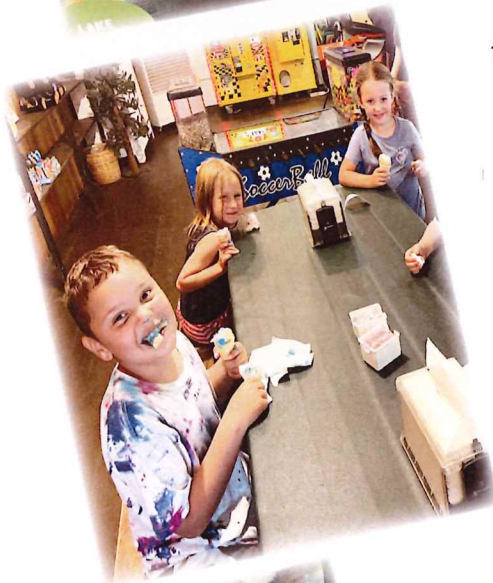
Another fun-filled week of summer school is in the books—and our 1<sup>st</sup>–3<sup>rd</sup> grade explorers were on the move!

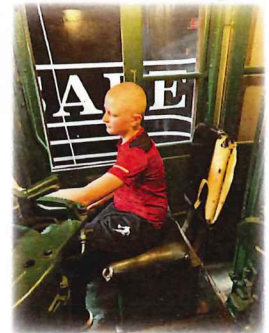
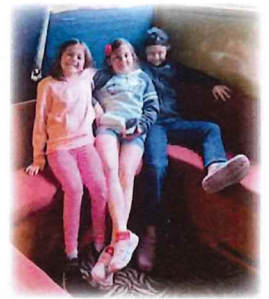

## When School's Out, Summer EBT is Here to Help!


Summer EBT (Electronic Benefit Transfer) is an income-based program that helps families buy food for their children while school is out. Wisconsin will send \$120 for each child who qualifies. You can use these benefits anywhere that FoodShare benefits are accepted, like most grocery stores, many convenience stores, and some farmer's markets.

**Your child should get benefits automatically if:**


- Your child was approved to get free or reduced price meals at their National School Lunch Program school.
- You have given your child's school an alternate household income form that shows you meet the income requirements for Summer EBT.
- Your child is school-aged and your household is part of FoodShare, W-2, the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations, or an income-based Medicaid program; or if we know they are a migrant, in foster care, or experiencing homelessness.



Watch your mail towards the end of June! If your family qualifies, you'll get a letter about your child's benefits.



Getting Summer EBT will **not** affect your child's or family's immigration status.



## 2025-2026 School Immunization Requirements

Changes to Wisconsin's child care and school-required immunizations will improve protection for children across the state by protecting them against vaccine-preventable illnesses, including meningitis and chickenpox.

### Changes include:

Adding meningococcal (MenACWY-containing) vaccine to the requirements for students entering 7<sup>th</sup> grade, and a booster dose for eligible students entering 12<sup>th</sup> grade.

Parent report of chickenpox disease is no longer acceptable for exemption from the varicella (chickenpox) vaccine requirement. Children must have a diagnosis of chickenpox from a qualified health care provider (M.D., D.O., N.P., or P.A.) to be exempt from this requirement, however existing exemption options still apply. At this time, children whose immunization record indicates a history of chickenpox (such as by parent report) are not affected.

### What has not changed?

The updated requirements leave in place the already established list of required vaccinations.

In addition, the existing exemption options are still available. There is no requirement for seasonal flu vaccination or COVID-19 vaccination.

### 2025-2026 School Immunization Requirements

For entry to kindergarten through seventh grades students need:

- 4 doses of polio vaccine
- 3 doses of hepatitis B
- 4 doses of DTaP/DTP/DT/TD
- 2 doses of varicella (chickenpox)\*
- 2 doses of MMR
- 1 Tdap at seventh grade
- 1 MenACWY-containing vaccine at seventh grade

For entry to 12<sup>th</sup> grade
