## Priorities and Opportunities

Rigorous, Community-Connected Classroom Instruction and Expanded, Enriched Learning Opportunities



Low academic proficiency (Math: 38%, ELA: 33%) indicates a need for stronger instructional support. Family and student voice call for:

More after-school clubs and sports.

Field trips and real-world experiences.

Strategic Actions:

Partner with community organizations to create hands-on learning opportunities (e.g., STEM clubs, arts programs, career exploration).

Use real-world content and culturally relevant pedagogy to connect curriculum to student lives.

Collaborative Leadership, Shared Power, and Voice Opportunities:

Staff feedback highlights a need for:

More administrative involvement

Support with behaviors and classroom needs

Strategic Actions:

Establish shared decision-making teams including staff, families, students, and community partners.

Recognize and respond to student voice in programming (e.g., clubs, play days).

Offer professional learning communities (PLCs) and shared planning time for staff to strengthen collective leadership.

Integrated Systems of Support



pportunities:

Strong partner base (50+ community partners) is available to support targeted interventions.

Strategic Actions:

Implement a multi-tiered system of supports (MTSS) for academic, behavioral, and social-emotional needs.

Culture of Belonging, Safety, and Care



Opportunities:

Behavior support and more admin involvement

Strategic Actions:

Foster inclusive practices that affirm student identity and build trust (e.g., cultural celebrations, student-led initiatives).

Train staff on equity-centered, trauma-informed care to support student well-being.

Powerful Student and Family Engagement



More after-school activities (clubs, sports, etc.)

More real-life learning experiences (like field trips)

trategic Actions:

- Expand after-school programs with input from students and families.
- Invite families to volunteer, lead workshops, or join committees, empowering shared ownership.
