Welcome to Volusia County Schools! Our goal is to build welcoming, safe, and supportive school communities for all students. The following documentation is required to register your student in a Volusia County public school:

# Verification of Legal Name and Guardianship of Student

- Certified birth certificate or passport of student
- Parent/guardian driver's license/identification

# Verification of Age

- · Certified birth certificate or passport of student
- To enter kindergarten, a child must be 5 years old on or before Sept. 1

# Verification of Immunizations and Physical Exams

- A Florida Physical form (DH3040) signed by a licensed Florida medical authority and completed within one year of registration date.
- Florida Certification of Immunization Form HRS 680

# Verification of Residency

Two different proofs of residence/address:

Mortgage deed, current lease agreement, vehicle registration or utility bill dated within the past 30 days such as a power, water, or gas bill. A driver's license is also acceptable only if it lists the address being used for enrollment as the primary residence.



# Verification of Academic History

- Last report card or most recent transcript
- Verification of Special Education Information (if applicable)
- Current Individual Education Plan (IEP) (if applicable)
- Current 504 Plan (if applicable)

All students entering Volusia County Schools must have current immunizations, unless the student has a medical or religious exemption. Contact your physician or Volusia County Health Department.

# Florida Certification of Immunization Form DH 680

Form DH 680, Florida Certification of Immunization, sometimes referred to as the "blue card," is the only document that schools are permitted to accept as proof of immunization. The child's name, date of birth, parent/guardian's name, all the vaccines and dates, and the appropriate section(s) on the reverse side of the form must be completed. If a child has not had all of the doses required to complete each immunization series, the Temporary Medical Exemption section (Part B) of the DH 680 should be completed.

# Meningococcal Disease

Meningococcal disease is a serious illness caused by bacteria. It is a leading cause of bacterial meningitis in children 2-18 years of age in the United States. Person-to-person transmission occurs with close contact with respiratory secretions or saliva. A dose of MCV4 is recommended for children and adolescents 11-18 years of age. # REQUIRED AND RECOMMENDED VACCINATIONS

# PRE-K—5TH GRADE

Varicella (chicken pox) vaccine, unless the disease has been documented on DH Form 680

# **KINDERGARTEN—12TH GRADE**

Completed diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis series (DTP, DT or DTaP), completed polio series (OPV or IPV), two doses of measles vaccine (preferably MMR), completed hepatitis B series

# 7TH GRADE

**DTaP** booster required.(Meningococcal and HPV vaccine recommended)

# **Public Records**

The Florida Public Records Law authorizes the public to inspect, photograph, and copy public records maintained by Volusia County Schools. Public records are records made or received in connection with the district's official business. However, there are many statutory exemptions from public records disclosure, and some records are statutorily designated as exempt, confidential,

or both (student information, social security numbers, health care records, etc.). Exempt and/or confidential records are subject to redaction by the district prior to production. # Focus Communications

# Let's Work Together to Keep Our Students Safe

Every student has a right to learn in a safe, healthy, and supportive environment. In Volusia County, we make the safety and well-being of your student, our employees, and all visitors a top priority. As many of you are aware, state law requires an armed, trained, safe school officer on every school campus during the school day. In compliance with state statute, we have partnered with local law enforcement to ensure all of our school campuses have local police officers, sheriff's deputies, or school guardians assigned.

Volusia County Schools is also a part of a statewide initiative called FortifyFL. It's a reporting app that allows anyone to anonymously report a threat involving schools directly to law enforcement and school administrators. The state has also requested we specifically make you aware of the following statutes:

**790.162** Threat to throw, project, place, or discharge any destructive device, felony; penalty.—It is unlawful for any person to threaten to throw, project, place, or discharge any destructive device with intent to do bodily harm to any person or with intent to do damage to any property of any person, and any person convicted thereof commits a felony of the second degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, s. 775.083, or s. 775.084.

# 790.163 False report concerning planting a bomb, an explosive, or a weapon of mass destruction, or concerning the use of firearms in a violent manner; penalty.—

- (1) It is unlawful for any person to make a false report, with intent to deceive, mislead, or otherwise misinform any person, concerning the placing or planting of any bomb, dynamite, other deadly explosive, or weapon of mass destruction as defined in s. 790.166, or concerning the use of firearms in a violent manner against a person or persons. A person who violates this subsection commits a felony of the second degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, s. 775.083, or s. 775.084.
- (2) Notwithstanding any other law, adjudication of guilt or imposition of sentence for a violation of this section may not be suspended, deferred, or withheld. However, the state attorney may move the sentencing court to reduce or suspend the sentence of any person who is convicted of a violation of this section and who provides substantial assistance in the identification, arrest, or conviction of any of his or her accomplices, accessories, coconspirators, or principals.
- (3) Proof that a person accused of violating this section knowingly made a false report is prima facie evidence of the accused person's intent to deceive, mislead, or otherwise misinform any person.
- (4) In addition to any other penalty provided by law with respect to any person who is convicted of a violation of this section that resulted in the mobilization or action of any law enforcement officer or any state or local agency, a person convicted of a violation of this section may be required by the court to pay restitution for all of the costs and damages arising from the criminal conduct.

# 836.10 Written or electronic threats to kill, do bodily injury, or conduct a mass shooting or an act of terrorism; punishment; exemption from liability.—

- (1) As used in this section, the term "electronic record" means any record created, modified, archived, received, or distributed electronically which contains any combination of text, graphics, video, audio, or pictorial represented in digital form, but does not include a telephone call.
- (2) It is unlawful for any person to send, post, or transmit, or procure the sending, posting, or transmission of, a writing or other record, including an electronic record, in any manner in which it may be viewed by another person, when in such writing or record the person makes a threat to:
- (a) Kill or to do bodily harm to another person; or
  - (b) Conduct a mass shooting or an act of terrorism.
- A person who violates this subsection commits a felony of the second degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, s. 775.083, or s. 775.084.
- (3) This section does not impose liability on a provider of an interactive computer service, communications services as defined in s. 202.11, a commercial mobile service, or an information service, including, but not limited to, an Internet service provider or a hosting service provider, if it provides the transmission, storage, or caching of electronic communications or messages of others or provides another related telecommunications service, commercial mobile radio service, or information service for use by another person who violates this section. This exemption from liability is consistent with and in addition to any liability exemption provided under 47 U.S.C. s. 230.

### 837.05 False reports to law enforcement authorities.—

- (1)(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) or subsection (2), a person who knowingly gives false information to a law enforcement officer concerning the alleged commission of any crime, commits a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082 or s. 775.083.
- (b) A person who commits a violation of paragraph (a) commits a felony of the third degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, s. 775.083, or s. 775.084, if the person has previously been convicted of a violation of paragraph (a) and subparagraph 1. or subparagraph 2. applies:
- 1. The information the person gave to the law enforcement officer was communicated orally and the officer's account of that information is corroborated by:
- a. An audio recording or audio recording in a video of that information;
  - b. A written or recorded statement made by the person who gave that information; or
- c. Another person who was present when that person gave that information to the officer and heard that information.
- The information the person gave to the law enforcement officer was communicated in writing.
- (2) A person who knowingly gives false information to a law enforcement officer concerning the alleged commission of a capital felony, commits a felony of the third degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082, s. 775.083, or s. 775.084.



Voluntary Prekindergarten/Early Learning Initiative is a program available to children who are 4 years old on or before September 1 of the current school year. This program teaches children the skills they need for a successful transition into kindergarten. This specialized program is offered at no cost to parents for three hours of VPK instruction. A full school day program is available for an additional cost to parents if they choose to attend.

Volusia County Schools VPK teachers have one primary goal when planning and preparing our students: kindergarten readiness. Kindergarten readiness is a journey and transition into formal academic instruction. Many skills and capabilities are needed for this transition to be successful. Kindergarten readiness does not mean already knowing kindergarten skills but rather having a foundation of knowledge and exposure that helps students better prepare for their kindergarten experience.

During this program, the students will be taught the Florida Early Learning and Developmental Standards: Physical Development, Approaches to Learning, Social and Emotional Development, Language and Literacy, Mathematical Thinking, Scientific Inquiry, Social Studies, Creative Expression Through the Arts.

# Extended Day Enrichment (EDEP) Programs

Extended Day Enrichment Program (EDEP) provides structured academic enrichment for school-age children in grades K-8. Every child and youth should have a safe and supportive environment while engaging in activities that support academic achievement and promote social, emotional and physical development before and after the regular school day.



EDEP Programs are staffed with qualified after-school personnel. For more information, please reach out to the EDEP district office at 386-734-7190, ext. 20353 or 20624, the site lead/facilitator at your child's school, or visit the EDEP district website.

- EDEP afternoon program is for students in grades K 5 and is offered at 40 elementary schools
- EDEP morning program is for students in grades K 8 and is offered at 10 middle school & 12 elementary school sites

These standards provide learning goals for students in every grade. Under the standards your child will be learning from kindergarten through fifth grade to read and respond to what they have read; build foundations in vocabulary and content for Physical, Earth, Space and Life sciences; be fluent in mathematics; and study the traditions, history and geography of Florida, the United States, and other countries. # Meeting the Needs of our Middle School Students

Between the ages of 10 and 14, children can experience dramatic physical changes, and these years are often characterized by mood swings and feelings of insecurity. Middle school children's behavior can vary from mature to immature, and they may feel confused and perplexed by their rapidly changing bodies. Often during middle school years, our children's friends become more essential to them. While they continue to value the adults in their lives, they often seek approval from their peers.

In order to meet these dramatic changes, middle schools in Volusia County strive to address the social-emotional needs of our students as well as their academic needs as they transition from childhood to adolescence. In addition to rigorous academic programs and opportunities for students to receive academic intervention and academic acceleration, students receive embedded instruction and guidance regarding social-emotional learning that is vital as they navigate these challenging years. Parent involvement in their child's middle school years is essential, and we strongly encourage parents to utilize the various resources available at your school to support your child's transition and strengthen our home to school connection.



# Middle School Testing

Required state testing for middle school includes: Florida's Assessment of Student Thinking (F.A.S.T.) testing for English language arts and mathematics (grades 6-8), FSASS testing for science (grade 8) and end of course (EOC) testing for civics (grade 7) and applicable high school level courses (Algebra or Geometry). Multiple high school level courses are available for students to accelerate their learning and earn high school credits. In addition, career exploration and a variety of career academies are available in our middle schools. We encourage parents to reach out to their assigned middle school to learn more about the academies and programs offered at their child's school.

# **Middle School Promotion**

In order to be promoted to the next grade level within a middle school, a student must make acceptable progress in at least four of the seven courses they are enrolled in during the school year. This must also include satisfactory completion of at least three of the four core courses: English, mathematics, science, and social studies. In order to be promoted to grade nine, middle school students must have successfully completed three courses in English, three courses in mathematics, three courses in science, and three courses in social studies (one of which must be civics).

All public high school programs meet or exceed state requirements. Extensive offerings are available in language arts, mathematics, social studies, science, music, dance, theatre, art, world languages, career and technical education, and physical education. High schools also have specialized credit retrieval labs, which provide an opportunity for high school students to retrieve failed credits through a competency-based, online curriculum and remain on track for graduation. Specific courses, including elective offerings, vary between schools based on student demand, community needs, and staff availability. The curriculum for high school students represents rigorous standards and high expectations. Each subject taught has its own curriculum map or requirements as outlined by state requirements. The curriculum map or requirements confirm the minimum knowledge of what students should know and be able to do by the time they graduate high school.

Special academic programs include **Advanced Placement (AP)** at all high schools, which offers students the opportunity to take college level courses while still in high school. Many colleges give credit and/or advanced college standing to students who attain an acceptable score of three or above (five-point scale) on an AP examination.

The International Baccalaureate (IB) diploma program is designed as an academically challenging and balanced program with final assessments that prepare students for success in college and life beyond. Students may choose to pursue the IB diploma or take individual certificates in IB courses. This program is offered at DeLand High School and Spruce Creek High School.

The **Cambridge International/AICE** program is based on a rigorous international curriculum with a global examination system that emphasizes the value of a broad and balanced study within college level academic courses. Students may master a range of skills critical for success at the university level and may pursue the AICE international diploma. This program is offered at Atlantic High School, Deltona High School, Mainland High School, New Smyrna Beach High School, Pine Ridge High School, Seabreeze High School, and University High School.

The **Dual Enrollment** program provides students an option to simultaneously earn college credit toward an Associate of Arts/Science degree or vocational credit toward a certificate program while meeting the requirements for a high school diploma. Dual enrollment is available through Daytona State College, University of Florida, and Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University.

# **Graduation Requirements**

Graduation from a Volusia County high school is determined by the number of credits earned. In addition to taking the required coursework to graduate, a student must:

- Have earned a cumulative grade point average of 2.0 on a 4.0 scale; and
- Have passed all the applicable testing requirements

# Graduation Academy Labs / Virtual Learning Labs

This program serves students who may benefit from a setting that is an alternative to the traditional school day. Students and their teacher(s) will be in a blended learning environment. This means that a bulk of the students' coursework is done in a virtual setting while the teacher provides support in setting daily, weekly, and monthly academic goals for successful completion of required courses. The teacher is trained in working one-on-one with students to support their individualized learning path. Goal setting helps set cooperative pacing and encourages students to master skills as they move on to more difficult materials until they complete the requirements for each course. These centers offer individualized, self-paced online learning for students wanting to earn credits at their maximum pace while moving toward graduation.



# What is Career & Technical Education?



Career and Technical Education (CTE) provides students with hands-on learning experiences that prepare them for success in both college and high-demand careers. Through a wide range of courses, programs, and career academies at the secondary level, students explore fields such as healthcare, finance, information technology, aerospace, engineering, and skilled trades.

As part of their CTE experience, students build:

- Technical skills specific to a career pathway
- Academic knowledge aligned to college and career expectations
- Employability skills that are essential for success in any workplace.

CTE programs in middle and high schools build career awareness and provide students with technical skills for high-skill, high-wage careers

- Middle School: Introductory courses expose students to career fields, often offering digital tools certificates or industry certifications.
- High School: Students complete a sequence of three or more job preparatory courses and can earn industry certifications aligned with workforce needs.
- Career Academies: Small, focused learning communities combining academics, technical training, and real-world experiences like internships and on-the-iob training.

Career academies are CHOICE programs that require an application for admission.

## **Career Technical Student Organizations (CTSOs)**

### **Digital Tools Certificates (Grades 6 - 8)**

Digital Tools exams are offered to middle school students to support the development of digital skills in areas such as word processing, coding, presentations, and digital citizenship.

# Industry Certifications (Grades 8 - 12)

Volusia students can earn over 120 industry certifications, demonstrating mastery of in-demand technical skills. These credentials support college and career acceleration, increase lifetime earnings, and can lead directly to employment opportunities

### **Articulated College Credit**

The Florida State Board of Education has approved 119 industry certifications that allow students to earn college credit for their demonstrated technical skills.

# Help Stop Bullying

Bullying is a widespread and serious problem that can happen anywhere. It is not a phase children have to go through, it is not "just messing around," and it is not something to grow out of. Bullying can cause serious and lasting harm.

Although definitions of bullying vary, most agree that bullying involves: 1) imbalance of power — people who bully use their power to control or harm others, and the people being bullied may have a hard time defending themselves; 2) intent to cause harm — bullying is not an accident; the person bullying has a goal to cause harm; and 3) repetition — incidents of bullying often happen to the same person over and over by the same person or group. Bullying can take many forms. Examples include: verbal — name calling, teasing; social — spreading rumors, excluding people intentionally or breaking up friendships; physical — hitting, punching, shoving; or cyberbullying — using the internet, mobile phones or other digital technologies to harm others. To report a possible incident of bullying, immediately talk to your school's administration.


# Your Rights as Parent

There are times when you may need to be an advocate for your child at school. You may need to speak up when you see that your child's needs are not being met. Getting to know your child's school and teacher is the first step in being a good advocate. According to the Florida Department of Education, you have the right to:

- Examine your child's school records and look at test results and teacher comments. If you see things you don't understand, ask the teacher or school principal for an explanation.
- Be a part of developing an individual educational plan to meet your child's needs if your child is in a special education program.
- Request parent-teacher conferences during the school year. Write down your questions and concerns before the meeting. Remember you are in a position to share important information as well as ask questions.
- Ask for a review of the decision if your child is suspended from school.

# Volusia County School's chain of support

If you have an issue with your child at school, first talk with your child's teacher. If the teacher is unable to help you resolve the issue, seek assistance from others. The chain of support is as follows:



Volusia County Schools is committed to delivering highquality instruction to all of its students. Stay in touch with your student's progress by accessing their schedule, attendance, discipline, grades, test history, announcements, online forms and messages via the district's Parent Portal. Accounts are available for all students enrolled with Volusia County Schools and are easy to set up. To ensure safe access to student

information, all portal account access must be verified by PIN. The PIN is provided by the student's enrolled school and is required to establish a Parent Portal account. If you need your student's PIN, you can contact your enrolled school or by contacting the Technical Help Desk at call 386-734-7190 ext. 25000. Follow the instructions below to set up and/or access the account.

# English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL)

English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) is a program that serves to meet the language and academic needs of a diverse English Language Learner (ELL) population that speaks over 60 languages. ESOL instruction integrates strategies for teaching English as a Second Language in accordance with the curriculum standards requirements to provide comparable and comprehensible instruction. This instruction helps English Language Learners (ELLs) develop the communicative and academic skills necessary for meeting national, state, and district educational

# Dual Language Program

The Volusia County Schools' Two-Way Dual Language Program offers students in select schools the opportunity to become bilingual and biliterate in English and Spanish, while maintaining high academic standards.

The program begins in VPK or kindergarten and requires a commitment from VPK through grade five or kindergarten through grade five. Students experience half of their academic instruction in English and the other half in Spanish. All literacy and content instructions in both languages are aligned with state standards.

# Translation/Interpretation

The ESOL Department provides translation and interpretation services for limited English proficient families. An interpreter can be provided for teacher conferences, ESOL/ESE meetings, etc. This service is to help parents become more involved in their children's education.

# Parent Leadership Council

The Parent Leadership Council (PLC) is established with parents from different schools in the district. During these PLC meetings, parents, teachers, school staff, and community groups are provided with training opportunities and information. The goal of PLC is to empower parents to become active participants in their child's education and enhance the district-to-school communication.

# Florida Seal of Biliteracy

of Biliteracy. This graduation distinction is earned with four years of a high school world language with a 3.0 unweighted average or the required score on an approved assessment. Eligible students must also earn the required ELA score. The Seal of Biliteracy is intended to identify students with 21st-century global and linguistic competency for prospective employers and college admissions. It is also intended to honor the multiple cultures and languages in a community. Typically, more than 300 graduates earn this distinction every year. # World Languages

A 21st-century education includes the study of world languages and cultures. Every opportunity for language acquisition offers our students unique advantages for personal growth and future professional success. The study of a second (or third, or fourth) language enhances the student's ability to master critical learning skills necessary for academic success.

One of the best ways to find out how your child is doing in school is through a parent-teacher conference. The following tips will ensure a successful result for your child.

# Before the Conference Tips for Parents:

- Teachers are contracted to be in school during school hours and for a short period of time before and after school. You will need
  to arrange to come to school during that time for the conference. Teachers must have 24 hours notice before a parent-teacher
  conference is scheduled.
- If you anticipate language differences, ask for an interpreter. The conference can be scheduled for a time when the interpreter can be present.
- Find out how your child feels about school (ask what he or she likes best or least and why).
- Prepare questions or concerns you wish to discuss.
- Everyone's time is valuable. Please be sure to be on time.

# During the Conference Tips for Parents:

- A parent-teacher conference may bring up all kinds of feelings. REMEMBER: the conference is an opportunity to work with the teacher as a team.
- Since conference time is limited, stay focused on the topic.
- Share observations from home about your child's strengths and weaknesses.
- Share relevant medical information concerning your child's general health, allergies, vision problems, etc.
- Share any relevant changes in the family situation.
- Listen carefully and ask the teacher to explain any terms or concepts you don't understand.
- Ask for more information or examples/samples of student work or behaviors that are relevant to the topic of the conference.
- If the teacher points out areas where your child needs to improve, ask for a plan to help your child make the improvements and ask how you can help.
- Be sure to sign and ask for a copy of the Record of Conference Form.
- If necessary, make an appointment for a follow-up phone conversation or conference.
- If you feel uncomfortable with the manner in which the conference is progressing, politely stop the conference and request the presence of an administrator.

# After the Conference Tips for Parents:

- Follow through on suggestions made during the conference.
- Continue the open lines of communication throughout the year.



Educational choice is the practice of allowing all families to make meaningful decisions about how and where their children will receive a primary and secondary education from a variety of schools and programs. In Volusia County, options may include, but not be limited to, controlled open enrollment, charter schools, advanced programs, dual enrollment, home school, virtual school and career academies.

# **Choice for Capacity**

Each Volusia County school is considered a school of choice and will be designated with one of the following classifications: substantial capacity, limited capacity, or waitlisted. Available school capacity is the primary determining factor for approvals of choice applications. The classification of each school is based on projected student enrollments.

# Teenage Parent Program

A public charter school specifically designed for pregnant and parenting teens and young adults, along with their children, offers a unique educational environment. Transportation services are available for both the student and their baby. In this setting, students apply classroom lessons by interacting with children in the childcare environment, passing on valuable skills to their own children. The school accepts vouchers from the Early Learning Coalition and Daytona State College. It provides a blend of hybrid online learning and live-taught classes, with certified teachers offering assistance and supervision throughout the day.

# **Career Academies**

Career Academies offer students unique, career-focused learning experiences that connect classroom instruction with real-world applications. Through strong business partnerships, students participate in hands-on projects, field studies, service learning, job shadowing, internships, and Career & Technical Student Organizations (CTSOs). Teachers collaborate with industry partners to help students build the skills needed for success in today's workforce. Many academies also offer opportunities to earn industry certifications and college credit through dual enrollment. Volusia County Schools offers 46 career academies across all 10 high schools.

# Volusia Online Learning

VOL is a full-time, comprehensive VCS school that serves students in grades K-12. Families who choose VOL want a virtual alternative to the traditional school setting that leads to a high school diploma. Typically, parents and students want additional flexibility while maintaining the pace, structure, and service of a brick-and-mortar school. Although students and teachers are separated by time and space, they work together to achieve high levels of learning.



Volusia Online Learning brings together the best technologies, the best curriculum and most importantly, the best of Volusia County teachers, who provide a rigorous online experience for their students. All Volusia Online Learning courses are aligned to Florida's standards while using online resources, virtual lessons, teacher discussions, and a variety of tools to help follow the courses' curriculum. Interested families can apply for Volusia Online Learning during the annual open enrollment period by visiting our website at www.volusiaonlinelearning.com.

# **VFlex**

VFlex is Volusia County Schools' part-time virtual option and is equivalent to FLVS Flex. VFlex uses the same curriculum and platform as FLVS, but with VCS teachers. VFlex offers courses to supplement secondary students' current brick-and-mortar schedule. Thousands of Flex courses are taken each year by VCS students. We have



recently expanded our course offerings to meet the needs of students.

This flexible alternative satisfies a wide range of educational needs, accommodating everyone.

Please note that part-time offerings have limited capacity and enrollment is approved on a first-come, first-served basis.

# VFlex+

VFlex+ is a part-time program designed for Home Education students who want the full-time experience without the full-time requirements. VFlex+ students can take up

to six courses and receive academic counseling and support to help them maintain a pathway to a high school diploma, should they ever return as a full-time student.



Home Education students can apply

The Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (F.A.S.T.) is a progress monitoring assessment that is administered three times per year, which measures student success with the Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) Standards. It includes assessments in English Language Arts (VPK through grade 10) and Mathematics (VPK through grade eight). Progress monitoring provides real-time data that will inform students, teachers, and parents about individual student growth.

Students in Algebra 1, Geometry, Biology, U.S. History, and Civics will take the state End-of-Course (EOC) assessment that will constitute 30% of the final course grade. Students in grades five and eight will continue to take the statewide Science Assessment in the spring.

# Achievement Levels

Achievement levels describe the success a student has achieved on the B.E.S.T. Standards which are tested on the F.A.S.T. Achievement Levels range from 1 to 5, with Level 1 being the lowest and Level 5 being the highest.

# Academic Proficiency and Promotion Requirements

Report cards are provided at regular intervals to keep parents fully informed of their child's academic proficiency. If your child has not demonstrated mastery/proficiency (grade C or better) in a reading, language arts, mathematics, or science course, he/she is not meeting minimum state and district expectations. Promotion is based on how well students are performing according to the B.E.S.T. Standards. The Volusia County School Board has established criteria for student progression, which includes state and district requirements. The Student Services department provides a wide array of assistance programs, specialized services, and comprehensive services to students, staff, and parents. The Student Services department includes school counseling services, school social services, school psychological services, positive behavior support, and health services. # School Counselors

School Counselors provide comprehensive lessons and guidance to students which includes academic support through planning and goal setting, career and college assistance, and individual and group counseling sessions to address emotional and behavioral opportunities. School counselors advocate for students' needs and connect families with external resources and services when necessary. They also collaborate with teachers, parents, and administrators to create a supportive learning environment, develop intervention strategies, and implement programs that promote students' well-being and resilience.

# School Social Workers

School Social Workers serve as a vital link between the home, school, and community in order to help students increase academic and social/emotional success. School Social Workers are professionally trained in social work and counseling. Their skills and expertise enable them to deal with the multiple needs of students. They work with students both individually and in group settings, make home visits, collaborate with school staff and community agencies, monitor school attendance, conduct social and developmental assessments, and provide information and referral services in order to help meet the needs of students and families.

# Mental Wellness Team

Volusia County Schools has incorporated an internal District Mental Health Team that works in collaboration with school staff and families to provide preventative services, intervention to address mental health concerns, and crisis support. The clinicians conduct mental health evaluations as well as provide small group and individual counseling sessions utilizing evidenced-based interventions. The District Mental Health Team assists parents and caregivers by providing resources and assisting families in obtaining mental health services through our partnership with multiple community agencies. The team serves as a vital role in training all Volusia County Schools staff in Youth Mental Health First Aid and provides additional professional learning opportunities related to mental health. # School Psychological Services

Our school psychologists are specially trained professionals dedicated to helping your child succeed in school and beyond. We work directly with students, families, and teachers to address challenges and build on strengths in learning, behavior, and development. School Psychologists partner with families, teachers, administrators, and other professionals to create safe, healthy, and supportive learning environments that strengthen connections between home, school, and the community. # School-wide Positive Behavior Intervention & Support

School-wide Positive Behavior Intervention & Support (PBIS) teams, as part of the Volusia County Behavioral Initiative (VCBI), work to improve school climate by inspiring a safe and civil learning environment for all students and adults. Members of the Student Services department, working collaboratively with school-based PBIS teams, assist with reviewing current practices, identifying school climate strengths and areas of concern, and problem-solving to develop a customized plan for maintaining a positive and proactive behavioral approach designed to teach social and personal competencies.

# School Health Services

School Health Services are provided to students in grades Pre-K through 12. These services are considered to be both preventative as well as treatment directed. School nurses and clinic assistants address the needs of students who enter the clinic with an assortment of health issues. Services provided are intended to supplement, rather than replace, parental responsibility. School nurses and clinic assistants encourage parents to monitor their child's health and the use of physicians, dentists, and community health agency services. It is expected that children who receive services through the school health program will have fewer visits to physicians and emergency rooms, fewer days lost from school due to illness, and will receive daily monitoring for chronic health conditions.

PTAs (Parent Teacher Associations) and PTSAs (Parent Teacher Student Associations) make up the largest volunteer child advocacy organization in the United States. A not-for-profit association of parents, educators, students, and community members, the PTA encourages parental and public involvement in public schools. PTAs provide members with parent education, leadership training, and a powerful voice of advocacy on behalf of all children. PTO (Parent Teacher Organization) is an independent group which also supports children and educational issues.

# Volunteers in Public Schools

Studies have shown that children whose parents are involved at school have a greater self-esteem, a more positive attitude toward school, improved performance, and better behavior. School volunteer programs benefit all participants. Parent volunteers have a greater understanding of the educational process while receiving direct satisfaction of helping children succeed. School staff receive a helping hand, while the community reaps the reward of millions of dollars of work provided free.

Volunteer opportunities are everywhere, from helping in classrooms/special areas, chaperoning on field trips, tutoring/mentoring, to holding leadership positions in parent organizations/advisory councils. Chaperoning on overnight trips and/or serving as a band adjunct requires fingerprinting. To volunteer, fill out an online volunteer application and have your government issued ID with photograph scanned into our Raptor Visitor Management System. Once approved, your application will be valid for one school year, through June 30. # School Advisory Council (SAC)

Each school annually elects a School Advisory Council (SAC) to share responsibility for supporting the school's continuous improvement. This advisory group is made up of the principal, teachers, support staff, parents, business partners, and students (high school only).

### The SAC role is:

- Prioritizing the needs of the school
- · Developing strategies for improving the areas of need
- Developing a plan for measuring the results of the School Improvement Plan (SIP)
- Assisting in the preparation and evaluation of the SIP
- Assisting in the preparation of the school's annual budget
- Deciding how to spend the SAC funds to meet the SIP goals

When students struggle academically or behaviorally or have other barriers to learning, strategies and interventions are put in place to address student needs. When it appears that a student's needs cannot be met with general education interventions, a student may be referred for evaluation for possible Exceptional Student Education (ESE) consideration.

Both students with disabilities and students identified as gifted receive services and supports through the district's Exceptional Student Education (ESE) department. Students with disabilities have an Individual Education Plan (IEP) developed to meet their unique educational needs. Students who meet gifted eligibility criteria have an Educational Plan (EP).

For most students with IEPs, efforts are made to serve students in their neighborhood zone school when possible. Certain programs may require students to attend a different school which offers the program. This is typically true for students in low incidence programs, including the district's gifted program.

For students with IEPs, the district is committed to ensuring that students are served in the Least Restrictive Environment (LRE) to meet their educational needs, as this is a foundational principle of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). For example, a

student with a mild learning disability may be able to have their IEP addressed in a general education classroom as opposed to a more restrictive setting. As a result, student progress is reviewed regularly to ensure that LRE for each student is being addressed.

School districts are also required to meet the needs of preschool children (ages 3-5) who have been identified with a disability. The identification of children with disabilities and the development of a service plan is done through the district's Child Find office. If you suspect your child has a developmental delay or disability and would like a screening, contact the Child Find office at 386-734-7190, ext. 52841.

Parents/guardians of K-12 students suspecting that their child may have a disability are encouraged to contact the chair of the Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS), formerly known as the Problem Solving Team (PST), at their child's school. This team of educational professionals will help identify interventions and supports for a student to be successful (i.e., in general education or ESE if eligible). Parents/guardians of students who are already identified as a student with a disability or giftedness may contact your child's ESE teacher(s) for assistance. Frequently asked questions for parents/guardians regarding ESE services can be found on the ESE Parent/Guardian Q&A.

# The Volusia County ESE Advisory Committee

The Volusia County ESE Advisory Committee is comprised of families and professionals dedicated to collaborative interaction among schools, service agencies, and the public. The committee meets virtually on a regular basis to gain information on issues that pertain to students served in Exceptional Student Education (ESE) in Volusia County.

Per recommendations from members, two groups, formerly known as the ESE Task Force and ESE Advisory, consolidated into the Volusia County ESE Advisory Committee, which is an outcome-focused group that supports the district's mission and strategic plan advocating for students with disabilities. The Volusia County ESE Advisory Committee supports collaboration with parents and community members. Our goal is to identify areas for improvement and make meaningful recommendations to promote the success of all students. # School Parent & Family Engagement (PFEP)

Since family support is so critical to student success, Volusia County Schools encourage all families to attend a Title I orientation meeting, offered at the student's school, to learn about the program and the role of parents in the success of their child's education. Parents are encouraged to become engaged in the education of their children at home and school. With input from families, every school that receives Title I funds must develop an annual Parent & Family Engagement Plan (PFEP). # What Parents Can Do to Help Children Thrive at School

As a parent or caregiver, you have a key role in your child's education—you can help bridge your child's transition from home to school, and give him or her the best chance at success in learning and in life. Here are some ways teachers suggest parents can help support their child's success in school:

- · Set high expectations for your child.
- Make sure your child is in school every day and on time. Attendance matters!
- Monitor Parent Portal.
- Work collaboratively with your child's teachers and talk to them about goals and expectations for your child.
- Talk to your child each day about what he or she is doing in school and discuss what he or she learned.
- Encourage your child to complete assignments, and see that she or he finishes them.
- Help with time management.
- Encourage independent problem solving.
- Monitor activities such as too much time on social media, TV, video games, text messaging, and phone talk time.
- Attend parent-teacher conferences.
- Participate in family engagement and volunteer opportunities.
