WEST HARTFORD SPEED MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

The Town of West Hartford has received a Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation to fund an 18-month Speed Management Pilot Program. The goal of the program is to reduce speeding related traffic crashes and reduce dangerous speeding at high-risk areas.

As part of this initiative, the West Hartford Town Council has approved an ordinance allowing the use of automated traffic enforcement cameras, including speed and red-light cameras. The grant funding will allow the Town to develop an Automated Traffic Enforcement Safety Devices (ATESD) Plan, along with the necessary documentation to meet National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requirements for implementing the program

This pilot will include approximately 15 active speed safety camera locations throughout West Hartford. The candidate locations will be selected based on crash data available from the CT Crash Data Repository, traffic volumes, the Vision Zero Focus Areas, police data and other factors. Before speed safety cameras can be installed, the locations must be approved by the West Hartford Town Council, the Office of State Traffic Administration (OSTA), with supporting materials indicating the locations must OSTA).

In accordance with Connecticut General Statute §14-307c(d), any revenue from citations will be reinvested to enhance traffic safety across the Town

Public Engagement is a critical part of developing the Speed Management Plan to identify candidate locations and install speed safety cameras. Two public information meetings are scheduled to be held along with engaging the Vision Zero Advisory Committee, the Town Council, and the Community Planning Economic Development Committee (CPED). SPEED CAMERAS AS A VISION ZERO STRATEGY


- High vehicle speeds can create dangerous conditions for pedestrians, cyclists and drivers leading to serious and fatal injuries.
- West Hartford embraces the principle that traffic deaths and serious injuries are unacceptable and preventable.
- A Speed Management Camera Program supports the Town's Vision Zero Plan:
 - Automated Traffic Enforcement Safety Devices are proven tools that encourage safer driver behavior
 - Up to a 40% reduction in fatal and serious injury crashes.
 - (Source: National Highway Traffic Safety Administration NHTSA)
 - A significant decrease in excessive speeding.

What is an Automated Traffic Enforcement Safety Device (ATESD)?

• House Bill 5917, signed into law in June 2023, authorized the use of both speed

and red-light cameras.

- Can only be installed in four types of locations:
 - 1. Traffic signals for red light running
 - 2. School zones for speeding
 - 3. Pedestrian Safety Zones for Speeding
 - 4. Other locations for speeding
- Devices that record violations of speeding or running red lights.
- Images capture license plate, date, time and location of violations.





Speed Management Cameras

- West Hartford received a Federal Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) grant to support an 18-month Speed Management Pilot Program for approximately 15 locations.
- Topic of today's Public Meeting.

Red-Light Cameras

- West Hartford subsequently received a second Federal Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) grant which will support an 18-month pilot program of automated redlight enforcement.
- Grant is pending final agreement. Red-light cameras will be subject to separate public meetings at a future date.





Requirements for Implementation

- Town Ordinance (Adopted 4/8/2025)
- ATESD Plan
 - Public Hearing (Town Council Meeting / Anticipated September 2025)
 - Approval from Town Council by vote
 - Review and approval by CT Department of Transportation Office of the State Traffic Administration (OSTA)
- National Enviornmental Policy Act (NEPA) Documentation (Federal Grant Requirement)





• The Town Council approved an ordinance allowing the use of Automatic Traffic Enforcement Safety Devices (ATESD) on April 8, 2025 consistent with requirements of State Law (Town Code: Chapter 168 Article VII; C.G.S.14-307). This ordinance permits the use of both speed management cameras and red-light cameras.

Violations Covered Under the Ordinance (168-40):

- Exceeds the posted speed limit by 10 mph or more.
- Fails to stop at a steady red traffic signal.
- Violations are municipal citations issued to the owner of the motor vehicle, not the driver (similar to parking tickets)
- Per State Law, citations are not a moving violation and is not reflected on any driving record





Review Process (168-41)

• A WHPD sworn officer or authorized town employee will review and approve recorded images before issuing citations.

Fines (168-42)

- \$50 for the first violation and \$75 for each subsequent violation within 1-year.
- A 30-day warning period will be in place before fines are issued for each camera location
- Online payment option is available with a processing fee not to exceed \$15.

Right to Appeal (168-43)

Vehicle owners may appeal the fine within 10 days.





<u>Use of Funds (168-42)</u>

- As required by State Law, funds collected from fines will be invested directly back into the West Hartford community by supporting:
 - Transportation safety and mobility improvements
 - Infrastructure enhancements
 - Costs associated with automated enforcement programs

Vendor Payment (C.G.S. 14-307c (b))

 Vendor fees for installation, operation, or maintenance of ATESD cannot be contingent on the number of citations issued or fines paid.





Privacy (168-45)

- No personal identifiable information shall be disclosed by the Town except where disclosure is made in connection with the charging, collection, and enforcement of the fines.
- No personally identifiable information shall be stored or retained by the Town or camera vendor unless the information is necessary for the charging, collection, and enforcement of the fines.
- The Town or vendor shall destroy any retained portion of personally identifiable information not later than one year after the date of such person's most recent violation.





Reporting Requirements

- State Law and SS4A Grant Agreement both require reporting to measure effectiveness of ATESDs:
 - Number of violations
 - Crash data at ATESD site and at similar location without ATESD
 - Number of hearings requested and results of hearings
 - Amount of Revenue from fines and fees
 - Percentage of fines collected from residents and non-residents
 - Cost to municipality to use an ATESD
 - List of engineering and educational measures undertaken by municipality to improve safety





NOTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS

- State Law requires signs at ATESD locations
- Town required to notify navigation applications (Google Maps, Waze, Apple Maps etc.)
- Town required to implement awareness campaign 30 days prior to camera operation







Use of ATESDs Beyond 18-month Pilot Program

- It is expected that ATESD vendor contract will include option to extend speed management cameras by an additional 18-month term for a total of three-years if safety is improved.
- Per State Law (14-307e), an ATESD Plan is only valid for three years (from date the first ATESD device becomes operational). Continuing program beyond three years will require renewal of ATESD Plan with a new public hearing and approval by Town Council.



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
WITH SPEEDING CRASHES


