Short Report of the Board.....

Short Report, Cornerstone Christian School Board

August 3, 2015

The chairman C. VanDriel opened the meeting with a reading of Proverbs 20, and then led in prayer. The board minutes for the first half of the June 8, 2015 meeting were approved without changes. The published agenda was adopted without changes.

Due to the summer break, there were no principal's or Ed Comm reports for the board to discuss. R. Faber reported that the CBM had not met since the last board meeting, but will soon. The Inspire group was set to move out the week of August 1, which gave the CBM more time than expected to get ready for the 2015/16 school year. Regarding IT, it was approved that the committee move ahead with the mandate to purchase five new computers for the upcoming year.

The board reviewed the master calendar for important dates, and looked over past action items, including a review of the school's website, and a possible formulation of a policy regarding personal vehicle use for school purposes.

The next regular board meeting was scheduled for Tuesday, September 8th at 7:30 in the school building. The board continued to the second half of the meeting, and approved the minutes from the second half of the board meeting on June 8th, 2015. The published agenda was adopted without additions.

- J. Doornbos shared his latest report with the board. The board discussed the tuition and dues report, and the current state of the annual pledge drive and the true cost of education per family.
- K. Veldman reported on a few staff & membership items, including the arrival and visa status of Edmund Nederveen.

Past action items were reviewed, and J. Doornbos led in prayer to close the meeting.

Treasurer Report.....Mr. John Doornbos

This report will get to you virtually on the eve of another school year starting... I'm confident most of us are looking forward to this restart, some with eager anticipation and others with uncertainty on what the new school year will bring. In any regard, everyone is sure to be keenly aware of this important day and awaiting its arrival. May God bless each one of you in your role as you do your part to ensure a good kick-off and an 'uneventful' school year.

Although activity around the school appeared to go into hibernation this summer, there was still some important activity going on behind the scenes. One of which is that we as board have successfully completed the operating pledge drive for the 2015/16 school year. Our target was to get \$80,000 of pledges and we are happy to report that this was achieved. Thank you for once again committing the resources to make this all come together. We are continually thankful in how it all comes together each and every year.

That being said, at our summer meeting the board took some time to reflect on the origination, process, and appropriateness of the Operating Pledge. The Operating Pledge was first introduced when the high school was added and at that time it was considered a short term income bridge to meet the additional costs of starting our own high school. The expectation was that once twelfth grade was added, the regular tuition would cover all of our annual operating costs; this hasn't happened. Questions that follow are ones like; is the current system equitable? Does this system make it too easy for some families to defer their financial obligation to others? On the other hand, would eliminating the operating pledge make things too difficult on some families, perhaps causing them to reconsider their commitment to the school? Does the current system encroach on the diaconate's role in the church by, in essence, acting as a tuition assistance program? Would it be more appropriate to raise tuition and allow families to work out how they would meet that on their own? Eliminating the operating pledge would add about \$125/month to the tuition cost for each family with children in the school. Topics like this have reached the board table a number of times so we've tentatively planned to bring this conversation to the entire membership at our fall membership meeting. In the meantime please take some time to ponder on this in advance!

The 2014/15 financial year came to an end on July 31st. Over the next couple of months we'll be analyzing the data to see how we performed relative to the budget we approved in April 2014. We had budgeted for a \$20,000 shortfall and were projecting that we might be able to improve on that when we developed the current year budget in April 2015 however we won't know the final outcome for another month or two. Regardless, we can be thankful that our financial situation is healthy. We have not had reason to use our line of credit for a number of years nor have we had need to dip into our reserves. In fact in the meantime we have been

able to purchase land and pay it off on-time. Although now, with the property loan being paid off, our cash flow situation will be tighter. As such we're hopeful that with operating pledges paid early and tuition/dues being paid on time we should be able to avoid a cash flow crunch.

In conclusion, let's continue to pray that God grants each one of us what we need as we get engaged in the upcoming school year. No doubt there will challenges that arise which will require amongst other things, wisdom, patience, and love for our neighbor!

Ed Comm Report......Mrs. Karla Leyenhorst

Here we are again, with the Lord's blessing, at the start of another new school year. Since it's still two weeks until Labor Day, and no other schools (that I know of) are starting until next week, some may be feeling like we're missing out on a week of summer. It doesn't help that it's also just days after the local Northwest Washington Fair which usually means summer break is winding down and not that it's already over. But alas! We have had the usual 10 weeks of summer break so school must begin!.... But why oh why are we starting a week before many schools in the area and in some cases even ending (a wee bit) later? I, like many of you, have wondered this very thing so, on behalf of the Ed Com, I hope to explain...

- 1. Back when the school began the decision was made to base our school year on days (180 per year) rather than on hours which is what many of the local schools do and (as far as we know) there hasn't been a real push or desire to change this.
- 2. We also have a few more holidays on our school calendar than other local schools do. (Perhaps this is where we match more what our friends/families across the border do but start and end two weeks sooner than they do.)
- 3. In the case of having to cancel school for any reason we still have few days of lee-way before we need to stress about making up those days of missed classes. (I understand that under the same circumstances other schools may be extending their school year or adjusting school holidays before we would have to consider it.)

For further thought, those who think a later start date is better often argue that the weather is usually nicer in late August than in June. This may be true but I've also heard it argued that if the weather is nice in early June it is very difficult to keep the kids focused on school work while the nice September weather doesn't seem to have the same effect. It seems to me this also may be true.

That being said, I would also like to include some quick details about Labor Day falling on the latest date possible, the 7th of September. Since 1992 this has only happened four times (1992, 1998, 2009 & 2015). We (this also includes me⁽²⁾) do well to realize that it is roughly only once every 6 -7 years that we will have two weeks of school before Labor Day (of course Leap years will cause this to be less or more). Suddenly our situation doesn't seem all that bad after all.
