Jenny Tiemeyer and Laetisia Kleyn will not be returning to CCS in the fall. While we were saddened to hear this news, we also wish each of these loved and valued teachers the Lord's blessing in their endeavors next year! We of course will bid them a timelier farewell at the end of the year too! For next year, we anticipate adding one HS teacher to our staff to alleviate some of the workload

currently being shared by our HS staff, and also filling the voids left by Mrs. Tiemeyer and Miss Kleyn. When we have names confirmed for those positions, you will most certainly hear about it!

One more important detail regarding the 2014/15 school year that will greatly help the school board with their strategic planning: If your child(ren) will not be returning to CCS next school year (unless, of course, they are graduating!), would you please inform either Mr. Kleyn or a board member by March 31st? It will help us a lot to know this in advance!

In conclusion, we give all praise and thanks to God for His great goodness to us, and we pray for His continued blessing on Cornerstone Christian School.







Short Reports of the Board.....

Short Report from Jan. 13, 2014

The chairman opened the board meeting by reading from Proverbs 2 and leading in prayer. The minutes from December 2, 2013 with the principal were approved without changes.

Matters from the minutes were reviewed, including scheduling a SWOT review, staff meetings, the matter of the use of the new property, staff visa statuses, and the possibility of implementing a policy handbook. Incoming mail included letters of thanks for Christmas gifts, a letter informing the board about a donation, and a request for time off from a staff member. The agenda was adopted.

The board discussed items with the principal from his monthly report. On the subject of the 8th grade graduation, the board agreed that the staff's preferred date of June 12 made sense. Also discussed was reinstating the practice of visiting young families who have children attending the school in the future, policies regarding alcohol on the premises during events, and the forthcoming policy regarding college recruiters at the school, which is yet to be written.

The board discussed the reports from subcommittees. Of note for the Ed Comm was the departure of Corrie Klos, and replacement names were shared. The CBM and IT chairman reviewed items pertaining to the building and technology, and a discussion was had regarding the possible installation of a new gym sound system in the future. This was targeted as an item for next year's budget, and it was decided that sound needs for upcoming events in the short-term would be met by renting equipment.

The principal shared some data with the board detailing the work breakdown of the current staff, as compared to a hypothetical situation with an additional high school teacher. The board studied the amount of work the current high school teachers bear, and what possible solutions could look like in the future. Discussed options included a new part time or full time staff member, online courses, and/or exploring a partnership with Credo.

The chairman spoke about a recent meeting of principals and board chairmen that he attended recently with the principal, and noted that a relationship with this group could prove to be fruitful.

For scheduling matters, the board set aside the week of January 27th, 2014 for annual teacher visits, and the next regular board meeting was set for Monday, February 17th, 2014 at 7:30 PM in the school building.

The board reviewed past follow-up items including a teacher visit, the latest bimonthly school visit, and a possible income source from Head Start using the Cornerstone facilities during the summer.

The principal was thanked for his time and left the meeting at approximately 10:30 PM.

The minutes from the meeting of the board without the principal from December 18th, 2013 were approved after making one change, and older matters from the minutes were reviewed. The meeting's agenda was adopted after adding a financial item.

In the realm of finance, the treasurer reviewed the types of financial documents that are important to view prior to the meeting. The board briefly reviewed members who are behind in paying tuition. Also discussed was

the endowment fund, and the board decided that a fund committee will be elected at the next Spring Membership meeting. The board reviewed a first draft of a budget for 2014-15. A new member was suggested for the Finance Committee, and the board discussed fundraising.

E. Brown led in prayer and the meeting was closed.

Short Report from Feb., 2014

Chairman C. VanDriel called the meeting to order, read from Proverbs 3, and then lead in prayer. The minutes from the board's January 13, 2014 meeting with the principal were approved without changes. As incoming mail, it was noted that a request from Washington State for property tax exception status was received. The agenda was adopted.

The principal reviewed his monthly report. Items for discussion included staff professional development, and revised athletic and music credit policies. The board decided to approve both. From the report, the board also discussed the large 3/4 class next year as it relates to math instruction, and strategic planning for the future of the school.

- B. Lodder briefed the board on the latest Education Committee report. Highlights included feedback on the improved report cards, future parent information evening strategies, and their investigation into online courses
- T. Faber updated the board on recent building matters from the CBM, including video surveillance cameras, an item related to the property fence, a gym sound system rental, and the need for a new CBM member.

The board discussed matters related to the staff. B. Lodder reported on recent visits with staff members, noting that the meetings have gone very well. The board also discussed a potential high school position, as well as the immigration status of a current teacher.

Two board members updated the rest of the board about the status of Head Start's request to rent the facilities for the summer. Cornerstone has counter offered, and no response has been received yet.

B. Lodder presented a proposal for a new policy of keeping a record of important board decisions. After discussion, the board agreed to adopt such a practice. The board will collectively approve of what goes into this "decision book" at each meeting, and the Secretary will be tasked with its maintenance.

The board discussed a proposed new policy regarding post-secondary recruiters visiting Cornerstone. After a minor change, the board adopted the policy.

The principal solicited the input of the board on the idea of putting a notice in the LINK regarding an annual deadline for parents alerting the school about student enrollment. The board agreed that a published notice would be a good idea to inform parents that they should let the school know by March 31 if their children are not to be enrolled.

The board reviewed outstanding action items, made note of important decisions thus far in the meeting, and set the date for the next meeting at March 10, 2014 at 7:30 PM in the school building. The principal was then thanked for his time and efforts, and left the meeting.

The board reviewed the second half of January's meeting minutes, and they were approved. The second half of the meeting's agenda was adopted after adding two financial items.

The board discussed several financial matters including the official recommendation by the Compensation Committee, a preliminary 2014/2015 budget, and the recent work done by the financial review subcommittee. In regard to the Compensation Committee's proposal, the board looked over a series of nine recommendations, and reviewed the salary grid, a road map for adoption, and their official report. The board agreed to adopt the committee's proposal. The board then reviewed matters related to the budget; how the financial figures are shaping up, and how to possibly attack challenges. The treasurer then presented the work done by the financial review committee, and highlighted its recommendations for the ongoing governing of how CCS finances are managed. The board adopted the recommendations. A potential new Finance Committee member was approved by the board.

Action items and decisions were reviewed, and J. Doornbos closed the meeting with prayer.



From The Treasurer......Mr. John Doornbos

Things continue to move along nicely as we reach the six month mark of the current school year. It is always very encouraging to see how, despite the challenges that always arise, God always provides and the school continues to operate with hardly a hick up. So far this year the financial challenges have been minimal. However, that could change as we start planning for next year.

Not that there are huge challenges on the horizons but, the reality is that some tough decisions need to be made. You might remember that this year we're budgeting to operate with a small deficit. Simply stated; expenses exceed income. In our planning we anticipate that this problem could continue to grow next year. With our high school staff somewhat stretched since Mr. Bouwman's departure, the board is looking at the option to hire a high school teacher to relieve some of that stress --- we cannot ask Mr. Chase and Mr. Marrisen to continue to operate with the same work load. I'm sure that more on the topic of a new high school teacher will be shared with the membership in due time but, for now, simple math will tell you that adding a teacher, when we're already running a deficit, means we need to look for ways to increase revenues.

How might that be accomplished? There are, generally speaking, three sources of income for the school, namely; Tuition/Dues, Operating Pledges, and Fundraising. Covering the added costs will likely mean that we will have to look at increases in all three revenue sources. Over the last few years, the school community has done an excellent job of raising additional funds from the community. In fact over the last several years this income source could be as high as 4-5 times what it was just a few years ago! Over the years, the operating pledges have become a very meaningful way for the school community to bridge revenue gaps and we'll continue to need that next year. Regarding our main revenue source, Tuition/Dues, after more than ten years of existence, a modest tuition and dues increase is likely. In sum, although no one really enjoys the effort required with generating the revenue associated with having an excellent school, the reality is that the two go hand in hand. Please remember the school board's deliberations on these matters in your prayers.

Speaking of fundraising events, by the time this edition of the Link reaches you, we'll be reflecting back on the excellent Aussie Themed Dinner/Auction that was put on this past Friday night. Being on the Finance Committee allowed me the opportunity to get a sneak peek into all that went into putting this on and, rest assured, it was a lot of work - as are all the fundraisers! We've become very good at producing meaningful and profitable events... the talent in this school community continues to amaze! Thank you to everyone who in some way or another has contributed... we really could not do it without you. That being said, we're also aware of the fact that we run the risk of creating 'fundraising fatigue'. Where to draw the line of 'enough is enough' is front and center on the Finance Committee and School Board's mind. Just know that we don't take the request to support these events for granted. We're also not saying 'yes' to everything. Rather, we're trying to balance the need for a quality education while limiting the tuition burden on the school community... and that is quite a balancing act. So please be willing to have sincere, up building, and encouraging conversations with those who are trying to decide where that line needs to be drawn. It's too easy to be a naysayer... we'd rather you invested that energy in genuinely helping us make the tough decisions.

Changing gears, at its last meeting the board finalized and approved two key initiatives. One was the work done by the Compensation Committee. They submitted a report with nine key recommendations and the board has approved this. You received a verbal report on this at the last membership meeting and now the finishing touches to this project have been made. We're thankful to the committee who spent considerable hours researching this, formulating a grid, and completing their work with a well thought out implementation plan. Having this in hand should give the staff, board and membership the tools we need to attract and retain high quality staff! The second item that the board approved was a report with recommendations from the Financial Review Sub-Committee. This committee's mandate was "to review all current financial practices, including income and expense recording practices, account oversight, year-end financial review practices, bookkeeper functions, and report reconciliation. Additionally, that where necessary, the committee should propose improvements." As a result of this committee's work they presented the board with a CCS Financial Procedures Manual. a Financial Calendar, and a recommendation to move the third party accounting services over to a new firm that more closely matched our needs. The intent of the manual is to create an agreed upon best practices book that identifies all of the ways the school will do its financial business moving forward. The Financial Calendar was put in place to assist the Treasurer and Book Keeper in making sure that all important tasks, during the year, are completed on time. Often Treasurers end up taking over a task with little to no idea on how things are done so these two tools should allow for more consistent and improved practice over time.

In sum, a lot of work continues to go on behind the scenes to make sure that the school operates smoothly. We are thankful for the blessings we have received so far this year, and as a result, our financial affairs continue to be in good shape. And we trust that blessings will continue to abound as we make plans for the next

year! What next year will all look like still needs to be resolved but we operate with the confidence that things will work out. Please keep the school's needs in your prayers.

From Our Principal......Mr. Darryn Kleyn

A look back at the calendar over the past few months, since the last issue of the Link, reveals a packed line-up of activity at the school. Time has passed quickly; as the first and second graders noted recently - we're already past the 100 day mark of the school year. The Lord continues to bless by giving us the strength and energy to provide for our children through covenantal education. It's a wonderful privilege to be instruments in our Father's hands to "tell the coming generations" about his mighty works.

Our Vision

Within the vision section of our Parent Handbook, the *basis* for our school is clear; it's rooted "in Holy Scripture as confessed in the Three Forms of Unity". The *basis* is further explained as follows: "As parents, we are called by divine ordinance to instruct our covenant children about the mighty works of the

LORD. God's work of creation and recreation form the foundation for all the subjects of learning. God the Father, our Creator, has put all things in man's domain, and in Jesus Christ, we and our children have been restored to that calling after the Fall. Therefore, the pursuit of knowledge and the development of talents, with a view to being faithful stewards over creation, is a necessary and worthy endeavor."

Another section included in our school's vision highlights the *purpose* of our school and a list of our school's *aims*. One of these important aims seeks to ensure that the school provides "education that recognizes the position of our children as members of the covenant." The explanation under this aim is a timely reminder: "A key motivator for establishing a school arises from the covenant God has established with us and our children. Parents have a responsibility to ensure that the education their children receive fully embraces the doctrinal instruction they are called to provide for their children. Our children are set apart by God to be His own possession in the world He created and upholds. The education our children receive should reflect this reality – and should provide the necessary skills for students to serve God in all areas of their lives."

I think it's worth reflecting on this particular aim. At the baptism of their children, parents promise "to instruct this child...and to have him instructed....to the utmost...." of their ability. It's to parents, that God assigns primary responsibility for the nurture of His children. Nurturing suggests, using the analogy of last time, "a careful and balanced attention to a young, growing plant in a greenhouse". Do we take the time to do this? Life can be so busy running here and there. Devotions and discussions around the dinner table can easily be rushed or dropped altogether. Family time can be quickly gobbled up with this and that commitment outside the home. Do we spend time explaining the truths of scripture to our children? Do they understand the significance of their baptism, for example, and can they articulate it? Do we pray with and for our children before they/we go to bed? (It's true: you do learn something about their spiritual barometer when you do this!). The purpose and basis for our school is well articulated, and while the school can play a vital role in the instruction of covenant children – let's remember and remind each other that it's first and foremost the home that sets the direction and spiritual nourishment for the seed of the covenant.

School Life

The school continues to be alive with activities; there are geography and spelling bees, staff meetings, a parent information evening, parent/teacher conferences, mission month, school assemblies, staff professional development, IOWA Tests of Basic Skills, school assemblies, a writing contest, basketball/volleyball practices and games, Dad's Day, an auction, an upcoming Science fair, and the list goes on. There is never a dull moment at CCS and we are thankful that everything, for the most part, runs along super smoothly. That is in no small part

because of our hardworking teachers and diligent volunteers. Thank-you all, for your continued support and willingness to work as a team.

If you didn't get to see it on Friday evening, you really ought to come in and have a look. How I Made My Shield




