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### **From The Chairman.....Mr. James Bareman**

The Lord has provided for us abundantly again this year. Since the last *Link* came out, we were able to welcome a new Spanish teacher, Mrs. Darlene VanStaalduinen, to the Cornerstone teaching staff. Also from this column, I'd like to extend a hearty "Welcome!" to Darlene on behalf of the whole Cornerstone community. We're glad to have you on board. It is truly humbling to see time and again how the Lord provides for the school when we are often not sure where to turn. All praise to him!

Recently the board was able to report that sufficient funds had been pledged for us to move forward with the purchase of additional land adjoining the school's current property. Another reason to be very thankful! As was pointed out at the membership meeting where the society gave the board the direction to move forward on this, the purchase demonstrates a long-term perspective on the part of the society. The purchase ensures that the school will have ample room for growth for many years to come, even though there may be no pressing immediate need.

It is good for us as parents, students, and school society to carry a long-term perspective in all aspects related to the school. For instance, if our view of the education and training provided at the school is focused on the here and now, at the expense of equipping for spiritual growth and knowledge of God, we may quickly become disappointed or disillusioned when what the school is able to offer seems limited compared to what the publicly funded system offers, or if some aspect of the school doesn't go as we think it should.

A related area that also requires long-term thinking is the matter of attracting and retaining the right teaching staff. This is a matter that is certainly on the board's mind these days, as we once again go through the process of having to hire new staff members for the next school year. The board is working on finding ways to alleviate some concerns that exist in this area, while balancing the need for long-term financial stability of the society as well.

Earlier on it was noted that things are generally going well at the school. At the same time there are many aspects up in the air, particularly as regards staffing and roles for the next school year. While we would have liked to be able to report on staffing for next year, we are mid process on working out these matters, and so are unable to say too much at this point. For now, we continue in confidence that the Lord, who knows our needs, will also supply them in the days ahead. Please keep these matters in your prayers, along with the petition for ongoing health and strength for the teachers, and we will let you know further news as the picture is clarified.

## Short Reports of the Board.....

### Short Report, January 8, 2013

The chairman J. Bareman opened the meeting with the reading of Psalm 7 and prayer. Minutes from the meeting with Principal of Dec 6, 2012 were approved with minor changes. A discussion was had regarding the possible methods of producing short reports for publishing. A letter of appreciation from a staff member regarding Christmas gifts was read aloud.

No matters were added to the agenda, and it was adopted.

The board discussed the principal's report and was updated on various items including the search for a Spanish teacher for the remainder of the year, supporting the Reformed Curriculum Development Committee, and the principal's input regarding next year's budget.

The board was updated on the new members of the Education Committee: Jon Dykstra, Ranelle Faber, and Karla Leyenhorst have accepted positions on the committee.

The board was updated on recent CBM developments. The gravel driveway to Badger Road will be completed soon, and spray nozzles for the sink have been requested in the kitchen. New shelves have arrived for attic and library storage. Jolene Vreugdenhil has taken over as the new cleaning coordinator.

T. Faber reported to the board on recent school visits. Overall, the visitors were pleased with what they witnessed in the classroom from both the teachers and students.

The next regular meeting is set for Tuesday, February 12th, and a quarterly "Big Picture" meeting is set for Tuesday, February 19th. O. Bouwman is thanked for his time and efforts and leaves the meeting.

Minutes from the meeting of December 6th and December 19th without the principal were both approved with minor changes. No other matters were added to the agenda, and it was adopted.

The board discussed matters of finance: J. Doornbos updated the board on the current state of tuition and dues, as well as the current state of our pursuit of the property purchase. We have a signed agreement with Bob Hamstra, and will assess where we stand in regard to funding by the next board meeting before moving onward. Budget planning and the preliminary revenue outlook for 2013/14 was discussed. It was noted that the committees should give budget input to the treasurer before the next board meeting.

The board discussed general business, including Special Resolution #1 from November Society meeting, the Finance Committee, and updates on the search for a new principal. J. Doornbos updated the board on his interest in reviving the finance committee to identify and possibly create new revenue streams for CCS. He has approached a few members of the school society and the notion has received favorable replies.

J. Doornbos led in prayer and the meeting was closed

### Short Report, February 12, 2013

J. Bareman opened the meeting with the reading of the first part of Psalm 9 and led in prayer. Minutes from the meeting with principal of January 8, 2013 were approved as amended with one minor change. No matters from the previous minutes needed discussion. A letter from the society's immigration attorney, and an application for a teaching position were noted as items of incoming mail. Discussion of these items were tabled until later in the meeting. The board adopted the proposed agenda after adding the incoming mail items.

The board discussed the principal's report. A proposed addition of afternoon times for parent-teacher conference times was considered, and the board agreed that the staff's strategy in soliciting the feedback of the parents regarding this was a good idea. A possible conflict with the date of eighth grade graduation was discussed. The board decided to keep the grad on Cornerstone's original published date of Friday, June 7th.

The topic of building security in the wake of recent tragic school events on a national level was raised. O. Bouwman relayed his plans to attend a Whatcom Emergency Management meeting on February 21st at the Lynden Fire Department, as well as contacting the Lynden PD chief for security recommendations. The board decided to leave the specifics of implementing any potential security plans to the staff and CBM.

O. Bouwman brought to light the concept of background checks in an employee hiring policy. After some discussion, it was decided that some type of hiring policy is good to have, and that the board carry it forward and consider it. O. Bouwman volunteered to inquire among his Washington state colleagues how they go about conducting such background checks.

O. Bouwman updated the board on the status of our newest staff member, Darlene VanStaalduinen. He noted that she has been doing great, is enjoying the job, and is bringing new challenges to the students.

T. Faber updated the board on recent CBM developments.

T. Faber updated the board on IT issues.

J. Bareman reported to the board regarding a school visit he had along with Education Committee member R. Faber. It was reported to be a good morning, and the visits with several teachers went well.





He also noted that math helpers are an invaluable resource, and that classrooms operate much more smoothly when they are available. Exploring math class help was marked down as a possible task for the Education Committee to explore in the future.

Board visits made with individual staff members, per our staffing policy, were reported on.

The board discussed the Teacher's College and how the school's hiring requirements relate to it.

The board discussed an incoming letter from the immigration attorney regarding the status of a staff member's visa.

The board appointed an interview committee consisting of board and Ed. Comm members to review various applications for teaching positions, per the usual practice. The incoming teaching application will be passed on to the committee.

The next regular meeting was set for Tuesday, March 5th.

O. Bouwman was thanked for his time and left the meeting.

The board then approved the minutes without the principal from February 9th.

Matters from previous minutes were discussed, and an update was given regarding future principal leadership in the school.

The published agenda was adopted with two additions regarding financial issues.

The board reviewed the pending revamp of the Finance Committee mandate, and the logistics of its operation. J. Doornbos' draft was approved with minor changes, and plans were made to incorporate it into the handbook.

The board reviewed the matter of setting aside up to \$60k for capital projects, as was passed by the Society at the last meeting. The decision was made to set aside \$30k at this point, and to review the matter again later in the fiscal year.

The board discussed a letter and invoice it had received at a previous meeting from the Reformed Curriculum Development Committee. The suggested fees of ~\$1400, which are based on a per student model, cover work done by various teachers from our school communities, including our own Darryn Kleyn, to develop Reformed curricula in various subject areas. The board decided to send a good will contribution of \$500, in light of our current fiscal situation.

J. Bareman led in prayer and the meeting was adjourned.

### **Short Report, February 18, 2013**

J. Bareman opened the meeting with reading from Psalm 9 and led in prayer.

The purpose of the meeting was to go over progress on staffing options for next year.

The board received an update from the interview committee on interviews that had been conducted relating to staff openings and determined the next steps to be followed.

E. Brown led in prayer and the meeting was adjourned.

### **From the Treasurer.....Mr. John Doornbos**

There is much to be thankful for since our last report – especially financially speaking! Although foremost on the board's mind is planning for next year's staffing and budgeting needs we could also spend time on a project that will help us with our long range planning needs, namely the purchase of the property next to the school

As you've likely already heard via the broadcast e-alert that was sent out by email a few weeks back the board has approved the purchase of the property. Although we had the approval of the membership to pursue this, it was contingent on the funding being available. Once we had an agreement in place with Mr. Hamstra we started the process of a pledge drive – and we're very thankful for both the number of people that participated in pledge drive and the money pledged. Although we may need to use some of the designated \$60,000 that the membership had approved by resolution for capital projects, we are hopeful that between now and the last payment in December, 2014 more pledges will come in to cover where we're short. One unexpected pledge for \$15,000 was a very nice surprise – it came from the Ladies Aid as a result of all the great fundraising work they do all year long. Thank you Ladies!

Of course now we need to start collecting on the pledges so that we can make the down payment and first installment over the next few months. We will be reviewing all of the pledge forms and sending out reminder statements where necessary but it would be great if the pledged money would come in without that --- so please use this note as your cue to make any payments you committed!

In my last report I gave you a glimpse of what might be coming in terms of a new Finance Committee. This committee had gone dormant over the years and prior to going dormant it was had the responsibility of building the budget, managing bill payment, and collecting on outstanding dues. Over time much of that has been taken over by our capable bookkeeper Marcia Faber and the board so the committee became unnecessary.



However, as stated in the last report, we as a board are becoming more aware of the fact that we need to be less reliant on a single stream of income (tuition) if we are to continue to be viable entity. Costs continue to increase and we're reluctant to increase tuition and add to the financial burden many families already feel. In Australia, BC, and AB they don't have that dilemma because the government pays a substantial part of the ongoing costs. However, in the USA we are left to paying everything ourselves and being solely reliant on tuition can be painful. For example, if there is a dip in families attending school suddenly you're struggling to make ends meet. You can't just cut costs because 80% of your costs are staff and you need them regardless of how many families there are. So what can we do? A good example of what options exist is Lynden Christian. They are in a similar predicament and over time have figured out some ingenious way to add new revenue streams to their income. Those do require some volunteer hours but time is often easier to find than money.

As a result of this growing awareness the board authorized a change to the Finance Committee Mandate that currently exists in the handbook. So we repurposed an existing committee, appointed members, and began the process of exploring new ways to bring money into the school. In fact, one good example of what is possible is the golf tournament which over the last couple of years has added a nice boost to our income. Of course it will take time for the committee to gain steam but we've already met twice and will continue to meet regularly while we vet and execute on ideas. If you have any please don't hesitate to share them! The committee is made up Rick Faber(Long Term Planning Committee rep), Darryn Kleyn, Brad Kuik, Ryan Vandelft (Golf Tournament Committee member), Lydia Faber (representing Ladies Aid), and the undersigned. Following is our new mandate:

## 7.2 Finance Committee

*The Finance Committee will consist of the Treasurer of the Board and at least two other School Society members approved by the Board. Ideally, the Treasurer of the Board will act as the chairman of this Committee. Members will be appointed for terms of three years or less.*

*The Finance Committee may be asked to:*

- *Propose and act on revenue generating ideas, with the approval of the Board, so as to responsibly supplement the manner in which the school is to be maintained financially;*
- *Carry out any other financial related tasks that the Board may require.*

*This Committee's work involves matters of a confidential nature, and this information is not to be made available to anyone outside of this Committee and the Board.*

Finally, I'm sure you're all interested in knowing how we're doing financially year to date! Very well in fact! I won't bore with exact numbers but suffice it to say that we are operating on pace to end the year with a healthy 'profit'. Of course some of that has been earmarked for the property purchase but some of it will also be needed for next year where we may need to operate at a 'loss' due to a potentially significant change in family memberships, something that we need to be able to withstand from year to year.

Overall we continue to be richly blessed! God has been and continues to be gracious. He has amply supplied us with everything necessary to operate the school with enthusiasm and optimism. Praise God from whom all blessings flow!

## **From The Principal.....Mr. Otto Bouwman**

Time marches quickly. As we move past the mid-winter stage, we see the new life emerging already in our gardens, we enjoy the greening grass, and we marvel at our Father's care for us all. Let each of us continue to praise him for his goodness towards us, and do so with lives of complete thanksgiving.

### **Little Warriors**

On a cool Monday evening last month, several members of our school community drove to Langley to attend a "Darkness to Light" in-service opportunity about sexual abuse prevention. In this column I'd like to share some information and responses to this difficult topic. I recognize that it's a topic that most of us aren't very comfortable addressing, and we all wish we didn't have to consider it. Nonetheless, it's better in society if people know about the topic; then everyone in society can have a heightened awareness of why and how each one of us can and should protect children. The following is certainly not meant to imply anything that is not said, nor is it my wish to have readers looking over their shoulder and consider anyone to be suspect; my goal is simply to increase awareness of a very difficult and complex topic.

The evening began with an attempt to raise awareness of the extent of the sexual abuse problem in North American society. "Child sexual abuse thrives in an environment of denial and fear," we were informed. Experts today believe that in this country on average 1 in 4 girls and 1 in 6 boys are sexually abused before their 18<sup>th</sup> birthday. While being fully cognizant of the danger of statistics, the basic point is that sexual abuse of children happens more frequently than we would like to believe. Unfortunately as well, most child victims never report the abuse; instead, they suffer in silence and (usually) frustration for the rest of their lives. What a sad, depressing, and difficult reality! Another tragic and shocking statistic that we were told was that in the vast majority of sexual abuse cases, the child and the child's family knew and trusted the abuser.

Sexual child abuse is an incredibly complex topic, and is clearly linked to many types of larger problems in our society. Victims can lead tormented lives for many years, and often find it a real challenge to become healthy and constructive members in society. The road leading to healing and forgiveness that an abused person will have to contend with in their life is a long and hard one. In these matters the need for the grace and restorative work of our Savior becomes so manifestly evident. Abusers as well as victims need to be spiritually cleansed in order to live a genuinely happy life again, and despite that cleansing will still need to couple that with a lifelong diligent effort. What gratitude we can have, knowing that restoration and healing can come, albeit imperfectly on this earth.

Since the focus of the evening was on abuse prevention, that was the topic of most of the presentation. Step one in decreasing sexual abuse is to minimize the opportunity for abusers to accomplish their goals. The best way to do that is to try to avoid situations in which a child and an adult are together alone. Insist when children are involved that there are windows in rooms other than your home. Choose group situations whenever possible. As parents, do your utmost to ensure that your children are not placed in situations in which they are at risk. That has implications not just for what goes on in a school setting, but also might be applicable for babysitting patterns in your home and other situations where your child(ren) is (are) alone with an older person. Nobody is interested in creating an aura of suspicion around people, but everyone desires the well-being of the children in our community. For the sake of the protection of our children, we do well to talk about these matters with each other and have practices in place that minimize the likelihood that abuse will happen.

We were also encouraged to talk about it not only with other adults, but we also need to teach our children about boundaries that may not be crossed, about things that may not happen, about their need to be open with parents, and about their need to be careful. Speak openly with your children, and don't limit that discussion to once every four years. Ask your children about their safety, in direct ways, because you are concerned about their well-being.

In Washington state, as in most other jurisdictions today, all school employees who have concerns that a child is being or is likely to be abused or neglected have the obligation by law to report to the appropriate authorities. Those authorities will then assess the report and, if appropriate, conduct an investigation. This law has been put in place for the protection of all children in the state, including those in attendance at Cornerstone.

We live in a society where we need to exercise due diligence, not just for the things we enjoy doing and are happy about, but also for matters that come on our path against our wishes.

In sum, I encourage everyone in our community to seek the wisdom to deal prudently in these matters. We need to be aware of some of the devastating realities connected with sexual abuse. Perhaps the Lord will use some to raise an alarm so that others do not become hurt. Perhaps the Lord will use some to help victims on their personal road to forgiveness and restoration. Perhaps the Lord will use some to help abusers, after having been legally confronted, turn to the Lord and be healed. Hopefully the Lord uses all of us to be more aware; after all: "Child sexual abuse thrives in an environment of denial and fear."

Student behavior isn't always perfect. Teachers aren't always impeccable examples. No, we're not satisfied with imperfection, and so we all keep striving to improve; I'm very thankful that the striving together is characterized by a pleasant atmosphere.

I repeat a thought from my last column: Jeanette and I have continued to be overwhelmed with your support and encouragement as we go through a time of transitioning. Thank you heartily for your ongoing thoughts and prayers.

### **Future**

I wish great news could be shared about next year's staffing. Alas, not yet; we hope and pray that good developments can be shared before too long. I know I speak on behalf of many when I say that it was a sad day when we heard that Tom VanderHorst had accepted a teaching position much closer to his home. It's been a joy to work with Tom, and witnessing him develop as a new teacher has been a real privilege. Regrettably, there are many uncertainties surrounding staffing for next year. However, like anyone with an interest in American coins sees regularly: "In God we trust." May he continue to provide for all of Cornerstone's needs.
