I'm pretty sure that with the momentum for this fundraiser being established, there will be opportunity for others to lend a hand with organization in the future! When the previous Link came out, Mr. VanderHorst was still waiting to hear back from the U.S. Customs and Immigration Service on his visa application. I thought it would be useful to briefly touch on how that played out, because it highlights an important point to ponder. Back when the board offered Mr. VanderHorst the teaching job, we immediately began applications for two different visas, acting on the advice of our immigration attorney. The first, known as an R-1 or Religious Worker visa, had the potential, if approved, to allow Mr. VanderHorst to be present when school started. The second, known as an H-1b, a visa category subject to quotas and depending on specialized training, would only allow Mr. VanderHorst to arrive in October at the earliest, when the new quota started. It was ultimately the latter Visa that was approved.

The point that I wanted to highlight has to do with the R-1 Visa. In order for such a Visa to be approved, the case needs to be made that our teachers are engaged in work that constitutes *religious* instruction. Ultimately, the USCIS officer who reviewed our application was not convinced that was the case, even though we had been granted such a petition on multiple previous occasions. But, the question to ponder is, how do we, as society, view the work of our teachers? Is it religious instruction? I think this is a question we do well to be busy with. In a chapter entitled "What is Education" in his book *The Case for Classical Christian Education*, Douglas Wilson argues the case that "a consistent Christian pedagogy sees education as inherently religious, as something that involves the whole person in the context of the whole universe, a universe created by the triune God." Our Lord Jesus Christ is Lord of all, and that necessarily means every area of our lives, and all that we do. That being the case, education that seeks to prepare children to fulfill their task in this world must be thoroughly grounded in a Christian worldview. The exciting challenge that we are involved with at Cornerstone is working out what that means, and bringing it to life in the classroom.

Looking ahead to November, please make note that the Annual Meeting of the Cornerstone Christian School Society will be held, D.V., on Tuesday, November 27, at 8:00 in the basement of the American Reformed Church building. Please mark the date on your calendar and plan to attend. A meeting agenda and other materials as needed will be provided at a time a bit closer to the meeting date.

May our Heavenly Father continue to bless the work going on at the school, that it may truly be to the glory and honor of his name!

#### Thank You!

Last weekend we could celebrate ten years of operation of Cornerstone Christian School. Admittedly, those ten years finished up a few months ago, but nonetheless it was great to be able to thank God and reminisce together. Thank you to all who helped make the evening a memorable one. Particularly, a big shout-out goes to a bunch of Cornerstone graduates who did a wonderful job decorating the facilities in such a festive fashion. You, along with everyone else who contributed, made the evening a successful one. Great job, everyone! That evening provided not only reason for gratitude for past blessings, but also encouragement to continue to be faithful in continuing the work that needs to be done in the future. Once again: thank you to all who made the evening a success.

Thanks are also in order to the Peace Arch Performers and Lynden Festival Singers. Recently the school received a check from their organizing committee, along with a substantial check for "your school's Arts program, with the desire that it may enhance your students' opportunities to foster and grow their interests in performing arts, to the praise of His glory." What a tremendous encouragement! Thank you, heartily, Mrs. Kuik, and everyone else who participated in that production. It is great to see such evidences of support for the school's program.

Another group that ought to be acknowledged is the Golf Tournament Committee. Thanks to educational leadership, students at the sophomore and junior levels are a little bit closer to accomplishing their goal of gathering funding for another planned trip to DC about 18 months from now – and that's saying nothing of the huge financial donation you have been able to gather for the school's budget. Thank you, everyone, for your contributions in this regard as well!

### Teaching

As most Cornerstone supporters are aware, securing teachers is not always a very easy task. The challenge involves several steps, one of which is making sure that potential teachers are allowed to work in the United States. For those without previous work authorization, that can be a problem. Earlier this fall, an R-1 visa for Tom VanderHorst was rejected by the American authorities. We had previously been advised that R-1 visas were generally becoming increasingly difficult to obtain, but had always been able to secure them. I'm saddened by the recent rejection, because it gives evidence that our American society is less and less able and willing to understand the centrality of the Christian faith in our personal and community lives. It all seems to mean that it's going to be more and more difficult for us to secure teachers with a Canadian Reformed background. I really wish I could present this challenge in a more positive light, but I'm not sure how to do that. How good to confess and be convinced that God will supply Cornerstone's needs!

Having said all of the above, we were delighted on Thursday, October 4<sup>th</sup>, when we learned that Tom VanderHorst's H-1b visa had been approved. We were very grateful that Mrs. Miedema, Mrs. VanHofwegen, and Mrs. Bareman had been so willing and so able to ensure that the teaching could carry on so smoothly in the regular teacher's absence. Now that the regular instructor is in the classroom and the staffroom, we have a full complement of staff; it sure is a blessing!

Perhaps it's helpful to share with everyone who is all currently teaching at Cornerstone, so that everyone gets as clear a picture as possible of what goes on inside your school.

- The grade 1/2 class is a very large one, with 28 students. Their home teacher is Antina Chase, who each morning teaches Bible to the combined class, and math to each grade individually. During the afternoons, Antina also teaches science/geography to this combined class. Another 1/2 teacher is Janet Faber. Many of you came to our Parent Information Evening earlier this month, and were able to witness her passion for teaching language arts to each of these grades individually. (While Janet teaches LA to the one grade, Antina teaches math to the other one.) During the afternoons, Janet also teaches art and music to the combined class. Rounding off the afternoon instruction to these students, Jenny Tiemeyer helps them develop their phys ed skills and historical awareness.
- Moving on to the 3/4 class, which is made up of 17 students: Laetisia Kleyn is the homeroom teacher there, taking care of instruction in almost all subjects. However, because we desire to teach language arts individually to each grade, while she teaches LA to 4<sup>th</sup> grade, Jenny Tiemeyer takes the third graders under her wing. Since LA instruction takes about 400 minutes per week, this is a sizeable portion of Jenny's task at Cornerstone.
- Now that Tom VanderHorst has arrived, he has the dubious distinction of being the only teacher in the school to be responsible for the progress of all the students in his classroom in all the subjects. He spends all day in the 5/6 classroom, with his 18 students.
  - Moving up, the 7<sup>th</sup>/8<sup>th</sup> grade class has numerous teachers. The homeroom teacher, Darryn Kleyn, sets the tone for the class of 18 and takes care of all the subjects that are not listed below. Debbie Johnson comes in three times in order to teach the history program, and Debbie Faber comes in once a week to teach art. As well, almost every day Jack Marissen teaches science to this group. Lastly, I have the opportunity to introduce these students twice a week to the joys of playing music together in a band.
  - With regards to the 9<sup>th</sup>/10<sup>th</sup> graders, which is a very large class of 30 students, Jack Marissen helps them
    develop their math, science, and computer skills. (The science class that they are taking is a lab-based

chemistry course, which requires occupying the former band room in the school's east wing.) This year Wayne Chase is teaching them reformed studies and American history. In addition to the English course that I offer these students, I also teach band to this group. On Thursdays, Debbie Faber packs all 30 students into her art room in order to help them develop their skills and appreciation in this area. Lastly, Darryn keeps teaching the PE program to these students.

• At the junior/senior level, Wayne Chase leads the way teaching reformed studies and world history to the all 17 students. He also teaches algebra II to the juniors, while Liliana Polinder teaches Spanish to the seniors. Then, while Liliana teaches Spanish to the juniors, the seniors have an opportunity to learn pre-calculus from Jack Marissen. (A few students take business math courses under the tutelage of Jenny Tiemeyer, stretching Jenny from one end of the school to the other.) Jack also teaches chemistry to these students, Darryn teaches PE, I teach band to those interested, and Wayne runs the work experience and senior project programs. Lastly, this year I am teaching American literature to this group.

While some might instinctively question the wisdom of having numerous teachers take care of a class, our experience suggests that multiple teachers can work well – very well as a matter of fact – if and when there are clear channels of frequent communication between the participants. From my perspective, communication between all the teachers appears to be working very well, so our students are well-served by having numerous teachers – each with his/her own gifts and insights.

Of course the above description lists only staff in charge of particular programs. That says nothing yet about the plethora of volunteers who come faithfully to help out so many of our students in so many ways. Thank you, everyone – paid staff and volunteers – for continuing to provide wholesome instruction to our students in all the different subject areas.

And if someone begins wondering whether or not all the available teaching spaces are being used as fully as possible in our beautiful building, rest assured: our current large group of students – 128 of them all – is really filling the place up. As a matter of fact, the band classes are being taught in the church's auditorium because we no longer fit in the school. Next year we are anticipating additional pressure points related to teaching space, especially with some of our large classes (particularly this year's first grade and tenth grade, both with 16 students) moving through the system.

#### **Rounding Off**

At the end of this week high school students expect to receive their report cards, signaling the end of the first quarter. That will be followed up by parent/teacher conferences. A few weeks later, it will be the turn of elementary grades to go through the same exercise. Report cards take a tremendous effort to complete, and the teachers really appreciate the opportunity to connect with all parents to discuss your children's progress. Please take the opportunity to liaise with the teachers for the well-being of your children.

Thank you for your continued support. May God continue to bless each one of us in our respective roles.
