The remaining minutes of June 12<sup>th</sup> are adopted. Matters from the minutes are discussed. Agenda is adopted. Staff visits are reported on by B. Lodder and J. Bareman. Finances are reviewed for the past year and looking forward to next year. Short report is approved and B. Lodder closes in prayer.

# From The Treasurer...... Mr. Marty VanDriel (martyvandriel@yahoo.com)

As we begin another new school year, the board thought it might be appropriate for a few words from the Treasurer. We have so much to be thankful for as a school society! The Lord has provided for us abundantly in so many areas, and the financial blessings we see are just a part of this.

At our fall membership meeting, we will be able to officially look at last year's budget, but consider this a brief preview. While not all work has been completed to close these books, I can report with gratitude that we were able to stay mostly within our budget, except for a few categories that went slightly over what we had anticipated. Thankfully, our income from dues, tuition, and donations was also slightly over our budget, so we were able to take care of all expenses during the course of the year without undue stress to our bookkeeper Mrs. M. Faber.

At our spring membership meeting a few months ago, the society adopted a budget that called for about \$57,000 worth of "pledges" in order to cover our expected expenses while keeping tuition and dues at their current level. Now that the pledges have all been tallied, we may report with joy that our operating costs will be more than covered, and we will indeed be able to keep tuition at the same rate as last year. We are truly thankful for the generosity shown by our school community and friends!

This response again brings to mind the words of Psalm 133 as we sing together from the Book of Praise – "Behold! How good, how pleasant is the union – when brothers dwell together in communion." It is a privilege as well as a duty to bear each other's burdens in love, and it is a beautiful thing to see this principle in action in our school society.

This reminds me that it would be great for us to encourage our young people (couples and singles) to donate to the school society as they are able, and to become supporting members if at all possible. It is so helpful for all of us – whether or not our own children are currently benefiting – when we can shoulder the

load together. In this way, tuition rates can stay manageable for those of us in the midst of those expensive years of raising a family, and one can support the important work ongoing at Cornerstone Christian School.

I also would like to encourage parents whose children aren't yet in school to become members and get involved with the school as soon as possible – it's a great way to get to know about how the school functions, and your efforts and suggestions will be greatly appreciated!

This report may also serve as a reminder that if your child is beginning school for the first time, or is moving to middle or high school, then tuition rates would apply as shown below as of August 1<sup>st</sup>. Our tuition rates are based on a twelve month year, running from August to July each year:

Category 1: Members without children in school: \$125 per month

Category 2: Members whose oldest child will begin attending first grade in 2 years: \$200 per month

Category 3: Parents whose oldest child at Cornerstone is in grades 1-4: \$500 per month Category 4: Parents whose oldest child at Cornerstone is in grades 5-8: \$700 per month Parents whose oldest child at Cornerstone is in grades 9-12: \$850 per month

Thank you to the many of you who have signed up for our ACH program in which funds are automatically removed from your bank account to pay your tuition or dues – this helps to keep our cash flow even, and minimizes the chances that you forget to get those checks in on time. (If you need a form to fill in so that you may take advantage of this program, please contact me any time.)

I hope I have not been too wordy with all these financial matters, and thank you again for your continued support of our school society.

# From The Principal....Mr. Otto Bouwman

Summer came, and summer went. A new school year is almost upon us. We can be thankful, in the first place, for the Lord's care over our individual, family, and communal lives during the past few months. We can also thank God that we stand enthusiastically at the cusp of a new school year, confident that we are able to be engaged in worthwhile work here at Cornerstone. However, all the work that we do this coming year will not be able to be done without the blessing of the Lord. Please pray regularly for the work that is done at the school throughout the entire school year, so that it can be done with joy and with good result.

## 2012/2013 School Theme

During the past week, your staff members have spent many hours together making preparations for this coming school year. Besides just the regular "getting-the-school-ready" types of activities, we were also able to discuss many details of the programs that we hope to offer for the 2012/2013 school year. We have decided to work with a very similar theme as we had last year. Last year's school theme was "Each One Unique" and much attention was given to the uniqueness of each student. Rarely in all my years of teaching have I seen a school theme resonate as well as last year's did. After all, each student is a unique creation, and we do well to recognize that, even in an institution with standards for all students.

This year, our theme will be "Each One Unique – Yet One in Christ." We have chosen this theme because we want to deliberately build on the work that we did last year. While continuing to acknowledge that each child is unique, we also all need to be reminded that as brothers and sisters it is good to give more deliberate expression to the reality that we are a community. This conviction is partly in response to sentiments that were recently shared with the staff about student behaviors and attitudes last year. Staff was informed about some patterns of behavior that apparently had been going on in which students were not treating others in a healthy manner.

Interestingly, one article which was shared with and discussed by staff this past week has been included in this issue of the *Link*. It was written by Rev. P. Feenstra, and was originally delivered as a graduation address for the Covenant Teachers College. Please take some time to read it. As teachers, we are certainly cognizant that a good bit of our work revolves around the notion of "character education." That's also necessary, as we are working not with perfect angels who have yet to fall from grace, but rather because in the first place we ourselves as teachers are fallen, and secondly we are working with depraved young children. In this life we will never arrive at the state in which our sanctification is complete. We have to work together molding and shaping the children in our care. We need to help them become more and more aware that their sanctification must become more and more evident, also in their treatment of each other as well as in their approach to their work. Working on character education has implications also for communication patterns between the home and the school.

Recently, the school board approved a number of (mostly minor) changes to our school's handbook. However, there is one newly added section that is critical to ensure the smooth operation of Cornerstone. While parents have been deliberately requested to communicate in line with this in the past, it was not in our handbook. In italics, here is the newly added material:

# Parent-School Communication Policy

Parents and teachers are encouraged to have regular communication with each other about student performance and behavior. While this can be done by means of officially scheduled parent-teacher conferences and report cards, contact by phone and e-mail is also encouraged.

All contact should uphold the principles of biblical justice (Matthew 18) and procedural fairness. If parents witness or hear of a particular incident which they consider may have been handled in an inappropriate way by a teacher or support staff, then the following procedure is to be followed to resolve any concerns. Bypassing this procedure can result in unsubstantiated allegations becoming public knowledge, making resolution very difficult.

Procedure for parents to communicate concerns:

- Parents are encouraged to first contact and have a discussion with the teacher involved.
- 2. If the parents remain concerned and wish to pursue the matter further, then they should inform the teacher that they plan to have a discussion with the principal. The principal will take the matter up with the teacher and try to resolve the issues so that all parties feel it has been handled in a satisfactory manner.
- 3. If the parents still conclude that the issue with the teacher has not been properly resolved and they wish to pursue the matter further, then they should inform the principal and bring the matter to the board in writing. The board will have the final decision as to how the matter will be resolved.

If communication from home to school follows these patterns, we are most likely to be able work together in a relationship of trust and harmony.

Since character education is something that needs attention every school day, the staff also took a close look this past week at what can be done during recess and lunch times to help increase the likelihood that all activities at school are wholesome for everyone involved. It's definitely best to have as much supervision of student activities as possible, both inside and outside of the classroom. Though teachers are assigned to take turns on recess duty, that doesn't yet mean that all students around the school are being supervised appropriately. Sometimes, students make it out before the teacher. Sometimes, the teacher's back is turned. Sometimes, the supervising teacher is on the other side of the building. Teachers would love to see parents assist us in our supervisory tasks. It is by no means uncommon to have parent volunteers helping monitor students during recess and lunch breaks at schools around the country. We would love to have many parents volunteer at the school in this capacity. Every day, we have elementary recess from 10:15 – 10:30, and lunch recess from 12:10 – 12:45. If you would be able to work in a supervision session at that time at the school, please contact the front office, let us know which day(s) work(s) for you, and we will make up a schedule. It would wonderful if we could have parent assistance for recess and lunch supervision every day.

At the same time, we ought to recognize that the challenges surrounding character education will never disappear. That doesn't mean we should not work diligently, but we ought to be realistic in our expectations. Shortcomings will be evident, and discussions and punishments will be necessary; that's life on this side of Glory.

"Yet One in Christ" – that is meant to help us remind our students of how we live, how we treat each other, and how we approach our work. Stay tuned as we continue to develop this theme throughout the school year.

## **Tuesday Start**

School starts in just two days. In the last issue of the *Link*, I wrote the following: Once the season for back-to-school sales begins, please make sure you purchase binders, paper, dividers, pens, pencils, for your child if your child is in grades 9 – 12. The school will provide textbooks, but students are expected to bring all their own other materials. In elementary grades, the school does supply math booklets. Seven/eight students are expected to bring all their own other supplies. The school will supply regular school supplies to young elementary students who demonstrate responsible use of materials.

Please make sure your children have all the needed materials for the first day, which begins at 8:15.

That means our total enrollment is 127, the largest to date. It is an increase of 12 since last year.
