MR. CHASE: A HISTORY

In the grand scheme of the world, Cornerstone Christian School has not been around very long. But twenty years is still quite a lot, with almost two generations being able to attend. There is only one teacher still at CCS who started from the beginning. Yes, the Master of Highschool, Mr. W. Chase. As a young boy, Mr. Chase lived and grew up in Japan as a missionary kid. Despite living across the world from where we are, life in Japan wasn't much different.

"Our family home carried on, much like it is here." Mr. Chase says. "We ate the same kinds of foods, generally speaking; traveled more or less the same kind of way."

The only major difference was language. Although Japanese was the main language, Mr. Chase didn't really have a need to use it, other than getting around. "I wasn't really fluent in Japanese, so I traveled on public transportation and used Japanese for that."

Despite not being fluently bilingual, Mr. Chase still knows a little bit of Japanese, and if you take lessons in the language, you might even be able to converse with him.

Here in CCS our biggest class has consisted of sixteen students. Mr. Chase's senior year had fifty-two students. He went to a large English-speaking Christian School, about half the size of Lynden Christian, which is a sister school.

Of those who know him, some might be surprised to learn that the famed teacher used to be a rascal in his younger years. However, when pressed further for examples, Mr. Chase stubbornly remained silent. Future generations may yet discover his secrets, but for now, they remain tight-lipped.

However, one small detail of his highschool life was unrooted. "I had a car in my senior year of highschool, so of my class of fifty two students, there were only two who had cars. Let's just say we were popular."

Mr. Chase has that popular quality.
Mr. Chase eventually moved to Colorado, but ended up moving to Washington when the newly founded Cornerstone Christian School reached out to him.
"There was an offer from the board; at that time there wasn't a complete highschool and I was hired to complete it."

Although the school had been founded in 2003, it was only grades 1-8. At the beginning of 2005, a highschool was created, and Mr. Chase was needed. When asked how he was inspired to become a teacher, Mr. Chase responded, "Love of knowledge, of Bible knowledge and knowledge in general; love of history. I kind of just fell into teaching." Falling or not, God obviously intended for Mr. Chase to be where he is now, and former students constantly mention his teachings in Bible studies and discussions.

Since 2005, Mr. Chase has worked for CCS, and as the only other teacher who also worked since the very beginning, Mrs. Faber, retired last year, Mr. Chase is now the only teacher who continues from its highschool inception.

Graduates, parents and fellow teachers all admire Mr. Chase for his deep knowledge and understanding of the Bible, and the way he can teach it. We are blessed to have him in our school, and pray that he can continue for as long as God provides.

During the session, Reverend Chase shared insights into his life, teachings, and experiences living in Recife, Brazil, a busy urban center. Reverend Chase highlighted that Brazil comprises 50% Roman Catholics and 30% Pentecostals. He noted differences in preaching styles, showing what some the Pentecostal ministers do to the practices outlined in the Book of Acts. He also mentioned concerns about certain ministers profiting excessively from church donations. At the moment, there are 19 Reformed congregations established in Brazil, with a goal to establish congregation in every major city. Our school and churches want to help the people in Brazil grow and be able to support as many people in their churches as possible.

To support this mission, Cornerstone aimed to raise at least \$4000, and so each class created its own fundraising strategies. Grade 5/6 started the fundraising efforts with their classic Bake Sale, offering an array of treats including cookies, floats, cupcakes, and brownies. Within seven hours, they raised approximately \$600 for Mission

Month.

Following 5/6, Grade 3/4 sold their delicious cinnamon buns priced at \$2 each, a slight increase from previous vears' \$1.50.

Grade 7/8 organized an ice cream sundae sale, offering small sundaes for \$2.00 and large ones for \$4.00, featuring vanilla ice cream with toppings such as chocolate syrup, Oreos, sprinkles, etc.

Grades 1/2 and 11/12 chose to give donations to the school, while Grades 9/10 did a pastry fundraiser in the

neighborhoods of their homes.

In total, the school raised \$4,452.83, which surpasses our total goal, and should provide nicely for the churches. We give our gratitude to God for guiding us through this successful February fundraiser. A special thanks to the STAMP teams and teachers for their support and organization of the fundraising activities. In addition, thanks to all who interacted with the events.


