



Johnson County School Nutrition Program

Community Eligibility Provision

The Johnson County School Nutrition Program will participate in the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) for the Free Meal Reimbursement for the 2025-2026 school year. Through CEP, a school district, a group of schools, or a single school may offer meals at no charge to all students. This eliminates the procedure of distributing and processing meal applications.

The Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010 includes the implementation of CEP to ensure that every student in low-income neighborhoods and/or districts can participate in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) and School Breakfast Program (SBP). To qualify, a district or school must have 40 percent or more of its students eligible for free meals based on direct certification. The School Nutrition Program reduces administrative and printing costs by participating in CEP and eliminating the need for meal applications. Families also benefit from the elimination of completing and submitting meal applications. CEP has been available to the entire country since School Year 2015.
