### Welcome Back

The first day of school for all Amherst Central School District students will be Tuesday, Sept. 2, 2025. This will be a full day of instruction. Breakfast and lunches will be served.

### FirstView Bus Tracking App is Available

Parents have a new way to track First Student buses. First Student is offering a FirstView bus tracking app for students and parents to track their bus routes. The app is available for the large buses only; it is not available for students riding small buses. The app is available through the Apple app store or Google Play store or by visiting [myfirstview.com](http://myfirstview.com). ### Bus & Classroom Placements

Parents will be able to access elementary classroom placement information, as well as transportation information, through the Aspen Parent Portal under the Classroom Placement/Transportation tab. When the information is released on the portal, parents will receive an email. Parents who do not have an Aspen account or have forgotten your login ID and/or password, contact your child's school. ### New Cell Phone Policy

The Amherst Central School District will implement Distraction-Free Schools starting in the 2025-26 school year to meet the requirements of a new state law for student use of personal internet-enabled devices during school hours on school grounds. Under this law, New York state schools are required to impose bell-to-bell restrictions on internet-enabled smart phones and devices capable of connecting to the Internet for grades K-12 starting with the 2025-26 school year. Over the summer, a 25-member committee of parents, students, teachers, Pupil Personnel Services staff, school principals, district administration, and a Board of Education member met to review state regulations and sample policies to develop a plan for the district.

Effective on the first day of school on Sept. 2, Middle and High School student devices must be turned off and stored in a locked locker during the entire school day (from homeroom/homebase bell through dismissal bell). Elementary student devices must be turned off and stored in student's backpacks in cubbies and/or lockers during the school day. At the elementary level, it is strongly recommended that internet-enabled devices be left home.

Parents/Guardians may call the school's main office, and the office staff can relay messages to the student or call the student to the office to speak with their parent/guardian. Parents may drop off written notes at the school's main office. Students may use the phone in the Main office, attendance office, nurse's office, counseling center or classroom (with teacher permission) to call parents.

### Welcoming a New Assistant Principal at Windermere Boulevard

Kimberly Hlavaty was named assistant principal of Windermere Boulevard Elementary School, effective July 7, 2025. Her appointment was approved by the Board of Education June 17, 2025. She has been a fourth-grade integrated special education co-teacher in math, ELA, science and social studies since 2014 at Union East Elementary School in Cheektowaga. She was part of the district's first "21st Century Classroom Initiative" to integrate technology into the curriculum. She was a co-leader of the special education team at her school and an advisor to students in the media & technology club. She mentored first year teachers and student teachers at Cheektowaga Central. She has presented professional development for her colleagues on various topics in technology and special education. She was coordinator of her school's multicultural festival and a co-coordinator of "Ability Awareness Night" to share community resources with families.



She is an adjunct faculty member in the School of Education & Human Services at Canisius University, where she has also served as a mentor for teacher residents. She was named to the New York State Master Teacher Program in January 2022 and served as co-facilitator of an elementary STEAM presentation and a presenter at the 2023 master teacher's program summer conference.

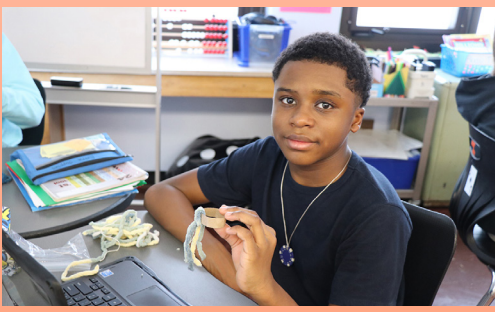
## Family Support Center Events

## Welcoming Our Student Ex-Officio Board Member

Olivia Hidalgo, a senior at Amherst Central High School, was selected as the 2025-26 Ex-Officio Student member of the Amherst Central Board of Education. Her one-year term runs July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2026. Active in many clubs at school, she holds a part-time retail job, volunteers at a food pantry and maintains a high academic grade point average. She attends Erie 1 BOCES Health Careers program and intends to pursue a career in pediatric nursing and public health. Last September Gov. Kathy Hochul signed a law that requires school districts in New York State to have an ex-officio student representative on the Board of Education as of July 1, 2025. The ex-officio student member of the Board will sit with Board members at all public meetings of the Board and participate in all Board hearings and meetings. The student member will not vote or attend executive sessions.



## Best Music Community

The Amherst Central School District has been named a 2025 NAMM Best Communities in Music Education. This marks the 9th consecutive year that our district-wide music department has received this award. The Best Communities in Music Education award acknowledges districts across the United States for their commitment and support of music education, and their efforts to ensure access to music for all students as part of a well-rounded education. The schools and communities recognized by this award demonstrate a commitment to ensuring music learning opportunities are available for every student and provide an example for other communities to follow.

## Advanced Coursework

The District acknowledges that advanced coursework can foster academic excellence, enhance critical thinking skills, and prepare students for college and career success. In light of the potential benefits and opportunities, the District is committed to offering a variety of advanced coursework options. As outlined in BOE policy 7223, advanced coursework options include accelerated coursework for eighth grade students, advanced placement (AP) courses and dual credit for college courses. Middle and High School parents are notified annually of the benefits and opportunities within the district of participating in advanced courses.

## Smallwood Drive Earns Another Promising Practice Award

For the sixth year in a row, Smallwood Drive Elementary School earned a Promising Practice award from Character.org for its "We Starts with Me" character initiative. Smallwood Drive was one of 13 schools in New York State and 230 nationally and internationally to achieve the 2025 recognition from the national organization that fosters character development in children and teens. The school's "We Starts with Me" initiative is rooted in social-emotional learning (SEL) and brain-based strategies, to empower students and staff to recognize their unique strengths and how they contribute to the school community. It was developed as an extension of Smallwood's award-winning practice in 2024, "Our Community, Our Plan." While last year's focus emphasized collective responsibility, the building saw an opportunity to deepen self-awareness and individual accountability. The idea was born from collaborative discussions with the school's mindfulness and Smallwood Strategic Planning committees, parents and faculty.



# Capital Project Update: Summer 2025 Work

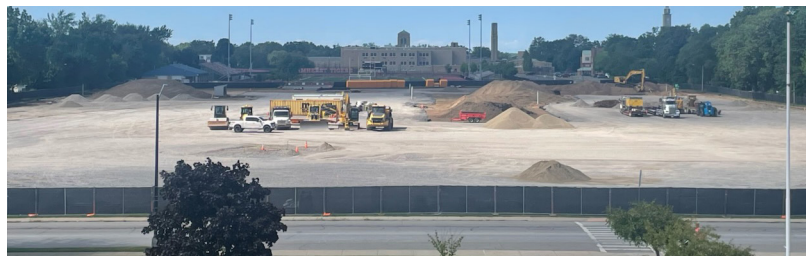
Phase 2 of the district’s capital improvement project kicked off in early May. During the summer there will be exterior and/or interior work occurring at all of our school buildings. Construction started in June for the new turf complex at Dennis Ford Athletic Field. The turf project will continue into late 2026. The site work at the athletic field is one portion of a larger three-phase project and we have posted schedules, timelines, and site plans for Phase 1 and 2 on the 2022 Capital Project webpage at [amherstschoos.org](http://amherstschoos.org). The majority of the work listed below is expected to be completed for the start of school in September. As we continue to improve our facilities, we are grateful for the community’s support and understanding. We recognize that there have been inconveniences along the way, but it will be great when it is completed.

# Attendance Matters

Attending school every day helps students learn and stay on track. Students need to attend school to achieve in school. When students miss school, they miss out on academics, clubs and so much more. Families can monitor and support their children in many ways to help improve attendance.

- Help your child get into the habit of going to school and learn the value of regular routines.
- Teach your child that attending school is non-negotiable unless they are truly sick.
- Build relationships with other families and friends to discuss how you can help each other (e.g. drop off or pick up children, baby sit, etc.).
- Encourage your child to participate in before or after-school activities. Students who are involved at school usually enjoy school more and are

- more likely to want to attend every day.
- If possible, schedule doctor and dentist appointments for before or after school.
- Call your school or visit the online Parent Portal to check your child’s attendance and see how many days they have missed – if they miss more than nine days in a year, they are at greater risk for failure.
- Schedule vacations for days your children don’t have school.

## Private, Parochial, Charter Students April 1 Deadline for Registering; Bus Requests

Students residing within ACSD limits, who attend private, parochial or charter schools are required to register with the district annually prior to April 1, or within 30 days of moving into the district, in order to receive transportation, school-based services and update student information on file. Residents of Amherst Central School District who require transportation to a private, parochial or charter school can (re)register through the Family Connection Portal. Visit the Central Registration webpage.

Once (re)registered successfully, you are able to indicate your need for transportation and you will receive an email from Central Registration confirming that your account is active and your documents are being (re)verified by Central Registration. Annually, you must register and verify documents before transportation requests can be completed.

## CEP: Free Breakfast, Free Lunch for All Students

As of Nov. 1, 2023, all students enrolled in Amherst Central School District are able to receive one breakfast and one lunch each day for no charge. This is a result of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) expanding access to the federal Community Eligibility Provision (CEP). CEP allows eligible schools participating in the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs to offer school meals at no charge to all students.

All students at Amherst Central High School, Amherst Middle School, Windermere Boulevard Elementary and Smallwood Drive Elementary are eligible to receive one school breakfast and one school lunch at no cost to your household. In the cafeteria, students will continue to go through the line and provide their student ID number at checkout, just like they do now. This provision only pertains to full breakfast and lunch meals.

A la carte items, such as snacks, ice cream, and additional food and beverage items must still be purchased. If you have been notified by the district that you have an outstanding balance on your child's lunch account, you are still responsible for the payment of that balance. We will continue to send letters home with balances due and instructions for payment arrangements.

## Reduced Fees on SAT, ACT, PSAT and AP Exams



Families that qualify for reduced rates or waivers on SAT, ACT, PSAT and AP exams will be required to complete the CEP Household Income Eligibility Form. This form is used to determine eligibility for additional state and federal program benefits that your child(ren) may qualify for. The form can be found by using the QR Code or from the District website under the Departments tab, Nutrition Services, Household Income Eligibility Form.pdf. ## Registering for School

Families new to the District should register their child/children as soon as possible to ease transition and allow adequate time for educational services to be arranged (schedule, classroom placement and transportation) before school begins Sept. 2, 2025. Visit the Central Registration webpage on the district website.

The Central Registrar will process registration documents for new and re-entry students, Universal Pre-K and Kindergarten students, as well as for private, parochial and charter school students. Students who reside in the Amherst Central School District, but are enrolled in private, parochial, or charter schools need to register with ACSD annually. The process of registering a child for Amherst Central School District is done online at [www.amherstschoools.org](http://www.amherstschoools.org). The Central Registration office is located at the District Office, 55 Kings Highway. Meetings with the Central Registrar are by appointment only; please call for an appointment or with questions, 716-362-3030.

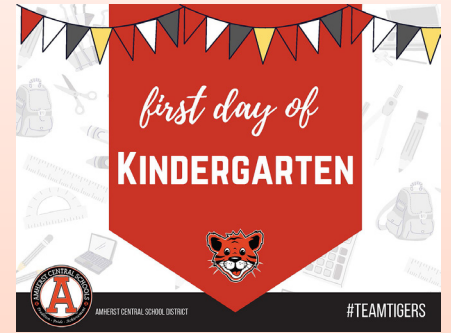

## DASA: Preventing and Addressing Bias-Based Harassment in Schools

The Dignity for All Students Act (DASA) took effect July 1, 2012 and was amended to include cyberbullying effective July 1, 2013. Its purpose is to provide students with a school environment free of discrimination and harassment by peers and by school personnel. It applies to behaviors on school property, in school buildings, on a school bus, as well as at school-sponsored events or activities. Incidents of harassment and discrimination may include, but are not limited to, threats, intimidation or abuse based on a person's actual or perceived race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sexual orientation, gender (including gender identity or expression), and sex. ## Code of Conduct, Attendance Policies

The annual notifications that school districts are required to make public to inform parents/guardians and students of their rights are posted on the district website. The District's Code of Conduct, along with School Attendance Policy, Parents Bill of Rights for Data Privacy and Security and Student Privacy Policy, can be found at [www.amherstschools.org/notifications](http://www.amherstschools.org/notifications). ## Special Education Services/ Child Find Notice

Each school district in New York State is required by law to establish a Committee on Special Education which is comprised of parents and professional school personnel. This committee reviews the needs of each child referred and determines if she/he is educationally disabled. Appropriate services or programs for identified children are then recommended by the Committee to the Board of Education. These programs take the form of part-time services, full-time special classes or home instruction. Special classes, resource rooms, integrated co-teachers and consultant teachers are available at all schools.

When the Committee on Special Education has determined that students with special education needs cannot be provided for in the District schools, appropriate out-of-district instructional programs are arranged at the District's expense.

The school district is also responsible for the placement of preschool children, ages 3 and 4, who have been identified by the Committee on Preschool Special Education as educationally disabled. This committee is made up of District personnel, a parent, a representative of Erie County, a representative of a preschool education agency and possibly regular and special education teachers.

Contact the Special Education Office at 362-3063 or your building principal if you feel your child may require special educational services. A NYS Parent's Guide to Special Education for Children Ages 5-21 is available upon request.

## Rights of Parents and Students Under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

The FERPA regulations, including recent amendments, require a school district to include specific information in its annual notice. This information includes the rights of parents or eligible students: to inspect and review the student's education records; to seek amendment of the student's education records which they believe to be inaccurate, misleading or otherwise in violation of their privacy rights; to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records (except to the extent that the law authorizes disclosure without consent) and to file complaints concerning alleged failures by the District to comply with the FERPA requirements.

The District may disclose appropriately designated "directory information" without written consent, unless you have advised the District to the contrary in accordance with District procedures. The primary purpose of directory information is to allow the District to include this type of information from your child's education records in certain school publications. Examples include:

- A playbill, showing your student's role in a drama production;
- The annual yearbook;
- Honor roll or other recognition lists;
- Graduation programs; and
- Sports activity sheets, such as for wrestling, showing weight and height of team members.

Parents and students over the age of eighteen, have a right to refuse in writing the release of student directory information by November 15 of each school year. After November 15, the District may release such information to any outside group without individual consent. As required by Federal law, student directory information for eleventh and twelfth graders shall be made available upon request to persons or groups which make students aware of occupational and educational options. In addition, two federal laws require the District to provide military recruiters, upon request, with the following information-names, addresses and telephone listings-unless parents have advised the District that they do not want their student's information disclosed without their prior written consent.

To exercise your right to have this information kept private, notify the school office in writing before November 15 that you do not wish this information to be released, either generally, to military recruiters or both. Please note that unless you use this "opt out procedure," the school district cannot refuse the military recruiters' requests and you and your student may be contacted by them at home.

# Pesticide Application

Parents and staff can request notification of certain pesticide applications by the District. New York State Education Law Section 409-h, effective July 1, 2001, requires all public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools to provide this written notification to all parents, guardians, faculty and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year.

The Amherst Central School District has implemented an integrated pest management (IPM) program including good housekeeping and sanitation, repair, maintenance, weed control and monitoring. The District uses pesticides only as a last resort when other nontoxic methods of necessary pest control have proven unsuccessful. Even then, the District uses only the least toxic pesticide specific to the pest to be controlled.

The District is now required to maintain a list of parents, faculty and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- A school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72 hours following an application.
- Antimicrobial products.
- Nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children.
- Nonvolatile insecticidal baits in tamper-resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children.
- Silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-use pastes, foams or gels in areas inaccessible to children.
- Boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate.
- The application of EPA-designated biopesticides.
- The application of EPA-designated exempt materials under 40CFR142.25.
- The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasps and hornets.

In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour notification list. ### School Property Rules

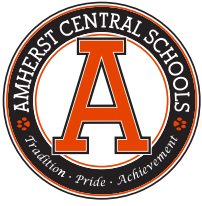

## Virtual Backpack

Our district uses a Virtual Backpack webpage to make flyers from non-profit groups, community groups and intergovernmental agencies available to our families. We post the flyers online rather than send those paper flyers home to families. It's a cost savings for our district, as well as it allows families access to the flyers 24/7.

## Emergency School Closing

When inclement weather or any other emergency situation forces the closing of District schools, the information will be communicated by radio, television broadcast and our parent broadcast system. Please do not telephone the schools or the District Office.

The decision to close schools in weather-related situations will normally be made by 6:15 a.m. The safety of our students and staff is the basis for any decision, and the key factors that must be considered include road conditions and weather reports.

When the schools are closed due to weather conditions, all other activities including before and after school programming, sports practice, student activities and Community Education classes will be cancelled. If schools are closed for other reasons, activities and practices that are not affected by the specific emergency may be permitted with prior approval of the building administrator.

## In-School Closing Procedures

*(for when school is in progress)*

*If inclement weather should occur after students are already in school*, students will not be dismissed during the height of any weather-related storm. In most cases dismissal would then take place at the regular dismissal time, weather permitting. However, on very rare occasions it may be necessary to close a school during the day due to loss of power, loss of water or other emergency situations. If this occurs, procedures are in place to transport the students to another building, if necessary. Students and staff would then remain at the alternate site until the regular dismissal time. A pre-established program of instruction would be implemented at the alternate site. Parents are reminded to provide the school office with up-to-date emergency telephone numbers.

## Board Meetings
