## ORISKANY CSD RECEIVES GRANT FROM DOLLAR GENERAL

## Literacy Foundation

The Dollar General Literacy Foundation (DGLF) recently awarded the Oriskany Central School District two grants in the amounts of \$3,000 and \$10,000 to support summer and adult literacy, respectively. The funds are a part of a record-setting, one-day donation in the Foundation's history of more than \$13.2 million to support adult, family and summer literacy programs in the 48 states in which Dollar General operates.

"Many community members may not realize that our District is responsible for the education of individuals housed at the Oneida County Correctional Facility, as it falls within our residency area," said Director of Special Programs Catherine Mucurio. "We are excited to expand our educational programming at the facility through the introduction of new resources and the funding of staff salaries. Investing in the education of youth within the facility not only supports their personal growth, but also contributes to the long-term strength and safety of our community."

In addition to these efforts, the District has received funding to enhance its pre-kindergarten and kindergarten screening process. "We've partnered with Barnes & Noble to provide activity packs and books for all incoming pre-K and kindergarten students," Mucurio shared. "With two District-run Universal Pre-K programs, we are excited to welcome families and encourage them to begin their children's educational journey with us."

These initiatives reflect the District's commitment to providing equitable access to education and lifelong learning opportunities for all students – whether they are just starting school or working toward a high school equivalency.

"For over 30 years, the Foundation has been investing in literacy and basic education programs in our hometown communities," shared Denine Torr, executive director of the Dollar General Literacy Foundation. "Today's grant announcement is a celebration of our unwavering commitment to student and teacher success. We are grateful to all the grant recipients for their commitment to advancing education and helping students thrive."

The Dollar General Literacy Foundation supports organizations that increase access to educational programming, stimulate and enable innovation in the delivery of educational instruction and inspire a love of reading. Each year, DGLF awards funds to nonprofit organizations, schools, and libraries within a 15-mile radius of a Dollar General store or distribution center to support adult, family, summer and youth literacy programs. The Foundation also offers a student referral program for individuals interested in learning how to read, speak English, or prepare for the high school equivalency exam. Referrals to a local organization that provides free literacy services are available online or through referral cards found in the Learn to Read brochures that are available at the cash register of every Dollar General store.

#### FOOD SERVICE INFORMATION

The Child Nutrition Programs are operated in each building by the Oneida-Herkimer-Madison BOCES School Food Service team. We are pleased to announce that in the 2025-2026 school year, we will be continuing to operate under the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) – meaning all meals are FREE to all students!

OHM BOCES strives to provide students with tasty, nutritious, fresh foods that appeal to students and the school community. We have continually exceeded federal and state guidelines for all required nutrients and increased our offerings of fresh fruit and vegetables. Farm to School items and programming are improving our students' connections to fresh food and resources. The menu balances student preference, commodity foods and locally sourced foods that are fresh, fun and encourage students to explore new flavors and new preparations.

Each student has their own meal account with an assigned pin number. Please be sure to help your children learn their numbers, especially if they are new participants. You can also use this account to make payments for a la carte items; checks made out to OHM BOCES Food Service, or online prepayments (ezschoolpay.com) are preferable, though cash in a labeled envelope is also an option.

Because we are operating under CEP this year, families do not need to fill out Free/Reduced meal applications. However, it is helpful to your school if you complete the income collection form available at ezmealapp.com. PDFs and hard copies are also available. Eligible families may qualify for benefits such as waived test fees.

While complete meals are FREE, single items like milk will still be charged to student accounts. Milk this year will be \$0.75. Other a la carte items such as frozen yogurt, baked chips and whole grain cookies will be available for purchase most days in the school cafeterias. Prices on those items range from \$0.75-\$2.50. There is no charging of a la carte items, meaning students must have a positive account balance, or cash in hand in order to purchase.

Please sign up for an ezschoolpay.com account! This is an excellent way to monitor your children's meals and a la carte purchases. These accounts are free to set up and use; you can even set up email reminders for when a balance gets low! If you choose to use them for prepayment, a small fee is incurred with each transaction.

Mr. Camello enjoys working in a smaller school community like Oriskany. Outside of work, his hobbies include golf, hunting, fishing, camping and woodworking.



Korrina Koenig joins the Oriskany CSD as an elementary teacher. She earned her bachelor's degree in



## Oriskany Students attend **ELEVATING STUDĚNT VOICES YOUTH SUMMIT**

On April 14, nine district-identified student leaders from Oriskany Jr./Sr. High students, but participating faculty as well. School attended the Elevating Student Voices Youth Summit, hosted by the Oneida-Herkimer-Madison BOCES. Regional students had the opportunity to learn about perspectives and life experiences that were different from their own, participate in discussions, develop strategies to ensure that all students feel a sense of belonging within their school community, and learn from community leaders – as well as other students and districts – about just how impactful their small gestures of kindness, positivity and inclusion can be.

Together with 10 other school districts, students highlighted the work that they have developed throughout the 2024-25 school year. Some of their initiatives

- Collaborating with the AV room at the Jr./Sr. high school to highlight and emphasize monthly themes such as Poverty in America Month and Black History Month.
- Sending out a building-wide poll and creating a bulletin board showcasing "Where Our Roots Lie."
- Collaborating with the Language Club to work with pre-K students at Eastern Star, starting the conversation of diversity using the Spanish language as a focal point.
- Ongoing collaboration with the Positivity Project at N.A. Walbran Elementary, tying in read-alouds to their monthly themes of leadership, perseverance and appreciating the good in others.

Keynote speaker Dr. Mark Montgomery spoke about positively impacting others through education and support. His message resonated not only with

### A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR OF SKYHAWKS ATHLETICS

The spring athletic season was quite busy, and despite facing challenging weather conditions, our teams excelled in baseball, track and golf, making history along the way.

Our varsity baseball team finished with an impressive record of 19-1, becoming the New York State Class D State Champions for the first time in the school's history. After finishing as finalists the previous year, the team returned this season ready to take on the challenge. They were also recognized as the All-CNY Team of the Year by Syracuse.com, with Eddie Wright named CNY Player of the Year for Baseball.

On July 9, as a member of the Oneida County Board of Legislators, I, along with my colleagues and Oneida County Executive Anthony Picente Jr., honored the state champion baseball team with a proclamation acknowledging their accomplishments. From now on, July 9 will be celebrated as The Oriskany Skyhawks Baseball Day in Oneida County.

The coaching staff includes Head Coach Eric Enos and Assistant Coaches Matt Enos and Cody Murphy. The members of the New York State Championship team are:

Our outdoor track team had several sectional winners at the Section III Class D Championships. The boys team placed fourth overall, achieving first place finishes in the boys 100m, 200m, triple jump and the 4x100m relay. Additionally, we secured second place in both the boys and girls pentathlons as well as the boys 400m event. At the state meet in Middletown, NY, Jack Tagliaferri finished fourth in the state for the 100m, competing against all teams in Class D. He was also a runner-up for Male Track Athlete of the Year.

Our Oriskany/Westmoreland Golf team saw one of their eighth graders, Ashton Ricci (Westmoreland), advance to the round before the state competition. Overall, it was another successful season for our golf team.

Jack Tagliaferri and Brienne Eldred were honored by Section III Athletics for their accomplishments as student-athletes this past June at the SRC Arena in Syracuse.

Oriskany's varsity sports continue to excel academically. This spring, all of our varsity teams qualified for the New York State Public High School Athletic Association (NYSPHSAA) Scholar-Athlete Award, which means each team finished with a GPA of 90% or higher. With all of our fall, winter

and spring varsity sports qualifying for the Scholar-Athlete Award, we have now earned the School of Distinction Award for the fourth consecutive year, granted by NYSPHSAA.

Each year, NYSPHSAA presents Sportsmanship Promotion Banner Award to schools that actively promote sportsmanship among their students, coaches, spectators and communities. Winners are determined based on their responses to Sportsmanship

# ORISKANY JR./SR. HIGH SCHOOL RECEIVES Sportsmanship Award

## VARSITY BASEBALL TEAM CELEBRATES HISTORIC STATE CHAMPIONSHIP WIN

The conclusion to the Oriskany varsity baseball team's 2025 season was one for the record books as the team became state champions for the first time in the program's history.

Prior to the championship win, elementary students, teachers and staff gathered in the afternoon of June 13 to wish the varsity baseball team good luck as they headed off to the New York State Baseball Championships on June 13-14 in Binghamton. The baseball team walked through the hallways receiving cheers, hugs and high-fives and enjoyed snow cones before getting on the bus.

The Skyhawks secured a spot in the state final four by defeating Notre Dame Academy 8-3 on June 7. This marked the team's second consecutive final four appearance, having also reached this stage in 2012, 2007 and 1993.

Oriskany beat Fillmore 5-2 in the semi final game on June 13. Eddie Wright pitched a complete game, struck out eight batters and allowed just three hits. The Skyhawks scored first and never looked back. With a 2-1 lead in the final inning, Wright drove in a run to extend the lead to two runs.

Then, Sean Graziano's inside-the-park home run brought in two more runs, putting the Skyhawks up 5-1. Fillmore scored one in the bottom of the seventh but Oriskany held on for the win to punch their ticket to the final game the next day.

When Saturday concluded, the Skyhawks were state champions for the first time in program history. Oriskany defeated North Warren 9-2 to be crowned Class D state champions. Chase Koenig pitched a dominant six innings, struck out 13 batters, allowed five hits and two unearned runs. He also batted in two RBIs at the plate.

The Skyhawks struck first, plating two runs in the first inning. Mathew Kernan reached on a bunt to score Nick Hays. Koenig then walked to score Wright to give the Skyhawks an early 2-0 lead.

In the top of the second, Thomas Maher scored on a sacrifice fly from Hays. Wright then scored on an errant throw to put the team up 4-0. Oriskany scored four runs in the fourth inning to break the game open. Jack Mason hit a two-run single, while Koenig and Dawson Foss each had an RBI to put the Skyhawks up 8-1. Graziano had an RBI single in the seventh inning to put Oriskany up 9-2. Dean Koenig then came in to get the final three outs to crown Oriskany as state champions.
