


### MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

As a school district, we are facing a significant and strategic challenge related to budget and operations. Partially captured in the infographic (see next page) that outlines the relationship between education excellence and community value, each of these statements can be supported with facts and evidence:

- We are in a strong financial position.
- We operate the school district efficiently (staffing, debt, transportation and other areas).
- We have increased our total reserves (fund balance and capital reserve fund).
- We have improved our bond rating through Standard & Poor's.
- We have reinvested in our capital infrastructure without incurring new debt (i.e., community assets).

The fundamental issue facing us is structural. The growing impact of the common level ratio (CLR) is the primary reason for the concern. This issue is impacting local revenue for all public school districts in Allegheny County. For the 2025–2026 budget, we cut close to \$2,000,000 from an initial \$3,000,000 deficit to help balance the budget. The remaining deficit will be covered through the use of fund balance. The structural cuts include not replacing 10.5 positions (teachers, paraprofessionals, and custodians). There was no millage change for 2025–2026. Pine-Richland School District has the third-lowest millage rate in Allegheny County.

For 2026–2027, our finance department has forecast a starting deficit close to \$5,000,000. Meeting this challenge next year and in years to come will be extremely difficult. There is a risk to excellence and sustainability of programming in academics, athletics and activities. Our district has a history of fiscally responsible decisions. It will take our immediate attention and a collaborative effort to address these challenges.

Please invest time in the careful review of this Annual Report. This report summarizes key accomplishments in academics, arts, athletics and so many other activities. It is the breadth and depth of opportunities that make Pine-Richland a special place. In addition, I want to draw your attention specifically to the annual notices that are outlined on pages \_\_\_ to \_\_\_. These notices help ensure clear communication of critical information tied to our legal and regulatory responsibilities.

Congratulations again to the Class of 2025! We look forward to the 2025-2026 school year. Thank you for your continued support of the Pine-Richland School District.










# **Academics**


#### MODEL FOR TEACHING AND LEARNING



Academic focus continued throughout the 2024–2025 school year with an intentional commitment to the concepts of alignment (curriculum), time (instruction), and feedback (assessment). These key elements comprise the Model for Teaching and Learning. When placing these three elements on a Venn diagram, the center "star" intersection is where effective learning occurs if all elements are aligned and informing one another. We focus on this intersecting area through the development of lesson planning. This focus will be sustained in the 2025–2026 school year as well and is a unifying factor of excellent teaching and learning across all disciplines and programs.

#### IN-DEPTH PROGRAM REVIEW—HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION MINI-REVIEW



During the 2023-2024 school year, the district developed the In-Depth Program Mini-Review process and implemented this approach with the K-12 science department. The process is designed as an accelerated form of the more comprehensive IDPR. This year, the health and physical education department participated in the mini-review process. The first phase of the review evaluated the implementation of the 2016–2017 IDPR department recommendations. Phase two of the process included an analysis of curriculum reviews, historical course requests, program adjustments since 2017 and national/state-level standards. The third and fourth phases of the mini-review included conducting interviews with two universities and six K-12 health/PE programs. Finally, the committee reviewed the findings from each phase to identify updated recommendations that will guide the department in making continuous refinements and improvements in the coming years.

# Future-Focused Financial Health

The district uses a 10-year capital funding plan to meet the needs of district facilities with a futurefocused strategy. The goal is to maintain all facilities and technology in the district while analyzing costs annually with a department- and building-level approach. We analyze future costs and projects each year to determine the financial commitment and to plan for minimizing debt. Cost estimates for the next decade are approximately \$50,000,000. The most significant projects of the capital plan are building HVAC and roofing with projected costs estimated at more than \$30,000,000. Planning for these major projects is a priority over the next five years. Significant projects planned for 2025–2026 include HVAC upgrades to Wexford Elementary and Richland Elementary.

# Safety, Security and Positive School Culture

A safe, positive, and welcoming environment is critical for learning. This focus on learning is our mission. To help build positive connections to people and activities, we offer a wide range of programs and services both inside and outside the classroom. These connections and the relationships formed through these activities are critical for strengthening a positive and welcoming environment. Each action we take that enhances a positive school culture also enhances our physical safety and security. We continue to build a positive school culture through RAMS Way across K-12, with a growing focus on implementing advanced tiers of support. The district implemented Tier 1 with fidelity across all six schools. We continue to promote a positive school climate through the RAMS Way initiative, reinforcing consistent expectations and support for all students. The expansion of safety and security personnel was a significant, strategic action for 2024–2025. Our ongoing partnership with the Northern Regional Police Department included the addition of two school resource officers, resulting in a daily presence in our 4-12 schools. The district also hired additional school security officers to promote safety, security and a positive school culture in our primary elementary schools.

In its 2024 rankings of K-8 schools, U.S. News and World Report named Richland Elementary School #4 and Wexford Elementary #6 out of nearly 1,600 elementary schools ranked in Pennsylvania. Hance Elementary ranks among the top 5% of elementary schools, while Pine-Richland Middle School ranks in the top 4% of Pennsylvania middle schools. The 2024 rankings are based on state assessments from the 2021-2022 school year.

The Pittsburgh Business Times ranked Pine-Richland School District 9th in southwestern Pennsylvania (Allegheny, Armstrong, Beaver, Butler, Fayette, Washington and Westmoreland counties) and 19th in the state in their 2025 report based on Keystone and PSSA exam results for 2022-2024.





Pine-Richland custodian Joe Strobel was recognized in September for saving a man's life with the Heimlich maneuver. While dining at a local restaurant, Mr. Strobel noticed a fellow patron was choking and used his first aid training received at Pine-Richland to successfully assist the man. Bus driver Bernie Giconi was recognized in May for assisting a Pine-Richland family with putting out a fire outside their home while finishing his bus route for the day.

Pine-Richland High School business education teacher Courtney Kronk-Love was recognized as a Distinguished Educator by Next Gen Personal Finance, a national nonprofit organization, for outstanding commitment to professional development in real-world personal finance topics.

Pine-Richland Middle School was redesignated in the Pennsylvania Don Eichhorn Schools: Schools to Watch program for the sixth time. This program recognizes schools achieving academic excellence based on 37 factors established by the National Forum to Accelerate Middle Grades Reform. Pine-Richland Middle School successfully demonstrated progress on specific goals and continuous improvement in areas including academic excellence, social equity, developmental responsiveness and organizational structure and processes. Pine-Richland Middle School has maintained its designation for 18 years.



The Western Pennsylvania chapter of the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention named Pine-Richland High School their 2023-2024 Educator Award recipient. Each year, AFSP chooses an organization that shows excellence in suicide prevention awareness and education programs. The award was presented in November.



Dr. Brian Miller, superintendent, was selected for the 2024 Baldrige Foundation Award for Leadership Excellence in Education by the Foundation for the Malcolm Baldrige National Quality Award. This award recognizes exceptional leadership in the promotion of performance excellence across the country.

The program recognizes school districts that demonstrate exceptional efforts to ensure access to music education as part of a well-rounded curriculum.

Chris Vins, third-grade teacher at Wexford Elementary School, was selected to join the Penguins Science Champions Team. Forty second- and third-grade teachers from the Pittsburgh region were selected to participate in "Science on the Ice: A Design Charrette for Teachers," a day-long event on March 29 at PPG Paints Arena, where they brainstormed fun and engaging second- and third-grade science lessons and activities that incorporate hockey and hands-on experiences aligned with the new STEELS standards.



Michelle Schonbachler, Pine-Richland Middle School nurse, earned the School Nurse Excellence Award for the Southwest Region of Pennsylvania for 2025 from the Pennsylvania Association of School Nurses and Practitioners. Mrs. Schonbachler was nominated by her peers in recognition of exceptional service to students and staff.

Pine-Richland High School earned AP Gold Honor Roll Recognition for the 2023-2024 school year. Only 7% of eligible schools nationwide, and only two other schools in Western Pennsylvania, earned this designation. The AP School Honor Roll recognizes schools whose AP programs are delivering results for students while broadening access. Schools can earn this recognition annually based on criteria that reflect a commitment to increasing college-going culture, providing opportunities for students to earn college credit and maximizing college readiness.

All six Pine-Richland schools were recognized by the Pennsylvania Positive Behavior Support Network for achieving Tier I with Fidelity status for implementing and sustaining school-wide positive behavior interventions and supports through the RAMS Way program during the 2023-2024 school year. This recognition highlights Pine-Richland's commitment to creating a positive, supportive school environment that encourages positive behavior, reinforces expectations and promotes respect and responsibility throughout the school, contributing to the well-being and success of all students.



Eden Hall Upper Elementary music teachers **Kim** Baney, Natalie King, Jeff Nicodemus and Michael **Timcheck** launched their first-ever Summer Music Camp in 2024, offering band and orchestra students a week of musical exploration, skill-building and ensemble collaboration. The week concluded with a performance for family and friends, showcasing the students' progress and enthusiasm. The program was met with strong participation and positive feedback, and expanded for its second year in 2025.



Pine-Richland's 6-School Sustainability Club once again partnered with Pine Township to participate in the community's second annual Earth Day event. Students from all six district schools facilitated community engagement opportunities, including a recycled/upcycled art show, face painting, sustainable crafts and more. The ongoing collaboration aligns with the club's goal of educating other students about small ways they can help the earth and provide a more sustainable future.



Pine-Richland School District partnered with Band Together Pittsburgh on May 17 to host an inclusive open mic event at Pine-Richland High School. Performers of all ages and abilities sang or played instruments, including keyboard, drums and the marimba. Band Together Pittsburgh believes that music has the power to unify the world and uses music to inspire and enrich the lives of those on the autism spectrum, enabling integration with family, friends and society as a whole.






For the third year in a row, the artwork of Pine-Richland students in grades K-8 was displayed at Pine Community Center, part of the art department's goal to make community connections to showcase student art for the benefit of both students and the community. Displays were updated throughout the year, and for Pine Township's Earth Day event, the student artwork on display was made from recycled materials to promote sustainability.



Students and staff at Wexford Elementary School raised \$9,579 for the 2024 KDKA Turkey Fund, which works in partnership with the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank to distribute Thanksgiving meals to local families in need. Donations are matched by PNC. Over the last 20 years, Wexford Elementary School has raised nearly \$500,000 for the annual Turkey Fund.

### **Food Service**

As of July 1, 2025, Pine-Richland partners with Chartwells K12 for food service. Parents will use the same apps for funding their children's accounts (SchoolCafe) and reviewing breakfast and lunch menus (Nutrislice). Lunch prices will stay the same for the 2025-2026 school year.

Contacts for food service questions include Dr. Kristen Justus and Chris Juzwick, Food Service Advisory and Wellness Committee co-chairs, as well as the incoming Chartwells food service director, whose contact information can be found on the Food Service section of the district website. All food service employees wishing to continue with Chartwells were granted the

opportunity to do so, which means our students will see many familiar faces when they return in August.

Community members and parents are invited to serve on the Food Service Advisory and Wellness Committee with district administrators, board members, teachers and students. The committee shares information about food services and gathers input to share with the food service management team. The committee addresses the wellness needs of students, including nutrition, activities and mental health. # Facility Improvements



Notable facility improvement projects completed this school year include:

- Upgraded HVAC at Pine-Richland Middle School
- LED lighting upgrades at Eden Hall Upper Elementary, in the Pine-Richland Middle School gymnasium, and at the Pine-Richland High School swimming pool
- New playground equipment installed at Wexford Elementary School
- Lighting upgrades in the Richland Elementary School
- New scoreboard installed at Pine-Richland Stadium

### ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT AND GROWTH REPORT

The first Annual Achievement and Growth Report (AAGR) was compiled in the fall of 2013 to reflect student performance on various standardized measures. This public display of standardized test results provides the highest levels of transparency. The format of the report has evolved over the past decade. Major shifts in focus include: emphasis on achievement and growth, top decile comparisons where available, expanded focus on measures of learning and a focus on data for action.

The Annual Achievement and Growth Report and In-Depth Program Review (IDPR) processes are designed to analyze performance with further connection to the building-specific strategic plan focus areas.

#### **HIGH-LEVEL FINDINGS**

In comparison to the state average and top decile benchmark, PRSD students are performing at high levels on the PSSA and Keystone Exams.

- ▶ PRSD students performed in the top decile in ten of fourteen PSSA-tested areas (consistent with 2023) results).
- ▶ PRSD students performed in the top decile in all three Keystone Exam tested areas (consistent with 2023 results).
- ▶ PRSD students met or exceeded the PVAAS growth standard in seven of twelve PSSA-tested areas (increase from 2023 results).
- ▶ PRSD students met or exceeded the PVAAS growth standard in all three Keystone Exam tested areas (consistent with 2023 results).

For both the PSSA and Keystone Exams, PRSD students in special education with an IEP at levels similar to the state proficiency average of general education students.

For both the PSSA and Keystone Exams, PRSD students who are economically disadvantaged scored at or above the state proficiency average of general education students in almost all tests.

For both the PSSA and Keystone Exams, PRSD students performed at generally consistent levels across gender with some performance differences noted for subgroups based on ethnicity.

- ► Female PRSD student and male PRSD student performance is generally consistent with some areas of discrepancy focus (e.g., ELA PSSA and Keystone Literature Exam).
- ► Given the small number of students in some groups, performance is generally consistent with some focus on differences at the individual student level/ subgroup (e.g., ELL and ethnic diversity).

In comparison to state and global performance, PRSD students outperformed benchmarks and achieved at near-historic levels on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT).

In comparison to state and national averages, PRSD students outperformed benchmarks and achieved at near-historic levels on the American College Test (ACT).

Over 1,000 Advanced Placement (AP) exams were taken by PRSD students with the highest ever percentage of students scoring 3 or higher on the required exams.

#### TARGETS FOR ACHIEVEMENT AND GROWTH

Achievement data for Pine-Richland students is compared generally to other students in the state and particularly to students scoring in the top decile (e.g. top 10% of public schools in Pennsylvania). For achievement goals, performance within the top decile is the most relevant and challenging comparator group. These comparisons provide a context for understanding how well we are educating our students.

Growth data is provided to each school district, based on the PSSA and Keystone Exams, by the Pennsylvania Value-Added Assessment System (PVAAS). "Growth" as defined by PVAAS, is "the relative change in achievement for a group of students from one point in time to the next" and is measured by "the difference between expected achievement and actual achievement for a group of students" (PVAAS SAS Website, 2024) using normal curve equivalents (NCEs) to compare current performance to estimate the average NCE change for a group of students. Our growth target is to ensure evidence of meeting the growth standard for each group of students (e.g. meets, above, well above).

### **PSSA** and Keystone Information

The Pennsylvania System of School Assessments (PSSAs) tests student skill in math and English language arts in grades three through eight and in science in grades four and eight. The following performance levels are used: advanced, proficient, basic and below basic.

The Keystone Exams are end-of-course assessments designed to assess proficiency in algebra I (grades 7-10), biology (grades 9-10) and literature (grade 9).



- The number of students taking the ACT continued to decrease at PRSD, at the state level and nationally.


### **Future Ready Index**

The Pennsylvania Department of Education utilizes the Future Ready PA Index as a method of evaluating schools in a more holistic manner than the SPP alone, utilizing a "dashboard model to highlight how schools are performing and showing progress on multiple measures" (PDE, 2018).


The Future Ready PA Index:

- Increases an emphasis on student growth measures, which incentivizes a focus on all learners and is less sensitive to demographic variables.
- Measures English language acquisition among EL students, not simply performance on a test of grade-level ELA standards.
- Incentivizes career awareness instruction beginning at the elementary level.
- Addresses the issue of unequal weighting of content areas in the current School Performance Profile.
- Provides indicators of student success after graduation.
- Increases the emphasis on student access to course offerings such as Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate, college credit, and Career Technical Education programs of study.

- ► Allows LEAs to include locally-selected reading assessment (grade 3) and math assessments (grade 7) as additional snapshots of student progress.
- ► Incentivizes schools to offer career pathways that culminate in high value, industry-recognized credentials.







This team advanced through district and regional playoffs and represented Pine-Richland at the annual PBA Young Lawyer Division High School Mock Trial State Championship in late March. The team is one of 14 from across Pennsylvania that qualified out of 290 participating teams and is the first Pine-Richland team in 11 years to be invited to the finals.



luniors Maddie Gross and Arrash Sheikh, members of the Pine-Richland Forensics Speech and Debate Team, qualified to compete at the University of Kentucky's J.W. Patterson Tournament of Champions in Poetry and Extemporaneous Speaking. This was the first time PRHS sent students to the national tournament. At the April tournament, Maddie and Arrash competed against 891 students from 316 schools representing 39 states. The tournament is invitation only, and students must have placed in the top six in at least two different tournaments earlier in the season.







### Board Approves Budget for 2025-2026 with No Tax Increase


2025-2026 Budgeted Revenue




2025-2026 Budgeted Expenditures

The Pine-Richland School Board approved the general fund budget for the 2025-2026 school year with total expenditures of \$115,597,329 and total revenues of \$107,430,461 with utilization of fund balance to address the \$1,245,036 operating deficit and \$6,921,832 for capital improvements for a total utilization of fund balance in the amount of \$8,166,868. The board maintained the following tax rates for the fiscal year 2025-2026 with no increase:

- ► Real Estate Tax rate of 19.5867 mills (no increase)
- ► Earned Income Tax of 0.5 percent
- ► Act 511 Per Capita Tax of \$5 for individuals age 18 and older
- ▶ Pennsylvania School Code Per Capita Tax of \$5 for individuals age 18 & older

#### **COST-SAVING MEASURES**

The district has addressed the financial climate and has looked at several alternative revenue sources and cost-saving measures for the past several years. Some of them included:

Staffing Reductions Due to Attrition **Energy Curtailment Program** Increase in Facility Rental Fees **Grants & Donations** 

Increase in Parking Fees **Rebates & Commissions** Advertisements Increase in Student Activity Fees

During the 2024-2025 fiscal year, the district was unable to capitalize on any bond refunding opportunities due to market conditions that reflected high interest rates. The district will continue to monitor each debt instrument for additional refunding opportunities to achieve savings and lower interest costs, if possible. Due to the high interest rates, the district's investments outperformed expectations by over a million dollars.

### **INDIVIDUAL TAXPAYER SAVINGS OPPORTUNITIES**

- ▶ The board approved the Homestead and Farmstead Exclusion Resolution for the upcoming tax year. The resolution provides for property tax reduction through a homestead or farmstead exclusion, which is provided by the state gaming industry/casinos. Residents should have an application on file with Allegheny County indicating the house they live in is their homestead. They will also receive a reduction in assessed value for their school tax. Each approved homestead will receive a real estate tax reduction in the amount of \$293.21. This means that the actual tax bill for qualifying homes will decrease for 2025 - 2026 from the prior year.
- ▶ In early 2025, the board approved a property tax rebate program for all qualifying senior citizens, widows and widowers for the 2024 calendar year. The application reflected a due date of June 30, 2025. If the filer meets the criteria, he or she could see anywhere from \$380 -\$1,000 in tax rebates.

### **BUDGET BALANCING ACT IMPACTED** BY VARIABLES

As you know, balancing the budget can be extremely difficult. Some of the variables that factor into the district's budget include:

**Common Level Ratio** – The Common Level Ratio court ruling in Allegheny County continues to level and decrease real estate assessment values in all Allegheny County public school districts including the Pine-Richland School District. Over the past three fiscal years, this has impacted the real estate revenues negatively. At Pine-Richland, 80% of overall revenue is generated from local sources. Real estate revenue is the largest element of that local income.

**Salaries and Wages** – Personnel costs for administration, faculty and support staff represent 65% of total annual budgeted expenditures. These expenditures are established by collective bargaining agreements and compensation plans.

**Employer Benefit Costs** – The district's employer contribution rate for the Public School Employees' Retirement System (PSERS) will increase to 34% of salary costs from 33.9% in 2024-2025. This rate is set by the PSERS Board of Trustees and mandated by state legislation. Although a drop in rate, expenditures for retirement contributions are budgeted to increase \$517,550 in 2025-2026. State funding reimburses the district fifty percent of these costs.

**Premium Costs** – Allegheny County Schools Health Insurance Consortium medical premium costs will increase by 5.7% for covered employees. Dental and vision insurance premiums will both increase by 3%. Overall group health insurance expenditures for the district are budgeted to increase by \$205,6888 in 2025-2026..

**Tuition Expenditures** – The district is required by law to pay tuition costs, which are projected at \$1,162,775 for 2025-2026 for students who reside in Pine-Richland to attend cyber-charter and charter schools. None of these costs are reimbursed by the state.

- Mrs. Amy Terchick as a representative to the Pine Township Parks and Recreation Board for 2025.
- ▶ **Mrs. Fortier** as a Food Service Advisory and Wellness Committee representative.
- Mr. Christopher Juzwick, director of financial and operational services, as a delegate to the Allegheny North Tax Collection Committee with Mr. Casciani as an alternate.
- Mrs. Barbara Williams serves as board secretary.

#### Attendance

The board requires that school age students enrolled in district schools attend school regularly, in accordance with state laws. The educational program offered by the district is predicated upon the presence of the student and requires continuity of instruction and classroom participation in order for

students to achieve academic standards and consistent educational progress. You can visit pinerichland.org/attendance for more about Policy 204. The district revised this policy in 2021.

#### **Discipline Code**

The purpose of the PRSD Discipline Code is to present standard behavioral expectations based on school board policy for all students in the district. Parents are encouraged to become familiar with the PRSD Discipline Code and to review these documents with their children. Parents, guardians, and students are also referred to Board Policy 218 of the board policy manual for additional information regarding the discipline code, student conduct, and consequences of inappropriate or proscribed behaviors and conduct. In the event of any conflict between the terms of the discipline code and any board policy, the applicable board policy will control and take precedence. ### **Public Outreach & Awareness System** (Child Find)

PRSD uses a public outreach awareness system to locate and identify children thought to be eligible for special education within the school district's jurisdiction. The district provides details of where to find out more information about the district's special education and early intervention programs through announcements on PR-TV (broadcasted throughout the community), in the annual report (distributed to residents, township buildings, and libraries) and via electronic communications (e-notices and website).

### Discrimination and Harassment

The board declares it to be the policy of this district to provide an equal opportunity for all students to achieve their maximum potential through the programs and activities offered in the schools without discrimination on the basis of race, color, age, creed, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender or gender identity, ancestry, national origin, marital status, pregnancy or handicap/disability.

The district shall provide to all students, without discrimination, course offerings, counseling, assistance, employment, athletics, and extracurricular activities. The equitable distribution of district resources is one means

the district shall use to ensure all students receive a quality education. The district shall make reasonable accommodations for identified physical and mental impairments that constitute handicaps and disabilities, consistent with the requirements of federal and state laws and regulations.

Discrimination is inconsistent with the rights of students and the educational and programmatic goals of the district and is prohibited at or, in the course of, districtsponsored programs or activities, including transportation to or from school or schoolsponsored activities.

Pine-Richland School District does not discriminate on the basis of sex and prohibits sex discrimination in any education program or activity that it operates, as required by Title IX and its regulations, including in employment. Such discrimination shall be referred to throughout this notice as Title IX sexual harassment. Inquiries regarding the application of Title IX to the district may be referred to the district's Title IX Coordinator (contact information below), to the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Civil Rights (https://ocrcas. ed.gov/contact-ocr), or both.

Annual notices are required for the PRSD website and related publications. Violations of this policy, including acts of retaliation as described in this policy, or knowingly providing false information, may result in disciplinary consequences under applicable Board policy and procedures.

### **Complaint & Investigative Processes**

The school board encourages students and parents/guardians who believe they have been subjected to discrimination or harassment to promptly report such incidents to designated employees in accordance with PR School Board Policy 103: Nondiscrimination/Title IX Sexual Harassment Affecting Students and 103.1: Nondiscrimination - Qualified Students with Disabilities, which can be found on the PR Policy Manual, which is linked to the district's website. Complaints of discrimination or harassment shall be investigated promptly, and corrective action will be taken for substantiated allegations. Confidentiality of all parties shall be maintained maintained to the extent possible consistent with the district's legal and investigative obligations.

Students and third parties who believe they or others have been subject to discrimination, Title IX sexual harassment, and/or retaliation

for reporting of such should promptly report such incidents to the building principal and/ or the Title IX Coordinator. Individuals are encouraged to do so even if some elements of the related incident took place or originated away from school grounds, school activities or school conveyances. A person who is not an intended victim or target of discrimination, but who is adversely affected by the offensive conduct, may also file a report of discrimination The building principal shall promptly notify the Compliance Officer/Title IX Coordinator of all reports of discrimination, Title IX sexual harassment and/or retaliation.

The Compliance Officer/Title IX Coordinator shall promptly contact the complainant regarding the report to gather additional information as necessary and to discuss the availability of supportive measures. The Compliance Officer/Title IX Coordinator shall consider the complainant's wishes with respect to supportive measures.

\*On April 19, 2024, the U.S. Department of Education released its Final Rule under Title IX which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex in education or activities receiving federal financial assistance. These updated regulations are effective August 1, 2024. Policies and administrative regulations will be updated based on the new guidelines. The online version of the PRSD Discipline Code will also be revised.

### Surveillance Cameras & Audio Recordings (Polices 810.2 and 817)

Under School Board Policy 817 (Use of Video Surveillance Cameras), the district is permitted to use video surveillance in any school building, on school district property, or on any transportation vehicle being used by the district. The district does monitor district buildings, property, and transportation vehicles with surveillance cameras and individuals using any such facilities should expect that such surveillance may occur. In addition, the use of audio recordings is permitted on school district transportation vehicles (Policy 810.2). The district began recording audio on all equipped buses in the 2017-2018 school year.

### Food Service (Policy 808) & Student Wellness (Policy 246)

In 2018, the school board approved a revised Policy 808 Food Services as well as an administrative regulation, which addresses student meal balances and unpaid meal charge procedures.

Pine-Richland School District recognizes that student wellness and proper nutrition are related to students' physical well being, growth, development, and readiness to learn. The board is committed to providing a school environment that promotes student wellness, proper nutrition, nutrition education and promotion, and regular physical activity as part of the total learning experience. In a healthy school environment, students will learn about and participate in positive dietary and lifestyle practices that can improve student achievement. In November of 2017, the board approved a revised Policy 246 Student Wellness.

#### Child Abuse (Policy 806)

The board requires district employees, independent contractors, and volunteers to comply with identification and reporting requirements for suspected child abuse, as well as the training requirement for recognition and reporting of child abuse to comply with the Child Protective Services Law and the School Code. #### Student Accident Insurance (Policy 211)

The board recognizes the need for insurance coverage for unforeseen accidents that may occur to students in the course of attendance at school or participation in the athletic and extracurricular programs of the schools. The board shall provide parents/ guardians the opportunity to purchase insurance coverage, at no cost to the board, for injury resulting from accidents sustained by students in school programs, school activities, and while traveling between home and school other than on a school bus. The premium will be paid by the parents/guardians. The board shall maintain insurance coverage by a qualified insurer over and above the first responsibility of family coverage at no cost to the student for injury resulting from accidents sustained while participating in an interscholastic sports program, the cheerleader program, and band program.

Parents/guardians looking for health insurance can review more information about the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). CHIP is there for your kids with quality, comprehensive health insurance coverage for routine doctor visits, prescriptions, dental, eye care, and much more. #### Student Fundraising (Policy 229)

Fundraising activities must comply with School Board Policy 229 (Student Fundraising) and must be requested in writing to the building principal or director of athletics on a district-approved form. The form must be reviewed and approved at the building/athletic office before any such fundraising can take place. No student instructional time may be used for fundraising. #### Student Assistance Program (Policy 236)

The district reinforces the connection between emotional well-being and student success through a continuum of the school

and community mental health supports. The Student Assistance Programs and School-Based Mental Health Services are available in all PR schools, K-12. Specifically, all staff members (administrators, teachers, counselors, nurses, coaches, bus drivers, custodial staff, food service personnel) are trained annually on risk factors and warning signs of suicide and appropriate responsible reporting procedures (Observe, Listen, Refer). The district and school suicide prevention coordinators continue to provide age-appropriate curriculum for students K-12 in the development of resiliency, understanding good emotional and physical health, protective factors, healthy coping and problem-solving skills, responsible reporting, and identifying trusted adults at school and in the home environments. Anyone can refer a student to SAP when they are concerned about someone's behavior. Students can go directly to the SAP team to ask for help. The SAP team contacts the parent for permission to proceed with the SAP process. Visit pinerichland.org/sap for more information.

### Suicide Awareness, Prevention, and Response (Policy 819)

The board is committed to protecting the health, safety, and welfare of its students and the school community. Policy 819 supports the provision of a comprehensive district program designed to promote behavioral health and prevent suicide. The Board directs the district to provide education on youth suicide awareness and prevention; to establish methods of prevention, intervention, and response to a suicide attempt or suicide death; and to promote access to suicide awareness and prevention resources.
