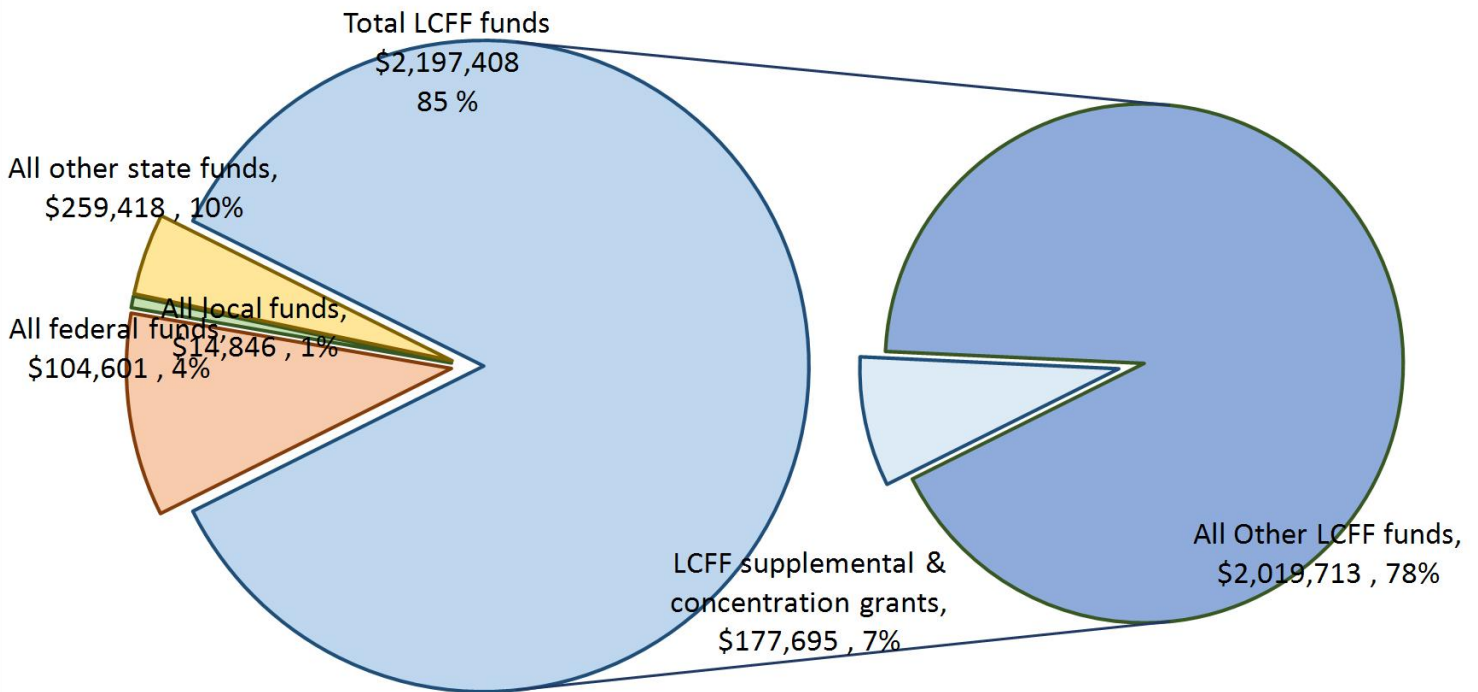

Projected Revenue by Fund Source

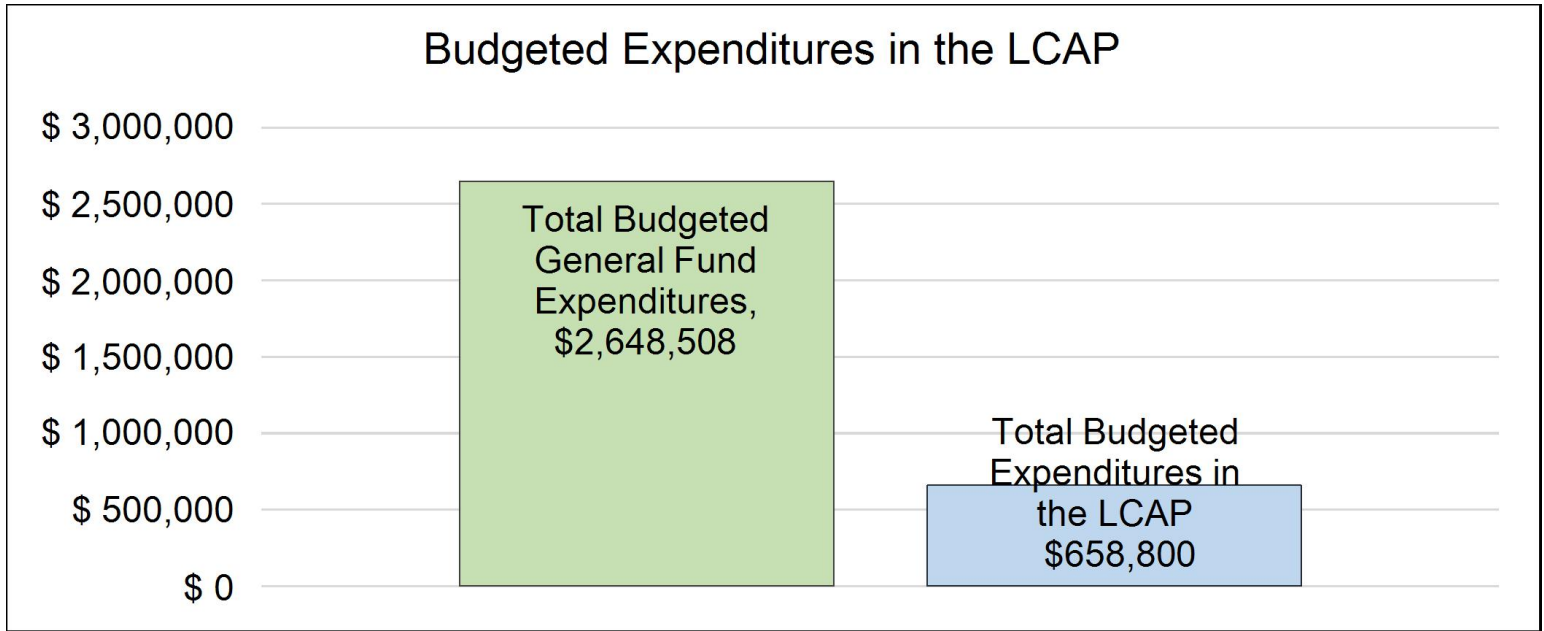


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue JCS-Pine Valley expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for JCS-Pine Valley is \$2,576,273, of which \$2,197,408 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$259,418 is other state funds, \$14,846 is local funds, and \$104,601 is federal funds. Of the \$2,197,408 in LCFF Funds, \$177,695 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (foster youth, English learner, and low-income students).

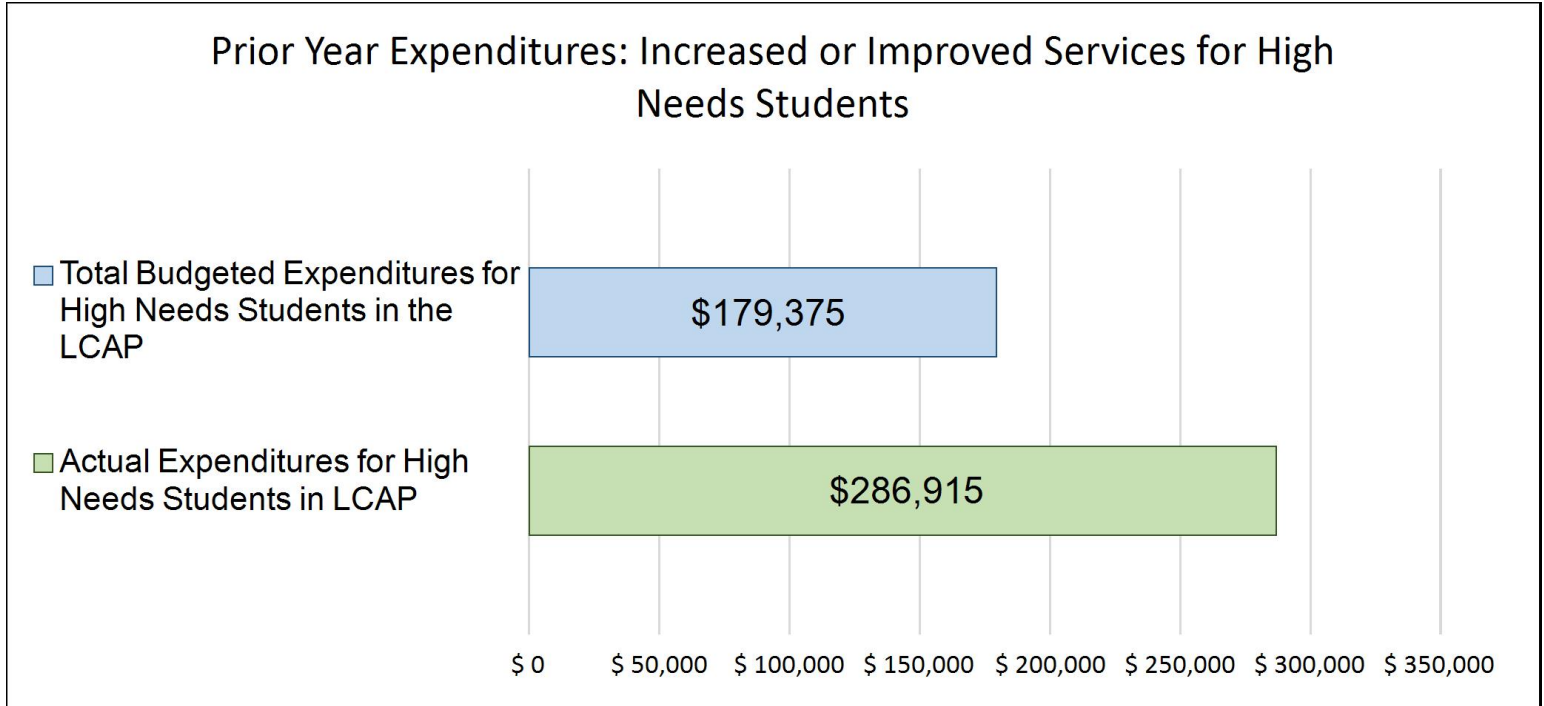

Increased or Improved Services for High Needs Students in the LCAP for the 2025-26 School Year

In 2025-26, JCS-Pine Valley is projecting it will receive \$177,695 based on the enrollment of foster youth, English learner, and low-income students. JCS-Pine Valley must describe how it intends to increase or improve services for high needs students in the LCAP. Plan Summary [2025-26]

General Information

JCS-Pine Valley is an independent study TK-12 charter school sponsored by Mountain Empire Unified School District. As of April 11, 2025 (P2) JCS-Pine Valley serves 183 students in east San Diego County. Currently, the school has one center in Pine Valley, Pine Valley Academy, which houses a 6-12 academy that students attend 3-4 days per week. Additionally, there is space for educational facilitators (EFs) to meet with Home Study students and space for special education services.

The mission of JCS-Pine Valley is to empower learners with educational choice. Our vision is to work in partnership with families to ensure all learners develop the necessary skills to become contributing members of our local and global communities. Our school's theme is cultivating character. Our students are very involved in community events, community service, recycling, responsible stewardship of nature, ASB activities, and school events, We also encourage global awareness and strive to step out of our comfortable town and into the world around us. We are dedicated to excellence and committed to nurturing passionate lifelong learners. Core values include:

- Creativity and Innovation: Envision and explore rich teaching and learning opportunities.
- Commitment: Educate students to their full potential and uphold the greater good of the school.
- Choice: Empower individual paths and goals through personalized learning.
- Excellence: Foster a climate of high expectations, quality, and accountability.
- Integrity and Compassion: Model honesty, dignity, fairness, and responsibility while demonstrating respect and understanding.

Students at JCS-Pine Valley are part of an independent study education model and are generally referred to as being in the home study program or the academy program. Daily instruction of TK-12 home study students is done by the parent-teacher under the supervision of an EF. K-8 students may get instruction one day a week at a learning center or the EF may work with the parent to incorporate instruction from our educational enrichment partners. Students at our 6-12 academy are taught by a certified teacher less than 74% of the time and by a parent-teacher more than 26% of the time.

The student demographic data shows that the majority of the student population identifies as White (77.0%), followed by Hispanic or Latino students (9.3%) and Mexican American students (6.0%). Smaller percentages include American Indian or Alaska Native (2.7%), Puerto Rican (2.2%), Filipino (1.1%), and very small representations of Asian and Black or African American students (0.5% each). One student's race is unspecified. In terms of ethnicity, 26.8% of students identify as Hispanic, while 73.2% identify as not Hispanic. Gender distribution is nearly even, with 49.7% female and 49.2% male, and a small portion (1.1%) identifying as non-binary. Overall, the student body is predominantly White and non-Hispanic, with a balanced gender representation and limited racial diversity. This demographic profile may inform the school's strategies for equity, inclusion, and culturally responsive practices.

The vast majority of students (96.7%) live in permanent housing, indicating residential stability, with only a small percentage (3.3%) experiencing temporary or non-traditional housing arrangements. Nearly half of the student population (45.9%) is identified as socio-economically disadvantaged, highlighting the need for continued support services. Additionally, 16.9% of students receive special education services, and a small percentage (2.7%) are identified as eligible for Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) programs. English Learners make up a very small portion of the student body (1.6%), all of whom speak Spanish. The demographic data suggest a relatively stable and homogeneous student population in terms of language, but with a significant proportion of students requiring academic and socio-emotional supports due to economic and special education needs.

While the LEA doesn't have a migrant population in the traditional sense, there is a somewhat transient population. Some families decide that home study is not the right "fit" for them, while others move back and forth between different charter schools looking for different resources and schedules. The 6-12 academy, however, has a consistent base of students who typically stay enrolled with the LEA through graduation once they start.

Students come to JCS-Pine Valley for various reasons: some are looking for an option other than their local school because they aren't happy with what their local school has to offer; some are drawn to the academy because of its project-based program or smaller classes; others like the balance of home school and classroom-based instruction; and still others prefer the traditional home study model with the flexibility and choice in curriculum and daily schedule. Because JCS-Pine Valley covers a relatively large geographical area, the student demographics and needs vary somewhat depending on the region. When analyzing data, the LEA considers the needs of its different populations, looking at data for the Academy and Home Study programs separately, to identify students' needs. While JCS-Pine Valley strives to support all learners in meeting their potential, the LEA is very aware of struggling and at-risk learners and their diverse needs and is constantly striving to provide additional support.

Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

The 2024 CA School Dashboard was released in December 2024 and revealed areas of academic performance and engagement where JCS-Pine Valley is improving or declining. This information allows the LEA to reflect on the effectiveness of actions/services in the 24/25 LCAP. Additionally, the dashboard data (along with other data collected from internal assessments, surveys, partner engagement forums, etc.) highlighted areas where JCS-Pine Valley should revise/refine actions and services in the 25/26 LCAP, especially related to equity for disadvantaged subgroups of students. For several engagement indicators and state-required metrics, data is not publicly available for JCS-Pine Valley students due to small enrollment numbers; therefore, the LEA used local data and calculations to determine overall performance and equity gaps. In addition to the 2024 CA School Dashboard, the following sources were used to access and analyze annual performance data: DataQuest (public database), NWEA MAP (local verified data), School Pathways (local School Information System), Qualtrics (local SEL survey data), RCOE Tableau (public data analysis tool) and Parsec (public and local data file analysis tool).

Note about red indicators on the CA School Dashboard: JCS-Pine Valley did not receive the lowest performance level for any indicators on the 2024 CA School Dashboard, nor for any student subgroups.

Note about LREBG Funding: The LEA did not have any unexpended LREBG funding in FY24/25. If the LEA receives LREBG funding in FY25/26, after the state's budget has been approved, the LCAP will be amended and re-approved by the LEA's board of directors to meet criteria that allow for LREBG expenditures in FY25/26.

ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE DATA

JCS-Pine Valley is considered a small school, and the number of students eligible to participate in state testing is even smaller (Grades 3-8 & 11); therefore, some equity report information is not available. For transparency, the total number of valid student results for ELA is 82, and for Math is 32. Of that group, the student count for groups that generate an equity performance rating is as follows: Socioeconomically Disadvantaged (35) and White (58). Student numbers for subgroups whose data is suppressed and not publicly shared are as follows: Students with Disabilities (20), Two or More Races (6), Hispanic (17), English Learners (5), Homeless (2), African American (0), Asian (0), American Indian (1), Filipino (1), Foster Youth (0), Long-term English Learners (0).

--ELA Performance Analysis--

All Students: Overall, 31% of all JCS-Pine Valley students eligible to take the state test in Spring 2024 met/exceeded the standard in English Language Arts. According to the CA Schools Dashboard, the Distance from Standard (DFS) is 29.7 points below standard, which is a decline (-5.7 points) from the 2023 ELA CAASPP performance. This has placed JCS-Pine Valley in the "orange" (low) performance category.

Equity Analysis: No subgroups earned the red (lowest) performance rating for ELA. SED students earned the orange (low) performance rating with a DFS of -44.4 (20.7 point decline). White students earned the yellow (middle) performance rating with a DFS of -24 (4.5 point increase). An analysis of internal data revealed that females outperformed all other groups with 37.0%, significantly higher than males, who scored 24.6%. Among racial/ethnic groups, students identifying as Two or More Races had the highest performance at 36.4%, followed by White students at 30.6%, and Hispanic or Latino students at 26.9%. Performance disparities are evident in program-based groups. Socioeconomically disadvantaged students scored below the school average at 25.5%, and the lowest performing group by far was students

with disabilities, with only 4.8% meeting or exceeding the standard. This data highlights a clear need for targeted academic interventions and support strategies, particularly for students with disabilities and socioeconomically disadvantaged students, in order to close achievement gaps.

EAP Performance Analysis (ELA): Internal data shows ten (10) valid scores for 11th graders who took the CAASPP in 2024, and 50.0% of them met or exceeded the standard in ELA. Subgroups for this metric are minute, with between 1-3 students in representing the SED, SwD, and Hispanic populations. Comparatively, these students underperform their peers and seldom meet the standard.

Conclusions and Impact on LCAP actions/services: This data suggests that ELA performance continues to be a significant area for improvement with the LEA's overall population achieving below the state average and on a downward trajectory in 2024. There are critical equity gaps that need to be addressed, particularly for socioeconomically disadvantaged students and targeted instructional support and interventions are necessary, as address in Goal 2 of the LCAP. For Grade 11, where students have the opportunity to demonstrate EAP readiness, results highlight moderate proficiency in English Language Arts (50%), but equitable outcomes for disadvantaged subgroups of students are still present. Overall, the general proficiency rate continues to suggest there is room for improvement in preparing students for postsecondary literacy demands.

There are several actions/services in the 24/25 LCAP aimed at improving outcomes for subgroups and, specifically, closing equity gaps for underserved students. In the 25/26 LCAP, these will need to be revised or refocused since 2024 data indicates that inequitable challenges for these subgroups are still significant. Local data related to academic intervention has been inconsistent; therefore, the LEA will ensure these continued efforts are systematic and specifically focused on underserved students to close equity gaps.

--Math Performance Analysis--

All Students: Overall, 28.6% of all JCS-Pine Valley students eligible to take the state test in Spring 2024 met/exceeded the standard in Mathematics. According to the CA Schools Dashboard, the Distance from Standard (DFS) is 62.1 points below standard, a 9.8-point decline from the 2023 Math CAASPP performance. This has placed JCS-Pine Valley in the "orange" (low) performance category.

Equity Analysis: No subgroups earned the red (lowest) performance ratings for Math. Two subgroups earned the orange (low) performance rating: White and SED. 26% of White students achieved proficiency with a DFS of -55.8 (maintained) and 25% of SED students achieved proficiency with a DFS of -74.7 (declined 17.1 points). All other subgroups did not earn performance colors due to low student numbers. An analysis of internal data revealed that, among student groups, performance varied notably by gender, ethnicity, and program participation. Males outperformed all other groups with a 34.5% proficiency rate, while females had a significantly lower rate at 22.2%. Ethnic performance varied, with Hispanic or Latino students achieving the highest percentage among racial groups at 30.8%, followed by students identifying as Two or More Races (27.3%) and White students (26.0%).

Program-based disparities were evident, particularly among students with disabilities, who had a 0.0% proficiency rate, highlighting a critical area for intervention. Socioeconomically disadvantaged students also underperformed compared to the overall average, with a 25.0% proficiency rate. These results indicate that while some subgroups are performing above the school average, there remain persistent achievement gaps, especially for students with disabilities and socioeconomically disadvantaged students. Targeted support and resources may be necessary to address these disparities and improve overall academic outcomes in mathematics.

EAP Performance Analysis (Math): Overall, only 20% of all Grade 11 students (10) met or exceeded expectations in math. Subgroups are too small to analyze data, but in general, the evidence suggests that equity gaps are present.

Conclusions and Impact on LCAP actions/services: The 2024 CAASPP math data analysis underscores the need for targeted support for all students, especially students with disabilities, male students, and racially diverse students, and SED students, to close the achievement gap and ensure equitable outcomes in math proficiency. For Grade 11, where students have the opportunity to demonstrate EAP readiness, results indicate low achievement. The Grade 11 data highlights a need for intervention and curriculum support at the high school level, particularly in preparing students for college and career readiness.

--EL Performance Analysis--

Due to data suppression, there is no public data for English Learners at JCS-Pine Valley for ELPAC performance and EL Reclassification Rate. As reflected on the CA Schools Dashboard, JCS-Pine Valley only had two (2) English Learners in 2023/2024 who took the Summative ELPAC, and 100% of ELs maintained their ELPI level. The LEA will continue to focus actions/services on EL development and, as EL numbers increase, we will evaluate the effectiveness of the LCAP actions and services.

--College and Career Analysis--

All Students: According to the 2024 CA School Dashboard, JCS-Pine Valley had 8 students eligible for the College and Career Readiness evaluation. Internal data reveals that 86% are considered College & Career Prepared, due to a combination of A-G completion, College Course Completion, and CAASPP scores. Due to data suppression, the LEA does not receive a performance color for the College and Career indicator. Regardless, the LEA has been dedicating resources for several years to improve student outcomes in this area, and an analysis of internal data reveals areas of growth and improvement needed when it comes to equity.

Equity Analysis: Due to the small population of students (8) and even smaller subgroups, data is suppressed, and equity performance colors were not given on the CA Dashboard.

Conclusions and Impact on LCAP actions/services: Internal data and CCI tracking reveal that 86% of 2024 graduates from the LEA were considered College and Career Prepared. The LEA has been dedicating resources for several years to improve student outcomes in this area; therefore, this is a highlighted success for JCS-Pine Valley. Action related to improving post-secondary outcomes for high school students, found in Goal 2 of the LCAP, will continue to be monitored and improved so that all students, regardless of background, have equitable access and opportunities to be successful.

--Science Performance--

All Students: The 2024 CA Schools Dashboard introduced Science (CAST) data for informational purposes only. 38 students had valid CAST scores, and 30% of them demonstrated proficiency with a DFS of -12.2 (1.6 point increase).

Equity Analysis: Among the various subgroups, performance varied significantly. Female students outperformed their male counterparts, with 35.0% of females meeting or exceeding the standard compared to 24.0% of males. By ethnicity, Hispanic or Latino students had a slightly higher success rate (27.3%) than White students (25.8%). Notably, socioeconomically disadvantaged students performed above the school-wide average, with 31.6% meeting or exceeding the standard, indicating a positive trend for this group relative to other performance gaps. In

contrast, students with disabilities showed significant underperformance, with 0.0% meeting the standard, mirroring similar concerns seen in math results.

Conclusions and Impact on LCAP actions/services: The 2024 California Science Test (CAST) results for JCS - Pine Valley show that 29.8% of all students met or exceeded the state standard. Overall, while some subgroups, such as females and socioeconomically disadvantaged students, show relatively strong performance, the persistent gaps, especially for students with disabilities, highlight areas in need of focused support and intervention.

--Growth Data--

All Students: The 2024 CA Schools Dashboard introduced ELA & Math Growth data for informational purposes only. For ELA, JCS-Pine Valley students generally scored 2 points above the typical growth of students with similar test scores in the previous grade level. In Math, JCS-Pine Valley students scored 8 points above the typical growth of students with similar test scores in the previous grade level.

By subgroup, SED and White students all had "typical" ELA growth (3-6 points above), while SwD students had "above" typical ELA growth (14 points above). For math, SwD, SED, and White students all had "typical" math growth, scoring between 3-13 points above students with similar test scores in the previous grade level.

Conclusions and Impact on LCAP actions/services: The 2024 CA Schools Dashboard growth data for JCS - Pine Valley reveals encouraging trends in both English Language Arts (ELA) and Math, particularly in terms of student improvement over time relative to peers with similar prior achievement. Overall, students at JCS - Pine Valley demonstrated positive academic growth, scoring 2 points above typical growth in ELA and 8 points above in Math. These results suggest that the school is supporting year-over-year progress, especially in Mathematics, where the overall growth is more pronounced.

When disaggregated by subgroup, socioeconomically disadvantaged (SED) and White students both showed "typical" growth in ELA and Math, meaning their academic progress was in line with expected trends for similar students across the state. Importantly, students with disabilities (SwD) exceeded expectations in ELA with "above typical" growth, scoring 14 points higher than similar peers, which is a significant achievement given this group's traditionally lower proficiency rates. In Math, SwD students also experienced typical growth, indicating consistent progress.

In summary, JCS - Pine Valley is not only maintaining growth across the board but is particularly succeeding in accelerating ELA progress for students with disabilities—a key indicator of equity and effective support strategies. The overall strength in math growth and above-average trends in ELA for key subgroups reflect a positive instructional impact.

ACADEMIC ENGAGEMENT DATA

--Chronic Absenteeism Analysis--

All Students: Chronic absenteeism data is based on the percentage of students in transitional kindergarten through grade 8 who were absent 10 percent or more of the instructional days they were enrolled. In 2023/2024, 4.8% of 146 students at JCS-Pine Valley were considered chronically absent (maintained from 2022/2023). This status and change earned the LEA the green (high) performance color. The chronic

absenteeism rate for JCS-Pine Valley is significantly lower than the statewide average, indicating that students at JCS-Pine Valley are less likely to be chronically absent than the average student in California.

Equity Analysis: For Chronic Absenteeism, no groups are in the red (lowest) performance tier. THE SED student group is in the orange (low) performance tier with a chronic absenteeism rate of 8.6% (1.1% increase), and White students are in the blue (highest) performance tier with a chronic absenteeism rate of 1% (3.9% decline). Although Hispanic, SwD, and students with Two or More Races did not meet the minimum threshold to receive performance colors, Hispanic students have a chronic absenteeism rate of 11.8% (7.9% increase), SwD have a chronic absenteeism rate of 7.4% (1.9% increase), and students with Two or More Races have a chronic absenteeism rate of 15.4%.

Conclusions and Impact on LCAP actions/services: The chronic absenteeism data for JCS-Pine Valley in the 2023–2024 school year reflects a strong overall performance, with only 4.8% of the 146 students in TK–8 classified as chronically absent. This figure matches the previous year's rate, demonstrating consistent attendance patterns and earning the school a green (high) performance rating on the California Dashboard. Compared to the statewide average, JCS-Pine Valley's absenteeism rate is significantly lower, suggesting that its students are far less likely to be chronically absent than their peers across California.

However, the equity analysis reveals key areas of concern. While no student groups fall into the red (lowest) performance tier, the Socioeconomically Disadvantaged (SED) group is rated orange (low), with a chronic absenteeism rate of 8.6%—a 1.1 percentage point increase from the previous year. In contrast, White students show excellent attendance, earning a blue (highest) performance rating with a rate of just 1%, down 3.9 percentage points.

Though some groups did not meet the minimum size for performance color ratings, their absenteeism rates are still notable. Hispanic students had the highest rate at 11.8%, up sharply by 7.9 percentage points. Students with Disabilities (SwD) had a rate of 7.4% (a 1.9-point increase), and students identifying with Two or More Races showed the highest rate at 15.4%. These disparities underscore the need for focused attendance interventions targeting specific subgroups, particularly Hispanic, SwD, and SED students, to ensure equitable support and prevent further attendance challenges.

--Graduation Rate--

All Students: According to the 2024 CA School Dashboard, JCS-Pine Valley had 8 students eligible for high school graduation, which does not meet the minimum student count to display data publicly. Internal data and tracking reveal that the LEA has a 2024 graduation rate of 87.5%. This is a decline of 12.5% from the 2023 graduation rate data.

Equity Analysis: When examined by program, socioeconomically disadvantaged students graduated at a rate of 75%, while students with disabilities had a rate of 100%. By ethnicity and race, White students had the highest graduation rate at 100%, while Hispanic students had a 2024 graduation rate of 0%.

Conclusions and Impact on LCAP actions/services: The 2024 graduation data for JCS-Pine Valley reveals a small graduating class of just 8 students, which falls below the California Department of Education's threshold for publicly reported Dashboard data. However, internal tracking indicates an overall graduation rate of 87.5%, marking a notable 12.5 percentage point decline from the previous year. This drop suggests a need for increased attention to high school completion efforts, even within the small student population.

From an equity perspective, there are significant disparities in outcomes across student subgroups. Socioeconomically Disadvantaged (SED) students had a graduation rate of 75%, indicating a need for targeted support to ensure equitable opportunities for success. Students with Disabilities (SwD) and White students both achieved a 100% graduation rate, reflecting strong performance within those groups. In stark contrast, Hispanic students had a 0% graduation rate in 2024, a deeply concerning outcome that signals urgent attention is required to understand and address the underlying barriers affecting these students. Overall, while some groups are thriving, the data highlights critical equity gaps that must be addressed to ensure all students are supported through to graduation.

As a result, the 25/36 LCAP will maintain and strengthen supports in service of improving graduation rates for all students, while prioritizing focused interventions for SED and Hispanic students, including academic support, transition planning, and personalized graduation pathways. The LEA will continue to monitor small subgroups closely, even when equity colors are not assigned, to inform targeted resource allocation and support equity goals.

CONDITIONS AND CLIMATE

--Suspension Rate Analysis--

All Students: Suspension rate data is based on the percentage of students in transitional kindergarten through grade 12 who have been suspended for at least one aggregate day in a given school year. In 2023/2024, 0% of 192 students at JCS-Pine Valley were suspended, placing the LEA in the blue (highest) performance tier. The suspension rate for JCS-Pine Valley is significantly lower than the statewide average, indicating that JCS-Pine Valley is more effective at using positive interventions and restorative practices to support student discipline behavior than most schools in the state of California.

Equity Analysis: With a suspension rate of 0%, all populated subgroups (Hispanic, SED, and White) were placed in the blue (highest) performance tier.

Conclusions and Impact of LCAP actions/services: JCS-Pine Valley demonstrates strong overall discipline practices, maintaining a 0% suspension rate and top-tier performance statewide. As a result, the LEA will maintain current positive and restorative discipline practices across the school and current LCAP, such as Leader In Me (301), HSA & SEL Counselor (302), and PD - SEL & Engagement (303).

--Local Climate Survey (HSA)--

All Students: The Fall 2024 administration of the PEAR Holistic Student Assessment (HSA) at JCS-Pine Valley revealed important insights into the social-emotional development and school engagement of students in grades 4–12. Schoolwide results showed that only 28.8% of students were thriving (Tier 1), while 37.5% were in Tier 2, and 33.8% were in Tier 3, indicating a concerning percentage of students facing serious challenges. While notable strengths included emotion control, action orientation, and school bonding, significant challenges emerged in learning interest and reflection, suggesting a need to strengthen student engagement and metacognitive skills.

Equity Analysis: When disaggregated, the data highlighted both strengths and areas of concern within specific student groups. Students with Disabilities (SwD) had the highest percentage of students in Tier 1 (44.4%) and showed strengths in action orientation, empathy, and reflection. However, they still struggled with academic motivation and learning interest, indicating a gap between emotional resilience and academic engagement. Low-Income students (SED) showed a balanced distribution across tiers, with strengths in empathy and school

bonding, but challenges in assertiveness, an area that may hinder their ability to self-advocate and participate fully in the learning environment.

Hispanic students emerged as the highest-risk group, with 60% in Tier 3, an extremely low average number of strengths (0.6), and high levels of challenge (5.9). Their greatest strength was empathy, while assertiveness and reflection were significant areas of concern. This suggests an urgent need for culturally responsive supports and interventions that foster student voice and identity development. Home Study students were the most positively represented group, with 50% in Tier 1 and higher averages of strengths than challenges. Their challenges, however, centered on optimism, assertiveness, and reflection, indicating that even thriving students may need support in developing confidence and a growth mindset.

Academy students represented the second-highest-risk group, with 40.4% in Tier 3 and a low average of strengths (1.3) compared to challenges (4.5). Although these students demonstrated strengths in action orientation and peer relationships, they faced major challenges in learning interest, reflection, and empathy. This points to a need for increased emphasis on motivation, critical thinking, and social-emotional awareness within this learning pathway..

Conclusions and Impact of LCAP actions/services: Overall, the HSA results suggest several key areas of need for the school. Most notably, widespread challenges in learning interest and reflection across student groups point to the importance of incorporating strategies that promote student engagement, autonomy, and metacognition. Low levels of assertiveness—especially among SED and Hispanic students—highlight the need for intentional instruction in self-advocacy and leadership skills. Additionally, with more than 70% of students in Tier 2 or Tier 3, there is a clear need for a robust multi-tiered system of support that includes schoolwide SEL instruction, targeted small group interventions, and individualized support for students in crisis.

Strengths such as emotion regulation, empathy, school bonding, and peer relationships can be leveraged to support school culture and student development. The data calls for a strategic, equity-focused approach to SEL implementation, including culturally responsive teaching, trauma-informed practices, and consistent progress monitoring. Continued work with the Leader in Me program (LiM) and Positive Behavior Interventions for Success (PBIS) is incorporated into Goal 3 of the LEA's LCAP. LiM is an evidence-based model focused on leadership, culture, and academics that equips students, educators, and families with essential leadership and life skills, preparing them to excel. This includes staff training, curriculum materials, and teaching/learning resources.

As a next step, school leadership and staff will prioritize targeted SEL programming, invest in professional development, and prepare to reassess growth during the fall 2025 HSA window. The school will continue to use the results of the HSA to identify students in need of Tier 3 support (intensive specialized interventions) and create action plans to address individualized challenges, including, but not limited to, Student Success Team (SST), small group mini-lessons, and counseling support. etc. Additionally, the counseling staff will continue to support aligning SEL lessons and activities to the HSA scales so school communities can target challenge areas with whole-group teaching and learning.

A description of how the adopted LCAP was influenced by the feedback provided by educational partners.

The LEA purposefully engaged Educational Partners, including Parents, Students, and Staff (Teachers, Principals, Administrators, and other School Personnel), in the development of the LCAP through group discussion in open forum settings such as School Site Council Meetings and Leadership Chats, Ongoing Feedback Surveys, and the Public Comment portion of the monthly Board Meeting. Throughout the year, these partners were asked to provide input on LCAP Goals. They were presented with student outcome data to demonstrate progress toward goals and prompted to provide feedback on the actions in service of the goals.

PARENT FEEDBACK

Parent feedback across all three LCAP goals reflects strong appreciation for several key actions while also highlighting areas for improvement. Parents identified teachers/educational facilitators, safe and functional facilities, specialized academic instruction for SPED

students, staff professional development, small class sizes, early literacy programs, arts and music classes, field trips, and parent-teacher/student-led conferences as the most effective supports. However, the meal program, counseling services, high school counselor communication, Bound for Blue, CTE course access, Naviance, School Site Council meetings, and the school's social media presence were seen as less effective. For Goal 1 (Conditions of Learning), parents called for more diverse and accessible curriculum options and emphasized the need for increased specialist support, particularly in high school Math and English, suggesting weekly Zoom lessons for improved understanding. In Goal 2 (Student Outcomes), LEAP teachers received praise, but parents recommended more proactive academic counseling starting in 8th grade and continuing annually to guide students toward college and career readiness. For Goal 3 (Students Engagement & Parent Involvement), while field trips are valued, their cost and Friday scheduling pose barriers; alternative days and more affordable options were suggested. Parents also noted limited awareness of engagement opportunities and recommended more flexible activities, such as park meetups, along with creating a parent-to-parent support group to strengthen community involvement.

STAFF FEEDBACK (TEACHERS, PRINCIPALS, ADMINISTRATORS, AND OTHER SCHOOL PERSONNEL)

Staff feedback across the three LCAP goals highlights both strengths and areas needing improvement. For Goal 1, the most effective actions include having highly qualified teachers, access to standards-aligned curriculum, and well-maintained school facilities. However, concerns persist about the rushed adoption of new curricula without sufficient evaluation, limited collaboration between SPED and general education teachers, and inadequate tech support on in-class days. Staff recommend forming a curriculum review committee with representation from all sites to ensure thoughtful adoption of materials that align with student needs. In Goal 2, staff value tools like data tracking and collaboration with SELPA, as well as the Early Literacy Learning Center. Still, they note limited access to effective intervention for home study students, outdated A-G elective options, and a lack of coordination with SPED services. Recommendations include expanding real-world learning opportunities, ensuring all electives are consistently delivered through Canvas, and increasing early literacy training for parents. For Goal 3, while field trips and family engagement events are appreciated, the Leader in Me program is viewed by some as ineffective. Staff emphasize the need for a cohesive marketing strategy that includes a unified brand, increased community visibility, and improved enrollment communication. Suggestions include appointing marketing leads and improving staff responsiveness to inquiries. Overall, staff call for better coordination, resource allocation, and communication to support student success and community engagement.

STUDENT FEEDBACK

Student feedback reflects a generally positive view of their school experience, with many students appreciating the supportive environment, caring teachers, small class sizes, and sense of community. Students feel their teachers help them learn, provide needed materials, and give constructive feedback, especially after major assignments. They also value fun and educational events like field trips, and feel that many staff members are approachable and compassionate. However, there are areas where students see room for improvement. Less agreement was expressed regarding teachers being easy to understand, receiving appropriate academic challenges, or feeling prepared for college and careers. Some students also noted gaps in emotional support, leadership development, and social guidance. When asked what the school could do better, students recommended more engaging electives, better field trip opportunities, stronger discipline to address bullying, and improved communication from leadership. They also called for more personalized academic support, reduced homework loads, more interactive lessons, updated facilities and technology, and healthier lunch options. These insights highlight the importance of fostering both academic excellence and a safe, engaging, and inclusive school climate.

The LEA has internalized this feedback and embraced it within the development of the 2025/2026 Local Control Accountability Plan. The goals included in this LCAP are aligned with the state priorities, and a majority of the metrics are required, but the actions and services are inspired by our educational partners.

Feedback from partners suggests that students, parents, and staff generally express positive sentiments about JCS-Pine Valley citing small class sizes, supportive teachers, and the opportunity to improve academically with access to educational materials and curriculum choices. To ensure staff are trained and well supported, the LEA will take action to provide a funded induction program for new teachers and administrators who need to clear their credentials. The instructional materials provided by the school are paramount to student success; therefore, we will ensure they are accessible to all students, rigorous, and aligned to standards through actions related to curriculum analysis, adoption, and implementation, technology provisions and support, and programs and services for unrepresented students. We will ensure that the facilities are safe for individuals by assessing physical spaces on campuses and ensuring janitorial services, necessary repairs, and building improvements. Within the metrics, actions, and services below, we aim to maintain many basic services through tracking systems while attending to improvements in curriculum, resources, and facilities for all students and support services for students with special needs.

All actions were carried out as planned and aligned to their LEA description. While there were no substantive differences in planned actions, there are some substantive differences in actual implementation and expenditures, as reported in the next section. These differences were due to the LEA under/over-estimating expenditures for full implementation of the action, a significant (unexpected) need aligned to full implementation of the action, a shift in how the LEA approached the planned action, or a decrease in expenses due to shared costs among the JCS network of charter schools.

1.2 - Parent and Staff partners expressed a strong need for new and updated curriculum; therefore, the LEA spent more than estimated on this action.

1.5 - All students have access to technology with a 1:1 student to device ratio. Hot spots are also provided to student who need access to home internet. The LEA was awarded a Technology Grant in 24/25 and received a surplus of new Chromebooks; therefore, expenditures were less than anticipated.

1.6 - The LEA utilizes Charter Tech Services for daily technology support. The cost in 24/25 was \$25,000 more than our LCAP estimate. The LEA will increase the expenditure estimate for this action in the 25/26 LCAP.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

According to parent and staff partner feedback, the most effective actions associated with Goal 1 were Highly Qualified Teachers (1.1), Curriculum (1.2), and Physical Safety (1.7). The least effective action rated by parent partners was specialized services (such as meal program and counseling) for underserved students (1.8). For staff, the least effective action was that students have access to technology (devices) that are functional, well-maintained, repaired, and replaced as needed (1.5 & 1.6). While the LEA has considered the reasons partners have rated these actions more or less effective, the LEA recognizes they are all essential in providing quality learning environment for students, and they will continue to play an important role in school improvement and the 25/26 LCAP.

Based on the school's Academic Performance and College and Career Readiness Indicators on the CA Dashboard, as well as partner input, we've determined the school needs to dedicate resources, time, and attention to providing high-quality, equitable, and responsive instruction so all students can succeed at high levels. Declining achievement in ELA and Math at the end of the last LCAP cycle indicates that all students must continue increasing communication and critical thinking skills. This is especially important for SwDs with lower performance levels on the CA School Dashboard. Although academic data for English Learners is not publicly available due to data suppression and low student numbers, an internal analysis of raw data files tells us that ELs are also performing far below all students in ELA and Math; therefore, we intend to address this equity gap with contributing actions/services. Additionally, secondary students need increased opportunities to be prepared for life after graduation and considered College and Career Ready, including a-g course access, dual enrollment, and career-technical education (CTE) opportunities. Through a lens of equity, the school will focus on the needs of ALL students, ensuring significant subgroups and unduplicated groups have comparable student outcomes. This includes the school's ability to support English Learners on their path to becoming fluent in English. We will monitor growth and make instructional decisions to impact achievement in differentiated areas of need throughout the school year using the NWEA MAP assessment. The identified metrics below will help us measure growth and tell us if the actions/services identified are making an impact and enabling us to address areas of student need authentically.

All actions were carried out as planned and aligned to their LEA description. While there were no substantive differences in planned actions, there are some substantive differences in actual implementation and expenditures, as reported in the next section. 2.3 - The LEA prioritized this action and was able to allocate a full FTE for Tier II Coordination and Instructional Support.

According to parent and staff partner feedback, the most effective actions associated with Goal 2 were Staff Professional Development/Collaboration (2.1), Early Literacy Learning Center (2.17), Ongoing Assessment (2.2), and Collaboration with SELPA for SwD (2.6). The least effective actions rated by parent and staff partners were Professional Development/Staff Collaboration for Tier II Intervention Practices (2.3), Access to A-G (2.12) and CTE courses (2.15), High School Counselor Communication and Support (2.10), Bound for Blue (2.11), and Naviance (2.16).

2.16 - The LEA will abandon Naviance, a college and career readiness software platform used to help students plan for college and careers. After 5+ years of implementation, partners are not finding it effective and engaging. It will be replaced with Scoir, a similar platform that is considered to be more user-friendly and visually appealing.

2.17 - NEW! The LEA is adding WASC Accreditation and Membership as an action in service of student outcomes and college and career preparedness.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

Feedback from stakeholders shows that overall, our students and parents feel connected to and supported by their teachers and that the school provides a safe and nurturing environment. An analysis of data from the state and some local tools such as our school information system, affirms this, demonstrating low and equitable suspension, expulsion, and drop-out rates for all students. Even so, on the Holistic Student Assessment (HSA), we have seen the % of students placed in Tier 3 (most significant SEL needs) increase dramatically since 2020. We hope to address the SEL needs of our students with the Leader in Me leadership program and PBIS. The Chronic Absenteeism rate has been on the rise over the last 3 years, and while JCS-Pine Valley's chronic absenteeism rate is far below the state's and the county's, SED students are chronically absent more than the overall student population at JCS-PV. We also need to focus on increasing participation in family engagement activities that we host at our locations and decision-making opportunities such as surveys, School Site Council meetings, and board meetings, especially for unduplicated pupils. Through the actions and services below, we hope to increase parent involvement, student engagement, and the overall school climate at JCS-Pine Valley.

3.4 - The action was carried out as planned and the cost of the Securly service was more than estimated.

3.9 - Parent, student, and staff partners emphasized the importance of access to Field Trips to increase student engagement; therefore, the LEA dedicated more resources to this action. Throughout the year, many field trips were planned and participated in. Bus transportation was also offered for several field trips, to increase access for all students. This resulted in significant increased costs and the estimated expenditures for this action in the 25/26 has been increased.

3.10. -Family events were held throughout the year, with the support of donations/PTO funding. Due to budget restrictions, the LEA spent less than planned but still sought to provide family engagement opportunities in service of the goal.

3.12 - In addition to ParentSquare, the LEA utilized Canvas to increase parent engagement and communication.

3.13 - Mid-year, the LEA decided to work with a professional service, Enrollment Professor, to increase enrollment through effective marketing strategies and professional support. Introduction and Instructions

The Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) requires local educational agencies (LEAs) to engage their local educational partners in an annual planning process to evaluate their progress within eight state priority areas encompassing all statutory metrics (COEs have 10 state priorities). LEAs document the results of this planning process in the LCAP using the template adopted by the State Board of Education.

The LCAP development process serves three distinct, but related functions:

- **Comprehensive Strategic Planning:** The process of developing and annually updating the LCAP supports comprehensive strategic planning, particularly to address and reduce disparities in opportunities and outcomes between student groups indicated by the California School Dashboard (California Education Code [EC] Section 52064[e][1]). Strategic planning that is comprehensive connects budgetary decisions to teaching and learning performance data. LEAs should continually evaluate the hard choices they make about the use of limited resources to meet student and community needs to ensure opportunities and outcomes are improved for all students.
- **Meaningful Engagement of Educational Partners:** The LCAP development process should result in an LCAP that reflects decisions made through meaningful engagement (EC Section 52064[e][1]). Local educational partners possess valuable perspectives and insights about an LEA's programs and services. Effective strategic planning will incorporate these perspectives and insights in order to identify potential goals and actions to be included in the LCAP.
- **Accountability and Compliance:** The LCAP serves an important accountability function because the nature of some LCAP template sections require LEAs to show that they have complied with various requirements specified in the LCFF statutes and regulations, most notably:
 - Demonstrating that LEAs are increasing or improving services for foster youth, English learners, including long-term English learners, and low-income students in proportion to the amount of additional funding those students generate under LCFF (EC Section 52064[b][4-6]).
 - Establishing goals, supported by actions and related expenditures, that address the statutory priority areas and statutory metrics (EC sections 52064[b][1] and [2]).
 - **NOTE:** As specified in EC Section 62064(b)(1), the LCAP must provide a description of the annual goals, for all pupils and each subgroup of pupils identified pursuant to EC Section 52052, to be achieved for each of the state priorities. Beginning in 2023–24, EC

Section 52052 identifies long-term English learners as a separate and distinct pupil subgroup with a numerical significance at 15 students.

- Annually reviewing and updating the LCAP to reflect progress toward the goals (EC Section 52064[b][7]).
- Ensuring that all increases attributable to supplemental and concentration grant calculations, including concentration grant add-on funding and/or LCFF carryover, are reflected in the LCAP (EC sections 52064[b][6], [8], and [11]).

The LCAP template, like each LEA’s final adopted LCAP, is a document, not a process. LEAs must use the template to memorialize the outcome of their LCAP development process, which must: (a) reflect comprehensive strategic planning, particularly to address and reduce disparities in opportunities and outcomes between student groups indicated by the California School Dashboard (Dashboard), (b) through meaningful engagement with educational partners that (c) meets legal requirements, as reflected in the final adopted LCAP. The sections included within the LCAP template do not and cannot reflect the full development process, just as the LCAP template itself is not intended as a tool for engaging educational partners.

If a county superintendent of schools has jurisdiction over a single school district, the county board of education and the governing board of the school district may adopt and file for review and approval a single LCAP consistent with the requirements in EC sections 52060, 52062, 52066, 52068, and 52070. The LCAP must clearly articulate to which entity’s budget (school district or county superintendent of schools) all budgeted and actual expenditures are aligned.

The revised LCAP template for the 2024–25, 2025–26, and 2026–27 school years reflects statutory changes made through Senate Bill 114 (Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review), Chapter 48, Statutes of 2023 and Senate Bill 153, Chapter 38, Statutes of 2024.

At its most basic, the adopted LCAP should attempt to distill not just what the LEA is doing for students in transitional kindergarten through grade twelve (TK–12), but also allow educational partners to understand why, and whether those strategies are leading to improved opportunities and outcomes for students. LEAs are strongly encouraged to use language and a level of detail in their adopted LCAPs intended to be meaningful and accessible for the LEA’s diverse educational partners and the broader public.

In developing and finalizing the LCAP for adoption, LEAs are encouraged to keep the following overarching frame at the forefront of the strategic planning and educational partner engagement functions:

Given present performance across the state priorities and on indicators in the Dashboard, how is the LEA using its budgetary resources to respond to TK–12 student and community needs, and address any performance gaps, including by meeting its obligation to increase or improve services for foster youth, English learners, and low-income students?

This is the percentage by which services for unduplicated pupils must be increased or improved as compared to the services provided to all students in the current LCAP year.

Calculations in the Action Tables

To reduce the duplication of effort of LEAs, the Action Tables include functionality such as pre-population of fields and cells based on the information provided in the Data Entry Table, the Annual Update Summary Table, and the Contributing Actions Table. For transparency, the functionality and calculations used are provided below.

Contributing Actions Table

- **4. Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (LCFF Funds)**
 - This amount is the total of the Planned Expenditures for Contributing Actions (LCFF Funds) column.
- **5. Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services**
 - This percentage is the total of the Planned Percentage of Improved Services column.
- **Planned Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the coming school year (4 divided by 1, plus 5)**
 - This percentage is calculated by dividing the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) by the Projected LCFF Base Grant (1), converting the quotient to a percentage, and adding it to the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5).

Contributing Actions Annual Update Table

Pursuant to EC Section 42238.07(c)(2), if the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) is less than the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and Concentration Grants (6), the LEA is required to calculate the difference between the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) and the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (7). - **Difference Between Planned and Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (Subtract 5 from 8)**
 - This amount is the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) subtracted from the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).

LCFF Carryover Table

- **10. Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Current School Year (6 divided by 9 plus Carryover %)**
 - This percentage is the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and/or Concentration Grants (6) divided by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9) plus the LCFF Carryover – Percentage from the prior year.
- **11. Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (7 divided by 9, plus 8)**
 - This percentage is the Total Estimated Actual Expenditures for Contributing Actions (7) divided by the LCFF Funding (9), then converting the quotient to a percentage and adding the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).
- **12. LCFF Carryover — Dollar Amount LCFF Carryover (Subtract 11 from 10 and multiply by 9)**

- If the Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (11) is less than the Estimated Actual Percentage to Increase or Improve Services (10), the LEA is required to carry over LCFF funds.

The amount of LCFF funds is calculated by subtracting the Estimated Actual Percentage to Increase or Improve Services (11) from the Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (10) and then multiplying by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9). This amount is the amount of LCFF funds that is required to be carried over to the coming year.
