ACCESS TO CAMPUS

Closed Campus

Alta Loma is a closed campus. Upon arriving on campus, a student may not leave without one of the following:

- being issued a pass to leave campus from the Attendance Office or the Main Office (i.e., illness, appointments, early dismissal).

- being signed out by a parent, guardian, or other person listed as the student's emergency contact (please be prepared to present some form of identification).
- having received verbal permission to leave campus verified by school personnel.

Note - if a student leaves campus without permission, they will be considered truant, and parents will be called.

If a student has a doctor, dentist, or another appointment, these steps should be followed:

1. A note from home with the details of the appointment is to be dropped off at the Attendance Office before school. The student will receive a pass to leave campus.
2. Parents need to sign the student out from the Attendance or Main Office.
3. Upon returning from the appointment, the student must check in at the Attendance Office for a pass to class.

Students are under the jurisdiction of the school from the time they leave home for school until the time they return home from school. Alta Loma's standards of behavior apply to students coming to and going from school.

Please note – once a student is on campus, they may not leave to go to Alta Loma Park or any other business in the neighborhood.

Visitors/Guests

Student visitors are not allowed on campus. All adult visitors must register in the school office and will be escorted to their destination.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Attendance

Attendance is vital for the success of students in school. California law states that absences are excused only if the child is ill or there is an excuse that meets the requirements of the *California Education Code* Section 48205. Even excused absences that cause a child to miss significant amounts of school can cause the child to fall behind in class. Parents are asked to schedule doctor, dental, optometry, and other appointments (personal or business) after school hours whenever possible. If an appointment must be scheduled during the school day, please bring your child to school before or after the appointment. If a student is going to be absent from school for five days or more (for reasons other than illness), please contact the Attendance Office well in advance.

Absences

It is the parent's responsibility to promote regular attendance. When absences become excessive for any reason (excused and unexcused), parents will be contacted. **Please note - students absent from school cannot participate in any school function that takes place on the same day or evening.**

What to Do When Your Child Is Absent for Any Reason

Parent/Guardian Responsibilities

1. Parents are asked to call the Attendance Office at 877-8797 by 11:00 am each day the student is absent.

or

2. Parents can write and send a note or send a doctor's note when the student returns.

Alta Loma Middle School has three full-time counselors on campus throughout the week. The counselors are responsible for providing academic, social, and emotional support to our students. They offer a variety of services at ALMS. Some of their duties include, but are not limited to, the following:

- schedule all students
- monitor grades
- teach guidance lessons
- review test scores and transcripts
- mediate conflicts
- organize parent/teacher/student conferences as needed
- design and work with students who have 504 plans
- support those with IEP's as needed

Our school counselors do not provide traditional therapy to our students. However, they have plenty of resources to share and can help you make an informed decision about outside counseling opportunities. If you have any concerns or questions about your child's performance in school or their overall well-being, please do not hesitate to contact the Counseling Office.

Discrimination/Hate Speech

Following the Anti-Bullying/Anti-Harassment Policy disclosed on pp. 8-9 of the *District Expectations for Student Success*, Alta Loma Middle School strives to provide a safe and hospitable learning environment for all. To do so, student speech and use of words are of the utmost importance. Racial slurs and hate speech of any kind that degrades a person or discriminates based on any one of the following factors is not tolerated: race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, gender identity, or religious beliefs/practices. Such incidents should be reported immediately. Restorative practices will be employed to reestablish a sense of belonging and community for all those involved but other consequences will be employed which can, but are not limited to, detention, Academic Help, or suspension (depending on the degree of the harassment).

Dress Code

Alta Loma Middle School's dress code supports equitable educational access and does not reinforce stereotypes. The purposes of the Dress Code are the following:

1. To allow students to express the diverse range of personalities at Alta Loma Middle School, including cultural, ethnic, religious, and gender-based identification
2. To prevent health or safety risks that interfere with the educational process

3. Ensure that student dress is appropriate for classroom instruction, athletics, or special activities, such as lab science, industrial arts, or performing arts.

Students must wear:

- A shirt with fabric in the front, back, and on the sides under the arms (no bralettes, sports bras, or sports bra-like attire to be used as shirts)
- Pants or the equivalent bottoms, including a skirt, sweatpants, leggings, a dress or shorts
- Bottoms must be worn at the waist -undergarments are not to be exposed
- Closed-toed shoes must be worn in classes and appropriate athletic shoes in PE (**no open-back shoes such as flip flops, slides, house slippers, etc.**)
- NO PE clothes outside of PE class, unless as a temporary solution to a dress code violation

Students may wear:

- Hats or hoodie sweatshirts are acceptable, provided they do not interfere with the ability to identify a student quickly (Student eyes and ears should be visible and unobstructed).
- Religious headwear
- Fitted pants, including opaque leggings and yoga pants
- Pajamas
- Ripped pants, as long as **undergarments are not exposed**
- Tank tops, as long as **undergarments are not exposed**
- Athletic attire

Clothing that poses a health or safety risk, or clothing with images or writing that promotes behavior contrary to the expectations of appropriate student behavior will not be permitted. This clothing includes but is not limited to

- Shoes with wheels, taps, or heel plates
- A bulletproof vest, body armor, tactical gear, or facsimile
- Spikes, chains, or accessories that could be considered dangerous or could be used as a weapon
- Any clothing that reveals visible undergarments or areas that should/would be covered by undergarments.
- Other than those worn for religious reasons, head coverings that interfere with the ability to identify a student quickly
- Any clothing, head covering, accessory, emblem, symbol, or insignia that:
 - a. Is identified or associated with gang affiliation or activities
 - b. Promotes the use of any illegal activity including recreational drugs, alcohol, nicotine, vaping, or paraphernalia
 - c. Contains hate speech, profanity, or pornography
 - d. Degrades or demeans any person or group
 - e. Encourages violence, harassment, or sexually inappropriate conduct

Clothing that violates the dress code may be confiscated. Students violating the dress code will be given a directive to change attire to reflect the dress code or be allowed to change

into PE clothes (students may call home for alternative clothing, but must change into PE clothes when time outside of class exceeds 45 minutes). Students will receive detention for violating the dress code.

Alta Loma Middle School is not responsible for any lost, damaged, stolen, or confiscated items [AR 5132(a)]

Drop Off/Pick Up

Students may be **dropped off** on Del Monte or Romney Avenues only if a parent/guardian is parked legally along the curb. Please do not stop and drop off your child while in traffic.

Students may be dropped off in the lower parking lot, too. Parents/guardians are asked not to stop and allow the student to leave the vehicle until the car is down in the lot. If a student needs to retrieve their backpack from the trunk, please pull into a designated parking spot so as not to impede the flow of traffic. Finally, students should leave only from the passenger side of the car. Walking in front of or behind cars is not safe and should be avoided when exiting the car in the lower lot. When in the lower lot, parents/guardians and students are asked not to walk up through the parking lot towards incoming traffic but to enter down below and walk protected by the fence.

Between the city bus, the ice cream truck, and nearly 640 students leaving campus, **pick-up** can be very tricky. Please drive with the utmost care and attention. Again, if using the lower lot, please park only in the designated slots.

Note

Please do not use the handicapped spaces for dropping off students. Please leave those spots for parents or others with a legitimate need for a

handicapped space because they may need to enter the building for some reason or other.

Alta Loma Park is always a good alternative for those who do not want to deal with the chaos on campus. The entrance is on Camaritas Avenue. Many students walk along the path from the parking lot to the school.

Parents/guardians may opt to designate a drop-off or pick-up site two or three blocks away on the different side streets. It is important, however, to respect the neighbors and avoid blocking any driveways.

Finally, please kindly share these guidelines with any family members, friends, or Uber/Lyft drivers who will be dropping off or picking up students.

Emergency Information

Emergency Information is now part of the Annual Enrollment Update to be completed on line ([District Link Continuing Students](#)).

A student may only be released to a parent/guardian or an authorized adult as specified on the emergency contact list. When completing this section online, please list persons who are local and available.

On occasion, a student may be released with verbal permission given by the parent/guardian to school personnel.

Important Note

Please contact the school office if there is a change of work or home address, phone number, or email, or if anyone new should be added to your emergency contact list. For safety reasons, this information must be kept current.

Health and Safety

Alta Loma no longer has a school nurse as part of its full-time staff. However, a district nurse/health technician and staff members who have formal first aid training are available to assist when needed.

Illness

If a student becomes ill during the school day, they should acquire a pass from the teacher for the Health Office (located in the Main Office).

Injury

If a student is injured at school, they should report to the teacher in charge.

- Parents will be contacted if more than basic first aid is required.
- Paramedics will be called in case of an emergency.

Medication

All medications require a doctor's note and parental permission. Both must be signed, dated, and current. A medication order is only good for the current school year. A new order must be submitted by the parent every school year in which medication is required.

- Medication must be kept in the health office in the original package.

Late/Missing Work Policy

(when students are absent)

Self-advocacy and communication are key when dealing with missing or late work when a student is absent. If a student is absent, they know how each teacher uses Google Classroom. If the circumstances allow, students should log into Google Classroom to follow assignments and communicate with their teachers. Communication through email, Google Classroom, or IC is always the students' first

step. Teachers, on their part, will review assignments and identify for the student which assignments can be excused and which are essential and to be completed to ensure class material is covered and reviewed. Upon a student's return to campus, they should continue to reach out to the teacher as needed. Students must learn to self-advocate and return to school without feeling overwhelmed or confused. Lockers

A Google form will be shared with all students in September. Students may request a locker at this time. Locker Agreements will be distributed. Once Locker Agreements are signed and returned, lockers will be assigned. Students do not need to purchase locks. The lock and its combination will be given to the student. Students should not share their combinations with anyone and the locker is for their personal use only. Students cannot share lockers. Finally, students should take care of their lockers avoiding stickers or any writing on the locker itself - both on the inside and the outside. The lockers are property of Alta Loma Middle School and can be searched or privileges can be taken away for any reasonable suspicion or abuse.

Lost and Found

Lost and Found is located in the Main Office. Students should label all property with their names. Any item not claimed by the last day of the school year will be given to charity. Alta Loma is not responsible for lost or confiscated items.

Personal Property

The following items should not be seen on campus at any time: laser pens/pointers, permanent ink markers (i.e., Sharpies), and any variety of items not needed for instructional purposes. Cell phones, earbuds, and other wearable technology must be turned off and out of sight when students are on campus (bell to bell), unless under the direct supervision of the classroom teacher.

No cupcakes, frosting, whipped cream, candy, or anything of the sort (i.e., Bobo Tea, etc.) is to be brought to school to distribute in class or at lunch. Uber Eats or other food delivery services may not be used during school hours.

Students may not sell items for profit on campus at any time (i.e., candy, Takis).

Physical Proximity

Since our number one priority as a learning community is academic growth, uninvited contact and excessive physical displays of affection are inappropriate for a constructive school climate.

Touching or holding hands, grabbing, groping, biting, pinching, embracing, horseplay, wrestling, slap fights, and kissing are some behaviors not encouraged or allowed on campus. A good policy to remember is *to keep hands, feet, and objects to oneself. Always be mindful of the personal space of others.*

Tardy Policy

Students are expected to be in their seats and ready for class before the bell rings. Promptness to class is essential for a successful learning environment. Excessive tardiness is detrimental to the student and to the class as a whole. When a student's readiness to begin class becomes an issue, consequences will be assigned to address the situation. They may include but are not

limited to, detention, clean-up, school community meeting, and reflection.

Procedures/Messages

Outgoing Calls

Students may call from the Main Office in the case of an emergency at the discretion of the principal and administrative assistants.

Incoming Calls

Please keep incoming calls to a minimum and for emergency proposes to reduce interruption of instruction time. Messages will be sent to the student as needed.

Please keep in mind that students do not have access to their cell phones at all times. During school hours it is best to communicate with your student through the Main Office.

Modes of Personal Transportation

1. All modes of personal transportation (i.e., bicycles, scooters, skateboards, etc.) are to be locked in the bike cage during school hours. The custodian will move items locked or stored in other locations.
2. Bikes, scooters, and skateboards stolen from campus will be reported to the police, and the incident will become a police matter.

Non-Participation List

Alta Loma events are privileged. These privileges include but are not limited to, non-uniform days, dances, after-school activities, and select field trips. This non-participation list intends to reduce the disruptions in the classrooms, collect library fines/lunch fees, and remind students to focus on their academic endeavors. Students whose names appear on the list are restricted from participating in the school activity and must wear their school uniforms on the day of the activity.

Students will have their names placed on the Non-Participation List if they receive a Level 2 through Level 4 consequence as outlined by the District and communicated through the *District Expectations for Student Success*.

THE BIG FIVE - EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS PLAN

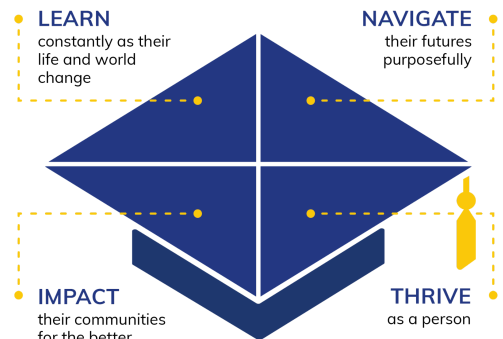

It is important for the parents to know that in the case of an evacuation when it is unsafe to remain on campus, the two main gathering sites for ALMS are the parking lot down by Chevy's and Alta Loma Park depending upon the safest route to exit the school. In the event parents/guardians need to sign students out after an evacuation, identification is required. If a parent or guardian is not available, students may be signed out only by those adults listed on the most recent emergency contact list on file.

PBIS

THE BASIS OF SCHOOL DISCIPLINE

In South San Francisco Unified School District's Strategic Plan, students *experience* engaging and welcoming environments, *explore* while innovating and collaborating, *embrace* diversity in all its forms, and *excel* as resilient and confident learners. To further emphasize the Strategic Plan, the district is implementing PBIS. From elementary to middle to high schools, there is a new movement working to cultivate academic success and social growth for all students through positive behavior intervention and support.



What is PBIS (Positive Behavioral Intervention and Support)?

It might be easier to begin with what PBIS is not. PBIS is not a quick fix or a band-aid. It is not for a school, a teacher, or a classroom. PBIS is not punitive or reactive. PBIS is not a list of rules and consequences.

PBIS is a program implemented district-wide to create safe learning environments for all students. It is a preventive research-based program centered upon expectations that are consistently taught and practiced by all stakeholders in the community. PBIS can positively affect the climate and culture of a classroom, a school, or a whole district. If implemented and reinforced with consistency,

PBIS can help deal with behavioral aspects that hinder a student's progress. PBIS brings a school community and a district closer together as common expectations foster social, emotional, and academic growth.

PBIS begins with clearly defined expectations. A behavioral matrix drives the PBIS experience along with incentives and defined consequences for inappropriate behavior. Expectations will be modeled, and they are the focus of instruction where students learn how positive behaviors are manifested in the hallways, classrooms, blacktop, lunchroom, bus, walkways, and restrooms.

With consistency and positive reinforcement all along the way, discipline becomes formative. Opportunities for growth are present at every moment. The preventive measures embraced by this program form responsible young adults who display with pride what a Ram is all about at Alta Loma Middle School.


District-wide and across our state and nation, schools are driven by the PBIS way. The concept of deriving expectations and teaching appropriate behaviors while reinforcing and evaluating the results along the way makes this research-based program a viable vehicle driving entire school communities along a renewed path. This new path of acceptance and mutual respect fosters the perfect climate for academic success. Reducing discipline incidents at every turn allows for a new focus on the learning community and the success of every student. Please look for updates posted on the school website for our progress.
