## ART HONOR SOCIETY

- Description:** The National Art Honor Society was established in 1978 in the United States by the National Art Education Association (NAEA) for high school students grades 10-12, for the purpose of inspiring and recognizing those students who have shown an outstanding ability in art. The intention of the National Art Honor Society is to recognize higher order learning in the visual arts while bringing art education to the attention of the school and the community. Membership in this chapter shall be based upon art scholarship, service to the community, and character. Members will be expected to attend regular meetings and abide by school rules. **Student members must maintain a 90 or above average in their art classes as well as be in good academic standing.** Students need to complete a minimum of 16 hours of service to maintain their membership. Ten of these hours must be directly related to the visual arts. Credit hours come from school and community service. Member students are eligible to apply for the “*Charles M. Robertson Memorial Scholarship*”, a special four-year scholarship to the *Pratt Institute’s School of Art and Design* in New York.
- Service to School:** Students may participate in several charity events including Every Child’s Dream, designing murals, decorating showcases and bulletin boards, assisting other art teachers, tutoring, fundraising, Halloween window painting and the Art Honor Society also promotes the arts at “Back to School Nights”.
- Service to the Community:** In providing service, the Art Honor Society makes posters for community groups; helps at art shows, participates in decorating the school for charity events; assists with department publicity (newspaper/web-site/posters) and raises money for the disadvantaged; does face painting at Sayville’s spring fest, and many other community events.
- The National Art Honor Society recognizes and encourages students character development through inclusive programs and teamwork. All student artists pledge to “Create a more beautiful world for myself, for humankind, and for all living things.”

Students are required to prepare and debate both sides of an issue through multiple rounds at the tournaments. The team collectively researches issues and students practice with one another before competing. Although new, the Sayville High School team has a strong record of fantastic debaters, who on the whole, win more rounds than they lose. Being a member provides many academic and personal benefits including research, writing and public speaking skills. In addition, members have the potential to win scholarship money and prizes. Debate is an incredible activity to have on a college application, as it demonstrates dedication, critical thinking skills, superior writing and speaking skills. In addition, debate requires respect of others as a foundational expectation. Debaters compete on both sides of every resolution and come to appreciate the valid points across a spectrum of opinions. And the collaborative work of preparing cases as a team creates a supportive and encouraging environment.

# ROBOTICS CLUB

**Meetings:** Throughout the year, after school

**Description:** The Robotics Team #2487 is an organization that is meant to inspire students to be technology and science leaders, by engaging them in exciting mentor-based programs that build engineering and technology skills, that inspire innovation, and that foster well-rounded life capabilities including self-confidence, communications, and leadership.

We join and compete in the FIRST (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) robotics competition held at Hofstra University every year. Before the robotics competition in March, students will participate in fundraising and training activities to prepare club members for the design and construction of an operational robot. During the robotics build season, students have approximately 9 weeks to design and build a functional robot capable of competing in the annual FIRST Robotics Competition held at Hofstra University in March every year.

Students will be involved in various fundraising activities throughout the school to support the purchase of additional materials necessary to build a custom robot to compete in the annual robotics competition.
