



Sixth Grade Instructional Plan for Reading Language Arts: First Semester

Course Overview

Sixth Grade Reading Language Arts is designed to develop proficient readers and writers through a structured literacy approach rooted in the science of reading. Students will build strong foundational skills in fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension while learning to read, analyze, and write about a variety of complex texts in the forms of both short and extended constructed responses. Instruction will be explicit, systematic, and scaffolded to support all learners in mastering grade-level expectations.

Throughout the year, students will:

- Strengthen decoding and word recognition skills
- Read with fluency and expression
- Expand vocabulary and knowledge of word structure including Greek and Latin roots
- Develop comprehension strategies for multiple genres
- Learn grammar and language conventions
- Write in multiple modes (narrative, opinion, informational)
- Engage in speaking, listening, and collaborative discussions

Attendance Policy & Its Importance

Regular attendance is vital to your child's academic development. Sixth grade is a pivotal year in reading - students begin to partake in novel studies and read more complex texts. When students attend daily, they stay current with new skills, deepening their knowledge of the world, develop thinking skills, and practice important habits that support lifelong learning.

Learning Objectives

By the end of the first semester, students will be able to:

Using Amplify Knowledge and Skills, students will develop literacy skills such as:

- Analyzing characters and plot elements of classical literature
- Determining key details and the central idea of informational text
- Making inferences about text, using textual evidence to support thinking about the text
- Comparing and contrasting texts about the same topic
- Synthesizing information across texts about the same topic
- Respond to text to demonstrate understanding- including written essays

Grading Policy

Major assignments - 60% Minor assignments - 40% which may include homework; however, homework may not constitute more than one fourth of the minor assessment summative grade.

Students will have the same number of days they were absent to make up any missed assignments without penalty. After that grace period, 10 points will be deducted for each additional day the assignment is late. If the assignment is not submitted at least one week before the end of the six-week grading period, it will receive a grade of zero.

For example:

- **Child is Absent Monday and Tuesday**
- Assignment is due by **Thursday** (2 days after returning)

- If turned in **Monday**, it's 2 days late = **20 points off**
