TEACH YOUR CHILDREN

Children's attitudes about drugs are shaped by pro-drug messages in the media and by permissive or inconsistent attitudes in the community. As a child approaches adolescence, the influence of peer pressure increases. In many cases, by the time a child is 13 years old he is more concerned with pleasing his friends than his parents. But, if he has grown up in a loving, supportive home environment, he will probably prefer not having to make the choice at all. He won't want to disappoint his parents, sometimes children get involved with drugs or other harmful activities simply because they don't know how to say NO without losing face.

There are several ways that parents can reduce the negative influences their children come into contact with:

Support prevention programs in your child's school

Drug abuse prevention programs today are much more skill-oriented than they used to be. They teach children how to identify and counter pro-drug influence in the media, at school, and from friends. They teach how to withstand peer pressure and say NO when asked to do something wrong. This kind of instruction is more effective if it is reinforced at home.

Let your children know that WeTip is there for them to call if they know about drugs being sold in their school or neighborhood.

WeTip's toll-free anonymous hotline is provided as a public service for ALL members of the community, including students that have information about a drug dealer or any crime that has occurred in their school or neighborhood. Students must be informed at an early age that their action or lack of action can directly influence their school and neighborhood. By actively getting involved in making schools and neighborhoods safer, students can show their intolerance of drugs and crime, and ultimately bring about a drugfree environment for themselves.
