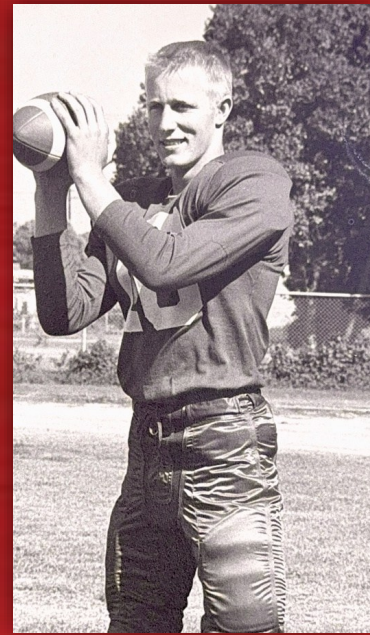
INTENT

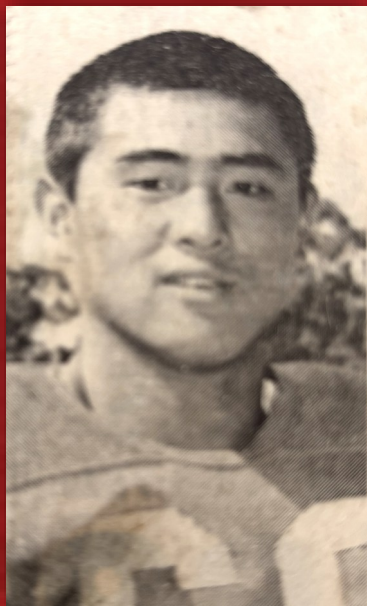

RICHARD "DICK" BEALL

1954 - 1958

Posthumous

Richard "Dick" Beall was one of Santa Maria High School's most talented and versatile athletes, excelling in multiple sports and leaving a legacy that extended far beyond his high school years.

Dick's athletic journey began early. In 1953, his Little League All-Star team captured the Western States Championship and came within one game of advancing to the Little League World Series, falling only to British Columbia. This early taste of high-level competition set the stage for his success at SMHS.

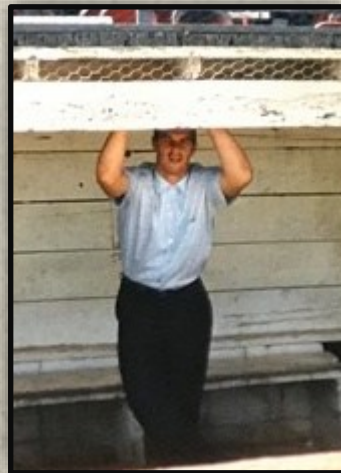
While at Santa Maria High, Dick lettered in baseball, basketball, and football, showcasing exceptional skill and leadership in each. He earned All-League honors in both baseball and football, and his performance garnered statewide recognition. In 1957, he was named All-CIF 2nd Team as both a tackle in football and a pitcher in baseball—a rare achievement. The following year, he was selected All-CIF 1st Team as a first baseman, confirming his status as one of California's premier high school athletes.

Heavily recruited for both college baseball and football, Dick's future was wide open. On the night of his graduation in June 1958, he signed a professional baseball contract with the Cincinnati Reds, beginning a five-year career in the minor leagues (1958–1962). His stops included Visalia, CA; Topeka, KS; Columbia, SC; and Macon, GA.

Dick made an immediate impact in professional ball. In his rookie season at Visalia, he batted .312, hit 22 home runs, earned Rookie of the Year honors, and was voted an All-Star. In 1959, he received an invitation to the Reds' major league Spring Training in Tampa, FL. Over his career, he compiled a lifetime batting average of .249 with 70 home runs.

Following his playing career, Dick dedicated himself to his family while staying connected to the game. He gave private hitting instruction and coached the Orcutt Express traveling softball team, continuing to inspire young athletes with his knowledge, passion, and love of competition.

Richard Beall will always be remembered for his excellence, versatility, and lifelong dedication to the spirit of Santa Maria athletics.



ATHLETE

BRAD DANDRIDGE

1985 - 1989



Brad attended Santa Maria High School from 1985 to 1989, where he excelled as a standout athlete in both football and baseball for the Saints.

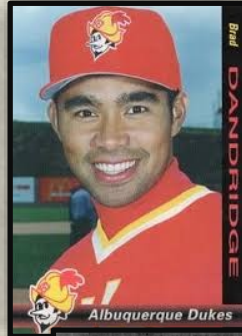
On the football field, Brad was a two-year letterman whose senior year was nothing short of remarkable. In 1988, he was named Northern League MVP, earned First Team honors on both offense (running back) and defense (defensive back), and was recognized as the All-Area Player of the Year. That same year, he was selected to the prestigious All-CIF team. As a junior in 1987, Brad earned a spot on the All-Area Team and was honored as Offensive Back of the Year.

In baseball, Brad was a three-year letterman who earned All-Northern League honors in both 1988 and 1989. His dominance in two sports earned him the Santa Maria Times "Athlete of the Year" award in 1988.

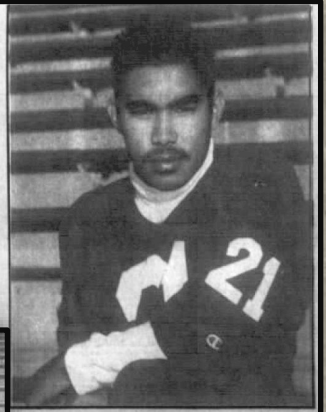
Upon graduation in 1989, Brad accepted a football and baseball scholarship to Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo. After one year, he returned to Allan Hancock College to focus exclusively on baseball. At AHC, he earned All-CVC Honorable Mention in 1991 and All-CVC honors in 1992. His baseball journey continued at Fresno State, where he played for the Bulldogs in 1993 and was named First Team All-Conference in the Western Athletic Conference (WAC).

Brad's exceptional college career led to a professional opportunity. Following his junior year, he signed with the San Diego Padres organization and played professionally from 1993 to 1998, competing for both the Padres and the Los Angeles Dodgers organizations.

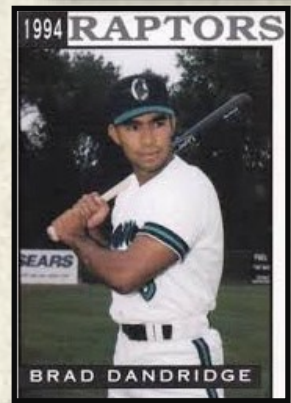
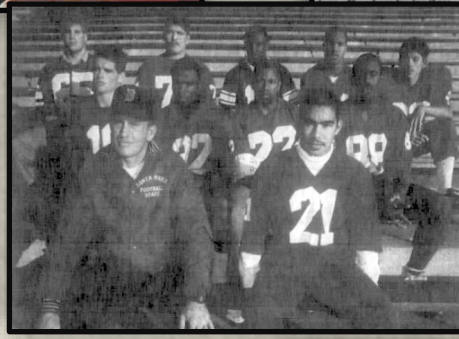
After retiring from professional baseball, Brad returned to Cal Poly, SLO, where he completed his Bachelor's degree in Business Administration. Today, he continues to serve the Santa Maria community as the City's Fire Chief, demonstrating the same dedication, leadership, and commitment to excellence that defined his athletic career.

ERNIE DEL RIO

1968 - 1972



Ernie's journey in wrestling began in 1969 at Santa Maria High School, where he competed for four years and quickly established himself as one of the program's top athletes. His dominance on the mat included winning three CIF/SS Division Titles and capturing the prestigious CIF Section Championship—comparable to today's California State Championship.

After graduating, Ernie continued his wrestling career at Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo, competing for legendary coach Vaughn Hitchcock during the 1973–74 seasons. He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in Recreation Administration from Cal Poly, setting the stage for his future in coaching and officiating.

Ernie began his coaching career as an assistant at Santa Maria High for three years, followed by four years at Righetti High School. In 1975, he transitioned into officiating, guided by mentors such as Cal Poly Athletic Director Dick Heaton and Coach Hitchcock. Over the next 49 years, Ernie became a fixture in California wrestling, balancing administrative leadership with decades of officiating at the highest levels.

His officiating résumé is extensive—working CIF Division Championships for 43 years, the Masters Meet in the San Joaquin Valley for 10 years, and the Southern California Masters Meet for 16 years. He was selected to officiate the CIF State Wrestling Championships from 2011 to 2013, an honor reserved for the sport's most respected officials.

Ernie also served in leadership roles that shaped the sport's future, including President of the Southern California Officials Association and board member for six years. For over 30 years, he served as President and Assistant Instructional Chair for the Los Padres Wrestling Officials Association.

His lifetime of dedication was recognized with induction into the California Wrestling Hall of Fame in June 2024, followed by the National Wrestling Hall of Fame California Chapter in August 2025.

Ernie is married, with three sons and four grandchildren, and remains a proud ambassador for the sport he has served for over five decades.

ATHLETE

JAMES DRAPER

1967 - 1971



A gifted two-sport athlete, Jimmy Draper attended Santa Maria High School from 1967 to 1971, earning varsity letters in both football and baseball. His talent and work ethic set him apart early, paving the way for a successful career at the next levels.

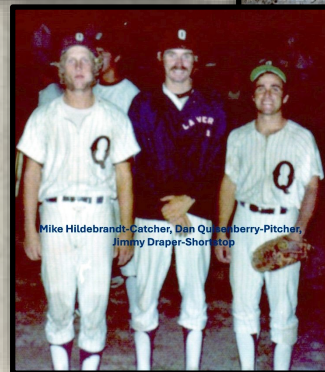
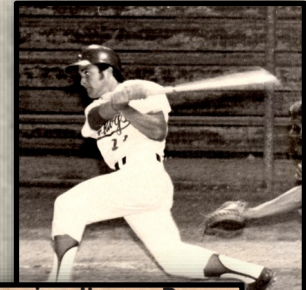
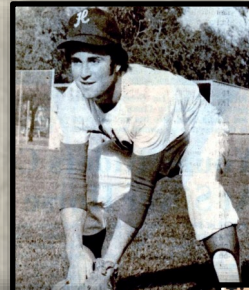
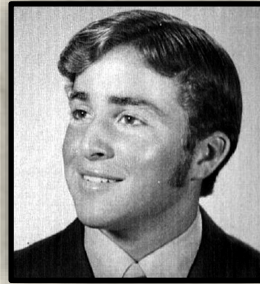
Jimmy continued his athletic journey at Allan Hancock College from 1971 to 1973, where he excelled as an infielder. He earned 1st Team All-League honors in both seasons and played a pivotal role on the Bulldogs' 1972 State Championship baseball team as the starting infielder.

His performance caught the attention of four-year programs, and Jimmy accepted a full baseball scholarship to UC Riverside, a member of the highly competitive California Collegiate Athletic Association (CCAA). At UCR, he was named Honorable Mention All-League shortstop in 1974 and 1st Team All-League second baseman in 1975. That season, he batted .350, led the nation in triples, and helped the Highlanders advance to the NCAA Division II playoffs. His school record for triples in a single season still stands today.

In 1975, Jimmy signed a free-agent contract with the Detroit Tigers, launching a three-year minor league career under the guidance of future Hall of Fame manager Jim Leyland. In his rookie season, he batted .289 with just 12 strikeouts in 236 at-bats—a testament to his disciplined approach at the plate.

Following his professional career, Jimmy returned to Santa Maria, where he dedicated himself to developing young athletes. He coached in youth baseball programs, including the Santa Maria Valley Packers, Little League, and provided personal instruction to players looking to improve their skills.

Jimmy Draper's journey from SMHS standout to collegiate star, professional player, and devoted mentor reflects a lifelong commitment to excellence, sportsmanship, and giving back to the community that shaped him.

Former Santa Maria standout sent to Virginia

Former Santa Maria High and Hancock College athlete Jimmy Draper, has signed a professional baseball contract with the American League Detroit Tigers.

Draper, who went on to become an all-time standout at University of California at Riverside, has already reported to the Tigers' minor league camp at Bristol, Va. He is scheduled to work out there for a few days before being assigned to a team in the Detroit farm system.

The 25-year-old son of Mrs. and Mrs. James Draper, age 2, Newline Dr. was signed as a second baseman, the position he played at UCR after playing shortstop for the Highlanders a year ago, when he was named the best defensive performer on the squad. Draper, who was a two-sport all-league and all-conference player for both Santa Maria High and Hancock College, set a number of UCR records this past year. The 5'7, 150-pound Tiger had 29 hits and 61 RBIs, both team marks at the college.

He also led the nation with 22 triples, had 25 stolen bases, and batted .349. He was named to both the all-California Collegiate Athletic Association and the

DARRYL EISNER

1953 - 1957

Darryl's athletic journey began as part of the inaugural Santa Maria Little League in 1950, where he quickly stood out, making the All-Star team as a catcher. At Santa Maria High School, he was a rare four-sport athlete—football, basketball, baseball, and track—earning nine varsity letters. He was best known for his excellence in baseball and football, earning the title of SMHS Athlete of the Year in 1957.

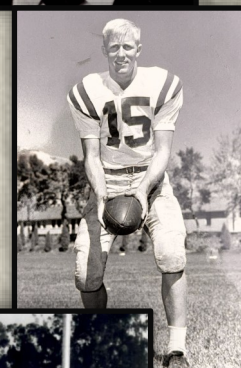
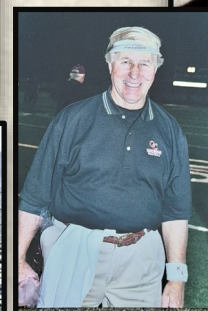
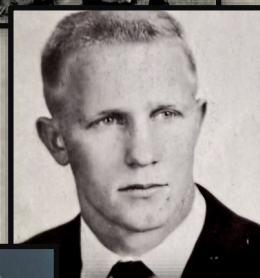
On the baseball diamond, Darryl played under Hall of Fame coach Don Wilson and helped lead the Saints to the 1957 CIF Championship, driving in three runs in the final game and finishing the season with a .446 batting average. He was named All-CIF First Team catcher and CIF Baseball Player of the Year, becoming the first Santa Maria athlete to play in the prestigious Hearst Baseball All-Star Game.

On the football field, Darryl was the quarterback and co-captain of the 1956 league championship team, earning All-CIF First Team honors and being named to the National High School All-American Football Squad. He even played in the Shrine All-Star Game at the Los Angeles Coliseum before more than 85,000 fans—the second largest crowd to ever watch a high school football game in U.S. history.

After graduation, Darryl was recruited by 19 major universities and accepted a football scholarship to the University of Oregon, later transferring to the University of Utah to play both football and baseball. While at Utah, he was offered contracts by the Giants, Dodgers, and Red Sox, but chose to complete his education before embarking on a 60-year career in sales and marketing.

In 2000, Darryl returned to the game he loved, joining the Oaks Christian High School football staff, where he helped coach one of Southern California's top programs for 14 years, including the 2006 team ranked third in the nation by *Sports Illustrated*.

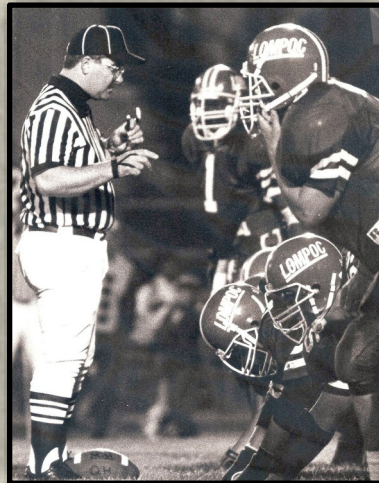
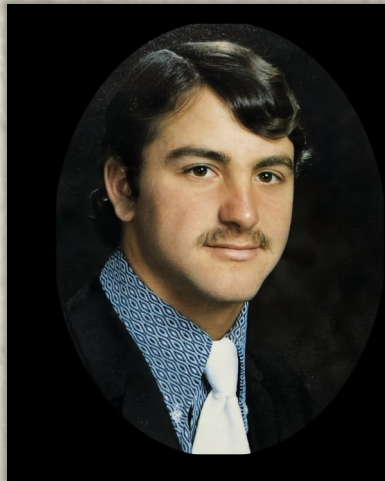
Darryl lives in Westlake Village with his wife Carol of 62 years, he has two children and three grandchildren.

MICHAEL OSTINI

1972 - 1976



Mike Ostini attended Santa Maria High School from 1972 to 1976, excelling as a two-sport athlete. He played all four years in football as a linebacker and offensive guard, and in baseball as a catcher and outfielder.

A three-year varsity letterman in football, Mike helped lead the Saints to three consecutive Northern League Championships. As a senior, he was selected as team co-captain and earned 1st Team All-League honors at linebacker, was named the league's Best Defensive Back, and received his team's "Most Improved Player" award.

Mike's involvement in sports extended beyond playing. While still in high school in 1974, he began officiating youth football, baseball, and basketball locally. In 1977, he joined the Los Padres Football Officials Association (LPFOA), launching what would become a 45-plus-year career officiating high school sports.

In 1980, Mike began umpiring college baseball, including 20 years at the NCAA Division I level. His accomplishments include being selected to officiate a CIF Southern Section Baseball Championship at Dodger Stadium in 2000.

Dedicated to supporting youth sports in his community, Mike has served over 40 years on the LPFOA board and has been the youth and high school football game assigner for the past 18 years. Career highlights include officiating 12 CIF Southern Section Championship Football Finals and four CIF State Regional games. In 2016, he was honored with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes Don Wilson Honorary Official Award at the FCA All-Star Classic. He also served as President of the California Football Officials Association in 2019 and 2020.

Today, Mike is a Personnel Commissioner for the Santa Barbara County Education Office and a founding member of the FCA All-Star Football Classic Game Committee. He lives locally with his wife, Debbie, and together they have a blended family of five sons, two daughters, and eleven grandchildren.

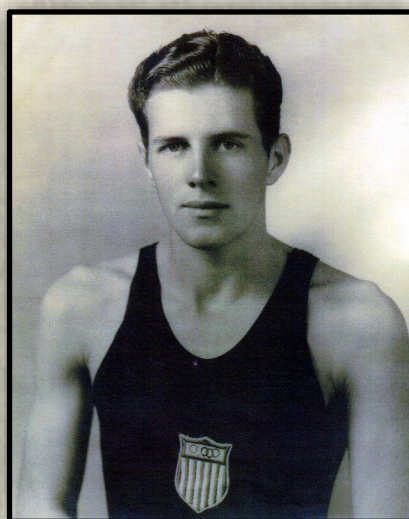
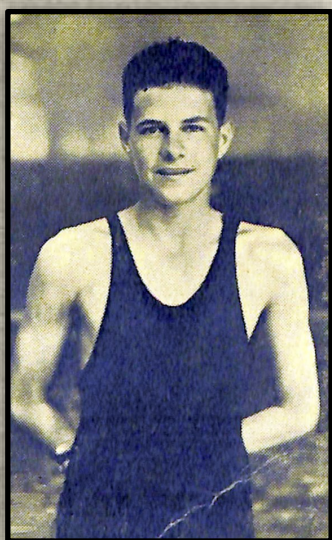

JOHN PAULSEN

1929 - 1933

Posthumous

John was an exceptional swimmer at Santa Maria High School and a member of the legendary 1932 SMHS swim team, considered one of the best in school history. The team—John, Cassius Purkiss, Roger Hatch, and Allan Stewart—was coached by Paul Nelson, namesake of Santa Maria's municipal pool. That year, they won numerous meets across California.

In April 1932, John competed at the dedication of the Los Angeles Olympic Swimming Stadium, placing first in the 100-yard breaststroke and securing the Southern California AAU championship. His performance earned him an invitation to the 1932 Olympic swim trials as an alternate. By the end of the trials, he was selected to represent the USA in the 200-meter breaststroke. At just 17, John became one of the youngest members of Team USA and the first athlete from Santa Maria to compete in the Olympics. Though Japan dominated the swimming events, his participation marked a historic moment for both the community and the school.

During his high school career, John won the National Breaststroke Championship and claimed two silver finishes at the National AAU Championships.

Following graduation, John accepted a scholarship to the University of Southern California, where he competed in swimming and water polo for four years. He graduated in 1937 with a degree in business.

John later served his country in the U.S. Navy during World War II. As assistant navigator aboard the USS *Ticonderoga*, he experienced one of the war's most harrowing naval attacks in January 1945, when two Japanese kamikaze planes struck the ship. Despite heavy damage, the *Ticonderoga* made it back to port for repairs. John served a total of four and a half years in the Navy.

John's legacy as a gifted athlete, Olympian, and veteran reflects a life of dedication, resilience, and excellence—qualities that have earned him a place in the Athletic Hall of Fame.

RICARDO PIÑON

1990 - 1994



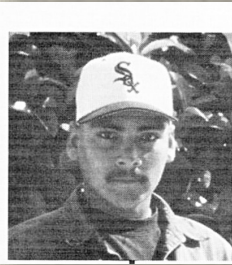
Ricardo Piñon, Class of 1994, was an exceptional three-sport athlete at Santa Maria High School, where he excelled in football, baseball, and soccer from 1990 to 1994. A true competitor, Ricardo earned an impressive nine varsity letters — a testament to his dedication, skill, and commitment to excellence. His versatility on the field and his leadership qualities made him a respected figure among teammates, coaches, and the entire Saints community.

On the football field, Ricardo was known for his toughness and determination, contributing significantly to the team's success throughout his four-year career. On the baseball diamond, he displayed both offensive and defensive talent, earning a reputation as a dependable and dynamic player. In soccer, his speed, stamina, and field vision made him an invaluable member of the squad. Balancing three demanding sports while maintaining strong academics showcased Ricardo's remarkable work ethic and time-management skills.

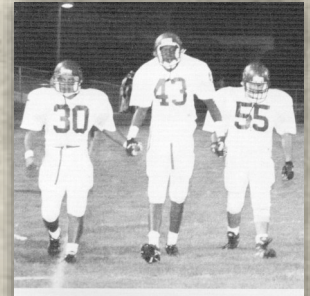
After graduating from SMHS, Ricardo attended Fresno State University before completing his degree at the University of Phoenix. His drive to serve and protect led him to a distinguished career in law enforcement. He served as a Santa Barbara County Probation Officer before joining the San Diego Police Department, where he excelled as a Police Officer and later as an Instructor at the San Diego Police Academy.

Beyond his professional achievements, Ricardo has remained committed to making a positive impact in his community. In the San Diego area, he devotes time to mentoring at-risk youth, providing guidance, encouragement, and a positive role model for young people facing challenges. His ability to connect, inspire, and lead reflects the same qualities he displayed as a student-athlete — discipline, resilience, and integrity.

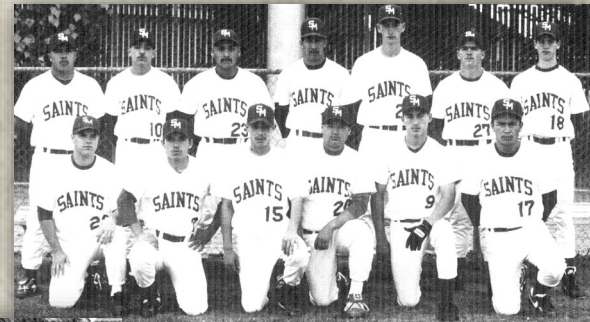
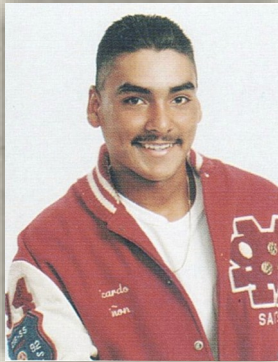

NELSON SAGISI

1968 - 1972



Nelson Sagisi attended Santa Maria High School from 1968–1972, excelling as a two-sport athlete, standout student, and dedicated leader. He left a lasting mark on Saints athletics, academics, and the community before continuing his baseball career at the University of California, Berkeley from 1972–1976.

On the football field, Nelson was a three-year letterman and co-captain in 1971, earning All Northern League First Team honors and being named the team's Best Lineman. In the storied rivalry against Righetti, he recorded five sacks in a 9–0 victory, earning KSMA Radio's Player of the Week. In 1972, he played in the Ventura - Barbara County All-Star Football Game, helping secure a 21–12 win over Santa Barbara South Team.

In baseball, Nelson was co-captain in 1972, earning All Northern League First Team and All-Tournament First Team honors at the SMHS Spring Break Easter Tournament. His leadership and excellence in both sports earned him the prestigious title of SMHS Athlete of the Year in 1972.

Equally accomplished in the classroom, Nelson served as Student Body Treasurer, Vice President, and President. He was SMHS Student of the Month (1969), Senior Best, and Elks Student of the Month (1972). Graduating with a 3.8 GPA, he earned a \$1,750 Regents Scholarship to UC Berkeley.

At Cal, he played four years of baseball on scholarship, earning a varsity spot in 1974 under coaches Edwin E. Lord and Bob Milano. His career included international competition in Canada, Europe, Colombia, Curaçao, Venezuela, and the Dominican Republic as part of Cal's touring team.

Nelson returned to SMHS in 1980, serving as assistant football coach and head varsity baseball coach, leading the 1982 team to a 12–3 record. He later coached at Righetti High School and spent 18 years at Arellanes Junior High, guiding successful basketball seasons and mentoring future Saints athletes.

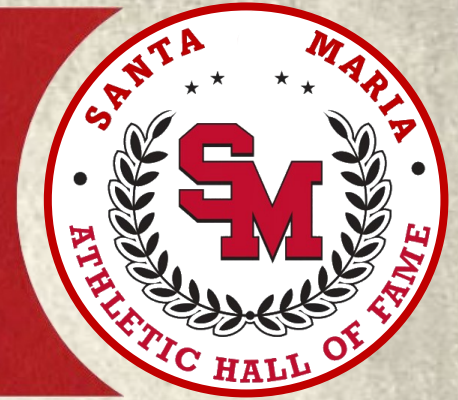
His numerous honors — All Northern League First Team (Football 1971, Baseball 1972), Best Lineman (1971), KSMA Player of the Week (1971), All-Tournament First Team (1972), and SMHS Athlete of the Year (1972) — stand as a testament to his skill, leadership, and lifelong commitment to Santa Maria High School.

ATHLETE

LESTER WEBBER

1931-1935

Posthumous



Lester was a three-sport standout at Santa Maria High School, excelling in baseball, football, and basketball, though he was best known for his exceptional pitching. Playing baseball all four years, he led the Saints to the 1933 Southern California Championship as a sophomore pitcher. He served as captain of both the football and basketball teams during his junior year.

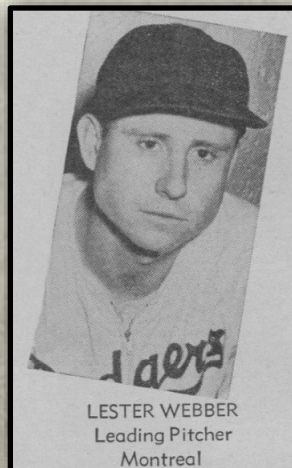
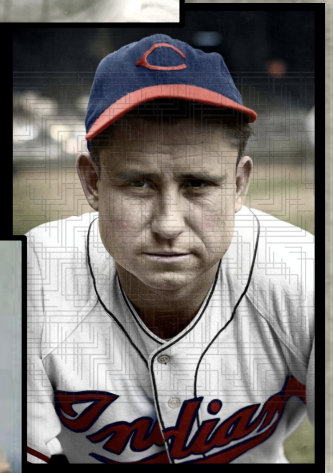
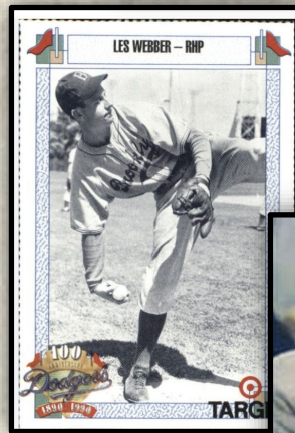
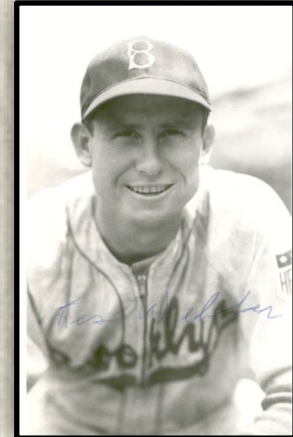
Beyond athletics, Lester was a leader in student government and extracurricular activities. He served as Class President for three consecutive years, was a Red Cross Representative, president of the FFA his junior year, a member of the FFA judging team, and president of the Block Letter Society.

In 1936, after winning 18 straight games for a semi-pro team in Canada, Lester signed with the Seattle Indians of the Pacific Coast League (PCL). The following year, he pitched for the Wenatchee Chiefs in the Western International League, going 21-6 in 31 games. Returning to Seattle in 1938, he became a full-time starter in 1939, posting a 17-7 record with a 2.78 ERA and earning PCL All-Star honors. In 1940, he helped Seattle win the PCL Championship, and in 1941, despite limited starts, posted a 7-3 record with a 2.16 ERA, leading the team to another championship.

That year, Lester was selected in the Rule 5 Draft by the Brooklyn Dodgers, managed by the legendary Leo Durocher. He made his MLB debut on May 17, 1942, pitching eight innings in a win over the Chicago Cubs. He finished the season 3-2 with a 2.96 ERA.

In 1943, transitioning to a relief role, Lester became known for inducing ground balls and earned 10 saves. He also famously received a \$100 fine for intentionally throwing at Stan Musial twice in the same at-bat.

Lester's major league career spanned six seasons with the Brooklyn Dodgers and Cleveland Indians. His final record stood at 23-19 with 25 saves and a 4.19 ERA in 158 games—a remarkable career rooted in the talent and leadership he first displayed at Santa Maria High School.
