## **WHAT IS AP(ADVANCED PLACEMENT)?**

- AP courses aim to teach students the skills and information needed to pass an end of year exam given by College Board. Any student who receives a score of three (or above) on College Board's five-point grading system typically receives college credit by most public colleges.
- Moreover, regardless of exam score, many colleges and universities view participation in the AP program as a sign of a motivated student. The course is advanced not only in reading and writing, but in the depth of the material. Students taking this course will learn at an accelerated pace and must exhibit responsibility, good work ethic, and a drive to learn to achieve college readiness skills and (potential) college credit.

## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

An AP English Language and Composition (AP Lang) course cultivates the reading and writing skills that students need for college success and for intellectually responsible civic engagement. The course guides students in becoming curious, critical, and responsive readers of diverse texts and becoming flexible, reflective writers of texts addressed to diverse audiences for diverse purposes. The reading and writing students do in the course should deepen and expand their understanding of how written language functions rhetorically: to communicate writers' intentions and elicit readers' responses in particular situations. ## **AP with WE Service:**

- AP with WE Service is a service-learning program that AP teachers can implement within their existing AP courses. The program empowers students to apply course content and skills to service-learning projects. It's delivered in collaboration with educational partner WE Charity, which provides experiential service-learning programs designed to create social change.
- Students have the opportunity to earn a National Service Distinction for meeting the set expectations for this program.
- All students enrolled in AP Lang at YWLA will participate in a WE Service project. They will be given some class time and guidance for their project, but the entire project is student lead and focused.

## **4 Parts to the WE Service Project:**

### **1. Investigate and Learn**

- a. Undertakes a student-led investigation of a topic at local and global levels, and evaluates existing programs that take action on the topic, making clear connections to AP course topics.

### **2. Action Plan**

- a. Develops an achievable plan to carry out one global and one local action in the form of direct service, indirect service, or advocacy, which includes clear tasks, responsibilities, resources needed, and a timeline.

### **3. Take Action**

- a. Participates in a project that has local and global significance, involving direct service, indirect service, and/or advocacy.

### **4. Report and Celebrate**

- a. Creates a portfolio that showcases the service learning project and explains the impact of the project and its significance. May participate in a celebration.

## **COURSE OBJECTIVES AND TOPICS**

### **Course Big Ideas:**

1. RHETORICAL SITUATION (RHS)
  - a. Enduring Understanding RHS-1: Individuals write within a particular situation and make strategic writing choices based on that situation.
2. CLAIMS AND EVIDENCE (CLE)
  - a. Enduring Understanding CLE-1: Writers make claims about subjects, rely on evidence that supports the reasoning that justifies the claim, and often acknowledge or respond to other, possibly opposing, arguments.
3. REASONING AND ORGANIZATION (REO)

- a. Enduring Understanding REO-1: Writers guide understanding of a text's lines of reasoning and claims through that text's organization and integration of evidence.
4. STYLE (STL)
  - a. Enduring Understanding STL-1: The rhetorical situation informs the strategic stylistic choices that writers make.

## **Curricular Requirements**

- CR1 The course is structured by unit, theme, genre, or other organizational approach that provides opportunities to engage with the big ideas throughout the course: Rhetorical Situation, Claims and Evidence, Reasoning and Organization, Style.
- CR2 The course requires an emphasis on nonfiction readings (e.g., essays, journalism, political writing, science writing, nature writing, autobiographies/ biographies, diaries, history, criticism) that are selected to give students opportunities to identify and explain an author's use of rhetorical strategies and techniques.
- CR3 The course provides opportunities for students to develop the skills in Skill Category 1 – Rhetorical Situation (Reading): Explain how writers' choices reflect the components of the rhetorical situation.
- CR4 The course provides opportunities for students to develop the skills in Skill Category 2 – Rhetorical Situation (Writing): Make strategic choices in a text to address a rhetorical situation.
- CR5 The course provides opportunities for students to develop the skills in Skill Category 3 – Claims and Evidence (Reading): Identify and describe the claims and evidence of an argument.
- CR6 The course provides opportunities for students to develop the skills in Skill Category 4 – Claims and Evidence (Writing): Analyze and select evidence to develop and refine a claim.
- CR7 The course provides opportunities for students to develop the skills in Skill Category 5 – Reasoning and Organization (Reading): Describe the reasoning, organization, and development of an argument.
- CR8 The course provides opportunities for students to develop the skills in Skill Category 6 – Reasoning and Organization (Writing): Use organization and commentary to illuminate the line of reasoning in an argument.
- CR9 The course provides opportunities for students to develop the skills in Skill Category 7 – Style (Reading): Explain how writers' stylistic choices contribute to the purpose of an argument.
- CR10 The course provides opportunities for students to develop the skills in Skill Category 8 – Style (Writing): Select words and use elements of composition to advance an argument.
- CR11 The course provides opportunities for students to write argumentative essays synthesizing material from a variety of sources.

- CR12 The course provides opportunities for students to write essays analyzing authors' rhetorical choices.
- CR13 The course provides opportunities for students to write essays that proceed through multiple stages or drafts, including opportunities for conferring and collaborating with teacher and/or peers.

## **AP Language and Composition Course Content:**

The course is divided into 9 units which address all CR's listed above. Each unit will touch on at least one of the big ideas of the course, connect to ideas in American culture, include both reading and writing rhetorically, as well as exam prep. Content will come primarily from the textbook *Ideas in Argument: Building Skills and Understanding for the AP English Language Course* co-written by the author of the Course Exam and Description and a long-time AP English educator. The course will focus primarily on nonfiction/expository texts which may include speeches, articles, essays, memoirs, and interviews as well as art, photography, comics, historical texts, news/current events, imaginative literature, advertisements, and more. The course will begin with a deeper study of the summer preparation.

**AP Exam: Students are expected to take the Digital AP Exam on Wednesday, May 14th @ 8am on YWLA campus. Exam Format:**

## Section I: Multiple Choice

45 Questions | 1 hour | 45% of Exam Score

Includes 5 sets of questions:

- 23–25 Reading questions that ask students to read and analyze nonfiction texts.
- 20–22 Writing questions that ask students to “read like a writer” and consider revisions to stimulus texts.
- NEW: there will only be 4 answer choices for the MC

## Section II: Free Response

3 Questions | 2 hours 15 minutes (includes a 15-minute reading period) | 55% of Exam Score

Students write essays that respond to 3 free-response prompts from the following categories:

1. Q1 Synthesis: After reading 6–7 texts about a topic (including visual and quantitative sources), students will compose an argument that combines and cites at least 3 of the sources to support their thesis.
2. Q2 Rhetorical Analysis: Students will read a nonfiction text and analyze how the writer’s language choices contribute to the intended meaning and purpose of the text.
3. Q3 Argument: Students will create an evidence-based argument that responds to a given topic.

## **Tutorials**

Tutorials are scheduled before and after school on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

## **Academic Integrity**

AP Lang is a college board course with the chance to earn college credit. Academic integrity is expected. The material you learn in school builds the foundation that will carry you into your future academic endeavors. Therefore, it is of the utmost importance that students do their own work, give credit to those whose work they have used in a paper or project, and study for tests and quizzes so that they are prepared. Students who are dishonest can expect a consequence. Status in NHS or a school leadership role will be reevaluated. A single, documented act of academic dishonesty in high school will result in disqualification of eligibility for the National Honors Society.

## **Plagiarism**

A student’s work is to be original and not plagiarized. Plagiarizing copyrighted material is illegal and dishonest. Taking credit for another person’s work or ideas and passing them off as your own
