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WHAT IS Honors?

The purpose of honors courses is to bridge the gap between regular and Advanced Placement (AP) or Pre-AP classes. They serve as an important part of a tiered academic pathway by offering more rigorous instruction and deeper learning than standard courses.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Spanish 3 Honors is a high school level course that builds on the skills acquired in Spanish 2, aiming to further develop students' abilities in listening, speaking, reading, and writing. The course continues to emphasize communication skills and cultural understanding.

By the end of Spanish 3, students are expected to reach the **Intermediate-Low** to **Intermediate-Mid** proficiency level according to the ACTFL (American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages) guidelines. This means students will be able to:

- understand the main idea and some pieces of information on familiar topics from sentences and series of connected sentences within texts that are spoken or written;
- participate in spontaneous spoken or written conversations on familiar topics, creating sentences and series of sentences to ask and answer a variety of questions;
- communicate information, make presentations, and express my thoughts about familiar topics, using sentences and series of connected sentences through spoken and written language.

Following Spanish 3 Honors, students will be prepared to enroll in AP Spanish 4.

COURSE ACTIVITIES (What we will be doing)

Students will listen, speak, read, and write in Spanish daily.

Due to the nature and importance of in-class work, active participation is necessary in Spanish class and is the single most important factor for student success. Students are required to pay attention and come to class ready to be active participants. They are required to demonstrate their ability to read, speak, write, or listen in Spanish. They may also be required to identify vocabulary or explain cultural/historical information. Assignments completed in class or as homework include but are not limited to: translation, answering questions, illustrations, flash cards, or storytelling/writing. Any assignments completed in class or for homework may be taken for a grade.
