Jackson, Mississippi has about 170,000 residents in an area of 104 square miles. There are 36 schools which include 6 high schools, 7 middle schools, 23 elementary schools along with 4 special program schools. These schools are divided into 6 feeder patterns based on the high school receiving the area's scholars.

## JPS Scholars Added to Mississippi Student Advisory Council

The Mississippi Department of Education (MDE) announced today the 132 members of the 2024-25 State Superintendent’s Student Advisory Council (SAC). The council includes students in grades 11-12 and first year of college.

The council consists of 94 new members, which includes 10 students who were semifinalists in spring 2024 for the State Board of Education Junior Representative position, and 38 students who are returning to the council from the previous school year.

All students come from different backgrounds, school size and regions in Mississippi and will be able to share their opinions and offer advice about educational opportunities and policy in Mississippi with Dr. Lance Evans, state superintendent of education.

MDE began the SAC program in 2019. Each fall, the MDE opens applications for new members and students are required to write a compelling cover letter, submit a resume and provide answers to questions about their interest in the SAC, their accomplishments, educational concerns, and academic goals.

The council’s purpose is to provide a forum for Mississippi’s students to offer diverse perspectives to the State Superintendent of Education. The students will act as liaisons between MDE and public-school students from across the state.

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# MISSISSIPPI ACADEMIC ASSESSMENT PROGRAM (MAAP)

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The Jackson Public School District, remaining steadfast in its commitment to academic excellence and continuous improvement, maintains a “C” rating on the Mississippi Academic Assessment Program (MAAP).

Science proficiency saw a slight increase of 0.5% and there were notable areas of growth, particularly in 5th grade math (3.6%) 6th grade math (3.8%) and 8th grade math, which experienced the highest proficiency at 5.1%. All of this in a school year with no shortage of challenges and setbacks.

Superintendent Dr. Errick L. Greene emphasizes the district’s dedication to excellence and a growth mindset as we address the challenges system-wide and ensure continued academic progress. “We recognize the areas where growth is needed, and we’ve already implemented new strategies to improve outcomes in these critical areas,” said Dr. Greene.

“We are using these results as a reflection point to make the necessary adjustments and to ensure we are providing the best educational experience for every scholar. We’re investing heavily in our team members and in our learning environments, and we’re determined to maximize every moment for powerful teaching and learning,” Dr. Greene added.

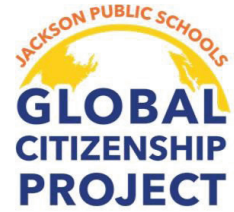

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# FROM THE CLASSROOM TO CAPITOL HILL: JPS SCHOLARS EXPLORE LEADERSHIP, CULTURE & GLOBAL CITIZENSHIP

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From October 20-23, 2024, scholars from the JPS Global Citizenship Project (GCP) took their annual journey to Washington D.C. for learning, engagement, and inspiration. While in our nation's capital, GCP scholars set out to explore the rich tapestry of American culture, history, and government, while also delving into the important themes of global citizenship.

Their tour includes college tours at the University of the District of Columbia, Howard University, and the Georgetown Law School. GCP scholars learned about the legacy and the impact that these institutions of higher learning had on civil rights and leadership within the African American community. At Georgetown Law School, they explored the Street Law Program – a community engagement initiative that gives the law school students professional experience by teaching practical law courses to high school students.

No trip to D.C. would be complete without experiencing its rich cultural heritage. At the National Museum of African American History and Culture, students walked through the profound history and contributions of African Americans. The scholars also visited the Smithsonian National Zoological Park.

A highlight of their trip was visiting the White House, which was further enriched by a meeting with Congressman Bennie Thompson's Chief of Staff, Dr. Timla Washington. The scholars discussed pressing issues and the importance of representation, gaining insight into the legislative process and the role of advocacy in enacting change. They also visited the Capitol Building and the National Mall.

Each stop deepened our scholars' understanding of global citizenship and our responsibilities as engaged citizens.

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# JACKSON MIDDLE COLLEGE SCHOLAR SELECTED AS NATIONAL STUDENT AMBASSADOR

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Asiah Scott, a senior at Forest Hill High School and Jackson Middle College has achieved the remarkable honor of being named an Educators Rising National Student Ambassador! As one of the select students awarded this prestigious title, Asiah will actively represent Educators Rising at a national level, inspiring her peers and championing the teaching profession. In this role, she'll share her own journey, advocate for important educational issues, and encourage fellow students to explore careers in teaching. Asiah's leadership and passion will have a lasting impact as she serves as a spokesperson for future educators across the country.

Jackson Middle College is a pilot project between Jackson Public Schools, Jackson State University, and the Mississippi Department of Education. The initiative addresses the critical shortage of qualified math teachers by creating a pipeline of certified educators while helping scholars reach their full potential. The program aims to identify and nurture students with a high mathematical aptitude.

Jackson Middle College is structured as a dual enrollment partnership, where scholars take both high school and college courses, enabling them to earn university credits while still in high school. Scholars enrolled in the program will spend part of their day at their high school taking non-dual credit courses and the remainder at Jackson State University (JSU) engaged in dual enrollment or dual credit coursework.

Upon high school graduation, scholars who meet specific criteria can continue their education at JSU with tuition waivers, eventually earning a bachelor's degree in Mathematics Education. After graduation, each mathematician will be contractually obligated to return to JPS and serve as math teachers, fulfilling the program's mission of creating a "grow your own" pipeline of educators.

Families, peers, and judges walked through the fair, admiring the projects, asking questions, and enjoying the scholars' evident passion for reading.

"The event is a celebration of literacy and imagination, fostering a love for reading while showcasing the creativity and effort of young minds," said Dr. Samecia Stokes, JPS Director of the Office of Library Services.

The JPS Reading Fair began as part of a statewide initiative. However, after the COVID-19 pandemic disrupted countless aspects of education, the statewide initiative was discontinued. The JPS Reading Fair now thrives as its own district-wide tradition.

More than just a showcase of creativity, the fair encourages scholars to exercise the power of choice by selecting one of their favorite books to bring to life.

"We have the opportunity to empower them to explore different genres and decide what they want to base their reading fair project on because so often they are told what to read in class," said Dr. Mavis Dawson, librarian at Bates Elementary School. "When they come to us, they get a choice—they can select a book and truly enjoy reading it."

The District Reading Fair is designed to inspire a deeper connection with reading while reinforcing the Mississippi College and Career Readiness Standards at every grade level. This experience fosters critical thinking, creativity, and a passion for literacy, while providing scholars with a platform to engage with peers, educators, and the community.

# PROVINE HIGH SCHOOL CAREER EXPLORATION FAIR DRAWS OVER 400 SCHOLARS



A total of 473 scholars from Provine High School attended this year's Career Exploration Fair, held in the school's gymnasium on Monday, September 23.

The event, organized by Katory Walker-Williams, Provine High School's academic coach, was a resounding success. Students had the opportunity to engage directly with representatives from over 40 local businesses and organizations, including the Mississippi National Guard, the Mississippi



Department of Transportation, Coca-Cola, Nissan, and United Way.

"We are empowering our youth to explore different career paths and discover what they already have

to be successful and what they need," said Walker-Williams.

Throughout the day, scholars explored various career paths, gained insights into different industries, and networked with professionals who offered valuable advice and guidance. Feedback from both students and business representatives was overwhelmingly positive, with many remarking on



the importance of such opportunities to bridge the gap between education and the workforce.

With the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reporting only 49 workers for every 100 job openings in Mississippi as of June, understanding career options and their requirements has become more critical than ever.

Events like this are crucial for scholars as they consider their future career choices and the steps needed to successfully enter the workforce. The fair left many students feeling more informed and confident about their career paths.



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# DR. ERRICK GREENE'S INSPIRATIONAL LEADERSHIP EARNS RECOGNITION BY NATIONAL EDUCATORS' GROUP

Dr. Errick L. Greene, Superintendent of Jackson Public Schools (JPS), was named the 2024 recipient of the Josephine E. Hill Superintendent Award at a gala on Saturday, November 23, 2024.

The evening was a celebration of excellence and camaraderie, bringing together educational leaders from across the nation. Presented by the National Alliance of Black School Educators (NABSE), this distinguished award honors our superintendent as an exceptional leader who has led our district to significant and positive outcomes for children.

Adding to the event's prestige, Senator Raphael Warnock delivered an inspiring address. Several JPS school board members, leaders and staff were in attendance for the ceremony.

"From the first day he walked onto the job, Dr. Greene prioritized our people and our places, shepherding through the largest pay raise for teachers, cafeteria, and maintenance workers in the history of JPS, and overseeing over \$100 million in facility improvements, including new science labs and libraries in every high school," said Board President Dr. Ed Sivak.

"I am incredibly honored and grateful to the National Alliance of Black School Educators for this prestigious award," said Superintendent Dr. Errick L. Greene. "Leading the Jackson Public Schools community for the past six years has been the highlight of my entire career. My team, our Board of Trustees, our thoughtful partners, and I work tirelessly to transform the lives of our scholars and their families through education. I'm very proud of the progress we've made thus far, and I look forward to achieving even greater outcomes for our scholars. In a time of such divisiveness and with education leaders being targeted and vilified across the country, I appreciate the NABSE family for shining a light on our efforts, and for helping all to see the greatness that is Jackson Public Schools."

"As a state representative of Mississippi and Hinds County, I am very pleased about Dr. Greene being named a finalist for the Josephine E. Hill Superintendent Award, which is the nation's highest honor for an urban leader," said Representative Christopher Bell, District 65. "I am grateful for the leadership he has provided to Jackson Public Schools for the past six years.

Under Dr. Greene's leadership, Jackson Public Schools has achieved significant improvements, including raising its accountability score by two letter grades, securing increased private funding, and resolving state violations. Notable outcomes include a tripled algebra pass rate and a 14-point rise in graduation rates. Through thoughtful planning and a truly team-oriented approach to tackling the District's unique challenges, Greene has truly cast a vision for success.

Dr. Greene was also recognized as a finalist for the Green-Garner Award presented by the Council of the Great City Schools.

# MURRAH HIGH SCHOOL SENIOR NAMED ONE OF FIVE NATIONAL STUDENT POETS



Nadia Wright, a senior at Murrah High School, is one of only five high school students nationwide named a National Student Poet.

The National Student Poets Program (NSPP) is a collaboration between the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) and the nonprofit Alliance for Young Artists & Writers, which presents the Scholastic Art & Writing Awards. Winners from this prestigious award program were selected as finalists for the student poet honor.

Wright is a proud member of the National Honor Society, and she has been an active member of Murrah's creative community since she was a sophomore. She joined *The Pleiades*, Murrah High School's literary magazine, and started writing poetry, already tackling mature topics such as hypocrisy and heartbreak. Four of her poems were published in the magazine, and she had her first recognition from the Scholastic writing competition for her poetry.

In 2024, Nadia continued to push the boundaries of genre and started writing more creative nonfiction as well as crafting her voice as a poet. She had poetry and literary nonfiction pieces published. In her piece entitled, "Manifested in Blood," she writes "I am the reincarnation of my ancestor's grief and pride. I strive to be wholly invested and connected with my community."

In the 2023-2024 Scholastic writing competition, Nadia not only won multiple keys for her writing, her gold key poetry went on to compete and win at the national level. She was chosen by Scholastic to be one of five youth poetry ambassadors across the entire United States. This year she will travel in that role across the Southeast to visit schools and lead workshops for other young writers.

Laketa Marshall-Thomas, JPS Assistant Superintendent of High Schools, says, "It is such an honor to be chosen and prove what a gifted writer Nadia is. We are so proud of Nadia and love that she is using her own talent and voice to empower other young people, as well."
