Morristown High School Proves It's a Class Act— Live on CBS New York

Morristown High School (MHS) was featured live on CBS New York's "Class Act" broadcast on November 15, following a nomination from the Morris Educational Foundation (MEF). Chosen as a standout among tri-state area schools, MHS was recognized for its excellence in academics, athletics, equity, and inclusion. In preparation, CBS anchor Chris Wragge visited in October to capture the vibrant spirit of MHS through taped interviews with students and staff.

To ensure students could attend the early morning event on November 15, Superintendent Dr. Anne Mucci approved special transportation, and the MEF provided "Morristown High School: One Community" t-shirts for the first 250 students, along with breakfast for all attendees. Over 450 students and 45 staff members filled the gym before 5 a.m.—with one student arriving as early as 3:15 a.m., even beating the CBS New York crew for setup! MHS Broadcasting students also arrived early to film behind-the-scenes moments for "Colonial Corner News."

The broadcast featured live and pre-taped segments highlighting the school's students, staff, clubs, and achievements. Mo-town pride was on full display from the marching band, cheerleaders, drill team, Mo the mascot, and the TV debut of the "Motown Rumble." Alumni student-athletes Ali Ferrara ('15) and Joe Goryeb ('75) also shared their love for the District and why they continue to support—Ferrara through teaching and coaching and Goryeb through give-back efforts.







Inspiring Future STEM Innovators

Morristown High School's National Society of Black Engineers (NSBE) Jr. STEM Day brought together students in grades 6 through 12 for a day of hands-on learning and interactive workshops. They explored engineering principles through guided design challenges, prototypes, and collaborative problem-solving to experience real-world STEM applications that sparked curiosity and creativity.

The day was proudly supported by the Morris County Chapter of The Links, Incorporated, a key partner in expanding STEM access and equity across the Morris School District. Through their support of NSBE Jr. and its Pre-College Initiative, the program infused mentorship, leadership development, and a strong sense of identity into every activity.

In addition to the local experience, a select group of students traveled to the 2025 NSBE National Convention in March, joining over 15,000 attendees for four days of STEM showcases, career prep, and connection with engineering professionals. They returned home energized and ready to lead.

Thanks to the guidance of NSBE Jr. advisors Mr. Rodney Lee and Ms. Holly Chitundu, the program continues to thrive. With active chapters now at the elementary, middle, and high school levels, the Morris School District and The Links are building a powerful pipeline—one that empowers students to explore, achieve, and lead in STEM.


AUTHOR-ILLUSTRATOR INSPIRES FUTURE CREATORS

Thanks to a grant from a donor passionate about literacy, the MEF brought author and illustrator John Patrick Green to Normandy Park School on June 2 to speak with 5th-graders District-wide. Mr. Green shared how his elementary school passion for drawing led to his career as an illustrator for Disney Adventures Magazine and culminated in his New York Times bestselling "InvestiGators" series. The students asked enthusiastic questions, and afterwards, each classroom and media center received a signed boxed set of InvestiGators books.



EXTENDING BOOK LIFE WITH COLIBRI

Media specialists prioritize book care and maintaining diverse collections, but many titles are easily damaged due to frequent handling by students. To address this, the MEF provided a grant to purchase the CoLibri System, a book-covering machine, to protect thousands of books by applying custom-cut, durable covers. This grant will reduce replacement costs while supporting the media specialists' mission to preserve and organize school library collections.



Behind the Scenes of Illustration

Woodland School had the pleasure of meeting Eric Velasquez, an extremely talented author and illustrator. Mr. Velasquez showed students a glimpse of his drawing process and how his illustrations evolve through the editing process.



Research Transforms Students Into Experts

Les Misérables even earned a Papermill Playhouse Rising Star award for Outstanding Pit Orchestra, an achievement made possible in part by the new equipment.

As Junior Elizabeth Sebiri shared, "The new laptops made finding, compiling, and inserting sound effects easier and faster, giving us more time to focus on other aspects of the Sound department." This grant has not only empowered student artists but also underscored the value of investing in the arts.


