### Admission Requirements for the California State University (CSU)

Eligibility for admission to the CSU is determined by three factors: (1) Specific high school courses, (2) Grades in specified courses and test scores, and (3) Graduation from high school. Some campuses have higher standards for particular majors or students who live outside the local campus area. Because of the number of students who apply, a few campuses have higher standards (supplementary admission criteria) for all applicants. Most CSU campuses have local admission guarantee policies for students who graduate or transfer from high schools and colleges that are historically served by a CSU campus in that region. The objectives of the School Site Safety Plan are as follows:

1. Protect the safety and welfare of students, school staff, and visitors.
2. Provide a safe and coordinated response to emergencies.
3. Protect the District's facilities and properties.
4. Enable the District to restore normal conditions with minimal confusion in the shortest time possible.
5. Provide for the interface and coordination between sites and the District Emergency Operations Center (DEOC).
6. Provide for the interface and coordination between the District EOC and the Cities of Richmond, El Cerrito, San Pablo, Pinole, Hercules, and Contra Costa County Emergency Operations Center (EOC).
7. Provide for the orderly conversion of pre-designated District sites to mass care sites, when necessary.

The Comprehensive School Safety Plan is updated annually. Our school safety plan was last annually reviewed, updated, and discussed with school faculty and a student representative in 2024. A copy of the Comprehensive School Safety Plan is available by request through the district's website.

## Professional Development

During 2024/25 Nystrom's professional development focus is teacher collaboration focused on data driven instruction. Data Driven Instruction is a philosophy predicated on one question: are students learning? Using data, we are able to analyze what our students have learned by looking at ongoing (formative) data sources, and use that to decide our next steps.

Our focus is on the four areas of our Theory of Action:

1. Word Recognition/Foundational Skills: Actively working to dismantle systematic structures of inequities to ensure the foundational literacy skills of phonological awareness, decoding, and sight recognition are taught in an explicit, systematic, and data-driven way
2. Language Comprehension: Actively working to dismantle systematic structures of inequities to ensure all students have access to rigorous, high quality, grade level standards-aligned curriculum daily with the goal of fostering constructive academic discourse
3. Math: Actively working to dismantle systematic structures of inequities to ensure all students have access to rigorous, high quality, grade level standards-aligned curriculum daily
4. Positive School Culture & Climate: Actively working to dismantle systematic structures of inequities so that students and staff are physically and emotionally safe to focus on learning.

These focus areas were developed with our Instructional Leadership Team (ILT) reviewing student data and progress on both interim and summative assessments.

- Site-based math coach provides ongoing and regular coaching and feedback for targeted grade levels.
- Site-based early literacy coach provides ongoing and regular coaching and feedback for K-3, focused on early literacy.
- Regular professional development for entire staff on CCSS-best practices, including multiple methods, data analysis training, etc.

## Professional Development

- Increased number of professional developments through optional PDs for staff.
- Regular data-analysis meetings with grade level teams to review common assessment data and create action plans.
- Grade level planning days each trimester for grade levels to review data and develop an action plan.
- We are involved in a number of Community of Practices (CoPs) that provide additional professional learning opportunities.
