

HOPE AND ZELL MILLER SCHOLARSHIP

SSN Verification:

- Social Security numbers are required to be in **Synergy** for a student to be HOPE eligible.

Rigor Requirement

- 4 courses complete prior to graduation (examples: Algebra 2 or higher, Chemistry, Physics, 2nd year of Foreign Language or higher, AP Courses)

HOPE Scholarship:

- 3.0 academic GPA
- This is the information that was shared with us:
- HOPE will cover the current year at 100% of the *prior year* tuition amount. Example: the 2024 year of college gets covered at 2023 tuition rate under HOPE, the 2025 year gets covered at the 2024 rate. If the rates are the same from one year to the next, HOPE funds at 100%; if the rates change from one year to the next then HOPE only covers the amount equal to the *prior year*.

Zell Miller scholarship:

- 3.7 academic GPA—covers 100% of tuition
- SAT 1200 combined CR and Math or 25 ACT composite

GA FUTURES & HOPE ELIGIBILITY



■ UNIVERSITY SYSTEM OF GEORGIA (USG) REQUIREMENTS

- Must have completed the 17 credits of Required High School Curriculum which includes **2 credits of world language**.
- Currently, UGA, Georgia College & State, and GA Tech require submission of SAT or ACT scores.
- Must meet the college's minimum freshman index and GPA.

FRESHMAN INDEX

The Freshman Index (FI) is calculated using an applicant's High School GPA (calculated on the USG's RHSC units) and SAT or ACT scores.

SAT FI Formula: $500 \times (\text{HS GPA}) + 1.06 \times (\text{SAT ERW} + \text{Math}) - 74$

Example: A student with a 2.9 HS GPA and 480 SAT Evidence-based Reading & Writing/440 SAT Math would use the following FI calculation:

$$\text{SAT FI} = 500 \times (2.9) + 1.06 \times (480 + 440) - 74$$

$$\text{SAT FI} = 2351.2$$

ACT FI Formula: $500 \times (\text{HS GPA}) + (\text{ACT Composite} \times 42) + 88$


Example: A student with a 2.7 HS GPA and 18 ACT Composite would use the following FI calculation:

$$\text{ACT FI} = 500 \times (2.7) + (18 \times 42) + 88$$

$$\text{ACT FI} = 2194$$





- Common App allows students to build a virtual college list, then apply to those multiple colleges using one application.
- You will have to write at least one essay for your application, but some colleges require additional essays.
- Not ALL colleges are on Common App. Some colleges require you to complete their institutional application available on the college's website.

■ THE ACTIVITIES LIST

- Activities = How you spend your time outside the classroom. Not limited to clubs/sports.
- How have you made a meaningful impact through your commitments and involvements?
- How have you contributed to your community?
- How do you engage with an interest you are passionate about?
- Be clear and specific.
- **Good Example:** CLARINET: Played B-flat clarinet for EHS marching band and picked to be drum major my senior year.
- **Better Example:** EHS MARCHING BAND DRUM MAJOR: Drum Major (12) for 80+ member band, charting halftime shows & conducting for games; Clarinet Section Leader, Drum Major Asst. (11); Clarinet (9-12)

■ THE ESSAY

- ALWAYS starts with self-reflection. What do you want the college to know about you?
- Your goal of your essay is to tell the college about your positive personal qualities, values, strengths, and character through an engaging story.
- Getting Started:
 - Brainstorm a list of your personal values and positive qualities.
 - Ask yourself, what life experiences helped you develop these values and qualities?
 - How will these values and qualities help you impact your college, future profession, community or world?

- THE RECOMMENDATION LETTERS
- Recommendation letters provide the college with additional insight into the type of student you've been in high school.
 - **Teacher Recommendation Letter** –Highlights your work ethic, classroom contributions, intellectual promise. Teachers can share specific examples of ways you've demonstrated the qualities of a great student.

2023 FRESHMAN ADMITS

UGA Calculated Grade Point Average mid-range/average: 4.14 academic GPA, 81.8% of enrolled students had a GPA of 4.0+.

•Please remember this is not the GPA students see on their high school transcript, but rather the GPA that UGA recalculates for everyone based on the core academic courses taken in high school and looking at the actual grades posted on the transcripts. Roughly 91% of the HS core grades were A's, and 8+% were B's, thus showing the academic strength of the accepted group.

AP/IB/Dual Enrollment course mid-range/average: 8-13 courses, average of 10+

•We determine academic rigor based on all core classes a student has taken (CP, Honors, Advanced, AP, IB, DE, etc.) as compared to what is offered in the school/community. This is not based simply on the number of AP/IB/DE courses, but instead we look at the overall coursework over four years in the core areas and the progression of rigor over the years. The AP/IB/DE information is the most specific data I can give on it, but the numbers do not cover all of our curriculum review.

SAT Total mid-range for students: 1230-1410

•This data is based on admitted students where the SAT was the strongest score if both SAT and ACT were submitted or if the SAT was the only test taken and sent.

ACT Composite mid-range for students: 27-32

•Remember, UGA focuses on ACT E and M. For reporting purposes, we give out the best score overall ACT score, but the ACT E and M are very similar to the overall score.

•This data is based on admitted students where the ACT was the strongest score if both SAT and ACT were submitted or if the ACT was the only test taken and sent.

MAKE YOUR COLLEGE LIST

Self Reflection

- The 5 "P's"
 - Program – Does the college offer what I want to study?
 - Place- Consider college size, distance from home, opportunities for employment & recreation in surrounding area.
 - People – Who do I want to surround myself with?
 - Philosophy – Do the college's goals line up with mine?
 - Personal – What attributes does the college need to have for me to successfully graduate?

Parental Input

- What do your parents think about the 5 "P's"?
- Discuss family finances and what is available for college.
- What areas of growth are needed for you to succeed as an independent adult?

Research

- Visit College Websites
- Read the college's online student newspaper.
- Common Data Set.
- College Visits.
- Meet with admissions representatives at EHS and college fairs.

Final List Includes

- Likely – The college has a higher admit rate and your profile is significantly stronger than the middle 50% of admitted students. You should like your likelihoods!
- Target – Your profile is similar to the middle 50% of admitted students.
- Reach – Your profile is below the middle 50% of admitted students, but you have non-academic factors that work in your favor.
- Being realistic now saves disappointment later!
