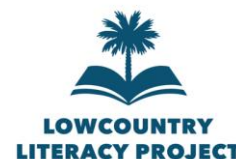

Lowcountry Literacy Project and Charleston County School District Partner to Expand Literacy Support in Title 1 Elevation Schools

Charleston, SC (August 28, 2025) - The Lowcountry Literacy Project and Charleston County School District (CCSD) are proud to announce a joint initiative expanding literacy support into Title 1 schools. The partnership will bring Orton-Gillingham training and yearlong coaching support to two of CCSD's Elevation Schools during the 2025–2026 academic year: Matilda F. Dunston Elementary School and Ladson Elementary School. Last school year, the Lowcountry Literacy Project supported 45 classrooms; this fall, the organization will add 31 new classrooms, bringing the total to 76 classrooms receiving support.

This expansion marks a milestone in the organization's mission. The partnership will provide educators across both schools with Orton-Gillingham (OG) professional development and embedded coaching as one of several strategies CCSD is using to strengthen Tier 1 instruction and targeted interventions.

A multi-year implementation plan has been designed for each school in collaboration with leadership, aligning with CCSD's ELA curriculum and tailored to readiness levels. Training will begin in August for all Tier 1 classroom teachers, reading interventionists, and special education staff, ensuring a consistent, schoolwide approach to literacy instruction.

"Our goal has always been to transform literacy outcomes by equipping teachers with the tools they need," said Lindsey Ballenger, Executive Director of the Lowcountry Literacy Project. "This partnership represents an important step forward - working alongside CCSD's broader literacy efforts to support the students who need it most."

Both Dunston Elementary and Ladson Elementary were selected for their strong commitment to this initiative. Each will participate in a two to three-year phased implementation process, ensuring teachers receive ongoing support to translate training into measurable gains for students.

The partnership builds on results from James B. Edwards Elementary School, Jennie Moore Elementary School, and St. Andrew's School of Math and Science, where OG-trained educators have seen improvements in decoding, comprehension, and student confidence. At these schools, data show that classrooms led by OG-trained teachers achieved twice as much overall growth on iReady compared to other classrooms in the same school. Just as importantly, as

more teachers were trained over a three-year period, long-standing achievement gaps began to close - shrinking by nearly 40 percent for vulnerable student populations.

“This partnership complements CCSD’s existing literacy initiatives by adding another powerful tool to our comprehensive strategy for reading success, and we are excited to work with the Lowcountry Literacy Project to bring this training to our Elevation Schools,” said Anita Huggins, Superintendent of CCSD.

In addition to CCSD’s investment, the Lowcountry Literacy Project is actively raising philanthropic funds to supplement the initiative, ensuring high-fidelity implementation with ongoing coaching and specialized support—costs covered by generous community partners. The Lowcountry Literacy Project is a Charleston-based nonprofit that partners with schools, districts, and teachers to close opportunity gaps and improve reading outcomes - one classroom at a time.
