Lumberton ISD District of Innovation Plan

1. School Start and End Date

Exemption from TEC §25.0811; TEC §25.0812 Related
Board Policies: EB(LEGAL)

Manner in which statute inhibits the goals of the plan

TEC §25.0811 states that a school district may not begin student instruction before the 4th Monday of August. TEC §25.0812 states that a school district may not schedule the last day of school before May 15th. The current process allows no flexibility in the design of annual calendars to fit the needs of the community or the wishes of the local Board of Trustees who represent community interests in this matter. Previously, districts had the option of applying to TEA for a waiver to start earlier, even as early as the 2nd Monday in August. The Texas tourism groups lobbied to have this stopped because they believed it was hurting their tourism business. Therefore, several years ago, the legislature took away all waivers and dictated that districts may not begin until the 4th Monday, with no exceptions.

Innovation Strategies

- A. Relief from the statute will allow LISD to develop a calendar that addresses student instruction and focused professional development in conjunction with the new instructional minutes requirement, rather than days.
- B. Alignment of the district calendar with local universities, advanced placement exams and STAAR timeline.
- C. Provide for increased local control of the instructional calendar in order to be responsive to community needs.

2. Teacher Appraisal Process

Exemption from TEC §21.351; TEC §21.352

Related Board Policies: DNA(LEGAL)

Manner in which statute inhibits the goals of the plan

Texas Education Code requires the commissioner to adopt a recommended appraisal process and criteria on which to appraise the performance of teachers. The criteria must be based on observable, job-related behavior, including: (1) teachers' implementation of discipline management procedures; and (2) the performance of teachers' students. In appraising teachers, each school district shall use the appraisal process and performance criteria developed by the commissioner.

Innovation Strategies

The district is seeking flexibility within the recommended appraisal process and performance criteria for teachers and staff evaluated using the appraisal system Texas Teacher Evaluation and Support System (T-TESS). The district seeks to continue to utilize T-TESS as the teacher appraisal instrument, while seeking exemption from the Student Growth Measure. Data provided from district and campus local assessments will continue to be utilized following the current district assessment model.

3. Certification Required

Exemption from TEC 21.003; TEC 21.053; TEC 21.057

Related Board Policies: DBA LEGAL/LOCAL

Manner in which statute inhibits the goals of the plan:

TEC 21.003 states that a person may not be employed as a teacher, teacher intern, or trainee, librarian, educational aide, administrator, educational diagnostician, or school counselor by a school district unless the person holds an appropriate certificate or permit issued by the appropriate state agency. In the event a district cannot locate a certified teacher for a position, or a teacher is teaching a subject outside of their certification, the district must request emergency certification from the Texas Education Agency and/or State Board for Educator Certification.

TEC 21.053 requires a teacher to present his or her certificate to the district before their employment contract will be binding and prohibits the district from paying an educator for teaching if the educator does not hold a valid certificate at the time.

TEC 21.057 requires that the district provide written notice to parents if an inappropriately certified or uncertified teacher is assigned to a classroom for more than 20 consecutive instructional days.

Innovation Strategies

The district will maintain its current expectations for employee certification. The District will make every attempt to hire secondary teachers and counselors according to TAC Title 19, Part 7, Subchapter 230; however, where that is not reasonably possible, the District will have the flexibility to create local certification requirements for qualification and training for individuals who are knowledgeable in the area and equipped to effectively perform the duties of the position in question. If the teacher is performing on T-TESS or the counselor has a proficient evaluation at a level that is acceptable to the District, the District may consider retaining the services of this employee with the expectation that the employee show they are working toward obtaining the appropriate certification through workshops, college classes, and/or other venues to prepare them for the examination. In addition, the employee will remain at will until the employee acquires SBEC certification or appropriate licensure. The District will maintain the documentation at the local level. The District will also allow certified secondary teacher(s) to teach subject(s) out of their certified area for individuals who are knowledgeable in the area and equipped to effectively perform the duties of the position in question. The campus principal may submit to the superintendent a request for local certification that will allow an already certified teacher to teach a course for which he/she is not certified. The principal must specify in writing the reason for the request and document the credentials or life experience the candidate possesses that would qualify this individual to be employed and carry out the duties required by the position. Paperwork will not be submitted to the Texas Education Agency but will be filed locally. The district will ensure that all individuals assigned to teach have the knowledge and resources necessary to be successful.

4. Planning and Preparation Periods

Exemption From: TEC 21.404

Related Board Policies: DL (Legal)

Manner in which statute inhibits the goals of the plan

Texas Education Code section 21.404 requires that each classroom teacher be provided at least 450 minutes within each two-week period for instructional preparation, including parent-teacher conferences, evaluating students' work, and planning. Due to the ridged construction of "two-weeks" without accounting for shortened workweeks, there is no flexibility for implementation of Lumberton ISD's four-day school week calendar.

Moreover, teachers do not have the opportunity to earn additional compensation by electing to teach more courses and waive the statutorily required planning time.

Proposed Innovation Strategies

All teachers will continue to receive daily time for planning and preparation. However, in order to implement the District's four-day school week and provide more flexibility in the campus master schedules, Lumberton ISD will adjust teacher planning and preparation periods to allow for implementation of the District's adopted calendar. In addition, teachers may elect to waive their planning periods to teach additional courses. Teachers that elect to waive their planning and preparation time to provide student instruction will be provided additional compensation.

5. Grievance Policy

Exemption from: TEC 26A.001(a)-(c), (e); TEC 26A.002; TEC 26A.003

Related Board Policies: DGBA(LEGAL/LOCAL); FNG(LEGAL/LOCAL);

GF(LEGAL/LOCAL)

Manner in which statute inhibits the goals of the plan

TEC 26A.001(a)-(c), (e), 26A.002, and 26A.003 requires the school district to adopt a grievance policy. This policy, among other things, significantly extends the timelines currently provided for under the district grievance policies.

Innovation Strategies:

LISD seeks to resolve issues equitably, timely and at the lowest level possible. The district believes its current grievance policies are effective and achieve the goals of resolving complaints. LISD will not adopt a new policy contemplated under TEC 26A but will continue to process complaints pursuant to its currently adopted grievance policies.

6. Instructional Plans and Course Syllabus

Exemption from: TEC 26.0062

Related Board Policies: FA(LEGAL)

Manner in which statute inhibits the goals of the plan

TEC 26.062 requires the school district to adopt a policy that mandates the posting of instructional plans and course syllabus on the district's website each semester. The policy must also require teachers to provide the instructional plan or syllabus to district administration, and the parent of each student enrolled in the class prior to the beginning of the semester.

Innovation Strategies:

- A. LISD believes in effective and timely parent communication, especially regarding the instruction provided to students. As the district offers a range of classes at various levels, maintaining and providing each instructional plan or syllabus on the district's website prior to the semester beginning an administrative burden is created. This practice will further restrict the district's flexibility in the instruction offered to district students. Further, the district's teachers provide instructional information to parents and issue syllabi to students, depending on campus, within the first few days of the school year, typically covering the topics and expectations for the entire year. Under this law, the district would be required to provide the same information to its parents multiple times throughout the year, unnecessarily duplicating these communications.
- B. LISD will not adopt a policy that requires the district to post instructional plans or syllabi on its website or provide such documents to parents prior to the beginning of the semester. However, the district maintains it will ensure that parents are informed of the instruction being provided to their students and will provide additional information, as necessary, if parents request.

7. Library Materials

Exemption from: TEC 33.026; TEC 33.027(b), (d), (f), (g), and (h)

Related Board Policies: EFB LEGAL/LOCAL

Manner in which statute inhibits the goals of the plan

TEC 33.026 requires the school district to adopt a policy for the acquisition of library materials which includes procurement or acceptance of donated library materials. The policy, among other things, requires the Board to approve all such library materials, allows the public to review a list of prospective library materials 30 days prior to final approval, and sets timelines by which the list of prospective library materials must be considered at a Board meeting.

TEC 33.027(b), (d), (f), (g), and (h) requires the school district to respond to challenges to library materials under certain timelines and to conduct reviews of the challenged library materials in specific ways.

Innovation Strategies:

- A. LISD is committed to ensuring that students of all ages have access to library materials that are appropriate and academically relevant. Further, LISD is confident in the campus librarians, in conjunction with campus administration, to review and select such library materials.
- B. The Board of Trustees will not adopt a policy requiring Board approval of library materials. Board review can be utilized when necessary and any donated library materials will be received in compliance with Board Policy CDC (Legal) and (Local).
- C. The Board of Trustees will not adopt a policy consistent with TEC 33.027, as the district already has procedures in place to process and timely respond to any library material challenge. The district will continue to operate under those procedures.

8. Professional Development/Mentor Teachers

Exemption from: TEC 21.451; TEC 21.458

Relevant Board Policies: DEAA(LEGAL)

Manner in which statute inhibits the goals of the plan:

TEC 21.451 prescribes staff development requirements for educators. These requirements impede the District's ability to provide timely professional development to employees based on newly emerging issues, data, and student needs.

TEC 21.458 sets eligibility requirements for teacher mentors and mentees. This provision states that the district may only assign a mentor to a teacher with less than two years of teaching experience, despite the fact that a teacher at any level of experience may benefit from a mentor-mentee relationship. The District needs the flexibility to assign mentors to more experienced teachers in need of assistance. The statute also sets eligibility requirements for mentor teachers, which limits the available pool of mentor teachers.

Innovation Strategies:

- A. The District will exercise local discretion in determining the areas of need, content, duration, and frequency for professional development for its instructional and noninstructional staff.
- B. The District will exercise local discretion in assigning teachers to serve as mentors based on a variety of factors, including experience, knowledge, and areas of instruction targeted for improvement or innovation
