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Course Description:

Honors 9 is designed to help improve a student’s ability to think critically about a wide variety of literature, including poetry, short stories, drama, and prose. It aims to strengthen a student’s ability to use written language and reinforces their facility to prepare and deliver oral presentations. This course will also teach students digital literacy through a digital classroom setting. Learners are expected to complete reading and work prior to class as this class relies heavily on classroom discussion and participation.

CCR grade: As a part of the PACKER learning community, you will be required to ACT with INTEGRITY and follow the CCR's outlined on the previous page. Cheating and Plagiarism:

With regard to cheating, the school policy will be enforced (located in student handbook) and your citizenship grade will be affected. **What is the difference between cheating versus plagiarism?**

- Cheating is the **intentional** use of someone else's work being presented as one's own work (i.e. submitting another student's essay and claiming it as your own).
- Accidental plagiarism is the **misrepresentation** of another's work as one's own (i.e. forgetting a works cited page; not attributing a quotation to the author; not understanding the correct method of paraphrasing a quotation).
- **AI work, such as Chat GPT, promotes institutionalized plagiarism. Professor of English and Comparative Literature at Rutgers notes that "[AI is] trained on massive amounts of data, most of which data has been scraped from the internet without any compensation or consent or knowledge of the person who generated the data." As such, any work found to be produced by chatbots will be considered INTENTIONAL plagiarism. This AI/ChatGPT policy is a new territory and is evolving. It may change to align with English Department, WFHS, and/or WFPS policies. Any changes will be announced.**

Late Work/Eligibility

- All work is valuable and needs to be completed to ensure understanding but **will be penalized as well as documented within your CCR grade in Power School.**
- **Assignment Revisions:** We value learning and striving to improve skills. However, the emphasis should be on improving current skills and aiming for mastery. Conference with one of your teachers to begin the revision process:
 - Late work will be entered as missing with a 0 until handed in. A "0" does NOT mean that the work cannot be completed but is simply a reminder the work has not been turned in yet. All late work is due by the end of the unit, after which the 0 will remain and credit will not be given.
 - Attending WIN sessions for missing work will be required in order to submit the work.

WFHS Food and Drink Policy:

- No food in hallways: this includes all lunch periods and instructional time. (It includes food purchased from school, brought from home, fast food, take-out, etc.)
- Food in classrooms must be provided by teacher(s) or approved by the teacher. Changes room to room.
- All drinks must be in a container with **non-spill lid** or will be thrown away.

WFHS Cellphone Policy:

- Students shall not use any electronic device that in any way disrupts or detracts from the educational environment. **Electronic devices are inclusive of cell phones, smart watches, earbuds, and school-issued devices.**
- Cell phones must be **out-of-sight and out-of-use** from the first bell to the last bell of the academic DAY! (This means not on your person in any way including pockets)
- **Failure to comply with the cellphone policy will result in your phone being confiscated and turned into the office.**

WFHS Attendance Policy:

- It is expected that you attend class and arrive on time each day. If you arrive after the designated start time for class, you will be marked tardy. Excessive tardiness, which means 20 minutes or more, will result in UV for the class period.
- Every fifth unexcused tardy will convert to an unexcused absence and the student will be assigned one hour of detention. This is per class period and will adhere to the attendance policy.
