BIOLOGY OLYMPIAD CLUB (USABO)

The USA Biology Olympiad is the premiere biology competition for high school students in the United States. It enriches the life science education of nearly 10,000 students annually. It provides the motivation, curricular resources, and skills training to take them beyond their classroom experience to the level of international competitiveness. Students will face two rounds of challenging exams, and 20 finalists will be invited to a residential training program at the USABO Finals. Students participate in 10 days of biology instruction inclusive of laboratory training and conceptual understanding followed by two days of testing. Four students will earn the right to advance as Team USA at the International Biology Olympiad (IBO), a worldwide competition involving student teams from over sixty countries.

SCIENCE OLYMPIAD

An American team competition in which students compete in 23 events pertaining to various scientific disciplines, including earth science, biology, chemistry, physics, and engineering. Over 7,800 middle school and high school teams from 50 U.S. states compete each year. U.S. territories do not compete; however, since 2012 high school teams from Japan have competed at the national tournament as unranked guests. There are multiple levels of competition: invitational, regional, state, and national. Invitational tournaments, run by high schools and universities, are unofficial tournaments and serve as practice for regional and state competitions. Teams that excel at regional competitions advance to the state level; the top one or two teams from each state (depending on the state) then advance to the national level. Winners later receive several kinds of awards, including medals, trophies and plaques, as well as scholarships. The mission of this club aligns with Kingsway's STEM Leadership Academy.
