Demographics Summary

Demographics Summary

Sanger Independent School District is located in north Denton County and proudly serves the city of Sanger along with the surrounding rural and suburban communities. The district encompasses a unique blend of agricultural farmland and ranch land, along with growing suburban neighborhoods that attract families who commute to the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex.

Sanger ISD currently serves approximately 2,958 students across six campuses:

- **Butterfield Elementary** – Grades 1–5
- **Chisholm Trail Elementary** – Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten
- **Clear Creek Intermediate** – Grades 1–5
- **Sanger Middle School** – Grades 6–8
- **Sanger High School** – Grades 9–12
- **Linda Tutt High School** – Alternative education campus

The district has experienced steady enrollment growth of 1–2% annually and continues to evolve to meet the needs of its diverse student population. All Sanger ISD campuses operate as Schoolwide Title I campuses, ensuring equitable access to high-quality instruction and support for all learners.

Sanger ISD student demographics reflect a variety of educational needs and strengths:

- **Economically Disadvantaged** – 43.8%
- **Special Education** – 20.8%
- **Dyslexia** – 11.1%
- **At-Risk** – 38.8%
- **Section 504** – 8.3%
- **Emergent Bilingual** – 14.5%
- **Gifted and Talented** – 6.0%

To support its mission, the district employs a dedicated team of professionals, including:

- 178 certified teachers
- 56 professional support staff
- 16 campus administrators
- 9 central office administrators
- 58 paraprofessionals
- 89 auxiliary personnel

As a District of Innovation, Sanger ISD has adopted a locally developed Innovation Plan that provides flexibility in several key areas, including the school start date, certification for Career and Technical Education (CTE) teachers, class size ratios in grades K–4, and the structure of site-based decision-making. This designation allows the district to tailor educational approaches to better serve its students and community.

Demographics Strengths

Diverse Student Population

- With 14.5% of students classified as **Emergent Bilingual**, the district has a strong representation of students acquiring a second language. This not only promotes cultural and linguistic diversity but also provides an opportunity to cultivate a bilingual and bicultural learning environment.

Significant Population Receiving Support Services

- **20.8% of students receiving Special Education services** and **11.1% identified with Dyslexia** indicate the district's strong commitment to early identification and targeted support for students with learning differences. This reflects an inclusive approach and robust special programs infrastructure.

High Level of Program Eligibility and Support

- With **38.8% At-Risk** and **43.8% Economically Disadvantaged**, the district qualifies for additional state and federal resources. This enables schools to provide wraparound services, intervention programs, and instructional support that can improve student achievement and close opportunity gaps.

Advanced Learner Representation

- **6% of students identified as Gifted and Talented** suggests that the district supports high-achieving learners through enrichment and advanced academic opportunities. This indicates attention to both ends of the academic spectrum.

Problem Statements Identifying Demographics Needs

Problem Statement 1: Although Sanger ISD provides equitable access to high-quality instruction through Schoolwide Title I programming and has experienced steady enrollment

growth, student performance gaps persist for several high-needs populations--including Economically Disadvantaged (43.8%), Special Education (20.8%), At-Risk (38.8%), and Emergent Bilingual students (14.5%).

Root Cause: A significant proportion of students require targeted, differentiated instructional strategies and specialized interventions due to diverse learning needs.

Student Achievement Strengths

Sanger ISD is projected to have a B in accountability for the 2024-2025 school year.

Sanger ISD has identified many strengths across multiple content areas.

In the area of Reading Language Arts, 8th grade had a 4% increase in the number of students achieving the Approaches Level. At Butterfield Elementary, the number of students achieving Approaches Grade level increased by 4%. There was an increase of 10% in the area of Meets Grade Level by 5th grade students. 8th grade students demonstrated an increase of 16% in the area of Meets Grade Level as well as a gain of 11% in the area of Masters Grade Level.

Overall in Mathematics, Sanger ISD has seen growth in students achieving the Approaches Level. 4th grade students gained 4% in the area of Meets Grade Level and 10% in the area of Masters Grade Level expectations. There was a 5% increase in Meets Grade level and 8% gain in Masters Grade Level in 8th grade Algebra I.

In 5th grade Science, there was an overall increase of 14% in the Approaches Grade Level and 5% in the area of Masters Grade Level.

Algebra I demonstrated a 5% increase in Meets Grade Level and an 8% increase in Masters Grade Level expectations.

Overall the EOC courses maintained or increased the level of student achievement from the previous school year.

Problem Statements Identifying Student Achievement Needs

Problem Statement 1: Students continue to struggle with the ECR and SCR questions on the STAAR assessment.

Root Cause: Students need more exposure to writing opportunities in order to grasp the skills necessary for success on the ECR and SCR.

District Culture and Climate

Root Cause: The root cause of the challenges in fully supporting and engaging all students and families stems from inconsistent communication practices, limited targeted supports for students with diverse needs, and gaps in ongoing professional development focused on equity and inclusion. Additionally, existing systems for gathering and acting on stakeholder feedback may lack the structure or resources needed

Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment

Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment Summary

At Sanger Independent School District, we have adopted the TEKS Resource System for English Language Arts and Reading (ELAR), Math, Science, and Social Studies at our high school campus. This system ensures that our curriculum is aligned with state standards and provides a comprehensive framework for instruction. Meanwhile, our elementary campuses benefit from a district-created scope and sequence, which is meticulously designed to align with specific content area programs, ensuring a cohesive and structured learning experience for our younger students.

Our commitment to collaborative teaching is evident through our Professional Learning Communities (PLCs), where teachers come together to internalize and align the curriculum effectively. This collaboration is crucial for maintaining consistency and quality across classrooms. To support this, we engage in regular monitoring through observations and documentation of curriculum documents, ensuring that our educational practices meet the high standards we set for our district. SISD utilizes HQIM that have been adopted by TEA in order to ensure the intentional integration of the TEKS.

The administration of unit and nine-week assessments plays a vital role in our educational strategy, as it ensures that instruction, curriculum, and assessment are all aligned with the TEKS standards. These assessments, provided by the district, are administered after each unit is taught or at the end of the nine-weeks, allowing us to evaluate student understanding and adjust instruction as needed to meet learning goals.

In our instructional approach, we utilize a consistent lesson structure that reflects the gradual release of responsibility model. This model is implemented across all content areas and grade levels, promoting student independence and mastery of skills. Our focus on the implementation of standards-based learning targets, ensures that our educators are equipped to deliver instruction that meets the diverse needs of our students and prepares them for future success.

Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment Strengths

Our commitment to critical writing across all content areas remains a cornerstone of our district's educational strategy. By integrating research-based writing strategies, such as summaries and elaboration, we ensure that students are not only absorbing information but also engaging with it critically. The emphasis on short constructed responses (SCRs) further hones their ability to articulate thoughts concisely and effectively, a skill that is invaluable across all disciplines.

The SISD Assessment Protocol is a vital component of our instructional approach, requiring campus administrators to collaborate closely with teachers. This collaboration involves a thorough analysis of assessment data, which is instrumental in shaping and refining our instructional practices. By delving deeply into this data, we can tailor our teaching methods to better meet the needs of our students, ensuring that our educational strategies are both data-driven and student-focused.

Every nine weeks, the Curriculum & Instruction Department convenes with campus administrators to review campus assessment data. These discussions are pivotal in identifying the curriculum needs of each campus, allowing us to make informed decisions about the next steps in our educational planning. This regular review process ensures that our curriculum remains dynamic and responsive to the evolving needs of our students.

The introduction of an Honors RLA class at the sixth-grade level is a strategic initiative designed to prepare students for future advanced classes. By offering this class, we provide

an opportunity for students to challenge themselves academically, fostering a readiness for more rigorous coursework in the years to come. This initiative reflects our commitment to nurturing academic excellence and preparing our students for future success.

Implementing standards-based learning targets is a critical step in ensuring that students understand the instructional purpose behind their lessons. By clearly defining what students are expected to learn, we provide them with a road map for success, helping them to focus their efforts and achieve their educational goals. This approach not only clarifies expectations but also empowers students to take ownership of their learning journey.

Problem Statements Identifying Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment Needs

However, inconsistencies in the implementation of these resources across campuses and grade levels pose challenges to ensuring all students receive high-quality, standards-aligned instruction.

Root Cause: Differences in instructional practices and varying familiarity with curriculum resources among educators across campuses and grade levels lead to inconsistent implementation. Enhancing support systems, clear expectations, and collaborative opportunities can promote greater fidelity to curriculum and improve instructional consistency district-wide.

Root Cause: The under-engagement stems from communication barriers, limited outreach tailored to diverse family needs, and insufficient structures to actively involve all stakeholder groups--especially non-English-speaking families--in meaningful ways.

Brief Description of SCE Services and/or Programs

State Compensatory Education (SCE) funds are designed to support programs and services that provide additional academic assistance to students identified as at risk of dropping out of school or those who have not met satisfactory performance on End-of-Course (EOC) assessments. These funds supplement, not replace, the regular education program by offering targeted interventions such as: Accelerated Instruction & Tutorials: Extra instructional time in core subjects to help students close learning gaps and meet grade-level standards. Credit Recovery & Alternative Education Programs: Opportunities for students to regain credits and stay on track for graduation. Small-Group or Individualized Support: Interventions during or outside of the school day tailored to students' specific academic needs. Extended Learning Opportunities: Summer school, after-school programs, or intersession support to reinforce skills. Behavioral and Dropout Prevention Services: Counseling, mentoring, and transition programs that address non-academic barriers to success. These programs are designed to increase student achievement and engagement, ensuring students receive the additional resources necessary to graduate on time.

Title I

Descriptor 1: Student Progress Monitoring and Supports

1.1: Developing and implementing a well-rounded program of instruction to meet the academic needs of all students;

Sanger ISD is committed to providing a comprehensive, well-rounded instructional program that addresses the diverse academic needs of all students. This program integrates rigorous academic content across core subjects—such as reading, math, science, and social studies—with enrichment opportunities including the arts, physical education, and technology.

Key components include:

- **Standards-aligned curriculum** designed to meet or exceed Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) requirements.
- **Differentiated instruction and interventions** to support students with varying learning needs, including English learners, students receiving special education services, and at-risk populations.
- **Integration of culturally responsive teaching practices** to ensure all students see themselves reflected in the curriculum.
- **Use of data-driven decision making** to continuously monitor student progress and adjust instructional strategies.
- **Professional development for educators** focused on instructional best practices and effective use of resources to support diverse learners.

This approach ensures that every student has equitable access to a broad, balanced education that prepares them for academic success and lifelong learning.

1.2: Identifying students who may be at risk for academic failure;

Sanger ISD employs a proactive and systematic approach to identify students who may be at risk for academic failure. This includes:

- **Early screening and diagnostic assessments** conducted at the beginning of the year (BOY), such as TPRI for reading and other subject-specific screeners, to identify students struggling to meet grade-level expectations.
- **Ongoing progress monitoring** using formative assessments, benchmarks, and classroom data to detect emerging academic challenges throughout the school year.
- **Data analysis by campus leadership and intervention teams** during regular data meetings to review student performance trends and pinpoint students needing additional support.
- **Use of multiple data points**, including attendance, behavior, and previous academic records, to gain a comprehensive understanding of potential risk factors.
- **Collaboration with teachers, counselors, and parents** to ensure timely identification and intervention planning.

This structured identification process enables timely, targeted interventions designed to improve academic outcomes and keep students on track for success.

1.3: Providing additional educational assistance to individual students the LEA or school determines need help in meeting the challenging State academic standards;

Sanger ISD is dedicated to ensuring that all students meet the challenging State academic standards by providing targeted additional educational assistance to those identified as needing help. Key elements of this support include:

- **Tiered intervention programs** such as Response to Intervention (RTI) and supplemental literacy and math interventions aligned with students' specific needs.
- **Individualized learning plans** developed collaboratively by teachers, intervention specialists, and families to address academic gaps and set measurable goals.
- **Use of progress monitoring tools** to track student growth and adjust instruction or intervention intensity as needed.
- **Extended learning opportunities** including before- and after-school tutoring, summer programs, and enrichment activities designed to reinforce classroom learning.
- **Professional development for staff** focused on evidence-based intervention strategies and differentiated instruction.
- **Regular communication with parents and guardians** to engage them as partners in supporting their child's academic progress.

This multi-faceted approach ensures timely and effective support for students struggling to meet state standards, promoting equity and academic success.

1.4: Identifying and implementing instructional and other strategies intended to strengthen academic programs and improve school conditions for student learning;

Sanger ISD actively identifies and implements research-based instructional strategies and supportive practices to enhance academic programs and create positive school conditions conducive to student learning. This process includes:

- **Data-driven decision making**, using assessment results, climate surveys, and stakeholder feedback to pinpoint areas needing improvement.
- **Adoption of evidence-based instructional models** such as differentiated instruction, cooperative learning, and culturally responsive teaching to meet diverse student needs.
- **Implementation of Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS)** and social-emotional learning (SEL) programs to foster safe, supportive, and respectful school environments.
- **Professional learning communities (PLCs)** where educators collaborate to analyze data, share best practices, and develop targeted instructional plans.
- **Enhanced family and community engagement initiatives** to build strong partnerships that support student achievement and well-being.
- **Ongoing monitoring and evaluation** to ensure strategies effectively improve teaching quality and student outcomes, with adjustments made as necessary.

Through these strategies, Sanger ISD continuously strengthens its academic programs while cultivating school climates that promote engagement, safety, and success for all students.

Descriptor 2: Teacher Quality

Sanger ISD is committed to equity in teacher assignment and regularly reviews staffing data to identify any disparities in the placement of low-income and minority students with

ineffective, inexperienced, or out-of-field teachers. The district uses this data to inform staffing decisions and provides targeted professional development, mentoring, and support to ensure all students have access to highly qualified and effective educators. Campus and district leaders collaborate to monitor teacher assignments and implement strategies to eliminate disproportionality, promoting equitable learning opportunities for every student.

Descriptor 3: School Improvement and Support Activities

Sanger ISD will fulfill its responsibilities under Section 1111(d)(1) and (2) by implementing a comprehensive system of support for campuses identified as needing improvement. This system includes:

- **Data Analysis and Needs Assessment:** Conducting thorough reviews of academic performance, student subgroup outcomes, and school climate data to identify specific areas requiring targeted support.
- **Development of Campus Improvement Plans:** Collaborating with campus leadership, staff, families, and community stakeholders to create tailored plans that address identified needs with clear goals, strategies, and metrics.
- **Targeted Professional Development:** Providing job-embedded, research-based training and coaching focused on instructional practices, data-driven decision-making, and effective intervention strategies aligned with campus goals.
- **Increased Monitoring and Progress Reviews:** Establishing regular checkpoints to monitor implementation fidelity, assess progress toward goals, and make data-informed adjustments.
- **Resource Allocation:** Prioritizing federal, state, and local resources to support interventions, enrichment, and necessary staffing on improvement campuses.
- **Family and Community Engagement:** Enhancing communication and partnership efforts to involve parents and community members as active participants in the school improvement process.
- **Collaboration with External Support:** Leveraging expertise and services from Regional Education Service Centers (ESCs) and other partners to provide additional technical assistance and resources.

Through these coordinated efforts, Sanger ISD ensures that campuses in need of support receive the focused attention and resources required to improve student outcomes and meet state accountability standards.

Descriptor 4: Measure of Poverty

Sanger ISD will use the following poverty criteria to select school attendance areas eligible for Title I funding under Section 1113:

- The district will utilize **free and reduced-price lunch (FRPL) eligibility data** as the primary indicator of poverty within each school attendance zone.
- Attendance areas with **at least 40% of students qualifying for FRPL** will be prioritized for Title I funding to ensure targeted support for schools with the highest concentrations of low-income students.
- When available, supplemental data such as **Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) participation rates** and census-based socioeconomic indicators may also be considered to refine selection and better capture poverty levels.

- The district will annually review and update poverty data to ensure that Title I resources are allocated effectively and equitably across eligible schools.

This data-driven approach ensures that Sanger ISD directs resources to attendance areas where students face the greatest economic challenges, aligning with federal requirements to promote equity and support student success.

Descriptor 5: Nature of Programs

Sanger ISD implements both **Schoolwide Programs** (Section 1114) and **Targeted Assistance Programs** (Section 1115) to support all students in meeting challenging State academic standards, with special consideration for vulnerable populations.

- **Schoolwide Programs:**
 - These schools operate a comprehensive reform strategy designed to upgrade the entire educational program.
 - The program integrates federally funded resources with other funds to improve instructional quality and student outcomes across all academic areas.
 - Emphasis is placed on providing high-quality instruction, using data-driven decision-making, offering extended learning opportunities, and engaging families and communities.
 - All students are eligible to receive services, and interventions are designed to close achievement gaps.
- **Targeted Assistance Programs:**
 - These programs focus on providing additional instructional support to identified students who are failing or most at risk of failing to meet State academic standards.
 - Services are based on student academic needs identified through multiple criteria and delivered by qualified personnel.
 - Targeted assistance includes supplemental instruction in reading, math, and other core subjects tailored to individual needs.
- **Educational Services for Neglected and Delinquent Children:**
 - Sanger ISD coordinates with local institutions for neglected or delinquent children to provide equitable access to educational services aligned with State standards.
 - Services include specialized instruction, counseling, and support designed to address academic and social-emotional needs in community day school programs or residential facilities.
 - Collaboration with community partners ensures continuity of learning and appropriate transition services for these students.

This multi-faceted approach ensures that all students, especially those with the greatest academic needs, receive targeted and comprehensive support to promote success.

Descriptor 6: Services to Homeless Children and Youth

Sanger ISD is committed to ensuring the enrollment, attendance, and academic success of homeless children and youth in full compliance with the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act. The district provides a comprehensive range of services designed to remove barriers and support this vulnerable population, including:

- **Immediate enrollment assistance**, waiving typical documentation requirements such as proof of residency, immunizations, or previous school records.
- **Transportation support** to and from the school of origin to maintain educational stability whenever feasible and in the student’s best interest.
- **Access to free meals, tutoring, counseling, and other supplemental educational services** to support academic achievement and social-emotional well-being.
- **Collaboration with community agencies and shelters** to connect families and youth with additional resources such as housing, healthcare, and mental health services.

Allocation of Title I, Part A Funds for Homeless Services:

- Sanger ISD determines the amount of Title I, Part A funds reserved for homeless children and youth based on the most recent homeless student count and the total Title I allocation.
- A portion of funds is set aside annually to provide targeted services, including transportation, school supplies, tutoring, and counseling, ensuring that homeless students receive equitable opportunities to succeed.
- The district reviews and adjusts this reservation each year to align with changing needs and federal guidelines.

This coordinated approach ensures homeless children and youth have access to uninterrupted, high-quality education and the necessary support to thrive academically and personally.

Descriptor 7: Parent and Family Engagement Strategy

- **Fostering Social-Emotional Learning and Mental Health Supports:** Implementing evidence-based SEL curricula and increasing access to counseling services to promote student well-being.
- **Improving Family and Community Engagement:** Hosting workshops, providing multilingual resources, and establishing partnerships to empower families as active participants in their children's education.

- **Supporting Career and College Readiness Programs:** Funding dual credit courses, career counseling, and work-based learning initiatives that prepare students for postsecondary success.
- **Addressing Equity and Access:** Directing resources to support underserved and at-risk student populations to ensure equitable educational opportunities.
- **Data Systems and Evaluation:** Investing in data management tools and staff training to monitor program effectiveness and inform continuous improvement.

Sanger ISD will regularly review the allocation and impact of grant funds to ensure alignment with district priorities and compliance with federal guidelines, adjusting as needed to maximize positive student outcomes.

13.2: Assist schools in developing effective school library programs to provide students an opportunity to develop digital literacy skills and improve academic achievement.

Sanger ISD will assist schools in developing and enhancing their library programs to provide students with essential opportunities to develop digital literacy skills and improve overall academic performance. Key supports include:

- **Professional development for librarians and staff** focused on integrating technology, digital resources, and information literacy instruction aligned with district curriculum and state standards.
- **Expanding access to digital devices and online resources** such as eBooks, databases, and educational software to foster research skills and independent learning.
- **Collaborative planning between librarians and classroom teachers** to embed digital literacy and critical thinking skills into daily instruction across content areas.
- **Implementing library programs that teach responsible technology use, online safety, and effective information evaluation** to prepare students for college, career, and civic life.
- **Creating welcoming, inclusive library environments** that encourage student engagement, creativity, and a love of reading.
- **Regular assessment and evaluation** of library services and resources to ensure they meet student needs and support academic goals.

By strengthening school library programs, Sanger ISD promotes student success through enhanced digital literacy and lifelong learning skills.
