Demographics

Demographics Summary

Butterfield Elementary serves 1st - 5th grade students as a Title I campus. Butterfield Elementary student enrollment is 490 students in the 2025-2026.

Butterfield Elementary enrollment has had minimal enrollment shifts in our student demographic groups. As of the 2025 - 2026 school year, the campus demographics were: 58 % White, 32 % Hispanic, 3 % African American, 45 % Economically Disadvantaged, 14 % English Language Learners. 18 % SPED, 34 % At Risk.

Butterfield Elementary has 54 dedicated staff members constantly working to best meet the needs of our students.

The instructional staff breakdown: 41 instructional staff members which includes 2 administrators, 1 counselor, 2 Campus Student Interventionists, 25 grade level teachers, 5 SPED, 2 Specials, 1 Gifted and Talented, 2 Dyslexia, 1 nurse.

Demographics Strengths

Butterfield Elementary is proud to enhance our English Language Learners' experience through the ESL certification of our teachers.

Our stability in student population allows us to build strong, lasting relationships with our students and their families, fostering a sense of community. Our dedicated teachers engage with students, addressing their unique learning styles and needs.

The strong culture on our campus is a testament to our collaborative staff, all working together to meet the needs of our students.

Root Cause: We currently have 143 students identified as At Risk and 151 served as SPED.

Student Achievement Summary

The 2025 STAAR Testing results have shown a commendable positive trend across all academic areas.

While the majority of our students are meeting the State's expectations in the approach categories, it is evident that there is room for growth. To ensure that more students reach the Mastery status, we must focus on providing additional support and resources. This will involve targeted interventions and personalized learning strategies to help each student achieve their full potential.

Our commitment to academic excellence remains steadfast, and we will continue to strive for higher levels of achievement for all our students. In 2024, our efforts showed remarkable progress. In our Accountability Rating Report our students improved from a 78 scale score to a 90 scale score in closing learning gaps for students, our student improved from a 71 scale score to and 82 scale score in Academic Growth. Our campus earned 3 Distinctions Designations: Academic Achievement in Science, Postsecondary Readiness, Top 25 Comparative Closing the Gaps. This highlights our ability to adapt and implement effective strategies that directly impact student learning outcomes.

As we look forward to the 2025 school year, we are optimistic about continuing our trajectory of growth. Our goal is to sustain at least a 5% increase in student achievement, building on the successes of previous years. We will continue to employ data-driven approaches, innovative teaching methods, and targeted interventions to support our students' academic progress.

Butterfield Elementary conducted beginning, middle and end of the year diagnostic assessment using IXL to capture data in order to make informed decision and tailor our educational strategies to effectively meet the diverse need of our students. Grade Level teachers and campus administration Data Walk after each Unit/Module assessment, the data is used to drive Tribe Time and individualize interventions.

Butterfield Elementary works to build a sense of community in order to retain strong staff. This past school year we retained all but one teacher.

To support the integration and development of new staff members, Sanger ISD has implemented a new Teacher Tribe Academy. This program takes place two days before the returning staff reports to campus and is designed to onboard new staff effectively. Additionally, new staff members are paired with mentors on their home campus, providing them with guidance and support as they transition into their new roles. This mentorship program is a testament to our commitment to fostering a supportive and collaborative professional community.

In an effort to remain competitive with neighboring small districts, Sanger ISD has made strides in increasing our pay scale. While our pay scale is still below that of larger nearby districts with more industry due to our tax base, we are committed to offering competitive compensation to attract and retain high-quality educators. This ongoing effort reflects our dedication to maintaining a strong and capable staff, which is essential for the continued success of our students and school community.

Butterfield staff is dedicated to creating a "tribe" environment, where all staff feel valued. We understand the importance of strong professional development, school leadership, workload, and the overall school climate lead to strong retention rates. Butterfield Elementary adheres to the curriculum and guidelines set forth by Sanger ISD, utilizing the HMH curriculum for Science and RLA, along with the Bluebonnet curriculum for Math. We are committed to following the expectations outlined in the Road to Success.

Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment Strengths

Our built-in intervention time, known as Tribe Time, focuses on meeting the academic needs of all students. This dedicated time enriches high-achieving students while also providing support for those who are struggling, fulfilling the requirements of House Bill 1416.

Additionally, we collaborate with district elementary campuses to ensure consistent instruction, create common unit assessments, and maintain vertical alignment across grade levels. To monitor progress, Butterfield employs both TPRI (Reading only for 1st and 2nd) and IXL diagnostics three times a year for Reading and Math. We also utilize STAAR benchmarks, unit assessments, and TEKS Checks to track and practice state TEKS and standards.

Our weekly Tribal Talks (PLC) provide an excellent opportunity for teachers to collaborate on instruction and track student growth effectively.
