Welcome,



Policy on Reporting the Annual Disclosure of Crime Statistics

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act, 20 U.S.C. § 1092(f) (the “Clery Act”), is a federal law that requires colleges and universities that receive federal financial assistance to disclose annually certain information about campus crime and safety and security policies. This Annual Security Report contains crime statistics for the three previous calendar years and information on safety and security, crime prevention, and campus law enforcement. The district’s Clery Act Compliance Officer and facilities staff prepare and distribute this report. They receive cooperation from other district departments, including Long Term Programs, Workforce and Economic Development, Student Services, and Human Resources, along with security and outside law enforcement agencies.

The crime statistics contained in this report include statistics for Clery Act crimes (identified in the Crime Information Section), including hazing, that were identified by or reported to the Executive Director of Facilities Development and Campus Safety (FD&CS), who is the Campus Security Authority (CSA). Contingent CSA’s include Associate Superintendent of Instruction and the Associate Superintendent of Business and Operations.

A written request for Clery Act crime statistics is made annually to all Campus Security Authorities. The CSA Compliance Officer requests crime statistics from law enforcement agencies and other building administrators over non-campus building and properties that are owned or controlled by the district, used in direct support of its educational purposes, and frequently used by students.

This report also contains statistics for weapons, drug, and liquor law violations that resulted in arrest or referral to a district official who initiated a disciplinary action (provided a record was kept and the proceeding may have resulted in the imposition of a sanction). The Associate

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Superintendent of Instruction and the Executive Director of Human Resources report disciplinary referral statistics to the Executive Director of FD&CS.

The District's Annual Security Report is published by October 1 each year. The report is available online at www.mntc.edu/content/campus-security-report. Copies of this report may also be obtained in person from the Executive Director of FD&CS at 4701 12th Ave NW Norman, OK 73070, or by calling (405) 801-5291. All enrolled students, faculty and staff are notified by mass communication push notification, social media posting, Student Handbook and Employee Handbook, and the school's website. The district posts the information to MNTC website for all applicants for admission, notifying the prospective students of the availability of the report, a description of its contents, and the opportunity to request a copy. Prospective faculty and staff may obtain a copy of the report from Human Resources, or by calling (405) 801-5151. In compliance with the Clery Act, the District annually discloses crime statistics to the United States Department of Education.

Plan Administrator

The Executive Director of FD&CS oversees the School Resources Officers (SROs) and sets best practices and procedures in place for the safety and security of the district. Deputies are on campus from 8am-10pm Monday-Thursday, 8am-5pm on Friday, and 8am-noon on Saturday. All district SROs have complete police authority apprehend and arrest anyone involved in illegal activities on campus in areas immediately adjacent to campus. Officers derive their police powers from 21 O.S. 2011, Section 99a1 5012. Violations of law by students, faculty, staff or others may result in the filing of criminal charges with the Cleveland County Courthouse.

Student, faculty, and staff misconduct (whether violations of law or district policy and whether occurring on or off campus) may also be referred for internal disciplinary action.

The Executive Director of FD&CS serves as the district's law enforcement liaison with local, state, and federal law enforcement officials and emergency management agencies.

The Facilities Department is not aware of any non-campus buildings or properties owned or controlled by any officially recognized student organizations. The district does not have housing therefore does not report these statistics.

How to Report a Crime

The district encourages the accurate and prompt reporting of all crimes to an SRO or school administrator. You may also submit a report in writing to Moore Norman Technology Center, Attention Executive Director of Facilities Development and Campus Safety, 4701 12th Ave. NW, Norman, OK 73070 or by email to jerry.mcconnell@mntc.edu.

Alleged violations of the district's Sex Discrimination, Sexual Misconduct, and Harassment Board Policy #418 may be reported to the Title IX Coordinators. For students, contact the Associate Superintendent of Instruction 405-801-5281, or for employees, contact the Executive Director of Human Resources at 405-801-5151. Other bias-related violations of district policy may be reported to the Executive Director of Strategic Communications and Engagement at 405-801-5051 or the Superintendent's Office at 405-801-5100. In case of an emergency contact the local police.

For the purpose of making timely warnings and the annual statistical disclosure, the district prefers that all crimes be reported in the manner described above.

Confidential Reporting

No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance.

The district offers several ways to report criminal activity while preserving privacy. Victims who do not wish to pursue campus disciplinary or criminal action, but who wish to document the details of an incident with the district, may file a report with the Executive Director of FD&CS and request that their names be withheld from the report. Crimes may be reported anonymously by calling the OSSI Tipline at 855-337-8300 or the School Security ProtectOK App <https://oklahoma.gov/dps/protect-ok-app.html>.

Individuals may also report sexual misconduct (which includes sexual assault, non-consensual fondling, non-consensual touching, sexual exploitation, and sexual harassment), relationship violence (which includes dating and domestic violence) and stalking to the Title IX Coordinator. The Title IX Coordinator will protect the privacy and confidentiality of the individuals involved in any report to the extent appropriate and allowed by law. The Title IX Coordinator will evaluate any request for confidentiality in the context of the district's responsibility to provide a safe and nondiscriminatory environment for all members of its community.

The amount of information detailing the alleged incident or identifying the alleged individual(s) responsible will determine the district's ability to respond. All reports of Clery Act crimes (even those reported anonymously) are counted and disclosed in the district's annual crime statistics, as appropriate.

The district does not have written procedures requiring professional counselors (who are exempt under federal law from the requirement to report crime statistics) to inform individuals to report crimes on a voluntary, confidential basis for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics. It is standard practice, however, for the district's professional counselors to discuss with their clients the various options (including anonymous reporting) for reporting criminal incidents.

Timely Warning

Clery Timely Warning notices will be issued to students and employees upon confirmation of a significant emergency, dangerous situation, or an incident or crime that would impact the campus community and/or the surrounding area.

This information may be disseminated to the campus community via a variety of mechanisms or mediums. MNTC will use one or more of the following means:

- Mass notification system
- PA announcement
- Electronic mail messages
- Text messaging to cell phones of those enrolled in the service
- Emergency website
- Other methods deemed necessary may be used in the information dissemination process.

The Marketing and Communications Department is responsible for all MNTC inside and outside communication outreaches.

The Timely Warning is issued through the district's mass notification system (School Messenger) to all students, faculty and staff by the Marketing and Communications Department. Campus-wide mass notifications are labeled with "TIMELY WARNING" in the subject line. Hearing impaired students receive text messages. All students must provide a cell phone number or indicate that they do not wish to provide one before they can register for classes. Faculty and staff are encouraged, but not required, to provide cell phone information for text alerts and emergency notifications.

Students, faculty, and staff are encouraged to read these alerts as soon as they receive them. Depending on the particular circumstances of the incident, an alert may also be posted on the MNTC Campus Safety webpage and/or on its Facebook and Twitter pages.

Timely Warnings will often ask students and staff for their help in gathering information about an incident or in identifying those responsible. Individuals are encouraged to notify an SRO or

contact the Executive Director of FD&CS by calling 405-801-5751, or in-person at 4701 12th Ave NW, Norman, OK 73070.

If there is an immediate threat to the health or safety of students or employees on campus, the district will follow its emergency notification procedures.

Program directors are instructed to report crimes promptly to a Campus Security Authority (CSA) so that the district may determine if a Timely Warning is warranted.

Emergency Notification

Moore Norman Technology Center uses School Messenger to notify students and employees when it is determined that there is a series of criminal activity, usually property crime related or other criminal activity that is not subject to the timely warning standard required by the Clery Act.

If the investigation confirms the existence of a significant emergency or dangerous situation that presents an immediate threat to the health or safety of students or the campus community, it will act immediately. The only reason the district would not immediately issue a notification for a confirmed emergency or dangerous situation is if (in the judgment of the Executive Director of FD&CS) doing so would compromise efforts to assist a victim, contain the emergency, respond to the emergency, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

The Executive Director of FD&CS determines the content of the notification and notifies the Executive Director of Marketing and Communications (or designee) to initiate an alert. The Executive Director of FD&CS will determine how much additional information is appropriate to disseminate at different points in time.

Examples of situations that may constitute the district's decision to issue a security alert include, but are not limited to:

- Situations where a series of crimes have occurred. Examples include, but are not limited to:
 - Burglaries (unoccupied rooms/buildings/structures)
 - Minor thefts
 - General criminal activity (fraudulent use of credit cards/forgeries)
 - Vehicle incidents (accidents/minor damage)

- Situations that cause major disruption to campus operations. Examples include, but are not limited to:
 - Chemical spills
 - Weather-related situations
 - Power outages
 - Water emergencies

The Executive Director of FD&CS encourages all students and staff to promptly report emergencies and dangerous situations to an SRO, or any school official or by calling 405-801-5000. Upon receiving a report the SRO will immediately investigate and respond to the situation.

Upon confirmation, the Executive Director of FD&CS immediately notifies the campus community or the appropriate segments of the community that may be affected by the situation. The entire campus community is notified when there is at least the potential that a very large segment of the community will be affected by a situation or when the situation threatens the operation of the campus as a whole. If the Executive Director of FD&CS notifies only the segment of the campus community that may be affected by the situation, they continue to assess the situation and notifies additional segments of the campus community if the situation warrants such action.

MNTC has redundant systems in place for communicating information quickly to the district community. Some or all these methods of communication may be activated in the event of an emergency or dangerous situation. The district notifies the campus community (or the appropriate segments of the campus community that are affected) through School Messenger.

All students should provide a cell phone number or indicate that they do not wish to provide one before they can register for classes. Faculty and staff are encouraged, but not required, to provide cell phone information for text alerts and emergency notifications.

Students, faculty and staff are encouraged to read these notifications as soon as they receive them. Depending on the circumstances of the incident, an emergency notification may also be posted on social media using Facebook or Twitter.

In the event of an emergency, all are encouraged to periodically check into this site to receive the most current updates.

Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

If the Executive Director of FD&CS determines that a building or area must be evacuated, the director will contact the appropriate personnel to advise them of the nature of the evacuation. The director will initiate and supervise the evacuation with the cooperation of other directors and assistant directors.

When an evacuation alarm sounds, individuals should evacuate the building calmly and quietly to a distance of at least 500 feet from the building and out of the way of emergency personnel. Individuals should not use the elevators because they may become inoperative. If possible, abled individuals should assist disabled individuals in exiting the building or to the

closest stairwell (and should notify safety officials of the disabled person's location). Disabled individuals who cannot use stairs should proceed to the closest stairwell and wait until help arrives. Individuals should not return to the building until instructed to do so by authorized personnel.

Flood or Severe Weather Emergency Response

In the event of a flood or weather emergency on or near campus, the Executive Director of FD&CS will receive advance notification from local agencies as to the extent and nature of the impending flood or weather emergency. Instructions for preparations and/or evacuations may be relayed from the Cleveland County Emergency Management to the campus community through the Executive Director of FD&CS.

The Communications & Marketing Department (in cooperation with the Executive Director of FD&CS) will send a mass announcement updating conditions to all students, faculty, and staff. The alert includes the nature of the emergency and instructions for preparation and/or evacuation if necessary.

Procedure to Test Emergency Response and Evacuation Procedures

All of the district's alerting methods are tested at least bi-annually to ensure all faculty, staff, and students are familiar with emergency alerts and what their individual roles are during an actual situation.

The Oklahoma Department of Education requires 10 drills each school year and one during the summer session. The drills consist of security, fire, tornado, earthquake, and other alike crisis. Fire drills are unannounced exercises. The purpose of evacuation drills is to prepare building occupants for an organized evacuation in case of an emergency. In addition to educating occupants of each building about evacuation procedures during the drills, the process also provides the safety office with an opportunity to test the operation of fire alarm system components.

Evacuation drills are monitored to evaluate egress and behavioral patterns. Reports are prepared by the Safety Coordinator and identify deficient equipment so that repairs can be made immediately. Recommendations for improvements are also submitted to the appropriate departments for consideration. The Safety Coordinator documents each test it conducts, including a description of the test, the date the test was held, the time the test started and ended, and whether the test was announced or unannounced.

Daily Crime Log

The SROs maintain a daily crime log. It is available during business hours at 4701 12th Ave NW, Norman, OK 73070. The log is updated within two days of an incident and is available upon request.

Security of and Access to Facilities

During business hours, MNTC is open to the public. During off-hours the campus buildings and gates are locked.

The Facilities Department oversees the buildings, grounds, and utility systems for the campus. Security service needs (including, but not limited to, inoperable doors, burned out lights, malfunctioning smoke alarms, and broken windows) receive priority. Emergencies and after-hours safety issues are reported to the Executive Director of FD&CS. The Facilities Department routinely surveys campus lighting and identify/reports deficiencies found, such as inadequate illumination and defective fixtures to the appropriate personnel for corrective action.

Preventing and Responding to Sexual Assault, Stalking, Dating Violence, and Domestic Violence

Training and Education

MNTC provides information and training for students and employees to assist in the awareness of the district's response and resources for those who have experienced sexual assault, stalking, dating violence and domestic violence.

These initiatives include the following:

1. A statement that the district prohibits sexual assault, stalking, dating violence and domestic violence;
2. The definition of sexual assault, stalking, dating violence and domestic violence under Oklahoma law; the definition of consent under Oklahoma law;
3. Procedures victims should follow if a crime of sexual assault, stalking, dating violence or domestic violence has occurred (including the importance of preserving evidence, how and to whom the alleged offense should be reported, options to notify law enforcement authorities, the option to be assisted by campus personnel in notifying authorities, and the option to decline to notify authorities);
4. Options for no-contact orders and orders of protection issued by local courts;
5. Information about how the district will protect confidentiality; and statements that
 - a. The district will provide written notification about counseling, mental health, victim advocacy, legal assistance, and other referral services to victims and
 - b. The district will provide:
 - i. Written notification to victims about options for and available assistance in changing academic, transportation, and working situations if so

- requested and reasonably available, regardless of whether the victim chooses to report the crime to law enforcement authorities and
- ii. An explanation of the procedures for campus disciplinary action. In addition, the district informs students and employees that it will provide a written explanation of rights and options to students and employees who report offenses.
- c. The district will also inform students and employees that disciplinary proceedings will:
- i. Include a prompt, fair, and impartial process from the initial investigation to the final result,
 - ii. Be conducted by officials who at a minimum receive annual training on issues related to sexual assault, stalking, dating violence and domestic violence and how to conduct an investigation and hearing process that protects the safety of victims and promotes accountability,
 - iii. Provide the victim and alleged offender with the same opportunity to have others present, including the opportunity to be accompanied to any related meeting or proceeding by an adviser of their choice and
 - iv. Simultaneously notify, in writing, both parties of the result of any disciplinary proceeding, procedures for appeal, any change to the result, and when the result becomes final. Students and employees will be informed that the district will not limit the choice of adviser or presence in any meeting or disciplinary proceeding, except that the district has established restrictions regarding the extent to which the adviser may participate in the proceedings.

Long Term Programs will offer a Rape Aggression Defense (R.A.D.) class and a Self- Defense Awareness Familiarization Exchange (S.A.F.E.) class. These educational awareness, crime-victim prevention programs provide individuals with information that may reduce their risk of exposure to violence and introduce them to the physical aspects of self-defense.

Reporting and Confidentiality

The district has procedures in place to support those who report sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking, including informing individuals about their right to file criminal charges as well as written notification concerning the availability of resources such as counseling, health, mental health, victim advocacy, legal assistance, and other services on and/or off campus. Remedies to prevent contact between a complainant and an accused party (such as academic and transportation) may be requested and will be offered, if reasonably available. The district will make such accommodations if the victim requests them and if they are reasonably available, regardless of whether the victim chooses to report the incident to the Executive Director of Facilities Development and Campus Safety or local law enforcement.

Any individual who has witnessed or been the victim of criminal activity, including sex offenses, should immediately report the incident to the Executive Director of FD&CS, SRO and/or local law enforcement (911). This will increase safety and allow for critical evidence to be preserved. Any member of the administrative team will help report sexual offenses to law enforcement upon the student's request.

These resources will protect privacy and confidentiality to the extent appropriate and allowed by law, but they are required to inform the Title IX Coordinator of any reports. The Title IX Coordinator will evaluate any request for confidentiality in the context of the district's responsibility to provide a safe and nondiscriminatory environment to all members of its community.

Title IX Coordinators and Campus Security Authority are located at 4701 12th Ave NW, Norman, OK 73069.

The District's Title IX Coordinators are responsible for overseeing all reports of sexual misconduct including relationship violence and stalking and identifying and addressing any patterns or systemic problems that arise during review of such reports. Allegations of sexual misconduct, relationship violence, and stalking may be reported directly to the Title IX Coordinator. The Title IX Coordinator can answer questions and provide information concerning this plan, available resources and support services, and external criminal and legal options. An alleged victim who wishes to initiate disciplinary proceedings should submit a complaint to the Title IX Coordinator. Complaints will be handled consistently with the district's applicable policies and procedures plans.

After an incident of sexual assault and/or domestic violence, the victim should consider seeking medical attention. For immediate and urgent medical concerns, go directly to the nearest hospital.

In Oklahoma, evidence may be collected even if you choose not to make a report to law enforcement. If you do not wish to make a report to law enforcement, please notify the hospital's qualified registered nurse examiner. It is important that victims of sexual assault do not bathe, douche, smoke, change clothing or clean the bed/linen/area where they were assaulted. If the offense occurred within the past 120 hours, it is important to preserve evidence which will assist law enforcement in proving that the alleged criminal offense occurred/or is occurring or may be helpful in obtaining a protection order.

In circumstances of sexual assault, if victims do not opt for forensic evidence collection, health care providers can still treat injuries and take steps to address concerns of pregnancy and/or sexually transmitted disease. Victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, stalking, and dating violence are encouraged to also preserve evidence by saving text messages, instant messages, social networking pages, other communications, and keeping pictures, logs or other copies of documents, if they have any, that would be useful to district hearing boards/investigators or police.

Although the district strongly encourages all members to report violations of this policy to law enforcement, it is the victim's choice whether or not to make such a report and victims have the right to decline involvement with the police. The district will assist any victim with notifying local police if they desire.

If you have been the victim of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking, you should report the incident promptly to the appropriate Title IX Coordinator.

As time passes, evidence may dissipate or become lost or unavailable, thereby making investigation, possible prosecution, disciplinary proceedings, or obtaining protection from abuse orders related to the incident more difficult. If a victim chooses not to make a complaint regarding an incident, he or she nevertheless should consider speaking with a School Resource Officer or other law enforcement to preserve evidence in the event that the victim changes her/his mind later.

If a report of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault or stalking is reported to the district, the procedures will be used that the district will follow as well as a statement of the standard of evidence that will be used during any disciplinary hearing on campus arising from such a report. For detailed procedures involving student perpetrators, see the Student Affairs Sexual Misconduct Policy at The Higher Education Act (HEA), as amended by the Higher Education Opportunity Act (HEOA), specified additional campus safety requirements in the following areas: hate crime reporting, emergency response and evacuation procedures and missing student notification policies. Disciplinary Proceedings to Resolve Allegations of Sexual Assault, Dating Violence, Domestic Violence, and Stalking

MNTC disciplinary proceedings provide a prompt, fair, and impartial process from the initial investigation to the final result. The proceedings are conducted by officials who (i) receive at least annual training on issues related to sexual assault, stalking, dating violence, and domestic violence and on how to conduct an investigation and hearing process that protects the safety of victims and promotes accountability and (ii) do not have a conflict of interest or bias for or against the victim or alleged offender.

The proceedings will provide the victim and alleged offender with the same opportunity to have others present, including the opportunity to be accompanied to any related meeting or proceeding by the adviser of their choice. The district does not limit the choice of adviser or

presence in any meeting or disciplinary proceeding, except that it has established certain restrictions regarding the extent to which the adviser may participate in the proceedings.

The district simultaneously notifies in writing both parties of the result of any disciplinary proceeding, procedures for appeal, any change to the result, and when the result becomes final.

Disciplinary proceedings are completed within reasonably prompt time frames designated by each policy (student, faculty, and staff). Time frames may be extended for good cause with written notice to the victim and alleged offender of the delay and the reason for the delay. Proceedings are conducted in a manner that is consistent with the district's policies and transparent to the victim and alleged offender, includes timely notice of meetings at which the victim or alleged offender, or both, may be present, and provides timely access to the victim, the alleged offender, and appropriate officials to any information that will be used during informal and formal disciplinary meetings and hearings.

Following an allegation of sexual assault, stalking, dating violence, or domestic violence, the Title IX Coordinator, Human Resources and/or the Associate Superintendent of Instruction will take appropriate interim measures to protect the victim. These measures may include, but are not limited to, the imposition of a no-contact order and/or employment, transportation, and academic modifications. The Associate Superintendent of Instruction, or designee, may limit a student's access to certain district facilities or activities pending resolution of the matter. The Associate Superintendent of Instruction may impose an interim suspension pending the resolution of an alleged violation when it is necessary in order to protect the safety and well-being of members of the MNTC community.

Complaints Against Students

Procedures for resolving complaints against students are outlined in the Student Discipline section of the student handbook <https://www.flipsnack.com/moorenorman/2025-2026-mntc-student-handbook/full-view.html>

To initiate an Investigation, the complainant must submit a written statement to the Title IX Coordinator that contains:

- The name of the alleged offender (the "respondent"), if known,
- A description of the alleged violation, and
- The date, approximate time, and location of the alleged violation, if known.

The Title IX Coordinator provides the complainant with a copy of the district's Discrimination, Harassment and Retaliation Policy, reviews procedures, and informs the complainant of available resources, support services, and options, including the option to be assisted by an adviser of choice.

The Title IX Coordinator meets with the respondent to notify the respondent that a complaint has been filed and will be investigated. The Title IX Coordinator provides the respondent with

a copy of the policy, reviews procedures, and informs the respondent of available resources, support services and options, including the option to be assisted by an adviser of choice.

After a complaint is filed, the investigator conducts an investigation and prepares an investigative report, which may be accompanied by supporting documentation or items (for example, statements or photographs). The investigator will then contact the Associate Superintendent of Instruction and possibly the district's attorney to determine further actions. For questions concerning the hearing process, disciplinary probation, deferred suspension, suspension, expulsion, and other corrective action contact the Title IX Coordinator.

Complaints Against Faculty and Staff Members

Complaints against faculty or staff members should be submitted to the Human Resources Title IX Coordinator. Procedures for resolving complaints against staff members are outlined in the Employee handbook.

Notification of Results of Disciplinary Hearings

The district will, upon written request, disclose to the alleged victim of a crime of violence or non-forcible sex offense the results of disciplinary proceedings conducted by the district against a student who is the alleged perpetrator. If the crime resulted in the victim's death, the district will disclose the results, upon written request, to the victim's next of kin.

Sex Offender Registration

Oklahoma Title 57, Sections 581-590.2 and Title 21, Section 1125 of the Oklahoma State Statutes, requires the Department of Corrections to create and maintain a registry of persons who have either been convicted of, entered a plea of guilty to, or adjudicated delinquent of certain sex offenses. Information provided by the State concerning registered sex offenders may be obtained through the <https://sors.doc.ok.gov/ords/svorp/sors/r/sors/disclaimer> or by calling 405-425-2607.

Alcohol and Drugs

The possession, use and sale of alcohol on the district's campus are governed by the districts' drug and alcohol policies (found in the MNTC Student Handbook), the Drug-Free School/Workplace Policy (found in the MNTC Staff and Faculty Handbooks) and Oklahoma law. The enforcement of alcohol laws and policies on campus is the primary responsibility of Educational Services and Long Term Programs.

Under Oklahoma law, it is a felony to furnish alcohol to a person under the age of 21. It is also unlawful for anyone under 21 years of age to purchase, possess or consume alcohol.

Individuals who violate alcohol laws may have charges filed against them with the Cleveland County Courthouse and/or face District disciplinary action.

The possession, sale, manufacture, or distribution of any controlled substance is illegal under both state and federal laws and violates the Drug-Free School/Workplace policy (found in the Student and Employee Handbooks). The enforcement of drug laws and policies on campus is the primary responsibility of Educational Services and Long Term Programs. Individuals violating drug laws may have criminal charges filed against them with the Cleveland County Courthouse and/or face district disciplinary action.

Faculty and staff members who violate the Drug-Free School/Workplace policy may be referred to the employee assistance program and/or disciplined, up to and including termination. MNTC complies with the requirements of the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act Amendments of 1989.

Drug and Alcohol Abuse Education Programs Prevention Programs

The district provides educational programming to prevent the unlawful possession, use, and distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol by students, faculty and staff. The program provides services related to drug use and abuse, including dissemination of informational materials, educational programs, counseling referrals, and disciplinary actions.

Educational Services provides annual educational program concerning alcohol and drug use and abuse for students. Programs offer self-assessment geared towards helping students explore their patterns of alcohol and drug use.

The district also sponsors occasional educational programming open to all MNTC community members relating to illegal drug use.

Weapons Policy

Possession or storage, even if legally owned, of weapons, explosives, fireworks, ammunition, or other materials that could be harmful to the members of the community is prohibited. The district recognizes certain exceptions to this policy, including use by authorized law enforcement personnel.

The new Oklahoma Self-Defense Act, 21 O.S. 1277 (D) allows adults in possession of a valid concealed handgun license to store such a handgun in a locked trunk on a Career Technology campus effective November 1, 2011. Questions relating to this act can be sent to the Executive Director of FD&CS at 405-801-5751. In all other instances, firearms and other weapons and destructive devices are prohibited in, on, or at district property, district-sponsored activities or district-related activities.

Campus Security Awareness and Prevention Programs for Students, Faculty and Staff

The district offers security awareness and prevention programs for students, faculty and staff. Long Term Programs also provides written information to students, faculty and staff concerning crime prevention and other topics leaders that addresses sexual assault, relationship violence, staking, alcohol, depression, self-harm, suicide and emergency preparedness.

Hazing Awareness and Disclosure

It is the policy of this school district that no student or employee of the district shall participate in or be a member of any secret fraternity or secret organization that is in any degree related to the school or a school activity. No student organization or any person associated with any organization sanctioned or authorized by the Board of Education shall engage in or participate in hazing.

For the purposes of this policy, hazing is defined as an activity that recklessly or intentionally endangers the mental or physical health or safety of a student for the purpose of initiation, admission, or affiliation with any organization sanctioned or authorized by the Board of Education.

“Endanger the physical health” shall include, but is not limited to, any brutality of a physical nature such as a whipping, beating, branding; forced calisthenics; exposure to the elements; forced consumption of any food, alcoholic beverage, drug, or controlled dangerous substance; or other forced physical activity which could adversely affect the physical health or safety of the individual.

“Endanger the mental health” shall include any activity, except those activities authorized by law, which would subject the individual to extreme mental stress, such as prolonged sleep deprivation, prolonged exclusion from social contact, forced conduct which could result in extreme embarrassment, or any other forced activity which could adversely affect mental health or dignity.

Any hazing activity, upon which the initiation or admission into or affiliation with an organization sanctioned or authorized by the Board of Education is conditioned, directly or indirectly, shall be presumed to be a forced activity, even if the student willingly participates in such activity.

Students violating these prohibitions shall not be permitted to participate in any extra-curricular activity sponsored by the technology center, shall be subject to disciplinary measures, which may include suspension or removal, and shall, when appropriate, be referred to local law enforcement authorities for prosecution.

Student Organizations that violate these prohibitions shall forfeit all rights, privileges, and recognition from the technology center for a minimum of one (1) year and shall be referred to local law enforcement authorities for prosecution. Hazing will be dealt with as outlined in the Code of Student Conduct. Technology center employees who are linked to hazing shall be subject to discipline – including dismissal or non-renewal.

The district will include hazing statistics reported in the Jeanne Clery annual security report and post twice each year (July and December) on the technology center website The Campus Hazing Transparency Report on documented violations.

Crime Statistical Disclosure

Crime Definitions

- *Criminal Activity.* Criminal activity is defined as any conduct which violates a local, state or federal law. Examples include, but are not limited to, all forms of homicide, assault, battery, robbery, theft, arson, property crimes, hate crimes, weapons violations, and drug/alcohol violations as described in Policy No#592 Campus Safety and the Jeanne Clery Act.
- *Murder/Non-negligent Manslaughter.* the willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.
- *Negligent Manslaughter.* the killing of another person through gross negligence.
- *Sex Offense.* are a type of criminal activity and are defined as unwelcome conduct of a sexual nature. Sex offenses commonly include stalking, rape, and acquaintance rape. Sex offenses may include other misconduct, whether violent or nonviolent, if the conduct is unwelcome and is of a sexual nature.
- *Rape.* The penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim.
- *Fondling.* The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, without the consent of the victim, including instances where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her age or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.
- *Incest.* Sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.
- *Statutory Rape.* Sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.
- *Robbery.* The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.
- *Aggravated Assault.* An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great

bodily harm. (It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.)

- *Burglary.* The unlawful entry into a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.
- *Motor Vehicle Theft.* The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned—including joyriding.)
- *Arson.* Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, or personal property of another, etc.

Hate Crimes

A hate crime is a criminal offense committed against a person or property which is motivated, in whole or in part, by the offender's bias. Bias is a preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of people based on their race, gender, religion, disability, sexual orientation or ethnicity/national origin.

Categories of bias included in the annual statistical disclosure are:

- *Race.* A preformed negative attitude toward a group of persons who possess common physical characteristics (e.g., color of skin, eyes, and/or hair; facial features, etc.) genetically transmitted by descent and heredity which distinguish them as a distinct division of humankind (e.g., Asians, blacks, whites).
- *Gender.* A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons because those persons are male or female.
- *Religion.* A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons who share the same religious beliefs regarding the origin and purpose of the universe and the existence or nonexistence of a supreme being (e.g., Catholics, Jews, Protestants, atheists).
- *Sexual orientation.* A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons based on their sexual attraction toward, and responsiveness to, members of their own sex or members of the opposite sex (e.g., gays, lesbians, heterosexuals).
- *Ethnicity.* A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons of the same race or national origin who share common or similar traits, languages, customs and traditions (e.g., Arabs, Hispanics).
- *Disability.* A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons based on their physical or mental impairments/challenges, whether such disability is temporary or permanent, congenital or acquired by heredity, accident, injury, advanced age or illness.
- *Gender Identity.* A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward group of persons based on their actual or perceived gender identity, e.g., bias against transgender or

gender non-conforming individuals. For purposes of the annual statistical disclosure, hate crimes include any Clery-reportable offense (listed above) and the following additional offenses.

- *National Origin.* A preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a person or group of persons because of the person's, or the person's ancestor's, place of origin, or because an individual has the physical, cultural or linguistic characteristics of a national origin group.

For purposes of the annual statistical disclosure, hate crimes include any Clery-reportable offense (listed above) and the following additional offenses:

- *Larceny-Theft.* The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Constructive possession is the condition in which a person does not have physical custody or possession, but is in a position to exercise dominion or control over a thing.
- *Simple Assault.* The unlawful physical attack by one person upon another where neither the offender displays a weapon, nor the victim suffers obvious severe or aggravated bodily injury involving apparent broken bones, loss of teeth, possible internal injury, severe laceration, or loss of consciousness.
- *Intimidation.* Unlawfully placing another person in reasonable fear of bodily harm through the use of threatening words and/or other conduct, but without displaying a weapon or subjecting the victim to actual physical attack.
- *Destruction/Damage/Vandalism of Property.* Willfully or maliciously destroying, damaging, defacing, or otherwise injuring real or personal property without the consent of the owner or the person having custody or control over it.
- Other Crimes Involving Bodily Injury.

Dating Violence, Domestic Violence, & Stalking

Dating Violence. Violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim. The existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on the reporting party's statement and with consideration of the length of the relationship, the type of relationship, and the frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship.

Domestic Violence. A felony or misdemeanor crime of violence committed by (i) a current or former spouse or intimate partner of the victim; (ii) by a person with whom the victim shares a child in common; (iii) by a person who is cohabitating with or has cohabitated with the victim as a spouse or intimate partner; (iv) by a person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction in which the crime of violence occurred, or (v) by any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person's acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction in which the crime of violence occurred.

Stalking. Engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to (i) fear for the person's safety or the safety of others; or (ii) to suffer substantial emotional distress.

Arrests and Referrals

Arrest and referral statistics include the number of arrests and the number of persons referred for disciplinary action for the following violations:

- *Liquor law violations.* The violation of state or local laws prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession or use of alcoholic beverages, not including driving under the influence and drunkenness.
- *Drug law violations.* The violation of laws prohibiting the production, distribution and/or use of certain controlled substances and the equipment or devices utilized in their preparation and/or use. The unlawful cultivation, manufacture, distribution, sale, purchase, use, possession, transportation or importation of any controlled drug or narcotic substance. Arrests for violations of state and local laws, specifically those relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing and making of narcotic drugs.
- *Weapon law violations.* The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, purchase, transportation, possession, concealment, or use of firearms, cutting instruments, explosives, incendiary devices or other deadly weapons.
- *Hazing.* Includes intentional, knowing, or reckless acts committed by a person (whether individually or in concert with other persons) against another person or persons regardless of the willingness of such other person or persons to participate, that is committed in the course of an initiation into, an affiliation with, or the maintenance of membership in, a student organization.

Geographical Definitions

- *On Campus.* Any building or property owned or controlled by an institution within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area and used by the institution in direct support of, or in a manner related to, the institution's educational purposes and any building or property that is within or reasonably contiguous the aforementioned area that is owned by the institution but controlled by another person, is frequently used by students, and supports institutional purposes (such as a food or other retail vendor).
- *Non Campus Building or Property.* Any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization that is officially recognized by the institution; or any building or property owned or controlled by the institution that is used in direct support of, or in relation to, the institution's educational purposes, is frequently used by students, and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution.

- *Public Property.* All public property, including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities, that is within the campus, or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus.

Unfounded Crime Reports

An “unfounded crime report” is one that has been fully investigated by sworn or commissioned law enforcement personnel and, based on the results of the full investigation and evidence, the sworn or commissioned law enforcement personnel have made a formal determination that the crime report is false or baseless and therefore “unfounded.”
