



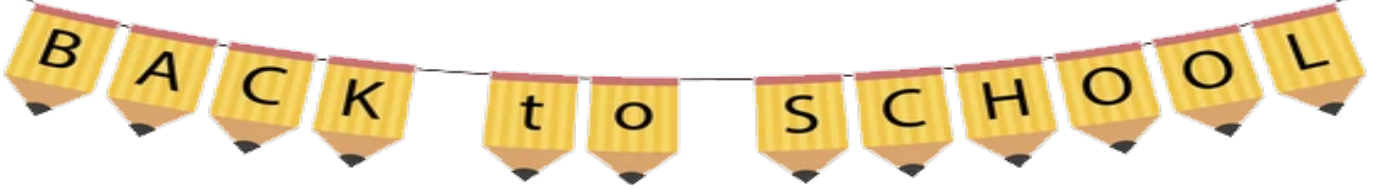

Our learners have made progress on their New Jersey Student Learning Assessments and New Jersey Graduation Proficiency Assessment. Family engagement, one-on-one intervention, attendance review committees, and positive reinforcement and incentive programs, have all led to improvements in our attendance rates and reducing chronic absenteeism.

Paterson Public Schools is pleased to report measurable improvements in student attendance district-wide from the 2023-2024 school year to the 2024-2025 school year thanks to multiple concerted efforts and on-going collaboration among schools, families, and the community.

The district’s chronic absenteeism fell by 3.57 percentage points last school year, and its daily attendance is now above 90 percent. The above chart shows the most improved schools in daily attendance and decreased chronic absenteeism by operational unit.

Senator Frank Lautenberg School (formerly School 6) is a positive example of the district’s progress as it saw average daily attendance increase from 86.59 percent in 2023-2024 to 90.97 percent in 2024-2025, a 4.38 percentage point improvement. Additionally, the school’s chronic absenteeism rate went down by nearly 20 percent in a single school year from 54 percent to just under 35 percent.

Additionally, Anna landoli Early Learning Center, School 8, Dale Avenue School, and Alexander Hamilton Academy registered impressive marks in their respective operational units. Alonzo “Tambua” Moody Academy posted the best marks in both attendance rate and chronic absenteeism in Unit IV.

The district’s approach that addresses both school-based and community factors helped lead to these improved numbers. Paterson Public Schools has expanded its school-based intervention teams, which connect directly with families to understand why a student might be missing school. The district also introduced incentive programs that celebrate students’ efforts. Attendance workshops, robo-calls, and school-based meetings ensure families stay informed and connected. The district actively utilizes Compulsory Attendance Specialists (CAS) to follow up with students and address attendance concerns. At the same time, Paterson Public Schools is strengthening partnerships that connect families to housing, health, and social services, addressing the real-life barriers that too often keep students from coming to school.

## USING DATA TO REACH & TEACH EVERY CHILD

Administrators and teachers from Alexander Hamilton Academy, Senator Frank Lautenberg School, and School 13 welcomed Dr. Tracey Severens, a nationally recognized educator and owner of Teach 4 Results, to learn how to lead an inquiry based approach to data analysis. This work is intended to engage both staff and students with the goal of improving the academic performance of every child.

A three-part series that will continue into October, the program also helps establish data captains in each of the participating schools. Those captains will then bring what they learned to their Professional Learning Communities throughout the year as the staff focuses on ensuring that each and every student is making meaningful progress towards academic success.

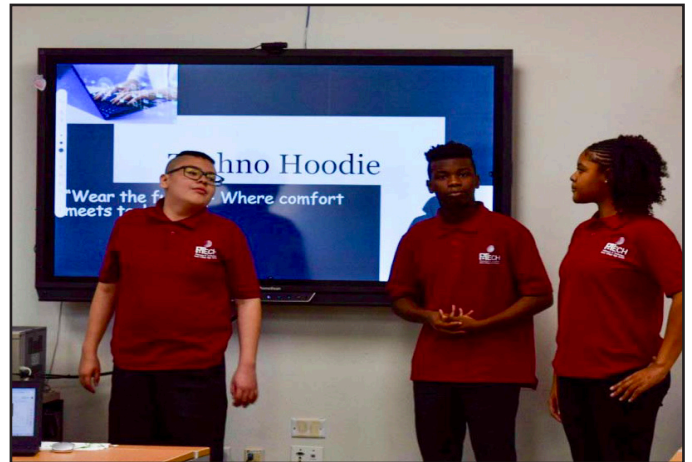
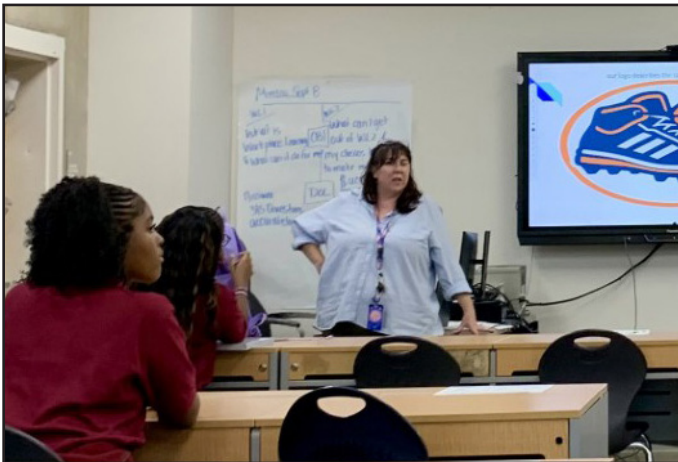
## SCHOOL 5 LEADERSHIP HOLDS MEET & GREET WITH FAMILIES

## P-TECH SUMMER BRIDGE PROGRAM SHOWCASES STUDENT INNOVATION



Each summer, Paterson P-Tech High School hosts a Summer Bridge Program to welcome and prepare rising 9th graders for the transition to high school. Over three days, students engage in orientation activities, team-building exercises, and group assignments designed to foster collaboration and creativity.

The highlight of the program is the culminating project, where student teams develop original products complete with logos, designs, marketing campaigns, targeted demographics, and business plans. Their work concludes with presentations before a panel of corporate professionals who serve as “sharks,” offering real-world feedback and even mock offers to “invest” in the students’ companies. This year’s judges represented leading organizations including Verizon, AZ Venture, NBC, MI Technical Solutions, and CliftonLarsonAllen (CLA).

The final presentations were held on September 5th, the second day of school. The students impressed the judges with their ingenuity, teamwork, and professional-level presentations, setting a strong tone for the school year ahead.
