Attendance - Preschool/Kinder

Help Your Child Succeed in Preschool and Kindergarten Build the Habit of Good Attendance

DID YOU KNOW...


Showing up on time every day is important to your child's success and learning from preschool forward.

Missing 10% of school (1 or 2 days every few weeks) can make it harder to:

- Gain early reading and math skills.
- · Build relationships.
- Develop good attendance habits.

High quality preschool and kindergarten has many benefits!

- · The routines your child develops will continue throughout school.
- Make the most of early grades by encouraging your child to attend every day.



Attendance-Transitional K/Kinder

Everyday Counts!

Show Up, Shine Bright!

Talk about it - sing about it - make it an adventure!

- Set a regular bedtime and morning routine.
- · Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- · Share ideas with other parents for getting to school on time.

Before the school year starts

- · Find out what day school starts and begin a countdown!
- Make sure your child has the required shots.
- Attend orientation with your child to meet teachers and classmates and find out about health and safety procedures.

Ready, Set, GO!


- If you are concerned your child may have a contagious illness, call your school or health care provider for advice. Ask for resources to continue learning at home if needed.
- · Ask family members or neighbors for assistance if you need help.
- Try to schedule non-urgent medical appointments and extended trips when school is not in session.
- If your child seems anxious about going to preschool, talk to the program director, teacher, your doctor or other parents for advice.
 Make sure the program is a good fit for your child.

Attendance - Elementary

DID YOU KNOW?

- Starting in preschool and kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school.
- Missing 10%, or about 2 days each month over the course of a school year, can make it harder to learn to read.
- Students can still fall behind if they miss just one or two days every few weeks.
- Being late to school may lead to poor attendance.
- Absences and tardiness can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up.

Attending school regularly helps children feel better about school—and themselves. Start building this habit in preschool so they learn right away that going to school on time, every day is important. Eventually good attendance will be a skill that will help them succeed in high school and college.



Attendance - Elementary

Everyday Counts!

Show Up, Shine Bright!

- Set a regular bedtime and morning routine.
- Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- Keep your child healthy and make sure your child has the required shots.
- Introduce your children to their teachers and classmates before school starts.
- Develop backup plans for getting to school if something comes up.
 Call on a family member, a neighbor, or another parent.
- Try to schedule non-urgent related medical appointments and extended trips when school isn't in session.
- If your child seems anxious about going to school, talk to teachers, school counselors and other parents for advice on how to make your child feel comfortable and excited about learning.
- If you are concerned that your child may have a contagious illness, call your school or health care provider for advice.
- If your child must stay home due to illness, ask the teacher for resources and ideas to continue learning at home.

Student Absences

Excused Absences

- Illness,
- Medical,
- Dental,
- Court Appointments,
- Attendance at Funeral Services of an Immediate Family Member,
- Time Spent With an Immediate Family Member on Leave from Active Duty,
- Quarantine, or
- Religious Holidays

When to Stay Home

- Temperature of 100 degrees or more (must be fever free without fever-reducing medications for 24 hours)
- Excessive coughing, persistent runny nose with yellow-green mucus discharge
- Rashes (unless a note from a doctor indicates otherwise) until the rash is non-contagious
- Vomit/Diarrhea (must be able to keep food and liquids down for 24 hours)

If your child is absent due to illness for 3 or more days, please contact the school office or your child's teacher to request an Independent Study which will provide continuity of learning and recover absences.

Independent Study

- Independent Study is an alternative for students who are absent from school as a way to recover absences (from 1 - 15 max. school days).
- Parents may contact the school to request an Independent Study
 Agreement to sign and work will be provided to the student. (subject to
 principal approval)
- The work will be provided by the classroom teacher(s) either through google classroom or through individual work sent home to complete. Students should complete the work as soon as possible after returning from the absence.
- When the completed work is completed, the teacher(s) will review the work to determine if the work is completed satisfactorily and receive credit to recover absences.

STOP

Pause. Take a breath. Avoid acting on impusle



THINK

What is the problem? What are the options? What is the best path forward?



ACT

Proceed with the best option. Act carefully and revise if needed.




REVIEW

Review what worked and what didn't. Make a plan for when you encounter the emotional situation next time.

District Policy - Homework

- A purposeful and meaningful extension of classroom learning not to exceed 10 minutes daily per grade level (plus 20 minutes for recreational reading)
- The student's responsibility is to complete assignments independently; however, parent support as a resource is encouraged
- Students with excused absences shall be given the opportunity to make up assignments
- Students may be assigned long-term projects, research reports, and/or problem-solving activities
- Teachers will coordinate assignments in an attempt to balance the amount assigned daily

Brain Development

Why Read Aloud?

Love of Reading

Parents that read aloud demonstrate that reading is important, that reading is pleasurable, that reading is valued.

Bonding

Is there anything better than sharing a good book with a child in your lap?

Literacy Skills

Vocabulary. Phonics. Familiarity with the printed word. Storytelling. Comprehension.

Reading aloud is invaluable for building literacy skills.

Why Read Alouds?

Reading aloud from novels and chapter books fosters a range of essential skills.

- social/emotional growth
- reading comprehension
- relationship building
- build a love of reading

3 STEPS TO VOLUNTEERING

Step 1 - Complete the online application

Link here: Volunteer Application

- Tier 2 for classroom/PTO volunteer (no fingerprinting)
- Tier 1 for classroom/PTO & field trip chaperone (fingerprinting required)



Step 2 - Upload current TB Test/Questionnaire - Contact school for TB Test options **Note: TB Tests/Questionnaires are good for 4 years from the date read/signed.

If you wish to chaperone on field trips (Tier 1), please continue to Step 3 below:

<u>Step 3</u> - Obtain a fingerprint form from the Ocean View School District C fice or Star View Office. You will be provided with a list of locations to complete your fingerprinting. (Fingerprint clearances can take up to two week)

Note: Fingerprint clearances do not expire

Please wait for an email indicating that you are an approved volunteer.

After you are approved, please work with your child's classroom teacher or our PTO for volunteering opportunities.


