COMMUNITY

Del Campo High School was established in 1963 and is located in the suburban community of Fair Oaks. Fair Oaks is located in Sacramento County, 12 miles east of the state capital in downtown Sacramento, California.

SCHOOL

Del Campo High School is one of nine comprehensive public high schools in the San Juan Unified School District. Del Campo places a strong emphasis on college preparatory courses and provides exemplary academic, career, athletic, and extra-curricular programs. Del Campo has five Career Technical Education (CTE) pathways: Broadcast and Video Productions (DC Daily)-a SEVA award-winning live broadcast, with awards including a first place in documentary and school newscast. Center For Entrepreneurship, which runs a 501(C)(3) non-profit organization, Kids Helping Kids (KHK). KHK serves to help young children with various needs ranging from college-bound foster/homeless students in need of computers, to pediatric cancer patients. Construction and Remodeling, where students get hands-on experience learning a variety of trade skills. This pathway is in it's third year as a California Partnership Academy called DC Build. Fire Technician/Emergency Medical Response, a pathway where students gain firsthand knowledge in fire science and CPR. Lastly we have our Digital Animation pathway. Other standout programs at Del Campo include the Del Campo Air Force ROTC, which has been ranked as one of the top in the nation and is consistently recognized as a "Distinguished Unit"; the Decamhian is one of the most highly regarded yearbooks in the country and has earned many major awards in scholastic journalism; student government; AVID program; Link Crew, IYT, and a diverse club list. Also, with over 50% of our student body participating in athletics, Del Campo provides a comprehensive athletic program in the CIF San Joaquin Section.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES

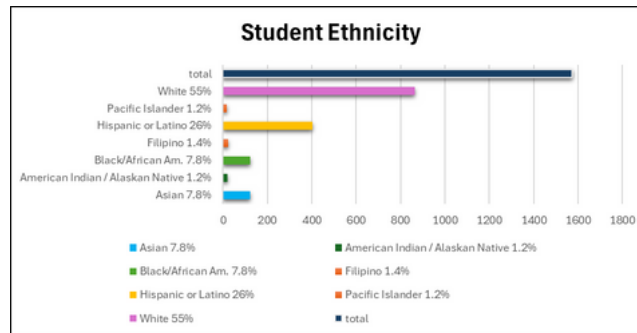

BLOCK SYSTEM

The school operates on a four-by-four block system. There are two blocks in the school year with four courses per block. Each block is 18 weeks with each course equivalent to a year's worth of study that is similar to the traditional two semester school. Within each block are two terms which last 9 weeks. Each term (9 weeks) is equivalent to one semester. Most courses are 18 weeks (one block or two terms) while others are 9 weeks only one term). Each term students earn 5 credits for each course/10 per block. Students can earn up to 320 credits by their senior year with a required minimum of 280.

MARKING/GRADING SYSTEM

Four-point scale of A=4, B=3, C=2, D=1, and F=0. Honors and Advanced Placement add one grade point for each class of C grade or better. Both weighted and un-weighted grades are reflected on the transcript, as well as a state GPA that excludes all ninth grade, physical education and ROTC grades. Courses taken at a community college may appear on the transcript. San Juan Unified District Schools do not report, nor include, student class rank on student transcripts.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

280 credits are required for students to graduate from Del Campo for four years. Classes completed with a grade of D- or better earn 5 credits per term/semester. The San Juan USD has adopted new graduation requirements beginning with the class of 2023.

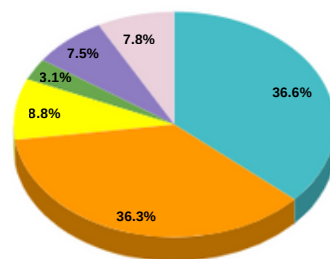
