EPS Welcomes Back Students



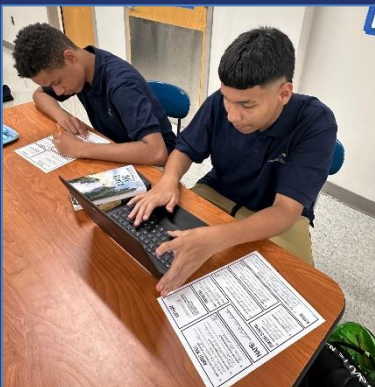

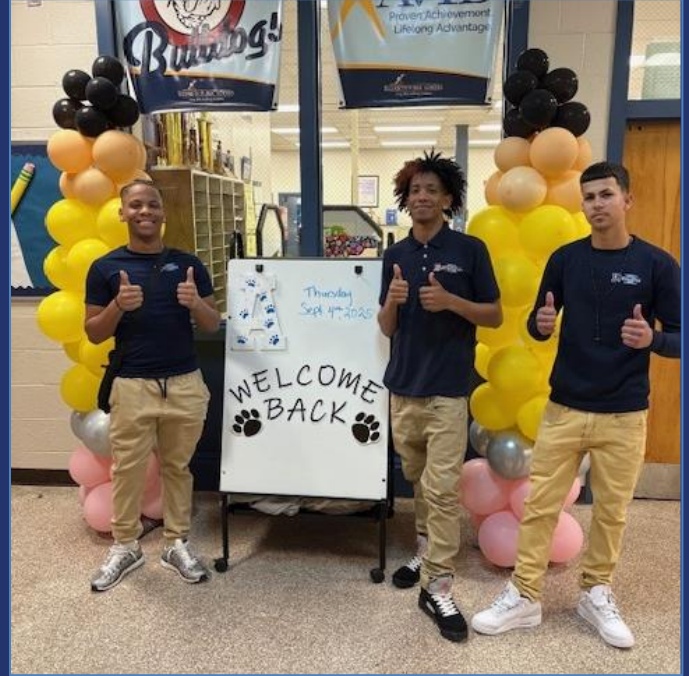

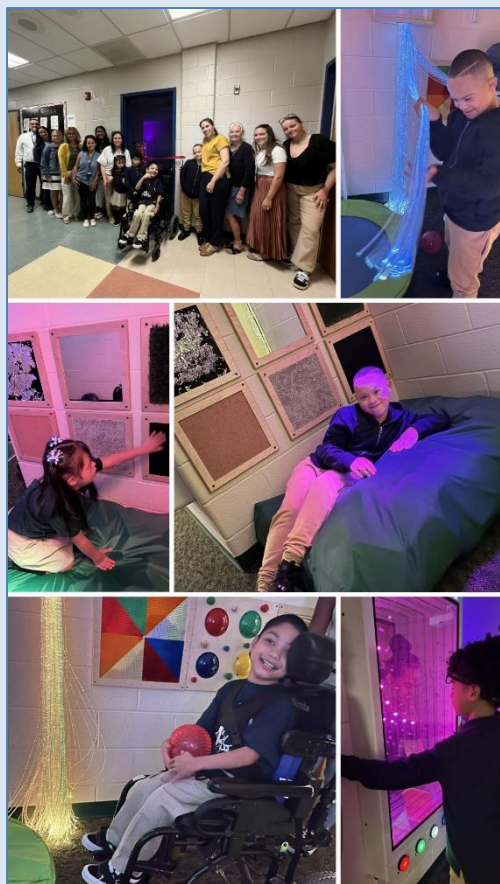


Dr. Albert Einstein Academy School No. 29

Juan Pablo Duarte – José Julián Martí School No. 28

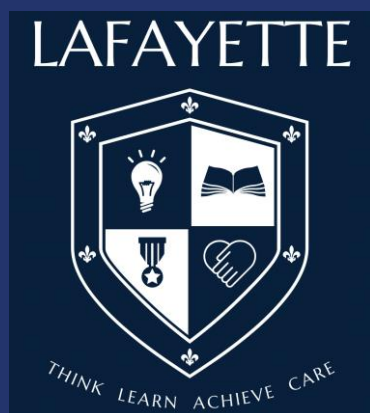

Dr. Antonia Pantoja School No. 27

Dr. Antonia Pantoja (1922–2002) was a Puerto Rican educator, social worker, feminist, and activist who dedicated her life to advancing opportunities for Puerto Ricans and other Latinos in the United States. Born in San Juan, she moved to New York City in 1944, where she earned advanced degrees in social work and education.

For School No. 27's annual celebration of Dr. Antonia Pantoja's birthday, students wrote their goals or aspirations on a birthday candle and placed it on Dr. Pantoja's cake. This school wide activity was inspired by the organization Pantoja created in 1961, ASPIRA (aspire) which empowered young Latinos through leadership development and advocacy for bilingual education. She also helped establish the Puerto Rican Forum and the Universidad Boricua (now Boricua College). Her tireless work in education and civil rights earned her the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1996. Dr. Pantoja's legacy continues to inspire efforts toward equity, cultural pride, and educational access for Latino communities.



Benjamin Franklin School No. 13

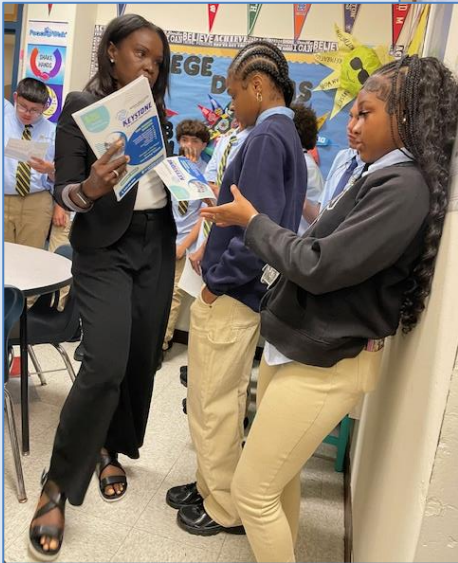
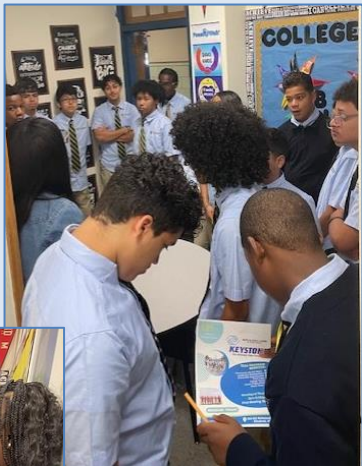
