Math

- Read, write, & represent numbers up to 1,000,000,000
- Compare and order whole numbers & decimals to the hundredths
- Add & subtract whole numbers and decimals fluently
- Multiply & divide a four-digit number by a onedigit or two-digit number
- Solve multi-step word problems
- Understand equivalent fractions & compare fractions with different denominators
- Add & subtract fractions with like denominators
- Solve area & perimeter word problems
- Classify 2D shapes based on attributes

ELAR

- Demonstrate and apply phonetic knowledge by decoding and encoding words that have multiple sound-spelling patterns
- Decode, encode, and determine the meaning of words with less common prefixes and suffixes
- Use multiple strategies and knowledge of word parts to determine the meaning of unfamiliar and multiple meaning words
- Notice similarities and differences between the ideas, message, and author's craft
- Analyze how characters change in stories
- Explain the author's implied purpose of texts
- Use a text's structure to determine the central idea(s) and support those with relevant details
- Infer why an author used figurative and descriptive language
- Respond to deepen comprehension

- Explain that energy is everywhere & can be observed
- Recognize patterns among the Sun, Earth, and Moon system
- Understand how natural resources are important & can be managed
- Describe life cycles
- Understand that organisms undergo similar life processes for survival

Social Studies

- Explain Texas history and regions in Texas
- Explain the importance and application of foundational government documents, including the Texas and U.S. Constitutions and how both State and Federal governments work
- Understand important symbols and celebrations including the Pledge to the Texas Flag, Texas Independence Day, Juneteenth, and the Alamo
- Apply foundational language skills to engage in civil discourse about social studies topics
