EXTRA-CURRICULAR PROGRAM

Introductory Statement

Welcome to Seneca High School! Extra-curricular activities are a necessary and important part of the programs of the Lenape Regional High School District. Extra-curricular activities are truly worthwhile because they allow students freedom of choice and permit them to exercise their initiative to a much greater degree than formal classes do. Extra-curricular activities provide opportunities to apply academic discipline, develop and test career goals, be of service to yourself and others, and make long strides in maturing into a healthy, well-rounded individual. Whether you enjoy creating, serving, performing, or competing – these activities are a great source of social contact and enjoyment, and your involvement at any time is highly encouraged, welcomed and invited! In high school, students can develop proficiency in leisure activities that yield satisfaction for a lifetime.

Listed in the subsequent pages is information detailing extra-curricular activities already established at Seneca. The administration has the prerogative to add or amend the regulations that follow and to make any other regulations necessary to carry out the activities program.

CLUB MEMBERSHIP

As a member of a club, a student is expected to meet all obligations and requirements set forth by the club charter or advisor.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR OFFICE

Clubs: You must be a member in good standing.

Classes:

- 1. You must be a member in good standing.
- 2. No serious discipline record(s) (discretion of administration).
- 3. A student may hold office in as many organizations as time and academic standing will allow, with the following exceptions:
 - The Class President may not hold any other office.
 - The Student Council President may not hold any other office.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY SELECTION

Membership in the National Honor Society is one of the highest honors awarded to a high school student. Selection into the National Honor Society is based on the student's outstanding achievements in four areas: Scholarship, Service, Leadership and Character.

- 1. **Scholarship** A student must be a junior or senior with a minimum regular cumulative grade point average of 3.25 or higher, or weighted grade point average of 4.875.
- 2. Service A student must demonstrate commitment to varied activities within Seneca High School and the community. Service activities are those which benefit others and for which the student receives no form of compensation. A student must participate in a minimum of three (3) varied school-sponsored activities per year of school attendance. In addition, the student must earn community service hours (minimum 20 hours per year). Hours must be documented, and letters must be acquired from the advisors with the number of hours, signatures, and phone numbers. All letters must be on letterhead.
- 3. **Leadership** A student must demonstrate leadership qualities in and out of the classroom.
- 4. **Character** A student must demonstrate the "six pillars of character:" respect, responsibility, trustworthiness, fairness, caring, and citizenship.

A student is qualified to be a candidate based on a 3.25 regular cumulative grade point average. The student will then receive a letter indicating candidacy and will attend a mandatory meeting where a full explanation of the selection process will take place. The student must complete an information form verified by advisors/coaches/sponsors, signed by the student and a parent/guardian, and returned to a National Honor Society advisor by the date indicated on the form. The form is then passed on to the National Honor Society Selection Committee.

Evaluation forms will be completed by teachers, administrators, and school counselors to attest to a candidate's leadership and character qualities. Discipline records of each candidate will be reviewed. A selection committee, composed of faculty members, will review all information, and discuss each candidate before voting. A student selected for membership must participate in a formal induction ceremony to become an official National Honor Society member. To remain a member of the National Honor Society, students must abide by all chapter-by-laws and maintain the criteria for admission.

If a student is denied membership, a written request submitted to the National Honor Society advisors may be requested to appeal the decision.

INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS

Realizing that interscholastic sports make a rich contribution to an individual's total education, Seneca High School aims to provide its students with an extensive athletic program. The school provides athletic teams on varsity, junior varsity, and freshman levels.

A student who wishes to participate in athletics may do so only after the school has received parent/guardian approval and the student has evidenced good health through a physical examination conducted by a home physician. Evidence of current tetanus inoculation is also required. The district maintains athletic accident insurance which is secondary to the family's primary medical insurance coverage. Restrictions on district coverage do apply. The parent/guardian is encouraged to contact the district personnel office should coverage questions occur.

INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETIC ELIGIBILITY

Eligibility rules apply to all Freshman, Sophomore, Junior Varsity and Varsity Teams representing the High School.

ACADEMIC ELIGIBILITY

- Student athletes in **Grades 10, 11, and 12** must have attained 30 credits from the previous school year to be academically eligible for the fall and winter season and 15 credits from the first semester to be eligible for the spring sports season.
- Student athletes in **Grade 9** are automatically eligible for the fall and winter season but must have attained 15 credits for the spring sports season.
- The student-athlete must be in the acceptable age range as determined by NJSIAA regulations. A student is eligible if they have not reached the age of 19 prior to September 1.
- **NOT ELIGIBLE** after the completion of 8 semesters following a student's entrance into the 9th grade.
- NOT ELIGIBLE after the class in which a student originally enrolled graduates, regardless of transfer from any school during the 3 or 4-year period.
- Any questions regarding eligibility should be directed to the Athletic Director.

TRANSFER STUDENTS

- ELIGIBLE immediately if it is the student's first transfer, and the transfer occurs during
 the first six semesters after their initial high school enrollment, provided that the transfer
 occurs on or before the start of practice date (as determined by the NJSIAA) of the
 sports season in which the transfer occurs.
- **ELIGIBLE** after 30 days (or ½ the maximum number of contests, whichever is less) from the start of competition date for athletes in grades 10, 11, and 12 at a present school if student participated in the sport at the previous school and transferred after the start of practice date (as determined by the NJSIAA). Any transfer that occurs before or after the start of competition date (as determined by the NJSIAA) is also ineligible for NJSIAA postseason competition in that sport. Students who transfer a second or subsequent time will be subject to a 30-day period of ineligibility (or ½ the maximum number of contests, whichever is less) for all NJSIAA sanctioned sports in which the student participated during the 12 months preceding the transfer.
- Senior transfers are subject to a 22-day period of ineligibility (or ½ the maximum number of contests, whichever is less) in each sport in which they participated during or after their third season of eligibility, during the 12 months preceding the transfer.
- This transfer rule applies to athletes of all levels of participation (not just varsity athletes) and is applicable to all NJSIAA-sanctioned sports in which the student participated during the 12 months preceding the transfer. Transferring students may participate in a new sport without penalty. The period of ineligibility will begin on the competition start date of each sport. For students who transfer after the competition start date, the period of ineligibility will begin on the date of enrollment into the school.

ETHICS COMMITTEE

I. COMPOSITION OF THE ETHICS COMMITTEE

The purpose of the Ethics Committee is to determine continued membership in an activity/club whenever its rules have been violated.

The Ethics Committee will consist of the following members:

- The principal or designee
- Three activity/club advisors
- One non-voting activity/club advisor representing the activity/club involved in the allegations against the student(s).

II. ACTIVITY/CLUB DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURES

Continued activity/club membership will be determined by the Ethics Committee. All five members of the Ethics Committee will hear and discuss charges after the following steps are taken:

- The student is referred to the Ethics Committee and formally charged.
- The student must be present at the hearing. If student(s) wishes, student(s) parent/guardian(s) may also be present. In all cases, parent/guardian(s) must be informed of the pending hearing and procedures.

III. ACTIVITY CLUB DISCIPLINARY GUIDELINES

- The Ethics Committee may recommend probation, suspension from the activity/club, or dismissal from the activity/club.
- Probation will not be assigned for more than one semester.
- A suspension from an activity or club will not exceed 45 school days.
- The principal is to be consulted if a student commits a disciplinary offense that could be determined as a second violation of activity/club rules.
- An activity/club advisor cannot make any rules that are contrary to existing school policy.

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITY PARTICIPATION FEE

The Board of Education will continue to assess an Extracurricular Activity Participation Fee for the 2023-2024 school year. The annual fee will be assessed to every student who participates in at least one athletic or extracurricular activity that requires a Board of Education paid coach or advisor.

List of Clubs and Activities that Require Activity Fee (see Club List on last page)

- Students who qualify for the Federal Free and Reduced Lunch Program are exempt from paying the Athletic and Extracurricular Activity Participation Fee.
- The fee will be assessed once per school year at a rate established by the Board of Education, which for the 2023-24 school year will be the following:
- \$200 per student for students participating exclusively in non-sport extracurricular activities (clubs).
- \$300 per student for students participating in at least one sport which requires a paid coach and a physical (this fee also covers any other extracurricular activities)
- \$600 per family cap
- The fee is valid for that school year only.
- Each student must submit the Athletic and Extracurricular Activity Participation Fee payment prior to the participation (including try outs) in an activity.
- The district will collect online payments through School Funds Online at SchoolCashOnline.com. Please only submit payment for up to 2-3 participating students per family depending on the student's participation. To take advantage of the \$600 family cap, please complete the Participation Fee Family Cap Registration Form to register the information for students for which you do not submit payment.
- The fee is non-refundable unless the student is cut from the athletic/activity roster and did not participate in any other athletic/extracurricular activities for the remainder of the school year. A refund request form must be completed and submitted by the last day of school, or the fee will be forfeited. Forms are available in the high school main office. Refunds will be issued over the summer, after all the student's obligations have been fulfilled. Any outstanding student obligations will be deducted from the refund at that time. Students who voluntarily drop out of an activity will forfeit their fee. Refund requests must be submitted within the same school year. Refunds for previous school years will not be given.
- Payment of the Athletic and Extracurricular Activity Participation Fee does not guarantee position, role, or playing time. It does not guarantee the student or his/her parent, guardian or family control over any conditions, guidelines or policies regarding the team or activities.
