GRADING

MHS calculates grade point average on a weighted and unweighted 4.0 scale: A=4, B=3, C=2. MHS has a partial credit system. Credits earned indicate the quantity of work completed and grades indicate the quality of work completed. Grades below a C- are not issued. Students are expected to revise and resubmit work until at least a grade of C- or better is earned. MHS does not report individual class rank. MHS students may take AP and Honors courses at Piedmont High School (PHS) where these courses carry an additional point.

STANDARDIZED TESTS

Due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and the increasing numbers of colleges and universities with test-optional and test-blind admissions policies, MHS no longer reports SAT or ACT scores.

OUTSTANDING DISTRICT PROGRAMS

Wellness Center: Provides prevention, early-intervention, and mental health education resources for students and families.
