



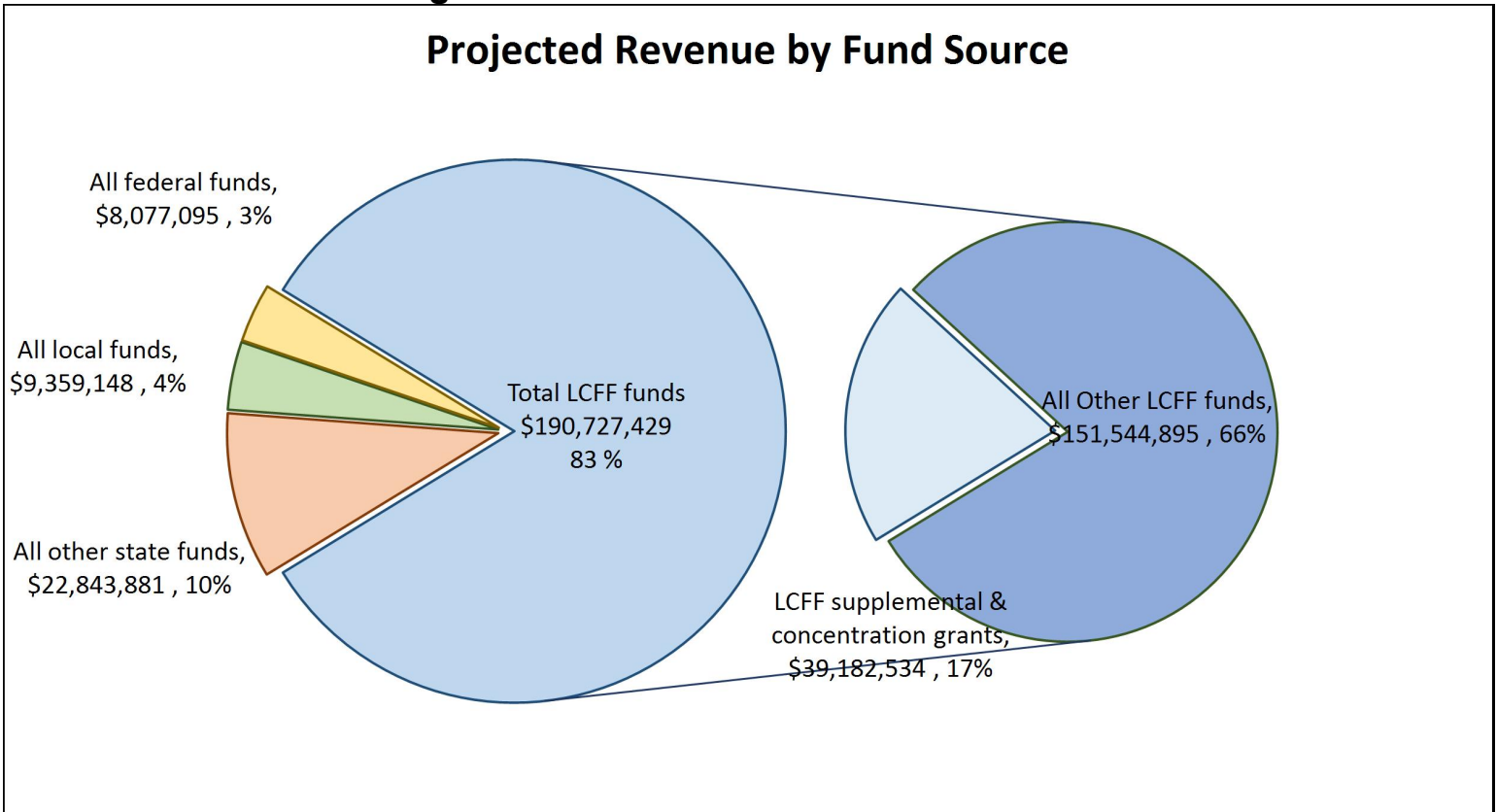

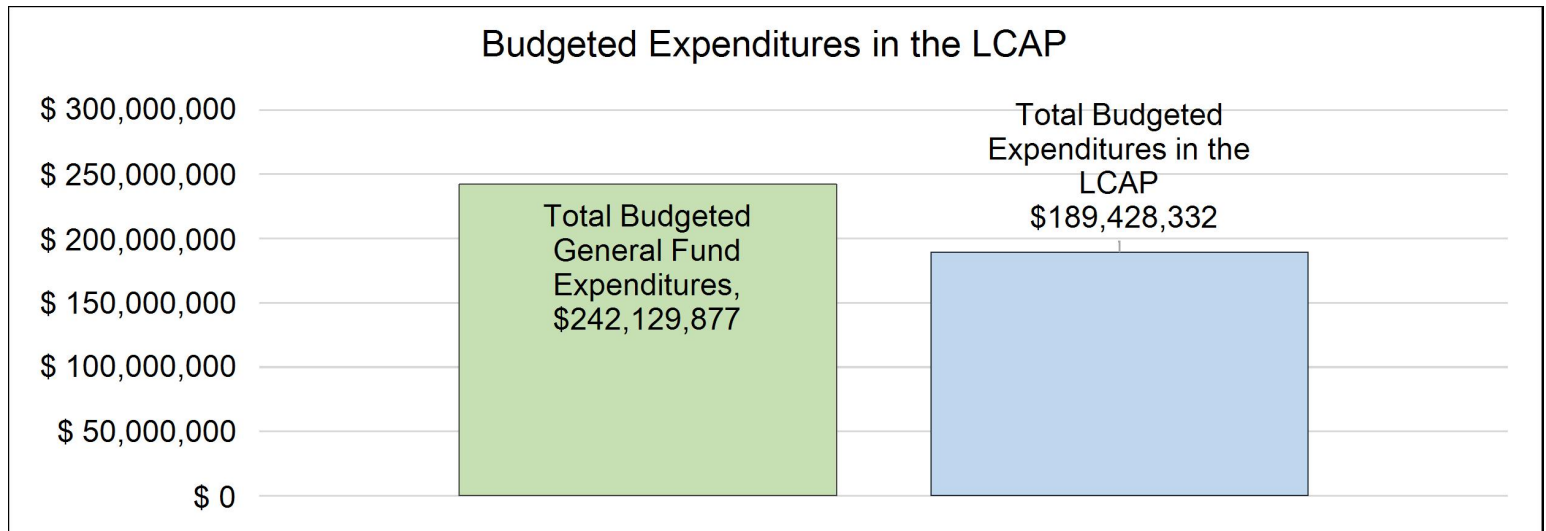

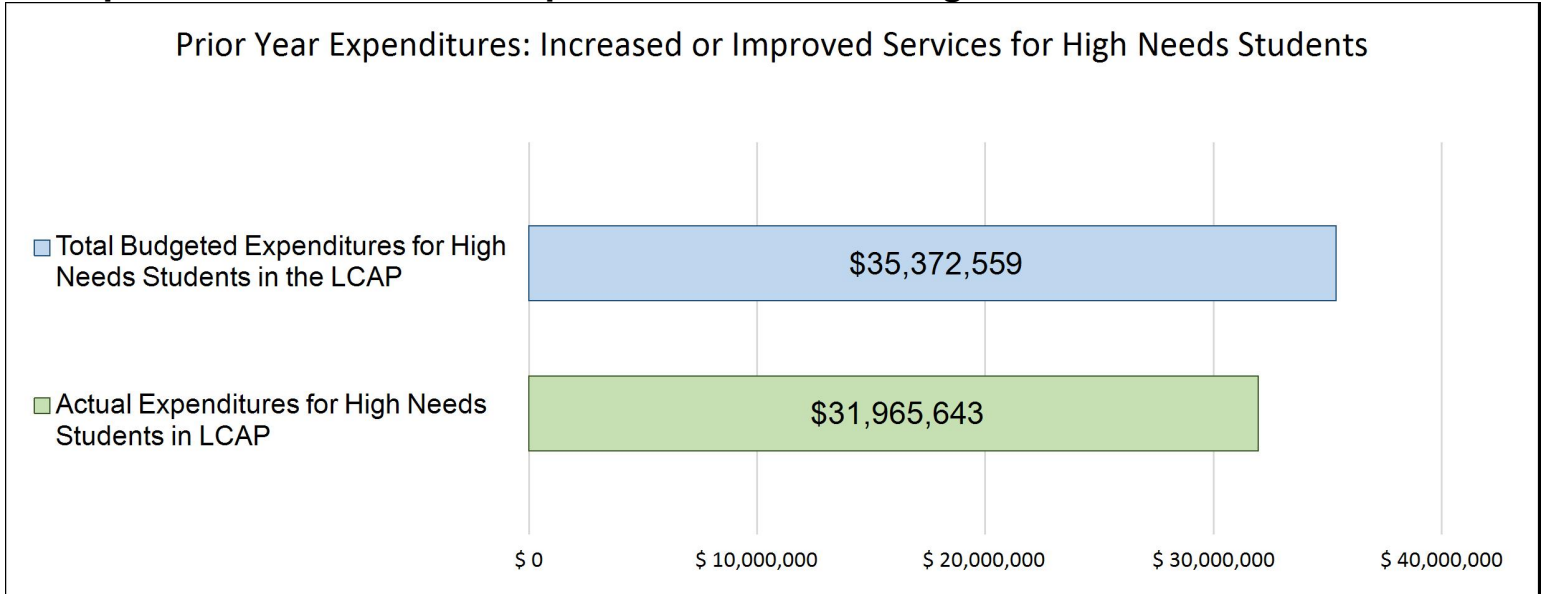

The District did not complete the new textbook adoption process. This was due to a delay at the state level to release new curriculum options. The District was unable to provide supplemental training, materials, and professional development options to support implementation of newly adopted curriculum.

## Plan Summary [2025-26]

### General Information

The City of Tracy and the Tracy Unified School District (TUSD) support a thriving community for students, families, and businesses. The city of Tracy has evolved from a historically rural/farming community, into a largely suburban community. Many residents commute into the Bay Area for work. This reality emphasizes the important roles our district school play, in helping all students access school resources to grow and thrive during the school day.

Our collective student body is highly diverse. TUSD seeks to provide and sustain innovative instructional practices, focused on continued student growth and cultural inclusivity. As part of the District strategic plan, various divisions of the Ed. Services department work to sustain cycles of continued improvement. These cycles help TUSD lay its foundation, that all students complete high school college and career ready.

Listed below is a broad overview of TUSD's student demographic information. These metrics derive from the CDE dashboard information, released on December 1, 2024.

TUSD operates a total of 18 total of schools. The breakdown of schools is:

- Three comprehensive high schools (9 - 12)
- Seven elementary schools (PK - 5)
- Four elementary schools (PK - 8)
- Two middle schools (6 - 8)
- One continuation high school (Student aged 16 years old and older)
- One community day school (7 - 12)

Of the above identified schools, George and Evelyn Stein Continuation High School and Duncan Russell Community Day School both qualify to receive Equity Multiplier funding (herein referred to as Stein High School and DR respectively). CDE defines Equity Multiplier funding eligibility, such that LEA schools show high percentages (> or = to 70%) of students identified as socio-economically disadvantaged and high percentages (> or = to 25%) of students who are identified as "non-stable" (in terms of their school enrollment stability), during the prior school year.

California Ed. Code Section 52064 (e)(7) requires LEAs to develop a focus goal(s) for each eligible Equity Multiplier school site. TUSD identifies these focus LCAP goals as Equity Multiplier goals #3 and #4. Goal #3 is specific to Stein High School and Goal #4 is specific to DR.

## Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

2024 Dashboard Reflections:

Review of CA School Dashboard Performance

English Language Arts (ELA): Overall performance maintained, -1.4 points to 32 points below standard. Foster Youth, Pacific Islander, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged, Filipino and American Indian student groups improved which means that they performed closer to standard met.

Mathematics: Overall performance maintained, -0.3 points to 74.3 points below standard. African American, Foster Youth, Pacific Islander,

Socioeconomically Disadvantaged, Filipino and American Indian student groups improved which means that they performed closer to standard met.

English Learner Progress Indicator (ELPI): Overall performance declined 6.7% with 46.7% of students making progress toward English language proficiency or maintaining the highest level. Both English Learners and Long-Term English Learners declined.

College/Career Readiness: Overall performance declined 2.0% to 31.9% of graduates meeting the criteria to be identified as "Prepared". African American, and two or more races student groups showed increases in college preparedness.

Graduation Rates: Overall performance maintained 0.3% to 88.2% of students graduating. African American, English learners, Homeless, Long-Term English Learners, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged, Filipino, Two or More Races, and Pacific Islander student groups showed increased graduation rates.

Chronic Absenteeism: Overall performance showed significant improvement with a 4.0% decline to 22.7%. Foster Youth, Long-Term English Learners, African American, American Indian, Asian, English Learners, Filipino, Hispanic, Two or More Races, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged, Students with Disabilities and white student groups showed improvements with declining chronic absenteeism rates.

Suspension Rates: Overall performance showed improvement with a 0.3% decline to 8.2% of students suspended at least one day. English Learners, Foster Youth, Hispanic, Homeless, Long-Term English Learners, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged, Students with Disabilities, and Filipino student groups showed improvements with declining absenteeism rates.

Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant (LREBG):

TUSD has \$15,133,757 unspent funds as of 6/30/2025.

LREBG funded actions may be found in Goal 1; Actions 1.2, 1.6, 1.17 and Goal 2; Action 2.5.

TUSD conducted a comprehensive needs assessment of the district and its schools. The TUSD needs assessment substantiated findings from the 2024 Dashboard related to chronic absenteeism, ELA performance, and Math performance.

A review of state and local data indicates significant need to improve performance outcomes in ELA for the following student groups (African American, Asian, EL, Hispanic, Homeless, LTEL, SED, SWD, and White). The review of state and local data indicates significant need to improve performance outcomes in math for the following student groups (African American, Asian, EL, Hispanic, Homeless, LTEL, SED, SWD, Two or More races, and White).

Listed below are the specific actions that will address these student needs, as well as justification for the use of LREBG funds per action:

- Action 1.2 – Staff Kindergarten classrooms with 0.5 FTE para educator I personnel to support ELA and math instruction at Tiers 1 and 2. Increase PreK-3rd grade students' access to school libraries. We will provide extended library hours each day for students and staff multiple Teacher Librarians to support early literacy improvement outcomes for students. These are allowable uses of LREBG funding, since they provide personnel to support core ELA and math instruction for early primary grades.
- Action 1.6 – Provide staffing for Teachers on Special Assignment to provide professional development and coaching opportunities for staff members to implement the instructional frameworks for ELA and math, including specific focus on sustaining MTSS and a

universal design for learning (UDL) to close the achievement gap. This is an allowable use of LREBG funding as it sustains our MTSS.

- Action 1.17 – Provide staffing for Teachers on Special Assignment to support ELA and math instruction. Provide a reading diagnostic program to identify benchmarks and monitor reading progress for PreK - 3rd grade students. Support students to receive supplemental tutoring across all core instructional areas. These are allowable uses of LREBG funding, as it provides direct support for teachers to improve at Tiers 1 instruction, Tier 2 intervention, and Tier 3 remediation for students to improve ELA and math performance outcomes.

Further, a review of state and local data indicates significant chronic absenteeism among all student groups (African American, Asian, EL, Filipino, Hispanic, Homeless, LTEL, SED, SWD, Two or More races, and White). Based on this, Goal 2; Action 2.5 directly addresses the need to track students' attendance and motivate students to attend school consistently.

- Action 2.5 – High School assistant principals provide proactive resources to support students to reduce chronic absenteeism, prior to students being identified as truant. Further, APs support students to reduce the likelihood of negative behaviors that would result in suspension from school, subsequently contributing to ongoing chronic absentee rates. This is an allowable use of LREBG funding.

## Reflections: Technical Assistance

Based on the 2024 California Dashboard, Tracy Unified School District is eligible for Differentiated Assistance for the following student groups and indicators:

- English learners for Academic Performance and College Career
- Long-term English learners for Academic Performance and College Career
- Homeless for Academic Performance and Chronic Absenteeism
- Students with Disabilities for Academic Performance and College Career
- Pacific Islander for Chronic Absenteeism and Suspension

In addition, the district met the criteria for Direct Technical Assistance for the following student groups:

- Foster Youth
- Homeless
- Students with Disabilities

Tracy Unified School District is currently in consultation with the SJCOE and CCEE to determine if assistance from the CCEE is necessary. In collaboration with the San Joaquin County Office of Education, we conducted a comprehensive needs assessment and reviewed performance data on the state and local indicators on the CA Dashboard to identify strengths and weaknesses. Through this work, TUSD determined the following:

Districtwide, K-8 chronic absenteeism rates declined by 4% overall between the 2024 Dashboard and the 2023 Dashboard. The 2024 Dashboard identified the district overall chronic absenteeism rate of 22.7%. Compared to the 26.6% chronic absenteeism rate in the 2023 Dashboard, TUSD is pleased to report this decline.

Overall suspension rates declined approximately 0.3% between the 2024 Dashboard and the 2023 Dashboard. The 2024 Dashboard

identified a school district overall suspension rate of 8.2%. Compared to an 8.6% suspension rate in the 2023 Dashboard, TUSD recognizes this metric as a positive trend. However, the district's disaggregated suspension rates indicated a continued need to create conditions to reduce suspension rates amongst specific demographic student groups. African American (AA), Students with Disabilities (SWD), and Homeless (HOM) students are all named in our Direct Technical Assistance (DTA) plan as priority groups. TUSD is focusing its efforts to reduce suspension rates for these target groups specifically, along with reducing our overall suspension rates.

Districtwide high school graduation rates maintained approximately 0.3% between the 2024 Dashboard and the 2023 Dashboard. The 2024 Dashboard identified the district overall graduation rate of 88.2%. Compared to the overall 87.9% graduation rate in the 2023 Dashboard, TUSD considers these data to indicate favorable trends. We maintain that any growth is a relative strength.

#### Growth Areas:

TUSD's suspension rate declined districtwide at a rate of -0.3% compared to the 2023 Dashboard. The following student groups African American (AA), American Indian (AI), Two or More Races (TOM), and Pacific Islander (PI) were identified in the lowest performance level (red). It is necessary to continue reducing suspension rates for these targeted student groups. AA students specifically, are identified as a priority group for Direct Technical Assistance. Although AI, TOM, and PI students are not identified as DTA priority groups, the District will continue to implement the DTA strategies to reduce suspension rates for these student groups as well.

Performance indicators in English Language Arts indicated that TUSD performed at a rate -32 points below standard. The following student groups English Learners (EL), homeless (HOM), long term English Learners (LTEL), and students with disabilities (SWD) were all identified in the lowest performance level (red) and experienced a decline in relative ELA CAASPP scores between the 2024 and 2023 Dashboard, respectively.

Tracy Unified School District will continue to work with the SJCOE to implement a professional development plan focusing on reducing suspension rates for African American students and students with disabilities specifically. Additionally, the district will continue to work with SJCOE to develop and implement a system wide Universal Design for Learning (UDL) initiative to improve early literacy rates for our district students, based on strong Tier 1 instruction, with timely support. Further explanation of this work can be found in actions 1.2, 1.3, 1.11, 1.12, 1.15, 2.2, 2.5, and 2.6.

#### Differentiated Assistance Update (Based on progress identified in the 2024-25 LCAP):

--During the current school year, the district has seen a broad change in philosophy and dialogue related to both instruction and student discipline. Our needs assessment indicates the crucial importance of improved Tier 1 instructional practices--especially as they relate to early literacy measures. Furthermore, our needs assessment indicated the overuse of suspension to mitigate student behavioral infractions. The district is making progress to address these issues. They center our efforts for Direct Technical Assistance (DTA), and frame steering committee conversations for immediate improvement.

A description of how the adopted LCAP was influenced by the feedback provided by educational partners.

Feedback from Educational Partners played a crucial role in shaping the 2024-2025 LCAP. Following a comprehensive review of district data and thoughtful consideration of educational partner input, the district has reaffirmed its commitment to two primary goals for the upcoming school year. Key actions and services to be prioritized include:

Staff input highlighted the importance of improving student attendance and addressing chronic absenteeism rates (Action 2.6), continuing support for all students, particularly English learners, through the availability of Paraprofessionals (Actions 1.4-1.6), and enhancing activities that foster college and career readiness (Action 1.7). While staff expressed a preference for maintaining single-grade classes, enrolment dynamics may necessitate flexibility in this area.

Parent/Community suggestions included: maintain a full-time counselor to support students (Action 2.4), identify opportunities to be more involved both during the regular school day and after school (Actions 2.5 and 2.6), and visual and performing arts opportunities within the school day (Action 2.2).

Student suggestions included: Although students feel safe they want more activities to get involved in such as sports (Action 2.7) and field trips (Action 1.7 and 2.7).

Schools receiving Equity Multiplier funds held multiple partner engagement opportunities to identify and prioritize the best uses of Equity Multiplier funds to support students. Based on the results of partner feedback (including survey data, town hall meetings, school site council meetings, site leadership meetings, and student engagement group meetings), both Stein High School and Duncan Russel Community Day School (Equity Multiplier Schools) conducted a specific needs assessment to determine the best uses of Equity Multiplier funds at each respective site. Feedback indicated strong support for increased College Career readiness upon graduation and the dearth of CTE offerings at SHS. Further, feedback indicated the necessity to improve student engagement efforts at DR. This collective feedback influenced Equity Multiplier goals 3 and 4.

George and Evelyn Stein Continuation High School:

Partner feedback suggestions included: Provide students with both, additional mental health support (Action 3.1) and additional academic support (Action 3.1), identify opportunities for students to participate in a CTE program to improve college/career readiness (Action 3.2). Continued Equity Multiplier eligibility may necessitate flexibility of the long-term viability of these potential options.

Duncan Russell Community Day School:

Partner group suggestions included: Provide students with increased supplemental curriculum options to support social-emotional learning, life-skills management, and anger management de-escalation (Action 4.1).

Additionally, staff input highlighted the importance of providing additional behavior support through positive behavior intervention support (PBIS) (Action 4.2).

Student feedback included providing structured break activities and positive behavior intervention support (Action 4.2).

Goal 1 helps TUSD, align and leverage state (SBAC) and local (Fastbridge) indicator data. These metrics highlight the district’s need for targeted support for lower-performing student groups. ## Goal Analysis [2024-25]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

22 of 24 actions were implemented as planned with no challenges.

### Notable Successes

Actions 1.6, 1.7, 1.8, 1.9, and 1.10 all center on providing ongoing professional development for district and school staff. These opportunities were implemented as planned and proved to be successful. Many of the the sessions focused on core content support, building Tier 1 instructional best practices, vertical content alignment, and social-emotional learning/health. These sessions were well-attended. We received consistent positive feedback to increase these offerings across all core content areas.

### Challenges to Implementation

Action 1.11 and Action 1.12 presented specific challenges in implementation. Action 1.11--Core Curriculum & Adopted Instructional Materials was not implemented as planned. We are building a 9th-12th grade adoption committee that will be trained on the most current CA Math Framework. The adoption timeline was adjusted due to limited availability of updated math curriculum. 9th-12th grade math adoption committee will screen available publications during the 2025-26 school year for implementation during the 2026-27 school year. Action 1.12--was partially implemented due to the limited representation of teachers on the Early Literacy Committee. This challenge was compounded by the fact that our Middle School math and Algebra Readiness steering committee struggled to align school site priorities with district goals.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

The following actions had a material difference of 20% or more:

Action 1.8 (Professional Development-STEM) had a material difference due to the following: 1) STEM underspent its budget for STEM materials, 2) not all Instructional Leadership Team members were able to attend all ILT PD sessions, and 3) the STEM department have two remaining contract/service agreements that have not closed out yet.

Action 1.9 (Professional Development-Math) had a material difference due to due to limited participation in professional development and planning sessions. The intention for this professional development option was to review the math framework, in alignment with district math adoptions. Due to the adoption timelines for math being delayed by the state, much of the framework planning has yet to be completed.

Action 1.11 (Core Curriculum & Adopted Instructional Materials) had a material change, due to the adjustment of the adoption timeline. The committee was unable to screen available publications. In accordance with the adjusted timeline, the committee will screen publications in 2025-26 for implementation during 2026-27.

Action 1.12 (Steering Committees to support TUSD Initiatives) had a material difference due to limited representation and participation of teachers on the ELA and Math steering committees. We experienced difficulties finding teachers willing to participate on the ELA steering committee. Further, there was limited teacher participation on the math steering committee. Due to limited teacher participation, some of the encumbered funds were not expended.

Action 1.13 (Additional Intervention & Curriculum Support) had a material difference due to the district using Arts Music Instructional Materials Discretionary Block Grant funding to supplement funding for instructional paras, providing intervention services to students.

Action 1.14 (Intervention-Technology Based Literacy Intervention Programs) had a material difference due to the computer-based reading intervention program being partially implemented at one of the two middle school sites.

Action 1.15 (Additional Intervention & Resources) had a material difference due to the termination of contract services with one of the behavioral and social emotional health contractors. Further, the Prevention Services department secured specific grant funds to support behavioral and emotional support initiatives. Thus, TUSD did not expend all of the allocated funds.

Action 1.20 (SPED-Inclusion) had a material difference due to personnel changes within the Special Education department. These funds were used to pay employee salaries, and some of the associated staffing costs were higher than initially anticipated.

Action 1.23 (Technology Purchases & Training) had a material difference due to a delayed purchase request. There is an outstanding purchase request for additional computers that has yet to be fulfilled.

#### A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

Action 1.1 (Basic Services for Students) is intended to provide all basic school services defined in TUSD resolution 10-04 for each student to learn; clarifying the primary and secondary purposes of the Tracy Unified School District. Metric 1a is determined to be successful. Given the current teacher shortage, 89.1% of teachers are fully credentialed, and 100% of classes were staffed with full-time teachers, appropriately assigned. Further, Metric 1b was successful and 100% of students have access to sufficient instructional materials.

Actions 1.2 (Staffing/Supplemental Services for Students), 1.7 (Professional Development- Teachers on Special Assignment), 1.8 (Professional development- STEM), 1.10 (Professional Development/Evaluation Training & Professional Learning Communities), 1.23 (Technology Purchases & Training) are all intended to improve student performance on Statewide Assessment. The evidence of effectiveness of these actions does not consistently show in state assessment results (Metric 4a). Socioeconomically Disadvantaged and Foster Youth student groups have shown improvement with more students meeting/exceeding standard. The same holds true for Socioeconomically Disadvantaged and Students with Disabilities in Math and for SED & SWD and for Homeless students in Science. It is important to note, these actions were implemented in 2024-25 and the assessment results are from 2023-24. Therefore, the impact to student learning can't be seen in the data. Staff feedback indicates these actions are effective. They contribute to higher capacity instruction, subsequently leading to higher learning outcomes for students. Staff feedback further indicates that continued professional development, aligned with targeted Tier 1 instruction remains a priority for the 2025-26 school year.

Actions 1.3 (Staff- Additional Teaching Positions), 1.18 (Summer School Intervention) are intended to improve 3rd grade reading skills and increase the percentage of students reading at grade level and is effective. When comparing results from Fall 2023 to Fall 2024, English Learners, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged, Students with Disabilities and Homeless have all increased the percentage of 3rd grade students at grade level (Metric 8b).

Action 1.4 (LCAP Clerk Typist) is intended to provide supplemental support for all schools to effectively implement SBAC and CAST. Keeping a Clerk Typist II to support Metric 4a was successful, since the employee keeps good records of district participation levels and tracks students' performance across both the SBAC and CAST.

Action 1.5 (TUSD ELPAC Testing) and Action 1.24 (Professional development & Staffing for English Learners and Long Term English Learners) are intended to increase the percentage of English Learners who make progress toward English Proficiency (Metric 4e) and increase the percent of English Learners (EL) students who meet Tracy USD standards to be reclassified as Fluent English Proficient (Metric 4f). The metric data is mixed with percentage of English Learners who make progress toward English Proficiency declining and the percent of English Learner students who meet Tracy USD standards to be reclassified as Fluent English Proficient showing no change.

Actions 1.6 (Professional Development), 1.15 (Additional Intervention & Resources), 1.16 (AVID Intervention Program) are intended to increase the percent of students who meet CSU/UC A-G college entrance requirements (Metric 4b). The actions have not shown effectiveness. However, it is important to note, these actions were implemented in 2024-25 and the A-G completion results are from 2023-24. Therefore, the impact to student success will not be seen in the data. Feedback from staff indicate these actions are successful as they make a positive impact on classroom teaching and learning. Staff members improve their instructional prowess, based in part on ongoing professional development. As such, staff reported students are being more successful in the classroom due to improved instruction, increased intervention opportunities, and AVID.

Actions 1.9 (Professional Development- STEM), 1.12 (Steering Committees to support TUSD Initiatives), are intended to increase the percentage of students in grades 2-12 who score at the College Pathway (CP) or Low Risk (LR) level on the Reading and Math Assessment (Metric 8a). The performance indicators for Read and Math on this diagnostic generally improved. We consider these actions effective. The data collected helps classroom teachers to work with individual students to provide timely Tier 2 support.

Action 1.11 (Core Curriculum & Adopted Instructional Materials) aligned with Metric 1b was not effective. The district has not started the core curriculum adoption cycle. This cycle is scheduled to begin during the 2025-26 school year. Math adoption options will be screened for students in grades 9-12 in the 2025-26 school year. ELA and History adoption cycles are further delayed, due to the CDE delay with core math adoption.

Action 1.13 (Additional Intervention & Curriculum Support) is intended increase the percentage of 11th grade students who demonstrate college preparedness (Metric 4h). The actions do not show effectiveness; however, it is important to note, these actions were implemented in 2024-25 and the college preparedness rates are from the 11th grade 2023-24 State Assessments. Therefore, the impact to student college preparedness is not seen in the data. Student feedback suggests that these actions are beginning to show signs of effective implementation. The proportion of students enrolling in classes which will, in turn demonstrate college preparedness, is increasing. The district expects this trend to continue during the 2025-26 school year and beyond.

Action 1.14 (Intervention- Technology Based Literacy Intervention Programs) is intended to decrease the Middle School Dropout Rate (Metric 5c). The action does not yet show effectiveness; however, it is important to note, this action was implemented in 2024-25 and the middle school dropout rate is from the 2023-24 school year. Therefore, the impact to middle school dropout rates can't be seen in the data. Student grade reporting, indicates an increase in performance levels due to their having access to these classes. We anticipate the compounded effect of improved reading outcomes for middle school students to contribute to a reduced dropout level.

Actions 1.17 (9th Grade Bridge & Freshman Seminar Program), 1.19 (High School Credit Recovery Opportunities) are intended to improve High School Graduation Rates (Metric 5e). This action is showing to be effective as All Students, English Learners, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged and Homeless graduation rates have all improved.

Action 1.20 (SPED- Inclusion) and Action 1.21 (Special Education Inclusion Training) are intended to ensure that students with disabilities complete high school and graduate with a diploma at proportionate rates with all students (Metric 5e). These actions show to be effective thus far. According to the CDE Dashboard, graduation rates for students with disabilities have maintained at 72.3% graduation rates for both the 2023 Dashboard and the 2024 Dashboard. Our intent is to continue providing inclusive learning environments for students with disabilities to maximize their time in general education classes, which will contribute to increased graduation rates. To help ensure this outcome, the district remains committed to providing the necessary PD and training for all special education staff to support students.

Action 1.22 (Career Technical Education- College and/or Career) is intended to increase the percent of students who complete a CTE pathway (Metric 4c). This action is showing to be effective as the percentage of All Students, English Learners, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged and Homeless who complete a CTE pathway have improved.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

After review of this goal, metrics and actions, we have updated our explanation of why we are implementing this goal.

We have made changes to the following Actions:

- 1.5 and 1.24 were combined into action 1.5.
- 1.6, 1.8, 1.9, and 1.10 were combined into action 1.6.
- 1.11 and 1.12 were combined into action 1.11
- 1.13, 1.14, and 1.15, were combined into action 1.13
- 1.20 and 1.21 were combined into action 1.20

These actions have such similarities that combining them allows TUSD to focus its efforts towards the desired outcomes. Furthermore, this combination of actions allows us to utilize resources in a more efficient way. Specifically, as it relates to providing professional development opportunities to teachers and framing our MTSS, combining actions helps TUSD clarify our practices and connect those practices to specific dashboard data metrics. Having combined various actions, the below table indicates reenumeration of remaining actions for readability:

Updates have been made to the following Metrics:

Metrics were reformatted to remove redundant information.

Metric 4a: African American, Asian, Hispanic, and White student groups have been added to ELA. African American, Asian, Hispanic, and White student groups have been added to Math. The Year 3 math target for LTEL students was adjusted from 17.02% to 12.02% to consistently align with the growth proportions of all other student groups.

Metrics 5e: Students with Disabilities were added to this metric. The baseline data and a projected 3 year outcome were included.

Metrics 7b, and 7c have been added to Metric 7a as well as data for Students with Disabilities (SWD). A target for year 3 SWD was also added.

Metric 8a was updated with a new 3-Year Outcome target for EL students in aReading (Low Risk), as EL student growth during 2024-25 exceeded the prior 3-Year target outcome.

Metric 8b was updated with new and correct data for EL, SED, SWD, HOM, and FY for Fall 2024. The changes box compares performance from Fall 2023 to Fall 2024 and changes from Spring 2024 to Spring 2025. The data for FY students in Spring 2025 represent a baseline value, as the number of FY students who took this test increased to 12 tested students--permitting the LEA to report the performance outcomes. We adjusted the Year 3 Outcome goals for FY students to correspond proportionately with the newly reported performance data. Metric 8c baseline data was updated for 7th grade ELA,- All and EL as well as for 8th grade ELA - All, EL and SED as it was reported incorrectly. Targets for Year 3 Outcomes were also updated.

LTEL data have been added to Metrics 4b, 4c, 4d, 5e, and 8c.

LTEL and EL data have been added to Metric 4e.

LCAP survey data indicated that mental health support and maintaining safe/equitable learning spaces are top priorities for students and staff. To accomplish this aim TUSD is implementing a broad social-emotional curriculum across the four broad categories of supports identified in Goal 1 (services, professional development, staffing, and materials). More specifically, Goal 2 action steps all support broad implementation of the district's MTSS framework. Ensuring that students feel safe to express ideas, attend school regularly, and are connected to their school community are key factors in working to improve ongoing attendance rates, reduce chronic absenteeism, and reduce both suspension and expulsion rates respectively.

Educational partner feedback becomes crucially important for all TUSD staff members. Students and families have strong insights regarding their educational partner experiences. As such, TUSD considers the shared points of view from students and families when developing systems for safe and equitable learning spaces for students and staff.

6 out of 6 actions were implemented as planned. Action 2.6 is identified as simultaneously a notable success and a specific challenge in implementation

### Notable Successes

Action 2.6, Mental Health, Social/Emotional & Behavior Services, through a contract service agreement. This contractor provided students with resources to improve Mental Health supports and services. Feedback from students, staff, and families was overwhelmingly positive. These services will continue to be offered for students in the 2025-26 school year (identified as Action 2.4).

### Challenges

Action 2.4--

Action 2.6--The contractor was unable to fulfill the contract for the entire school year. The district was then able to continue services and support with another contractor. However, this challenge did contribute to a gap in support for students.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

The following actions had a material difference of 20% or more:

Action 2.4 (Crisis Prevention (CPI) Training For Staff) had a material difference due to department turnover, the District did not send as many employees to the CPI professional development trainings as anticipated. This training remains a priority and we anticipate expending all funds during the 2025-26 school year.

Action 2.5 (Social Emotional (SEL) Curriculum) had a material difference due to the Prevention Services department receiving additional Mental Health Student Services Act (MHSS) grant funding. Based on the grant timeline, these funds were expended first.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

Action 2.1 (Facilities Inspection Tool) is intended to complete all deferred maintenance projects for non-bonded schools, to meet FIT reporting timelines (Metric 1c). This action has shown to be effective based on 100% of district schools being identified in good repair, as per the 2024 FIT report.

Actions 2.2 (Targeted social/emotional programs, resources....), Action 2.5 (Social Emotional Learning Curriculum) is intended to decrease the suspension rate (Metric 6a). This action has shown to be effective based on the Percentage of students who were suspended at least once during the academic year as All students, English Learners, Foster Youth, Homeless, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged, and Students with Disabilities groups all improved with a decline in suspension rates.

Action 2.3 (Increase Parent Engagement) is intended to improve attendance rates (Metric 5a). This action has shown to be effective with All Students, English Learners, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged, Students with Disabilities and Homeless groups all increasing attendance rates.

Action 2.4 (Crisis Prevention Intervention Training for Staff) is intended to decrease expulsion rates (Metric 6b). This action has shown to be effective with our continued low expulsion rates districtwide which is 0.4%.

Action 2.6 (Mental Health, Social/Emotional & Behavior Services) is intended to increase attendance and decrease chronic absenteeism (Metrics 5a, 5b). This action has shown to be effective with All Students, English Learners, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged, Students with Disabilities and Homeless groups all increasing attendance rates (Metric 5a). In addition, Chronic Absenteeism rates have improved with a decline for All Students, English Learners, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged, Students with Disabilities, Homeless and Foster Youth groups (Metric 5a and Metric 5b).

Action 2.5 was changed to reflect LREBG funded actions, within the scope of Goal 2 (Metric 5a and Metric 5b).

We have made changes to the following Metrics:

Metric 5b was updated to include Long-Term English Learners, African American, Asian, Filipino, Hispanic, Two or More races and White student groups to measure the impact of the LREBG action. The metric description was updated to align with how data is reported on the CA School Dashboard, grade k-8.

Metric 6a was updated to include Long-Term English Learners.

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**An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.**

According to the 2024 California Dashboard for college/career levels by student group, 0.0% of students at George and Evelyn Stein High School (SHS) are prepared for college or a career. Due to its configuration as a continuation high school, SHS lacks opportunities for students to become college and/or career-ready. Students attend SHS on a credit recovery path. However, TUSD must still work to ensure that SHS graduates are college and career ready. Students completed the LCAP survey and indicated their interest in having CTE options. Offering a CTE pathway in barbering, aligned with students interests, is expected to increase the graduation rate of SHS students with both a diploma and a completed CTE pathway.

Furthermore, in consultation with student focus groups at SHS, they expressed interest in pursuing career skills, both in the areas of cosmetology and barbering. To accomplish this interest TUSD is building a CTE pathway program for their benefit. This CTE pathway centers on barbering, within its course offerings. Students who complete this pathway, along with their general course of study will be eligible to take the state licensing exam for careers in barbering.

## Goal Analysis [2024-25]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

1 out of 2 Actions was implemented as planned with no challenges.

Action 3.1 was partially implemented due to challenges with staffing reliability.

Action 3.2 was fully implemented as written, and regarded as successful. SHS purchased all of the materials and supplies to launch a CTE aligned barbering program. As such, SHS was able to hire a qualified barbering teacher. This program will begin course offerings for students during the 2025-26 school year.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

The following actions had a material difference of 20% or more:

Action 3.1 (Academic & Life Skills Support- Professional Development for Staff) had a material difference due to the termination of contract services with a specific vendor. The contract terminated in March, 2025. Thus, some of these encumbered funds were not expended.

Action 3.2 (CTE Curriculum, Training, Supplies) had a material difference due to the total cost to purchase materials, supplies, and training for a new barbering program exceeded the amount initially anticipated. Unspent funds from Action 3.1 were used to cover the excess costs associated with Action 3.2.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

Action 3.1 (Academic and SEL Support) was not effective. Due to staffing difficulties, as well as the association with Metric 8a, transition surveys were not implemented with consistency. Thus, reporting indicators were not reliable.

Action 3.2 (Curriculum Training and Supplies) does not align to a specific Metric. The purpose of this action was to purchase the necessary materials and supplies to begin a CTE aligned barbering program. Educational partner feedback indicates that all necessary purchases were made, and as such, is considered successful.

Priority 6: School Climate (Engagement)

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

Students who attend Duncan Russell Community Day School (DR) require significant support. This is particularly salient in the areas of social-emotional support and life-skill development. Local data indicate that suspension from school remains a challenge and barrier to student success.

To address these issues, the goal is to create a school environment where students are engaged and feel safe. To improve school climate conditions, DR will continue to make a concerted effort to support Hispanic, Socio-Economically Disadvantaged and Students with Disabilities to minimize students’ propensity to engage in undesired behaviors that would result in suspension from school.

2 of 2 actions were implemented as planned with challenges.

Action 4.1 was partially implemented due to the cancelled contract between TUSD and FACES. The contract cancellation mid-year took away students' access to the SEL support that FACES was able to provide from March, 2025 to the end of the 2024-25 school year.

Action 4.2 was partially implemented due to the cancelled contract between TUSD and FACES. Staff members were not able to receive all of the necessary professional development training (to provide students with supplemental SEL support), included in the initial FACES contract.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

The following actions had a material difference of 20% or more:

Action 4.1 (Curriculum) had a material difference due to the need to provide more supplemental curriculum for students. Based on the cancelled contract between TUSD and FACES, the school purchased additional materials and supplies to offset the lapse in direct services for students.

Action 4.2 (Professional Development) had a material difference due to the FACES contract (to provide students with supplemental SEL support) being dissolved mid-school year. As such, all of the funds allocated to this action item were not expended throughout the entire school year.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

Actions 4.1 (Curriculum) and 4.2 (Professional Development) are intended to address student social-emotional and life-skill development. These actions were determined to be effective based on the decreased suspension rates (Metric 6a) and increased feelings of safety (metric 6c).

The district exceeded the Year 3 targeted outcome in year one for both metrics. Metric 6a was updated to include suspension data for ALL, SED and SWD student groups. All data fields for the metric were updated to include these groups.

## Introduction and Instructions

The Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) requires local educational agencies (LEAs) to engage their local educational partners in an annual planning process to evaluate their progress within eight state priority areas encompassing all statutory metrics (COEs have 10 state priorities). LEAs document the results of this planning process in the LCAP using the template adopted by the State Board of Education.

The LCAP development process serves three distinct, but related functions:

- **Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Coming School Year:** This percentage will not be entered; it is calculated based on the Projected Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Coming School Year and the LCFF Carryover —

Percentage. ***This is the percentage by which the LEA must increase or improve services for unduplicated pupils as compared to the services provided to all students in the coming LCAP year.***

- **Goal #:** Enter the LCAP Goal number for the action.
- **Action #:** Enter the action's number as indicated in the LCAP Goal.
- **Action Title:** Provide a title of the action.
- **Student Group(s):** Indicate the student group or groups who will be the primary beneficiary of the action by entering "All," or by entering a specific student group or groups.
- **Contributing to Increased or Improved Services?:** Type "Yes" if the action **is** included as contributing to meeting the increased or improved services requirement; OR, type "No" if the action is **not** included as contributing to meeting the increased or improved services requirement.

- **4. Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (LCFF Funds)**
  - This amount is the total of the Planned Expenditures for Contributing Actions (LCFF Funds) column.
- **5. Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services**
  - This percentage is the total of the Planned Percentage of Improved Services column.
- **Planned Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the coming school year (4 divided by 1, plus 5)**
  - This percentage is calculated by dividing the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) by the Projected LCFF Base Grant (1), converting the quotient to a percentage, and adding it to the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5).

### **Contributing Actions Annual Update Table**

Pursuant to EC Section 42238.07(c)(2), if the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) is less than the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and Concentration Grants (6), the LEA is required to calculate the difference between the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) and the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (7). - **Difference Between Planned and Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (Subtract 5 from 8)**
  - This amount is the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) subtracted from the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).

## **LCFF Carryover Table**

- **10. Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Current School Year (6 divided by 9 plus Carryover %)**
  - This percentage is the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and/or Concentration Grants (6) divided by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9) plus the LCFF Carryover – Percentage from the prior year.
- **11. Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (7 divided by 9, plus 8)**
  - This percentage is the Total Estimated Actual Expenditures for Contributing Actions (7) divided by the LCFF Funding (9), then converting the quotient to a percentage and adding the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).
- **12. LCFF Carryover — Dollar Amount LCFF Carryover (Subtract 11 from 10 and multiply by 9)**
