History & Purpose

In 1972, the federal district court for Eastern Pennsylvania made final order, injunction, stipulation, and consent agreement in the suit filed by PARC, now known as the Arc of Pennsylvania. The suit was filed against the Secretary of Education, The State Board of Education, the Secretary of Public Welfare, and all their agents, on behalf of thirteen children with intellectual disabilities who had been denied access to free public education.

The historic agreement, often referred to as the PARC Consent Agreement, mandated that the Commonwealth develop plans to identify, locate, evaluate, educate, and train all school age children with intellectual disabilities. This action predated and precipitated the federal law P.L. 94-142, the Education of All Handicapped Child Act. This law was amended most recently in 2004 and is now known as the Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act (IDEIA 2004).

The first plan, COMPILE, established a system of state and local task forces with the primary purpose being to ensure that the intent and spirit of the Right to Education Consent Agreement is carried out throughout the Commonwealth. These task forces, now known as the State and Local Tsk Forces on the Right to Education, became an active partner in the identification and location of thousands of students with intellectual disabilities during the early and mid-1970s.

Today, because of this action, all students with disabilities are afforded a Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE). Today, the State and Local Task Forces remain a vital part of the Commonwealth's Education System for all disabilities.





State Task Force on the Right to Education

The State Task Force (STF) serves as an advocate for students with Intellectual Disabilities, but actions, decisions, and initiatives often affect all students with disabilities. The STF has the responsibility to call upon the Commonwealth's resources for resolutions of needs and problems through administrative and policy making means.

The State Task Force is comprised of four members, representing the following:

- The Arc of Pennsylvania
- PA Department of Public Welfare
- PA Department of Education
- Governor's Office

The STF meets at least five times per year and meetings are open to the public. Caregivers and educators are encouraged to attend.
