• All three schools in the Madeira City Schools have been recognized by the United States Department of Education as Blue Ribbon Schools.

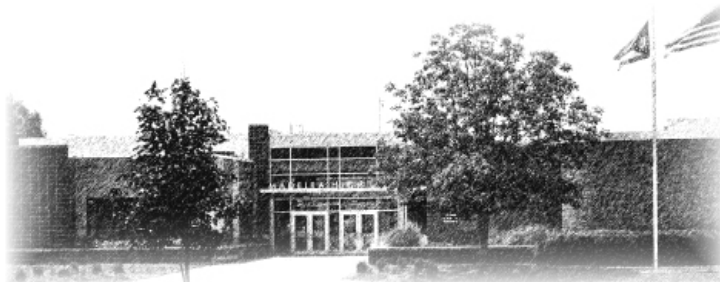
• Madeira High School was ranked #8 within the state of Ohio in the 2025 US News and World Report's Best High Schools. The report also ranked Madeira High School #311 in the national rankings, #4 in Cincinnati Metro Area High schools, and #399 in STEM high schools.

• Madeira has received the maximum 5 star report card rating every year this rating has been used by the state of Ohio. Of the 607 districts in the state, only 47 received 5 stars on the 2024-25 report card. Madeira was ranked 5th overall in the state's 2024-25 rating system.

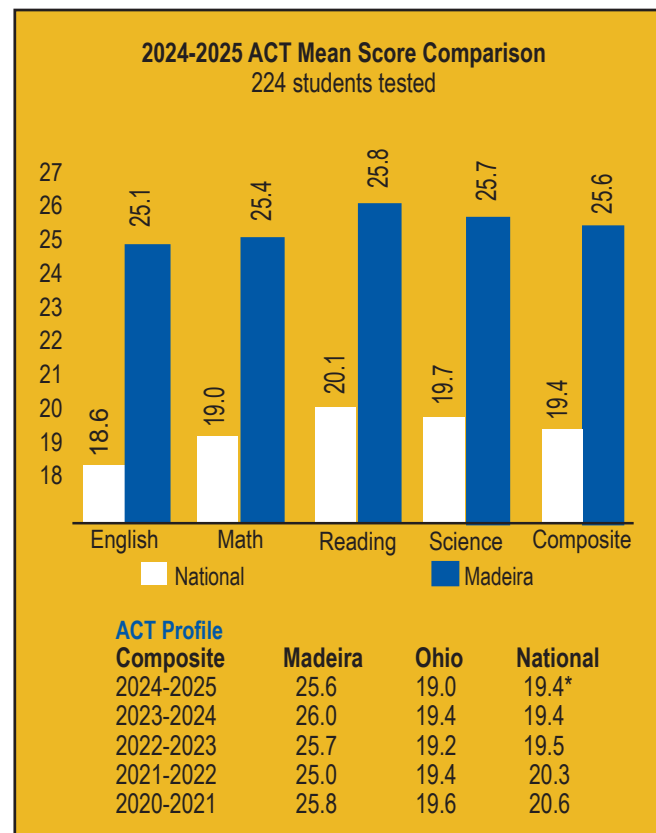

Advanced Placement and College Credit Plus courses are elevated by 1.0 (e.g. a 'B' earns 4.0 points). Honors courses are elevated by .5 (e.g. a 'B' earns 3.5 points). All courses are included in cumulative GPA, calculating rank at the end of each semester.

Student Accomplishments

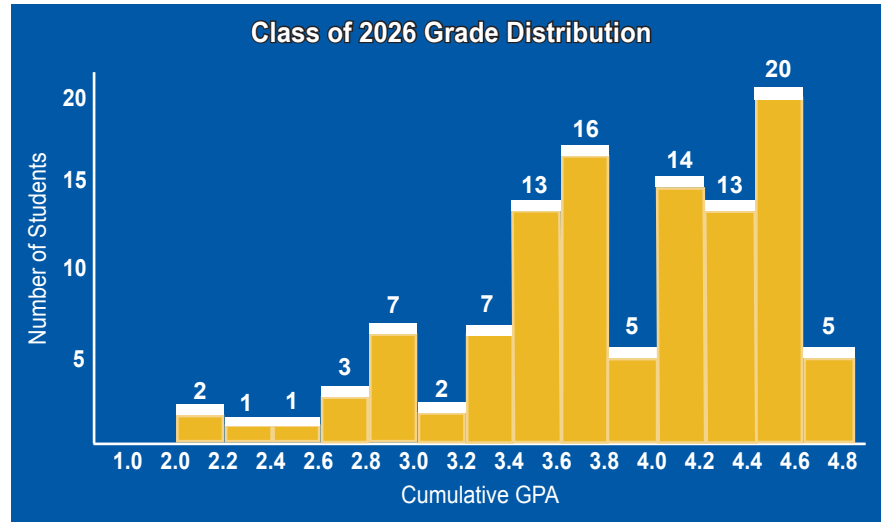
• An annual Day of Service, sponsored by the Madeira Schools Foundation, gives every high school student the opportunity to volunteer for over 20 local individuals and organizations.

• Approximately 1/3 of the Class of 2026 participate in at least one business internship or partnership.

• The National Honor Society is composed of 104 MHS students who qualify through academics, service and character.

• 98% of students are involved in extracurricular state qualifying athletic, academic and music programs.

• 7 High School students are involved in specialized programs through the Great Oaks Career Campuses.



The mean GPA for the Class of 2026 is 3.830. Among the students in the class, 51% are above the mean. The median GPA is 3.897. Reference to the ACT statistics presented on the front page will provide additional information. After six semesters the highest GPA is 4.637 and the lowest GPA is 2.029.

Course Designations at Madeira High School

Students at Madeira High School are encouraged to select academically challenging courses appropriate to their ability and performance as well both their immediate and future goals in college and career. Course designations are based on the level of challenge provided by the course content.

Each subject area may contain courses covering the same content with different levels of rigor. Courses are described on the transcript by the descriptors detailed below.

• **Advanced Placement (AP)** These very rigorous courses follow the national curriculum provided by the CollegeBoard and result in the opportunity to sit for the Advanced Placement exam in the subject area. All Advanced Placement courses receive weighted grades (1.0).

• **Honors (HN)** This designation indicates courses that are highly demanding and prepare students for continuing work at selective four year colleges. All Honors courses receive weighted grades (.5).

• **College Preparatory (CP)** These courses are comprehensive offerings that effectively prepare students for postsecondary studies.

• **College Credit Plus (CCP)/Dual Enrollment** The Ohio College Credit Plus program includes college coursework taught on or away from the Madeira High School campus. These courses earn transcripted college credit and also are included as high school credits. CCP courses are given weight equal to the most challenging offerings in each subject area. *These courses are represented by the college name, college course title and course number.*
