PRIORITIZING SAFETY: NEW MEASURES FOR 2025-2026

The Patchogue-Medford School District is deeply committed to maintaining a safe, secure, and welcoming learning environment for all students, staff, and visitors. For the 2025-2026 school year, we are focusing on three key areas of safety: the implementation of metal detectors to strengthen building security, enhancements to our Visitor Management System to better monitor campus access, and updated guidelines for e-bikes to promote safe transportation. These proactive measures reflect our District's ongoing commitment to student and community well-being while preserving the strong partnership between families, community members, and school staff that is vital to student success.

Security Measures and Metal Detector Policy

Per Board Policy 5154.1, periodic metal detector searches may occur during high-attendance events. Signs will be posted, designated entrances used, and additional protocols may apply. Safety remains our top priority. For questions, contact John Ahern, Director of Security, at 631-687-6580.





Visitor Guidelines

These following visitor and guest protocols ensure safety while fostering a welcoming environment. Thank you for your cooperation.

- **Appointments:** Visitors are encouraged to schedule appointments with staff before arriving.
- Check-In: All visitors must enter through the main entrance, use the intercom to state their name, purpose, and show photo ID (driver's license, military, or other government-issued). Those without ID require administrator approval.
- Visitor Management System: Approved visitors scan ID, take a live photo, and select destination. A badge will print if cleared. Badges must be worn visibly at all times.
- **Escort:** Visitors may not walk unescorted; staff must escort them to and from their destination.
- Sign-Out: Before leaving, visitors must return to the greeter desk, check out, and return their badge.

NYS E-Bike and E-Scooter Law

As electric-assist bicycles (e-bikes) grow in popularity, the Patchogue-Medford School District would like to remind families of the importance of safe and responsible riding as well as New York State law regarding e-bikes. By New York State law, riders must be at least 16 years old. Helmets are legally required for riders aged 16 and 17, as well as being strongly encouraged for those over 18. Please note that e-bikes and e-scooters are restricted in certain areas on school property as per Board policy 1340.

Nationally, e-bike injuries treated in emergency departments have increased dramatically. We urge parents and guardians to talk with their children about safe riding habits, age restrictions, and the importance of helmet use.

New York State legalized the use of bicycles with electric assist (e-bikes) and electric scooters (e-scooters) for people over 16 in 2020, but riders should be aware of key rules and restrictions. For more complete information, please scan the following QR code.

PATCHOGUE-MEDFORD FAMILY CENTER OFFERS SUPPORT FOR DISTRICT FAMILIES

The Patchogue-Medford School District reminds our community to take advantage of our Family Center, a welcoming resource hub designed to support families throughout the year. Located within the District, the Family Center offers a wide range of services, including counseling and crisis intervention, Spanish translation, free parent workshops, seasonal assistance (such as school supplies and home heating support), and an on-site food pantry for District families.

The Center also assists families in setting up accounts for important platforms like Parent Portal, ParentSquare, FinalForms, and before-and-after-school childcare.

EVERY DAY COUNTS: WHY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE MATTERS FOR YOUR CHILD'S SUCCESS

Regular school attendance is one of the strongest predictors of a child's academic success. Research shows that students who attend 95 percent or more of school days perform significantly better on standardized tests and develop stronger skills in reading and math. Even a few absences add up—missing just two days per month makes a student chronically absent, a factor linked to lasting academic challenges. Attendance habits formed as early as kindergarten can shape success throughout elementary school and beyond.

The benefits go far beyond test scores. Students who attend regularly build stronger relationships with teachers and peers, participate more actively in class, and are more likely to engage in extracurricular activities. These experiences foster not only academic growth but also personal development, confidence, and a sense of belonging. Looking ahead, students with consistent attendance are more likely to graduate on time, while chronic absenteeism increases the risk of falling behind academically.

We know some families face challenges that make daily attendance difficult. Please remember that help is available. If transportation, health concerns, or other obstacles are affecting your child's attendance, reach out to your school's guidance counselors, social workers, teachers, or principals. Our team is here to work with you and find solutions.

Over the coming weeks, our District Attendance Officer, Linda Hockney, will be spending time in our middle schools to meet students and families. She has been a familiar face in our high school for years, and now she's looking forward to getting to know our middle school students and families, too. Her role is not punitive, but supportive; she helps connect families with community resources, develop individualized attendance plans, and collaborate with school staff to ensure every student has the opportunity to succeed.

HOW OUR SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION SPECIALIST SUPPORTS STUDENT WELLNESS

Wilda Rosario, our dedicated substance abuse prevention social worker, plays a vital role in helping students stay healthy and make positive choices. Her position is made possible through a longstanding partnership with the Office of Addiction Services and Supports (OASAS) under the Safe and Drug-Free Schools Act, which has supported districts like ours for nearly four decades.

Mrs. Rosario leads evidence-based prevention groups at the high school level, where students learn about the risks of substance use and build skills for making safe, informed decisions. Her work is guided by research and tailored to the unique needs of our community.

Students suspended for substance possession participate in a structured ten-week support program with Mrs. Rosario. This intervention focuses not on punishment, but on growth, equipping students with tools for healthier choices. Prevention begins early: fourth graders receive age-appropriate lessons on smoking and vaping, while middle school students benefit from targeted summer programming before eighth grade.

DASA IN ACTION AT PATCHOGUE-MEDFORD

The Patchogue-Medford School District is committed to fostering safe, welcoming schools, environments in which every student is treated with dignity and respect. As part of this ongoing commitment, all District administrators participated in a Dignity for All Students Act (DASA) workshop during the annual administrative retreat on August 22, 2025 as well as a follow-up presentation by our District attorneys on September 17, 2025.

These workshop provided an in-depth overview of the law, including reporting requirements, investigation timelines, and the responsibilities of school leaders in addressing allegations of bullying. Administrators also engaged in meaningful discussions about prevention programs and strategies designed to reduce incidents of bullying while promoting positive school climates.

By strengthening understanding of DASA and reinforcing consistent practices across all schools, the District ensures that students and families can trust concerns will be taken seriously and handled with care. Together, we are dedicated to creating learning environments where every student feels safe, valued, and empowered to succeed.

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
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PORTRAIT OF A GRADUATE: PREPARING OUR STUDENTS FOR THE FUTURE

The Portrait defines six interconnected attributes that all graduates should demonstrate. These attributes are grounded in culturally responsive-sustaining education and reflect New York State Education Department's commitment to whole-child development:

- Academically Prepared. Mastery of NYS Learning Standards and readiness for college, careers, and civic engagement.
- **Creative Innovator**. Uses imagination and flexibility to solve problems and develop new ideas/products.
- Critical Thinker. Thoughtfully analyzes information, evaluates evidence, and makes interdisciplinary connections.
- Effective Communicator. Clearly articulates ideas through speaking, writing, and media; engages with diverse audiences.
- Global Citizen. Acts ethically and responsibly in local and global communities; promotes sustainability and democracy.
- Reflective and Future Focused. Practices selfreflection, sets goals, maintains positive relationships, and makes responsible decisions prioritizing well-being.
