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<b>FR14</b>	Identifies the officials responsible for compliance with all components of the local wellness policy in each school.	<b>2</b>

<b>PEPA14</b>	 Addresses physical activity breaks during school.	<b>0</b>
<b>PEPA15</b>	Joint or shared-use agreements for physical activity participation at all schools.	<b>0</b>
<b>PEPA16</b>	District addresses active transport (Safe Routes to School) for all K-12 students who live within walkable/bikeable distance.	<b>1</b>
<b>PEPA17</b>	 Addresses using physical activity as a reward.	<b>0</b>
<b>PEPA18</b>	Addresses physical activity not being used as a punishment.	<b>1</b>

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<b>PEPA19</b>	Addresses physical activity not being withheld as a punishment.	<b>0</b>
