9TH GRADE Requirements

Students must have completed
8th grade

10TH GRADE Requirements

Students must have 1 year of
attendance, earned 5 credits,
including Eng I and Alg I

11TH GRADE Requirements

Students must have 2 years of
attendance and 11 credits earned.



ABSENCES

Excessive Absences

Student must be in attendance 90% of the days for the semester or credit for the course is lost due to excessive absences.

(No more than 8 absences in 1st semester and no more than 10 in 2nd semester)

AP must approve all excessive absences plans.

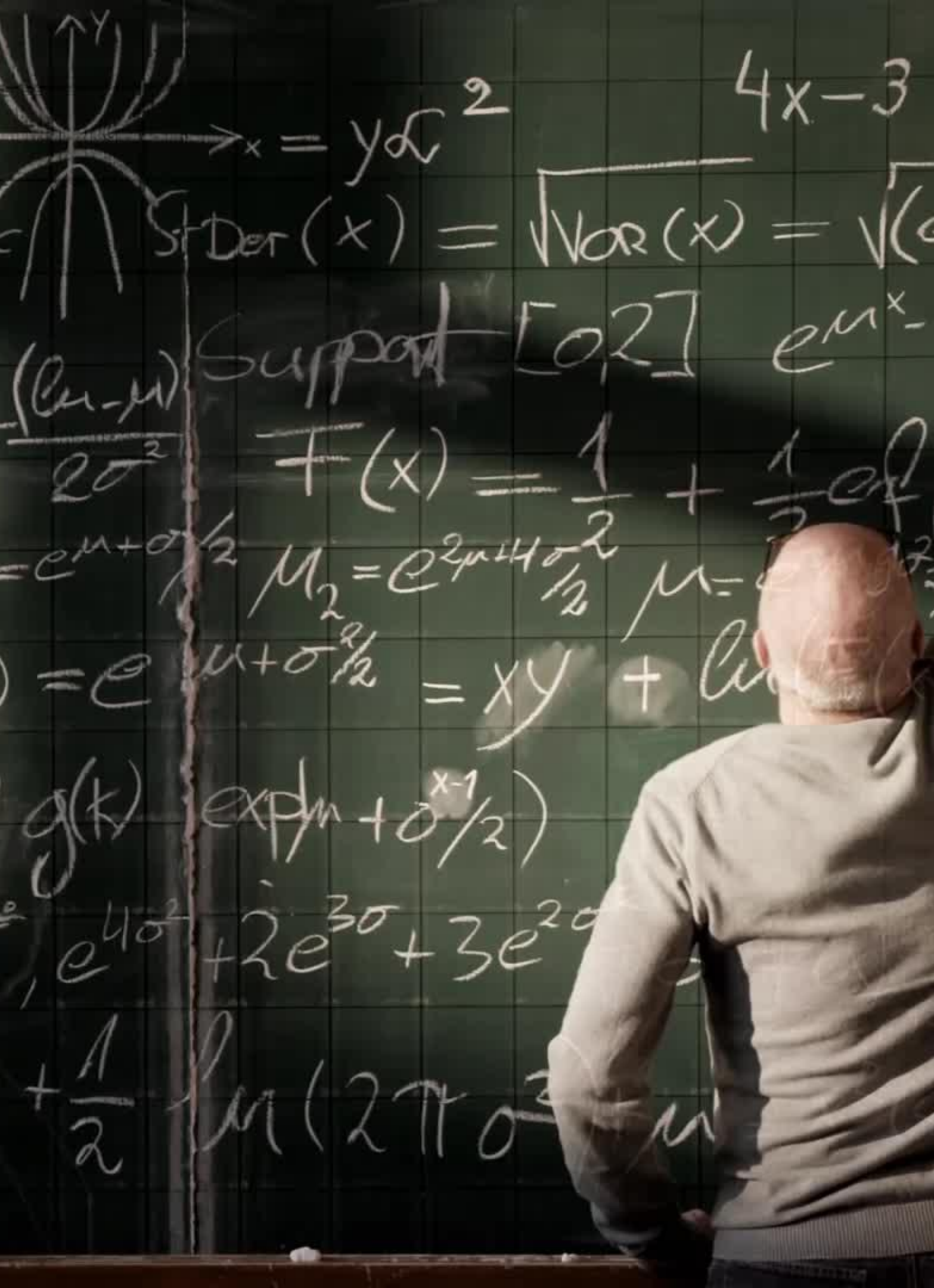

ENGLISH Requirements

4 credits of English

PACE (1½)credit





MATH Requirements

Algebra, Geometry and a 2 additional math credits for a total of 4 credits.

Algebra II must be completed to earn the Distinguished Level of Achievement and to qualify for advanced math classes. It is also require for STEM endorsement.

science REQUIREMENTS

Biology and IPC, Chemistry or Physics, and 2 additional science courses for a total of 4 credits.

Chemistry completion is needed to qualify for advanced science classes, and Chemistry and Physics are required for a STEM endorsement.



SOCIAL STUDIES Requirements

World Geography or World History,
U.S. History, Government (1/2) &
Economics (1/2)

PHYSICAL EDUCATION & HeALTH

- 1 credit of Physical Education
- 1/2 credit of *Health requirements for graduation.

*Health is not required beginning with the Class of 2029. Instead, an additional .5 elective credit is needed.

Fine ARTS

1 credit of the same Fine Arts is required for graduation

* Students participating in Band will earn ½ credit for Band I and ½ credit for Band II





Electives

- 6 credits of Elective course options for class of 2028
- 6.5 for the Class of 2029 and beyond

High school counselors can provide information, answer questions, and in some instances, help students enroll in courses outside the regular school day.

ADDITIONAL GRADUATION Requirements

Two years of the same Foreign Language (LOTE) are required.

At least one Endorsement is required

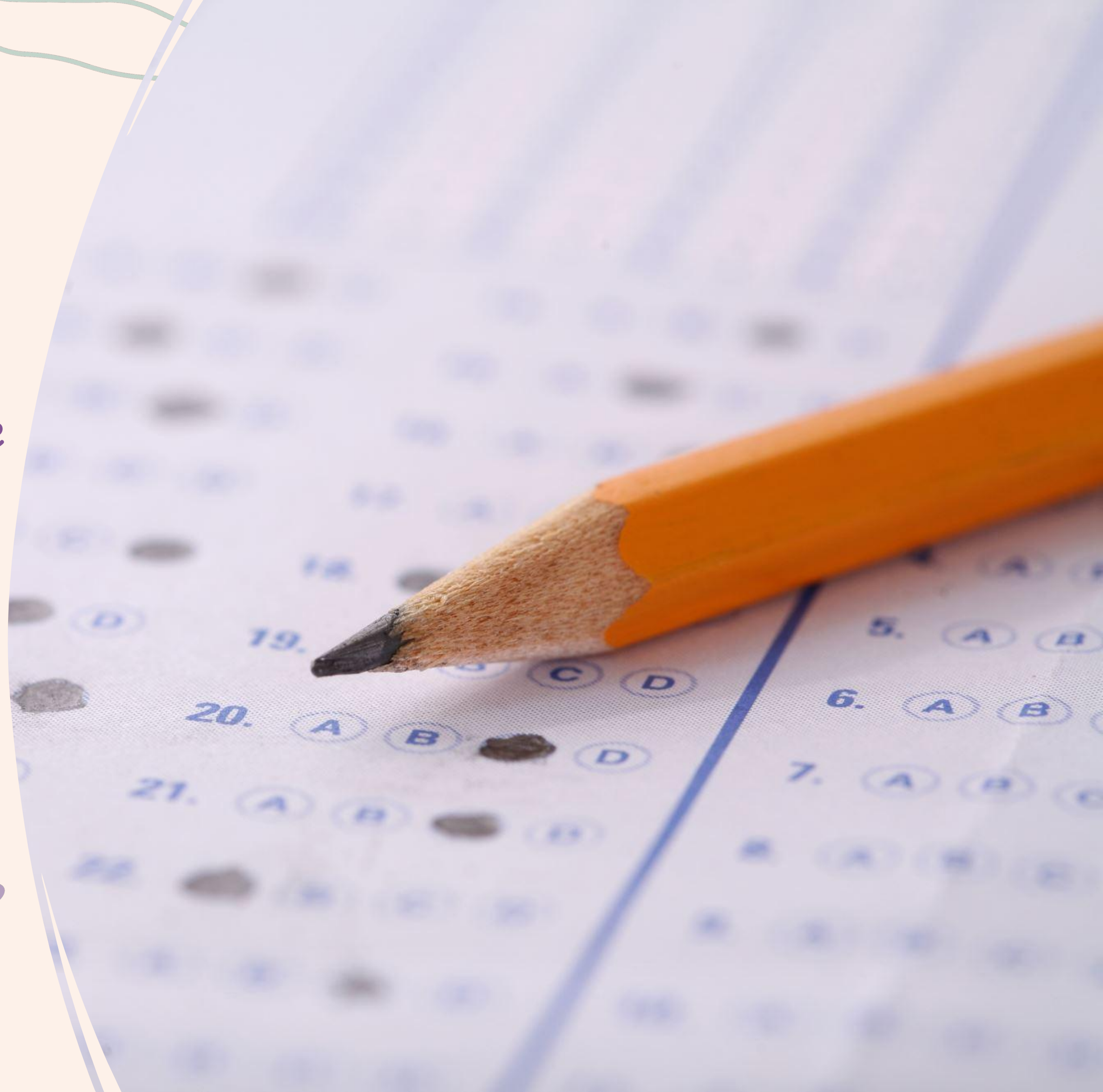


NOTE: Any high school courses taken in middle school count as high school credit, however *most* are not included in the GPA. (Spanish IIIK & IVK/AP, Art for HS credit, Geometry, Biology, and Health are exceptions.)

STANDARDIZED TESTING

Students are required to meet satisfactory performance on the five STAAR (EOC) assessments to graduate high school

- English I
- Algebra I
- Biology
- English II
- US History



TRANSCRIPT

- Permanent academic record starts with high school course work
 - High School credits earned in middle school will be on transcript but not all will be added to GPA
- Utilized by colleges, employers, and military
- What's on the transcript?
 - Semester grades
 - GPA
 - Class Rank
 - Endorsement
 - Standardized test scores – STAAR EOC

GPA AND CLASS RANK


Explanation of [GPA calculation](#) and its impact on class rank.

Pass/Fail opportunities are available for Juniors and Seniors who have a GPA over 6.0.

GPA/Class Rank information is available on Home Access Center(HAC) under the transcript tab

Ranking for seniors only will be updated in January and calculated for the Graduation Ceremony in March.

4 YEAR PLANNING

- Students update 4 year plans annually through the registration process
- 4 year plans are maintained in Xello 
- Freshman conferences will be held during the semester the student take PACE
 - This conference is how 9th graders register for their 10th grade classes
- Sophomore Conferences/Registration will be held in January and February
- During freshman and sophomore years, we encourage students to take rigorous courses and/or courses to pursue a certification or earn college credit, when eligible!

Programs of study: state-approved coherent sequence of courses, industry-based certification(s), and work-based learning

College, Career, & Military Readiness (CCMR) equips students with the essential skills and knowledge needed for life beyond high school, whether they choose higher education, a career, or military service. Through a variety of resources, curriculum, and activities, CCMR ensures students are well-prepared for their next steps.

A student must be on track to earn their CCMR point and endorsement to qualify for Early Release/Late Arrival and final exam exemptions their senior year, so it's important to start planning now!

PSAT TESTING

Sophomores and juniors are strongly encouraged to take the PSAT on **October 1st!** This is excellent practice for the SAT, which is typically taken during the junior year. Taking the PSAT during 11th grade also qualifies students for entry into the National Merit Scholarship program.

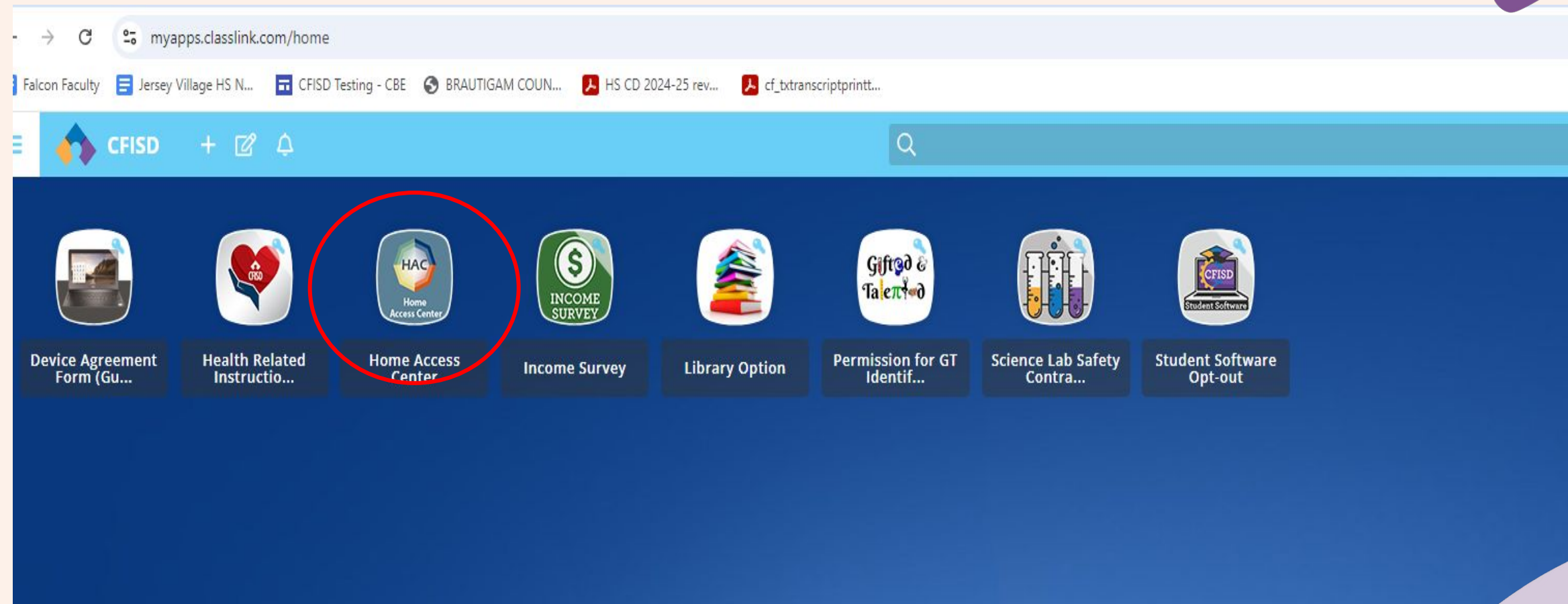
